### Record Crop Reported for Latah County

his cooperative and that 23,000 bushels have been dumped on the ground at Decoy. It had been estimated that the record crop would be 20,000 bushels this year. He added that general yields are good because of the early rains. "Overall averages of wheat yields in the Latah area is running 40 bushels per acre," said E. Hoffman of the Lewiston Grain Growers, Inc., plants at Kootenai. The highest yield at that area was 78 bushels on a 40-acre field. He said it is the biggest harvest in the history of his plant—2 years and 2 million more pounds of wheat than last year. Farmers delivering grain to the Mark P. Miller Milling company here are averaging 40 to 45 bushels per acre, said Conrad Lyons, plant manager. The yields in the Moscow area are averaging 1,500 pounds per acre. Homer Peterson of Oriskany, Moscow, said he has averaged 3,000 pounds per acre in the July crops in the Juliaca area.

### Methodists in Jerome Plan Ecent Sunday

JEROME, Sept. 15.—Jerome Methodist church will observe its 45th birthday Sunday, Sept. 18, with a special service Sunday. Guest speaker at 11 a. m. worship service will be by Mrs. Edward Carlson, district superintendent, Boise.

Following the service a coffee hour will be held and an anniversary cake will be served. Members will be honored. Arrangements for the coffee hour are being made by Mrs. Edna Carlson, John Overfield, Mrs. Virginia McCarty and Mrs. C. E. Callen.

The Jerome church was organized Sept. 16, 1900, with the Rev. J. L. Minney as pastor. However the first preaching service was held on Oct. 4, 1900, in the common club room in the Camasa building. Seventeen were present at the first service but when the church was organized it had 70 members. In November, 1909, the amusement hall was rented and services were held there for a period of time. Later the church offered to let the Methodists use their church building for a period of time.

October, 1910, the Episcopal church was offered for use by the Methodists without cost.

When the church was organized in 1900, E. E. Brewer was the first chairman of the efforts to build the church. Graham was chairman of the board of stewards. Mrs. E. E. Brewer, Phoenix, Ariz., was chairman of the ladies' aid. Mrs. W. E. White, in Jerome, this time was the first president of the church.

The church was built at the corner of Avenue A and Elm street in 1911 and was completed in 1912. The value of the property at that time was listed at \$2,500. In 1910 the church had two ministers, each for a period of time. The salary was paid out in salaries to them. By 1919, when Dr. H. O. McCullister was pastor, the salary had been increased to \$1,200.

An addition was added to the first building in 1927 for Sunday school and the property was valued at \$5,000.

The new sanctuary was started March 1928 and was completed July 1929. The Rev. Donald Walker was pastor. Dr. W. E. White, district superintendent, presided at the dedication, 18, 1940. Dr. Werda and the Rev. J. D. Grogg conducted the ceremony in 1940.

His beginning with 70 members in 1909, the church today has 237 members. Twenty-two ministers have served the church, including the present pastor, the Rev. Dwight E. Wheeler.

### RED-COLORED GLASSES

The famous British labor delegation touring the communist world came up the other day with its pronouncements on life in red China.

The findings really fall into two categories—those by the relatively conservative Labor party, and those by the fiery demagogue, Aneurin Bevan.

Attlee's report showed that he had at least made some effort to keep his head about him, and not be swept into gales of enthusiasm for the communist regime. He had the nerve to ask Chinese Chairman Mao Tse-tung to "use his influence on the Russians to reduce their world armaments."

He also asked Mao to urge Moscow to give up its intrigues in other countries and free the iron curtain satellites.

But Attlee was more glib on other scores. Though he noted that China relies heavily on Russia for industrial supplies (he could have said military supplies), he seemed to have said that he could find "no other examples" of Russian influence inside China.

One wonders how he could have imagined the reds would really spell out such examples if they were trying to impress the visiting Britons with their independence and their peaceful intentions.

Attlee also observed "extraordinary activity" in red China and said he was impressed by "certain definite reforms." He was troubled at the time but still felt that evidence indicated a government "based on the good will of the peasant population."

At this point, Reporter Attlee was at his worst. Whatever he may have been shown on his tour, there is mounting evidence to suggest charges of severe oppression of the Chinese people by Mao's regime. He either does not read or his memory is a sieve.

As for Bevan, he once again demonstrated his almost total lack of capacity for understanding or sympathy for the Chinese people. In moving to Japan, he assured sympathetic socialists that Asia had nothing to fear from the red Chinese in this way of further aggression.

Bevan said coexistence with China is now the only sane course for the rest of Asia. He said the world's welfare cannot be preserved by "dividing the world into two sharply antagonistic organizations."

If the world is so divided, it is the communist doing and the free nations? If it stays divided, again the fault cannot be laid at the west's door. Bevan appears to feel the reverse is true.

The truth is these differences can only be healed at the expense of the communist regime. The political and military marauding of Chinese-inspired rebels in Indochina and Burma gives the perfect refutation for Bevan's glib and utterly false picture of the situation in Asia.

In sum, we must conclude the Attlee-Bevan accounts of life in China followed expected form pretty closely. The net effect is damage to the free world, for some people are likely to believe this nonsense.

### TESTING GROUND

Headlines these days suggest pretty furious activity between the nationalist and the communist Chinese around the small islands off the mainland coast of China. The effect could be misleading if serious operations there are not kept in perspective.

The reds may well be in the preliminary stages of an invasion attempt against Quemoy, an island some seven miles from the mainland. The island has long been occupied by the nationalists and by them as a base for hit-and-run raids against the mainland.

These raids have harassed the communists ceaselessly, and it would not be surprising if they should now be mounting an attack designed to wipe out the base.

Naturally the nationalists are unwilling to abandon this desirable vantage point without a fight. They might find it a severe assault against the red mainland and island bases near Quemoy is the measure of the importance they attach to their outpost.

But this is not war on a big scale, nor is it necessarily a prelude to red attack on the far more important strategic prize of Formosa, the big nationalist-held island 100 miles off the Chinese shore.

The reds can try and may succeed in capturing tiny Quemoy with a vast assortment of junk and other vulnerable craft, despite the fact that the island is heavily defended by the U. S. seventh fleet standing patrol duty close by. Is something else? There is no evidence the reds are prepared yet even to attempt a sneak assault there by sea. Only the Russian navy could give them the support they need for such an attack.

As a theoretical matter, the idea of an airborne attack cannot be ruled out. But the chances are that yet China is not now equipped nor is its military manpower trained for that kind of offensive.

So blows against Quemoy, however loudly they are heralded, do not signal the start of a broader offensive against the big target, Formosa. Possibly their only value, as a prelude would be to gauge the character and strength of the national defense of Quemoy. If that defense is rugged, the reds may think a long time before trying to remove the painful Formosa thorn in their side.

### Union Bosses Take Varying Views on Bid

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 15.—Dave Beck, president of the AFL "Teamsters" union, took a stand opposite to AFL President George Meany by opposing a proposal to eliminate jurisdictional disputes in organized labor.

The hourly labor leader declared upon his arrival here yesterday for next week's national convention of the federation that he would "not be a party to such an agreement and the Teamsters' union will not sign it."

Opposes Meany. Beck's stand on the issue was opposed to that of Meany, who has been advocating an end to jurisdictional agreements.

The federation is composed of autonomous unions with autonomous rights to disagree, Beck said. "We have machinery to cope with jurisdictional disputes and we intend to come to separate understanding with the employers."

In explaining his opposition, Beck said his union did not intend to raise others but on the other hand did not want to be tied down to the proposed agreement.

"There's been a lot of talk about this," Beck said, "and there are thousands of workers in other unions who should be in with the Teamsters."

Further opposition was expressed by Beck to a possible merger of the AFL and CIO. "He said he did not believe the time was ripe for the plan 'broad enough' for such a move."

### Solon Says GOP To Guard Mines

WINNEPEG, Sept. 15.—The Republican party is concerned with the welfare of the U. S. mining industry, Rep. Cliff Young, R., Nev., says.

Speaking in Winnepeg, he pointed to the federal administration's new program for the protection of 200,000 tons of domestic lead and 300,000 tons of domestic zinc as evidence of such concern.

"Nevada miners should support a Republican congress if they want protection from foreign imports," Young said. He added, "The 20-year trend of developing foreign mines at the expense of local producers has been halted."

He said the legislation passed this year for the benefit of U. S. miners, while helpful, was still not enough. Young said future Republican congresses would take further steps to protect the domestic miner from outside competition.

The policy-making general body of the council, largest Protestant body in the nation, yesterday adopted this resolution:

"The President of the United States has appointed Sept. 22, 1954, as a day of prayer and has invited to all citizens of the nation to unite in praying for peace."

"The National Council of the Churches of Christ in the United States of America urges its constituent churches to respond to the call and to share in the intercessions of this day."

### Navy Hurricane Hunters Can't Explain Why They're Doing It

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Sept. 15.—U. S. navy weather planes have been plunging into hurricanes for 10 years and the men who fly them concede they can't explain why they attack it.

The 35 officers and 200 enlisted men of airborne early warning squadron four, the navy's "hurricane hunters," are not "thrill-seeking youngsters. All but two of the pilots are married men, most of them veterans, and why they love their job is a mystery even to them.

They are all volunteers, get no extra pay and must stay on call 24 hours a day during the hurricane season from June 15 to Nov. 20.

Their job is to fly at wave-top level into such hurricanes to chart its force and direction. Their reports give coastal towns time to prepare, and hurricanes no longer take the same fearful toll as the howler which hit Galveston in 1900, killing an estimated 10,000 persons.

The squadron, based at the Jacksonville naval air station with a detachment at San Juan, Puerto Rico, operates under the control of fleet weather-central at Miami.

Because of the danger of flying into a hurricane which may have winds of more than 100 miles an hour, the pilots are "requested" and not ordered to enter the storm. Whether they do or not is up to them. They always do unless they feel it would definitely jeopardize the lives of their crews.

### Ruling Given Vet Students On Total Pay

Wages earned by veterans holding down part-time jobs while attending school will not affect the GI allowance paid them by the federal government, reports—Arnold Helmer, Twin Falls veterans administrator.

These earnings need not be reported to the VA, says Helmer. Some veterans have confused the Korean GI bill with the World War II law which placed a ceiling on income earned by veterans in civilian life.

The Korean GI bill does have a ceiling, but for on-the-job training only. It does not apply to veterans in the classroom. Even this job training ceiling imposes no limit on how much a veteran may earn.

Instead, when a veteran's on-the-job training wages plus his GI allowance exceed \$310 a month, the VA scales down the allowance accordingly to bring the total within the \$310 limit.

Starting allowance rate for Korean veterans with no dependents is \$70 a month; \$85 for one dependent and \$105 for more than one dependent.

Under the law, these rates are reduced at four-month intervals as training progresses and the veteran's earning abilities increase.

Pay for veterans in school full-time with no dependents is \$135 and \$150 for "veterans" with more than one dependent.

**Drug Might  
Work on Cancer**

CHICAGO, Sept. 18 (AP)—A new formula for parysnylin, shows promise against specific strains of cancer, of controlling some infections of certain types of cancer, and of curing cancer, the American Chemical Society has announced today.

The formula, by changing the structure of the parysnylin molecule, is "tailor-made" against specific strains of cancer cells, said scientists of the Laboratories division of the Cyanamid company.

The formula has knocked out transplanted cancer in mice, and has been tested experimentally on cancer.

The greatest promise so far has been in the treatment of African sleeping sickness, a parasite, and is under study on humans and animals.

The first was obtained from a tumor found in an old Indian in Wisconsin. Now it and several of relatives have been made available.

The drug may be the first in a new line of antibiotics, by changing the way in which bacteria multiply. It is the first new agent against specific strains of bacteria, such as those that cause typhoid, diphtheria, tetanus, and pneumonia. It also has been shown to kill cancer cells, said scientists at the American Cyanamid company, which has planted breast cancers in mice, and administered the drug experimentally to patients with human cancers.

It shows greatest promise so far against African sleeping sickness, malaria, and typhoid fever, and is now in going trials on humans and animals along with this disease.

The drug was obtained from a mold found in an old Indian and Chinese mound in Wisconsin. Now it and its number of relatives have been made synthetically.

## Beef, Poultry And Seafoods Likely 'Buys'

By Associated Press

Scouting prices of beef, poultry and seafood this week as among the best available buys for week-end feasting.

Still on the list of stand-out bargains as recently as a week ago, pork has since moved sharply higher in price, reflecting increased wholesale costs. Center cut pork chops are up as much as 10 cents a pound as retail in some cities.

Prices of veal, another recent favorite, also are moving up.

While beef prices in most areas are pretty much the same as last week, individual markets have slanted out T-bone steak, rib roast and boneless chuck pot roast for promotion as week-end specials. The U. S. department of agriculture has designated beef as its food "champion" for the week.

Specialists say beef is in more than plentiful supply.

Poultry chickens constitute a good buy, with prices down as much as six cents a pound from last week-end in some cities. Devices of seafood can find occasional bargains in cod fillets, oysters, lobster and shrimp.

Egg prices mostly are lower. The downward trend a production slump resulting from cooler weather.

There still are plenty of bargains around on the produce counter although the season for some fruits and vegetables is drawing to a close.

Best buys in the vegetable department include eggplant, corn, sweet potatoes, cabbage and peppers. Seedling grapes, peaches and apples still can be had at reasonable prices. They're practically giving away apples and peaches in some eastern areas where orchards have been damaged by hurricane winds.

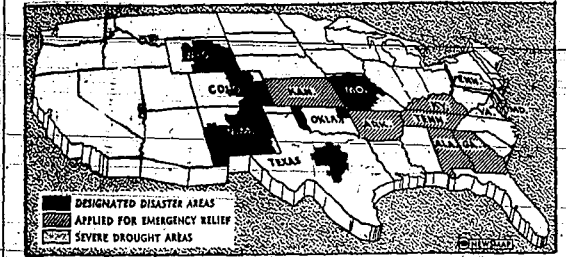
The season for Florida citrus fruit is expected to arrive on schedule with grapefruit shipments arriving in big city markets in heavy tons. They are plentiful, but most other citrus categories now available were grown in California.

## Red Smokes Bring Anger From Public

VIENNA, Sept. 16 (AP)—Here's a way to stop smoking: Try communist cigarettes. It's a cigarette recently and immediately felt such pain that I still cannot find words to describe it," a Hungarian wrote to the Budapest newspaper Magyar Nemzet. Similar complaints have been noted from readers in Poland, Romania, Bulgaria, Hungary and East Germany.

Hungarian cigarettes, the reds' official newspapers admit, often are found to contain almost no tobacco at all. In Poland, smokers grumble they discover pieces of rags among their state-produced tobacco products.

Smokers in Bulgaria, the home of fine tobacco, claim the cigarettes the state sells them sometimes are "completely rotten." In Romania, newspaper readers wonder why there are sometimes only 15 cigarettes in a package supposed to contain 20.

Polish smokers complain that there are 10 different state-made brands for sale in Poland, but all taste alike. In East Germany, a newspaper freely conceded that several brands "are not suitable for human consumption."
