CONTRIBUTION TO SAFETY

To a world accustomed to long drawn-out international conferences, the speed with which the Manila meeting proceeded to shun a Southeast Asia defense pact is the short of amazing.

The explanation appears to be that groundwork for the session was carefully laid, and a great heart was prepared with scrupulous attention to the views of all participating nations, and the meeting itself was marked a determination to reach a quick accord.

For this combination of favorable circumstances, much credit must go to Secretary of State John Foster Dulles. The approved agreement is essentially the American draft.

So, after a brief three days, it is a reality at the United States, France, Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines, Thailand and Pakistan are joined in defensive alliance against the threat of spreading communism in Asia.

The achievement is of the utmost importance, though the pact does not contain the NATO-type automatic agreement that any pact member attacked shall immediately have the benefit of military aid on all its treaty partners.

It is this time that the United States has learned not to fear aggression in the era of marauding Japanese militarism, wanted the automatic feature. But they bowed before the leader feeling that such a pact would be impractical in Asia at this time.

In Europe, the Western powers have worked together in two wars. They have a long tradition of cooperation in the face of peril. In Asia, this tradition does not exist. This is the first real wedding of Asian nations that have been accomplished. It is understandable that Dulles and other diplomats gave a course which would allow Asia to preach this new association—somewhat eagerly. They have tried to drive them into system—calling for non-alignment, guarantees, and other allies.

Consequently, the SEATO treaty says each ally will meet the "common danger" of armed attack in the treaty area in accord with its own constitutional processes, and in the event of aggression the members will "consult immediately to determine appropriate measures for the common defense. Aid will be sent only on request of an attacked nation.

This country made a concession which may soundly wider than it appears. It was agreed that the pact should not specify communist aggression as the threat to Asia, India and its followers, Burma and Ceylon, refused to have anything to do with a pact they believe directed against particular powers. In time, it is felt they might be induced to see the wisdom of this feeling, provided the provocative language is being.

Greene said boxing "can be better" by organized effort to make it a sport rather than "just a boxing business."

"Boxing, because of television, has been made only a medium for exploitation," said Greene, "when the day comes that it no longer comes up to such standards, it will be dropped."

Speaking to the 100 representatives of boxing commissions in the Western hemisphere, including Panama and Cuba, Greene said there were less than a dozen clubs with fewer than 2,000 fighters now working.

"Boxing is no longer a sport," he said, "it is a business, and it is being exploited by these clubs that down now ... before television kills them."
