State Police Officer Deplores Traffic Toll for Magic Valley

RUPERT, Sept. 3.—State Police Officer J. H. Burt, who has been patrolling the Magic Valley for several years, deplores the toll that the traffic takes on the valley's roads.

"There have been 38 fatal accidents this year and 103 accidents in all," he said. "There have been 103 fatalities—of these, about 10 were one-car accidents and eight were two-car accidents. The rest were three-car accidents."

The only major highway in the valley is U.S. 12, which is a two-lane highway. "It is a very dangerous highway," he said. "It is a very narrow highway and it is a very old highway."

Between Boise and Pocatello on the north side route 12, there is only one patrolman and his territory extends north into Elmore and Blaine counties.

There are 35 points of entry state police now and 30 patrolmen. Before the legislature cut the patrol force, the lieutenant said the traffic toll was much heavier.

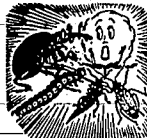

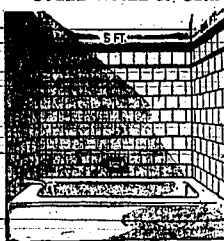
