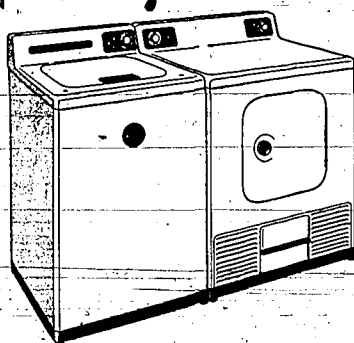

HOSPITAL TROUBLES

Now that all four major hospitals in Salt Lake City are having their troubles, the people of Twin Falls county should be thankful that Magic Valley Memorial was given full accreditation recently after undergoing a series of difficulties.

Views of Others on the editorial page of this same issue appears an editorial from the Salt Lake Tribune, deploring the loss of accreditation by three of that city's private general hospitals—LDS, Holy Cross and St. Marks.

Since that editorial was written it has been learned that Salt Lake General hospital also has been dropped from the accredited list.

It's not surprising, as the Tribune editorial pointed out, that this news came as a "shock" not only to those responsible for these institutions but to the medical profession of the city, but to the general public.

If accreditation is not restored before next July 1, the hospitals, in question will lose their internship and residency training programs, which, as the Tribune explained, "would be a crippling blow to hospital service and to medical practice here."

While full details of the findings of the Joint-Commission on the Accreditation of Hospitals have not been revealed, officials of the four hospitals declared that practices complained of by the JCAH action related to "ghost surgery" and "fee splitting." The Tribune editorial also mentioned "careless or incompetent surgery."

According to the Associated Press, some Salt Lake doctors admitted privately that a small minority in the profession practices "ghost surgery"—the name given to surgery performed by a doctor unknown to the patient, when the patient has been led to believe his own doctor is doing the job.

In summary of developments in Salt Lake City up to date, the Tribune warns that the "situation... calls for very serious consideration and prompt corrective action."

"There is" the newspaper added, "need for clarification. We think the full findings should be made public."

The final observation is probably the most important point to be gained from Salt Lake City's experience if all concerned are intent upon avoiding any further recurrence of the current disastrous developments.

It was shocking to the people of Twin Falls county and Magic Valley when Dr. Lucius W. Carr, medical director of St. Diego County, completed his survey of Magic Valley Memorial hospital in August, 1933.

But the medical audit served a good purpose nevertheless in that it marked the beginning of getting Magic Valley Memorial's house in order.

Subsequent developments led to an exhaustive program of public relations information, which has been given high praise by representatives of the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals themselves.

The net result, after all the difficulties had been brought sharply into focus, was a concerted effort to get Magic Valley Memorial fully accredited. Following a survey by Dr. Harry A. Navel, representative of the JCAH, Magic Valley Memorial won that coveted distinction early in September.

So as we said at the outset, we should be thankful, looking at our troubles realistically and taking the time now and then to look back, suggested at Salt Lake City, we surmounted most of our hospital difficulties. As a result, instead of losing something it had never had, Magic Valley Memorial won full accreditation.

Federal Department to Spend Funds in Magic Valley in '55

Various branches of the department of interior plan to spend \$19,275,000 in Idaho in 1955.
Of this amount, the bureau of reclamation will spend \$16,907,782, the bureau of land management \$2,000,000, the bureau of Indian affairs \$100,000, geological survey \$994,500, fish and wildlife service \$160,210, bureau of mines \$64,500, Bonneville power administration \$40,000 and national park service \$22,749.
Much of this money either will be spent in Magic Valley or in areas which have a direct bearing on the valley.

The state, included in this will be continued investigations on the Big Wood river project and initiated investigations on the Little Wood river. A part of the money allocated to the bureau of land management will be spent through the office at Butte and Shoshone. In the last 18 months the bureau has completed 1-1/2 million acres in the state, including allowance for the many applications for desert entry in the flat river and Blue Creek irrigated districts.
The geological survey will use a part of its money to continue surveys along the Snake river plain and the fish and wildlife service, in conjunction with the bureau of land management, reports that action has been taken to cooperate with the state fish and game department in establishing an upland game hall.

The group also will hear reports from the Christmas decoration committee and from a group which attended a Sun Valley meeting last week sponsored by the Boise Chamber of Commerce.

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
