BAN-FRANCOISCO, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Pacific Greyhound bus drivers called off a threatened strike early Thursday after a last-minute agreement ended a wage dispute that threatened to inconvenience 100,000 people in seven western states.

At 12:10 a. m. union adviser H. P. Meinhold emerged from a last minute negotiating session and announced:

"There will be no strike."

Businessmen Missing Bet by
Not Developing Sun Energy

NEW YORK, Oct. 14 (AP)—The sun's energy can be used to power homes and other household appliances, it can also be used in small solar-powered machines for such things as irrigation, heating and cooling, and charging batteries.

Use of such appliances and engines will be widespread within five years, and businessmen are missing out by not looking into the possibilities of a new solar energy industry.

These predictions are made as a sort of an aside by scientists meeting here Thursday with manufacturers, engineers and utility officials for the primary purpose of discussing the industrial uses of atomic energy.

The solar energy use these scientists are talking about is for small-scale power units. They think these things could come soon, if industrial leaders would take them up. They contend we shouldn't wait on the big-scale developments planned for the future—use of atomic-powered plants or large-size solar engines.

"There is a worldwide demand for small-scale power machines, up to five horsepower, for irrigation, heating and cooling of dwellings, charging batteries, and other ranch uses," Charles G. Abbot of the Smithsonian Institution says.

"The demand is very keen in Australia, India, Israel and other semiarid regions, where fuel is several times more expensive than in the United States."

But he notes there are at least 100,000 square miles in California, Arizona and Nevada where the sun furnishes sufficient energy for such power plants during 300 days a year.

"At present there is no company manufacturing such units, though the demand is large and constant," Abbot says. "I receive several inquiries a week where such devices are available. I have to reply that they exist now only at the Smithsonian."

Air Force Orders Supersonic
Bomber B-58 Into Production

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (AP)—The day is drawing nearer when the supersonic warplane will be able to launch guided missiles unerringly toward enemy targets, while flying at long distances from such heavily defended areas.

That era was foreshadowed today with disclosure that the air force has ordered the world's first supersonic bomber, the B-58 Hustler, into production.

Publishing boldly ahead into the unknown age, the air force also announced a production order for the P-104 jet fighter which is believed to be the fastest warplane in the world. Its speed is substantiated by reports as 1,800 miles an hour.

There was immediate speculation that the B-58 would be the first supersonic bomber to be built. The first of these aircraft, announced yesterday, is scheduled for delivery in 1955.

Mrs. Luce to Retain Job at Italy Embassy

TWIN FALLS, Oct. 14 (AP)—Mrs. Clare Booth Luce has decided to stay in Italy in her post as American ambassador to Italy, and President Eisenhower has backed her decision, high diplomatic sources said today.

The sources disclosed Mrs. Luce's decision "almost at once" after her resignation after 10 days of silence and speculation during which her friends and embassy assistants reached the conclusion she would bow out in a few months.

Stays Up Mind

"She said that Mrs. Luce now has made up her mind to remain as ambassador to Italy as long as Mr. Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles want her there another two years if that is their wish."

The President and Dulles are "entirely sure Mrs. Luce remains in the difficult post she has held for the past 18 months, the source reported."

Mrs. Luce on a number of occasions in the past has indicated privately she would return to the United States once certain major problems confronting Italy were laid aside.

But, according to the diplomatic sources, some of the problems still remain and she had been persuaded to remain as ambassador indefinitely.

Declines Comment

Mrs. Luce declined official comment on the reports she planned to quit.

Although for 18 months she publicly denied she planned to resign, she said after the Luce-Dulles agreement on Trieste she indicated to friends she would be in Rome only a few months more.

Mrs. Luce, however, now is making plans to be in Rome when Italy ratifies the London-German armistice agreement, and she has a number of other Italian-American projects she would see accomplished.

General Fails To Shoot Elk

MCCALL, Oct. 14 (AP)—Well, the general got a good look at some elk anyway.

Gen. Matthew Ridgway and his pet dog, the 10-year-old "Lucky," were hunting in the Chamberlain basin Wednesday.

The chief of staff and his wife and side were flown to Mountain Home air force base in an air force plane to hunt for elk. Information officials said it was authorized to disclose only that the Ridgways had "an excellent time" and "were immediately for Washington, D. C."

With a check with Bill Wadsworth, former senior fire dispatcher at McCall, revealed that the party failed to bring any game.

"They saw two elk just before they left," he said, "but it was too busy to get a good shot at them. They also saw a couple in heavy timber."

A spokeswoman, which Ridgway stay for two days and made him miss a Buffalo, N. Y., speaking engagement, probably spoiled the hunting trip.

Ridgway maintained contact with the outside world through a hookup between the base and the forest service radio network.

11 Weeks Will Hold Key for Polio Vaccine

BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 14 (AP)—The next 11 weeks can hold a big part of the key to how good the new polio vaccine is, an expert in the vaccine tests said Thursday.

A fair number of cases are still expected before Jan. 7, 1955, and those occurring in the polio test areas can be of "major importance" in getting the final, vital answers on the vaccine, said Dr. Robert P. Kerna, deputy director of the poliovirus vaccine evaluation center, University of Michigan.

Big Month Trial

Because of that, and other peculiarities of polio, the public will probably have to wait another six months before it can be known whether the vaccine works, or how well it works, Dr. Kerna told the American Public Health Association, here.

Usually, about 10 per cent of polio cases in each calendar year occur after Nov. 1, he said, but this year the polio peak came late and a high percentage of cases than normal is expected between now and the year's end.

217 Test Areas

An unpredictable number of them will occur among children in 217 vaccine test areas, involving 1,800,000 youngsters. Of them, about 425,000 got the vaccine developed by Dr. Jonas E. Salk, Pittsburgh. Another 110,000 received a neutral substance which could not have any effect, and another 1,175,000 not given anything are being watched as "controls" or comparisons.

The test is whether the vaccinated children have fewer cases of polio compared with nonvaccinated children.

The test area includes portions of both Utah and Idaho.

Sharp Rise in Oil Is Shown

NEW YORK, Oct. 14 (AP)—A sharp rise in oil imports for the week ended Oct. 8 was reported Wednesday by the American Petroleum Institute.

Deliveries of foreign oil were at the rate of 1,235,700 barrels daily, an increase of nearly half a million barrels daily over the previous week.

Refining companies ran to stills 4,711,000 barrels of crude oil a day. The daily average of the previous week was 4,679,000 barrels. A year ago runs were 6,941,000 barrels a day.

Daily average crude oil and condensate production by states and change from previous week included: North Dakota, 17,450, up 2,500; South Dakota, 100, down 50; Wyoming, 249,450, down 2,500; Montana, 40,800, down 1,000; Colorado, 122,900, up 600; Utah, 3,700, down 100.



New Housing Construction Rate Is High

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—Housing experts predicted today that the home construction boom will expand until it hits a rate of more than 1,000,000 family units a year in the 1930s.

This would be about 400,000 more a year than are being built now in a post-war lull which is the biggest thing of its kind in any nation's history.

Eyes Increase

"With the kind of action that we can and should expect of industry under sound economic conditions, the new year's home building rate can be increased moderately to more than 1,200,000 units," said the federal housing chief, Albert M. Cole.

"And when the record crop of war and postwar building comes of age and begins setting up new households in the 1940s, home building levels should rise sharply to better than 1,500,000 units a year."

Other housing experts there had had similar predictions. A growing population needs more housing and having the means of buying it.

High Birth Rate

The birth rate is continuing high and the rate is rising. More people are living longer.

In the 1930s, the population growth will be particularly heavy in the 20-25 age bracket—the one in which the greatest number of persons marry and set up new homes.

Retirement plans and social security have enabled persons to keep their own homes instead of putting them on the market and moving in their children.

High Rate Seen

Speakers for the home construction industry expect replacement of new households to reach a rate of 1,500,000 to 2,000,000 a year in the 1930s.

Some economists foresee a need for replacing at least 1,000,000 sub-standard houses a year for the next decade. Government estimates put the number of "dilapidated" houses occupied last year at 2,250,000. Such a house "does not provide adequate shelter or protection against the elements or it endangers the safety of the occupants," officials say.

Income Increases

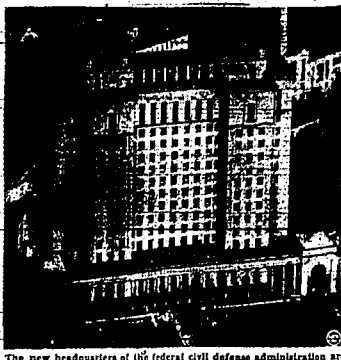
It is predicted that more families will move up into the middle income group. And an accompanying greater confidence in their future will make them feel more free to take on mortgage obligations, it is believed.

The government probably will continue to back an "easy money" policy unless inflation should threaten to get out of hand. This and the liberalized housing law enacted last summer is expected to permit relatively easy financing of as many new homes as there is sound demand for.

Insurance on Home Loans

Although the full impact of the new housing law will not be felt until next year, applications to the federal housing administration for insurance on home loans already have started to pick up. The record, \$3,586 last August, a record for that month and nearly twice the number in August, 1933.

Civil Defense Center



The new headquarters of the federal civil defense administration are in this vacated army hospital at Battle Creek, Mich. The vital agency has quickly and quietly slipped out of Washington, to the surprise of many officials.

Civil Defense Agency Makes Massive Move Out of Capital

WASHINGTON (NEA).—One of the government's vital agencies last quickly and quietly slipped out of town—to the surprise of many Washington officials.

The federal civil defense administration has speedily completed a massive move from the capital to new lodgings in the Perry Jones army hospital at Battle Creek, Mich.

More than a million pounds of equipment was trucked 600 miles to the new location in two weeks. The general services administration did the job for \$100,000.

The exodus to Battle Creek would not have been carried out so hastily had not congress waited until the last minute before appropriating funds for transfer.

But before the official word was tabulated, elaborate moving plans were being readied. The PCDA departed so suddenly that many of the bureau's staff had to be told the agency was no longer in Washington.

Around 270 employees decided to stick with the PCDA—and live at Battle Creek. Settling these families in homes in time for the youngsters to attend the opening of school after Labor day was a major problem.

An SOS was sent to the Battle Creek real estate board. The area was combed for homes and now most of the strangers from Washington are in suitable living quarters.

On the first day of business at Battle Creek, the PCDA was called on to handle an emergency. New England had just been hit by a devastating hurricane and President Roosevelt asked Vol. Peterson, PCDA administrator, to carry out safety measures.

This meant long distance calls to governors of all New England states, assignment of additional personnel to the storm area and preparation of detailed damage reports. The job

Expert Notes Practice Aids Fine Memory

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—When Dr. Bruno Puri reads a particularly good novel, he makes a point of remembering it word for word, so he can read it over again in his mind on long train rides.

Puri is an expert in memorizing the science of memory.

Beside having a brain with a built-in library, he can flip through a pack of cards and memorize their sequence, glance through a magazine and tell you later the page number on which every ad and article appears, or remember a given list of 100 strange objects in sequence, forward or backward.

He has been teaching and studying the processes of memory for 40 years and claims that in 10 easy lessons he can lumber up an average memory so its owner can pick telephone numbers, dates, names, figures and facts off mental notes just like lists.

"The memory is like a muscle. It has to be exercised. The more it is exercised the better it works," he said.

A good many of the 30,000 students who have taken Puri's memory course can almost equal him in mental acrobatics, but most of them were interested in improving their memories for practical reasons.

There was a hotel manager who enrolled because he had trouble remembering names and faces, an electrical engineer who wanted to memorize wiring diagrams, a businessman who always wrote notes to himself and forgot where he put the notes, and an army officer who wanted to amaze his comrades by rattling off exact details of all great battles of the past.

"There was even a burglar at Alcatraz who took my correspondence course," Puri said. "I don't know, but maybe he had some safe combinations he wanted to remember."

The memory coach is especially proud of a bread-packer salesman from Paterson, N. J., who in a Puri class learned to memorize the names of 100 different breads.

Puri is keeping an office open in Washington at the general services administration and 30 members of the country's civil defense program. Thus PCDA authorities will be in touch with developments here.
