Solon Cancels Three Speech Appointments

CHICAGO, Sept. 24.—The Republican leaders were caught flat-footed today by Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy's cancellation of the three speaking dates he had scheduled.

The Wisconsin Republican had been scheduled to speak tomorrow at Omaha, Neb., Sunday at Springfield, Ill., and the following day at Bloomington, Ill.

Sponsors of the speeches expressed disappointment over the cancellations.

McCarthy's aides reported that he was suffering from a sinus infection and that he is under a doctor's care. It was not clear whether he was in a Washington hospital or at his capital apartment.

Illinois State Treasurer Homer T. Hoffman said he was informed by telephone yesterday that McCarthy was "in a hospital." But the senator's wife told the Chicago Tribune that he was at home.

Hoffman is chairman of the Du Page county Republican convention which sponsored the scheduled Naperville speech.

His scheduled appearance in St. Paul, Minn., was also canceled.

McCarthy would not appear, however, at an order for installation of an extra 5,000 chairs.

Plan for Natural Gas in Idaho Hit By Utah Coalmen

BOISE, Sept. 24.—The Idaho public utilities commission today had on file a request from the Utah Coal Association to intervene in the natural gas hearings scheduled to start in Boise Oct. 1.

The association had filed about two years ago as an intervenor against the intermountain gas company. The latest petition was in connection with the applications of the Oregon Gas company, Greeley, Colo.; Idaho Natural Gas, Boise; and Pocatello Natural Gas.

All of the applications have asked for the right to distribute natural gas in southern Idaho.

The association said its members would be adversely affected by the distribution of gas in Idaho, and the product would displace coal as fuel and result in loss of work to producers, transporters and distributors.

Air Project's Aid Is Asked By Concerns

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 24.—Small, independent airlines today asked the support of state aviation officials in a plan for a nation-wide "air exchange" for their companies.

John A. Johnson, president of the Air Transport Association, which represents the non-scheduled airlines, asked for action in the exchange plan at a meeting of the national association of state aviation officials held here today.

The exchange proposal, which would let the aircraft transportation group coordinate operations for charter and contract flying, is now pending before the civil aeronautics board. The association, through a central control board in Washington, D. C., already handles military charters for the independent airlines.

The air exchange proposed by the "airline" transportation association would be the only one of its kind.

Price Cuts Keynote Nation's Economy Picture for Autumn

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—A smattering of price cuts—downsides for vitamins—brighten the consumer's prospects.

A few more may be on the way. The outlook at the butcher's is for what the meat industry calls "retentive prices" for the remainder of the year.

And Christmas shopping may be easier on the pocketbook, too. Such old standby gifts as toilet articles, jewelry, luggage, and fur will have the benefit of the cut in Uncle Sam's excise taxes.

TV set prices have been lowered by a number of manufacturers on the eve of their biggest selling season. And attractive price tags may be put on a number of toys when the stores ready up their Christmas gift departments.

But merchants and manufacturers alike hasten to add that while lower prices here and there will gladden the shopper, the price prospect in general is for more of the same stability.

Prices of individual commodities are pretty steady, or down, or up, in the last two years. But the most striking thing has been the stability of the price average. Neither the wholesale nor the consumer price indexes have varied notably for many months.

Inventory cutting, declining industrial activity and a slowdown in some sections of retail trade usually bring on price drops at this time of year.

Producers explain that operating costs have reached so high a level as to put a solid floor under prices. Distributors say their costs are so much heavier than a few years back that they can't lower retail prices. On the contrary, they complain of an increasing squeeze in their profit margins.

But if the cost of living in general stays pretty steady—and most economists look for it to continue that way for awhile—the consumer can take comfort today in the price cuts that drop up here and there.

Polio Hits High Through Nation

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—The public health service reports 278 new cases of polio last week, a new weekly high for the year. That was 537 more cases than reported the previous week.

The incidence of poliomyelitis for 1954 is following the same pattern as it did in 1953, when the incidence remained on a high plane for about five weeks, the service said in its weekly summary.

It noted that the 155 cases in the corresponding 1953 week also was an increase over the preceding week, but not the peak figure. However, an official who closely follows the situation said he believed the disease has just about reached its peak this year.

Judge Hears Burley Court Crime Pleas

BURLEY, Sept. 24—Merle Day, Burley, pleaded innocent Wednesday when arraigned before District Judge R. Beckwith on a charge of forgery.

Day was arrested last May on the charge of forgery and pleaded guilty in preliminary hearing. Bail was set at \$2,500 but bond was not posted. The hearing was held Aug. 11 and he was bound over to district court.

When arraigned Wednesday before Judge Beckwith, Day pleaded innocent but no date was set for trial. Bail was continued at \$2,500.

On Sept. 17 Judge Beckwith released James Morrison, Burley, on a similar charge, so Morrison could go to work. Day was charged with forging three checks. He waived preliminary hearing Aug. 20 and was bound over to district court.

Day was not posted Sept. 13. Morrison was taken before Judge Beckwith who ordered the defendant's release.

Richard Weigall, Rupert, pleaded guilty to first degree burglary when arraigned before Judge Beckwith Wednesday. The judge will sentence Weigall Oct. 4.

Weigall was arrested Aug. 30 and on his arraignment before Probate Judge Henry W. Tucker he waived preliminary hearing. Bail was set at \$2,000 and bond was not posted.

Max Wilson, Heyburn, was sentenced by Judge Beckwith Oct. 4 on a charge of first degree burglary. He was arrested Aug. 30 and pleaded guilty to the charge.

Also sentenced Oct. 4 will be Theodore Tworby, Kelso, Wash., who was arrested Sept. 18 on a charge of burglary. He was sentenced to 10 years in the state penitentiary.

Also sentenced Oct. 4 will be Layton on a charge of grand larceny in connection with the theft of a car. He was arrested Sept. 18 and pleaded guilty to the charge.

Senate Action For McCarthy Facing Delay

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24 (AP)—Mounting political pressures increased the odds today that the Senate will postpone a showdown on the McCarthy censure motion until after the Nov. 2 election.

Senators of both parties agreed that if the notice to recall the upper chamber does not come within the next few days a session before the election is unlikely. Senators differ sharply over the ground rules for the censure motion, and the politically touchy question should be settled before or after the election.

The Senate Judiciary committee studying the proposal to censure Ben. Joseph R. McCarthy was expected to report today. McCarthy is expected to be present in the Senate to the printer today, Chairman Arthur W. Watkins, R., Utah, indicated that he hoped to have public early next week regardless of when the senate returns to act on it.

There was still no hint of what the committee report will say or whether it will contain recommendations for or against a senate rebuke of the Wisconsin Republican.

Probers Consider Change for Fund

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 24 (AP)—The House subcommittee probing union welfare funds today considered a stiff recommendation that would take union welfare funds from union administrators and place them with banks or trust companies.

Henry B. Ely, attorney and co-chairman of the subcommittee, said the \$500,000 annual welfare fund, made the recommendation yesterday in the second day of a nation-wide probe.

He told the congressional subcommittee that \$300,000 a year could be saved in the street metal workers fund through better business practices.

Newsman Hits Publicity Over "Python Pete"

PORT WORTH, Sept. 24 (AP)—Python Pete, probably the most publicized snake since the serpent entered the Garden of Eden, was still a wild card yesterday from Forest Park zoo.

Pete escaped his quarters here last Saturday and nobody has been able to put a hand on him since, not that anybody wants to stroke his 16-foot, 180-pound frame.

George Dolan, writing for Pete's Snake in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, "described the 'efforts' of a group of Kappa Sigma fraternity brothers who journeyed over from Dallas in an attempt to capture Pete."

"If Python Pete knew what was going on," said Dolan, "he'd probably be himself in a knot and choke to death."

"Peteburgers have hit the market," said Dolan, "jokes about Pete are circulating widely... He's becoming a laughing stock."

"But a group of chattering juveniles in a great cultural center to the east probably did more to hurt Pete's reputation than anyone."

"Eight carloads of Southern Methodist Kappa Sigma brothers, some with guns, came over to hunt Pete... like a den of Cub Scouts sent to track down Jesse James."

Dolan told the group's efforts Tuesday to find Pete in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, after first making sure a photograph was present.

Radioactive Dust Called Harmless

YANCOVICH, Sept. 24 (AP)—Dr. Gordon Ehrum, director of the British Columbia Research Council, said radioactive particles from a Russian hydrogen bomb were falling on this west coast city today, but were not enough to do any harm.

He said a radioactive count of 300 per minute was noted in recent rain. He said the count was not considered dangerous, however, and would have to be at least 10,000 per minute before any harm would be done. The normal count is 42 to 50.

"This indicated that an atomic bomb has exploded perhaps in the last two weeks," he said, "but we have had much higher counts in other explosions."

Chicago Officers Slay Trio of Men

CHICAGO, Sept. 24 (AP)—Sharp-shooting Chicago police killed three alleged felons in 24 hours and wounded another so critically today that he was expected to die.

Those felled by police bullets were Chris Kananen, 35, George Mann, 31, an unidentified Negro, and Frank Croton, 23.

Croton, who was shot when he resisted arrest, was wounded critically and not expected to live. The others died instantly.

Hike in Freight Rate Suggested

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24 (AP)—Two interstate commerce commission examiners believe Idaho should raise its intrastate railroad freight rates to match interstate charges.

Examiners M. Wilkins and C. A. Rice proposed Thursday the ICC give the Idaho public utilities commission 30 days in which to make adjustments.

Their recommendation is subject to ICC approval.

The ruling stemmed from a complaint by railroads that the Idaho commission failed to apply to intrastate freight the 12 to 15 percent increases authorized by the ICC in 1952 for interstate shipments.

U. S. Keeps Silent On Red Charges

BERLIN, Sept. 24 (AP)—U. S. authorities declined comment today on Soviet charges of an American spy ring in East Germany and the reported arrest of more than 400 secret agents.

The espionage charge was contained in a letter from Soviet High Commissioner G. M. Pushkin to Dr. Jochen B. Constant, United States high commissioner in Germany.

The letter accused the United States of violating the rights of occupation of Germany and West Berlin by sending spies and saboteurs there from the iron curtain into the Soviet zone.

Calf Hit

BURLEY, Sept. 24 (AP)—Clark Ward, 10, hit a calf (four miles south of Burley) last Friday while driving through a herd of cattle on the Grove Lane road, Burley police reported Wednesday.

Damage to Ward's 1954 Chevrolet was estimated at \$20. Police did not say if the calf was injured or to whom it belonged.

Divided Germany Poses Snarl For Nations in Years to Come

BY JAMES MARLOW
WASHINGTON, Sept. 24 (AP)—Divided Germany will be a problem for the west and Russia for years. No wonder both sides are pulling so hard in opposite directions, with no solution in sight.

The United States and Britain have obvious reasons for wanting the West Germans rearm in a hurry and made part of the western defense against Russia.

The crucial time element makes them look not only to the immediate military benefit but to the uncertain future.

The difference between West Germany rearm and unarmed, facing the Russians is the difference between a quick peace and a swinging door.

Once the Germans were armed, the French have made abundantly clear through their expressed worries, the allies would have the problem of seeing that rearmament didn't get out of bounds to become a new terror.

The allies will meet in London next Tuesday and again in Paris in mid-October to seek the double answer of rearming Germany and keeping her within bounds afterward.

But time is working, and it may not be working on the side of the allies. At this moment, under the pro-allied and anti-communist leadership of Chancellor Adenauer, the West is working to get into the Western defense alliance.

But Adenauer will not always be there, and whether he is or not, the mood of the West Germans may change if the allies, through their inaction, keep them dangling indefinitely.

The allies have not given them the right to rearm nor permitted them independence. American, British and French troops occupy the country. The three powers keep a veto over Adenauer's Germany.

But the Germans have made an astonishing recovery from the war and are growing in strength. They can't be expected to remain in a second rate position forever.

The Russians have been doing their best to persuade the West Germans they would lose all hope for a reunified Germany if they join up with the west. If the west German turn neutralist, in the hope of getting Russia to yield up East Germany, and if Russia ever does them.

The United Germany could dictate the future of Europe, and perhaps the world, by making an alliance with the west or Russia.
