

00 Perish As Tremor Hits Africa

ALGERIA, Sept. 9 (AP)—A tremendous earthquake today leveled about a fifth of the city of Oran in northern Algeria and severely injured thousands of people. Unofficial estimates put the number of dead and injured at over 1,000. Authorities described the quake as the worst in Africa's worst 20 years.

At least 1,000 people died in the quake, which was as high as 1,000 miles from the epicenter. Telephone lines were cut, and communication between Oran and Algiers and Oran and the rest of the world was knocked out. At least 200 dead and injured were reported. The quake was as strong as 2.5 on the Richter scale.

Ike Has Careful Plan For Surplus Disposal

DENVER, Sept. 9 (AP)—President Eisenhower today announced a government policy aimed at expansion of world trade and avoidance of "demoralizing world commodity markets" in disposal of a billion dollars worth of surplus farm crops during the next three years.

Under the agricultural trade development and assistance act approved by congress at the last session, surplus commodities valued at 700 million dollars may be sold abroad by the U. S. during the next 36 months.

In addition, commodities valued at up to 300 million dollars may be given away to friendly peoples abroad in the event of national disaster or famine.

Prospects for Polio Vaccine Termed Good

ROME, Sept. 9 (AP)—Three American leaders in the war on polio prospects are good for a vaccine that eventually may give long protection against the disease.

Dr. Jonas E. Salk, whose vaccine already has been given to 425,000 American school children in a mass immunization drive, said the vaccine is as good as possible with a few injections.

Dr. Albert B. Sabin, said some possibly remote day—but not yet—a doctor may give a baby a few drops of vaccine and thereby immunize him for life.

Far Submers Fleet

Cat-Catching Cat Rescued By 100 Pals

NEW YORK, Sept. 9 (U-P)—A cat, the only one of its kind in the world, was rescued by 100 pals from a trap set for it by a cat-hater.

The cat, a white female with dark eyes, was born on the Brooklyn island of Long Island City. It was a favorite with longshoremen and a terror to rats that infest the area.

Her favorite hunting ground was a space beneath and between the wooden planks of the pier. The workmen reinforced the pier with a 15-inch coat of concrete, thus trapping the cat.

Several days passed and no one saw the cat. It was thought it had been killed. Then someone heard it meow from a three-inch hole in the concrete.

After that the longshoremen took down their cat. They discovered a huge electric drill from construction gang and bored a hole in the concrete.

Four minutes after being without food for eight days, now she had been freed from her prison. She was as upset from the noise of the drill that she wouldn't come near the hole to freedom.

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Viruses May Aid Solution Of Mysteries

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9 (U-P)—A new technique for discovering a group of viruses which may help scientists solve some baffling medical mysteries was announced today.

Dr. Robert J. Huebner, chief of the division of the National Microbiology Institute, Bethesda, Md., and other scientists reported the process to the International Conference on Microbiology.

Grown in tissue

Using this new technique and related methods, scientists have isolated and grown about 100 viruses representing human and animal diseases. The viruses were removed and kept alive for periods up to two months in laboratories.

Some of the uncovered viruses have been found in respiratory diseases, including influenza, measles, mumps, and scarlet fever. Dr. Huebner said it was possible to isolate the viruses from other animals and the disease they cause.

Dr. Huebner said the new method is useful in many ways. For instance, it may be possible to keep live and other human tissue in long enough to discover in those organs unknown viruses which cause disease.

The technique was used in a hunt for the cause of the common cold. But Dr. Huebner said there is no evidence that the virus was spread so far cause the runny nose type of cold without fever. He said the virus produces an attack frequently classified as a common cold but of the type that includes a severe throat and fever.
