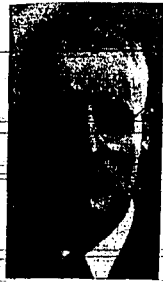

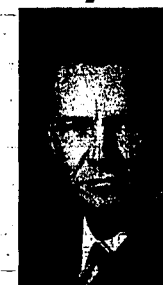

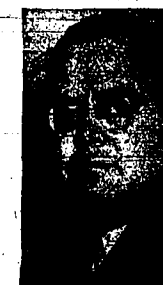

Smylie made his statement in reply to criticism by the Gooding county Democratic central committee, which earlier had questioned whether Smylie had promised to move the hospital to Boise if he were elected governor.

Smylie termed the attack a "gross error" and said the state has a substantial investment in the hospital.

"Most of this investment has been made while I was a member of the board of examiners and my attendance appears minimal. If I took all of the authorizing financial documents," he said.

"This includes the authorization to undertake the construction of a new 50-bed wing still in the final planning stage."

"The location of the hospital is permanent in every sense of the word," he said.

Smylie said he was making the "frank statement" of his views to assure the people of Idaho where he stood and to assure those who succeeded him that he would not be silent in learning the institution.

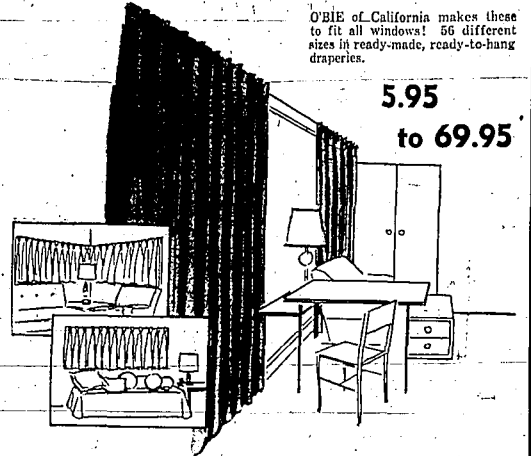

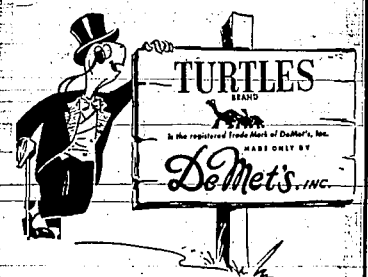

"The views and policies of the association are those of the irrigators themselves. No one else has a right in formulation of these policies. The irrigation district does not engage in partisan politics, but stands firmly for the maximum protection of water rights as the irrefutable heritage of our farms. We would expect candidates for high office in Idaho to take a similar position regardless of party."

"The statement by Clark Hamilton that the Idaho State Reclamation association receives nearly 40 cents of every dollar in its budget from the three big power companies is in itself and the similar statement by William P. Whittaker are maliciously untrue."

"As we have previously testified in congressional hearings, when subjected to similar vicious attacks, the association is financed from two sources: (1) by funds from irrigation districts and rural companies contributing to an association fund which represent more than one-half of our income; and (2) by funds the association solicits from business firms of all kinds in all communities of the state, which depend upon irrigation for the maintenance of their economic welfare."

"Contributions from business, solicited by the association, represent less than half of our income. Power companies have been solicited along with other major business concerns for their share with us in the welfare and advancement of irrigation, and their contributions have been in line with the others. For example, this year's contribution by Idaho Power company is the grandiose sum of \$150."

"No business firm has any voice in the affairs of the Idaho State Reclamation association by reason of contributions to it. To imply otherwise, as Mr. Hamilton and Mr. Whittaker have done, is to give an impression absolutely unfounded in fact."

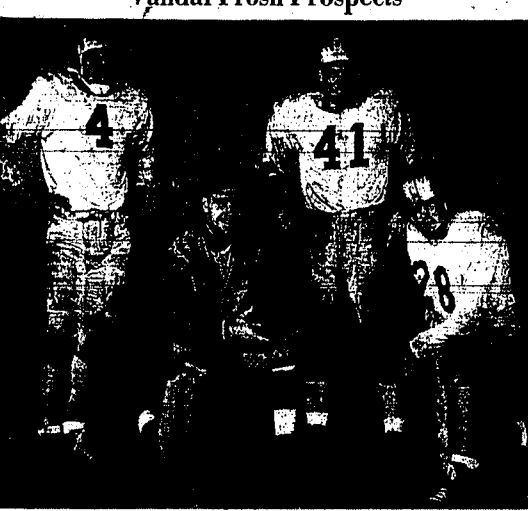

GOODING, Oct. 30—Norman Field whipped Gooding and set the record for a 26-13 victory over the Gooding Gridders in a loop game.

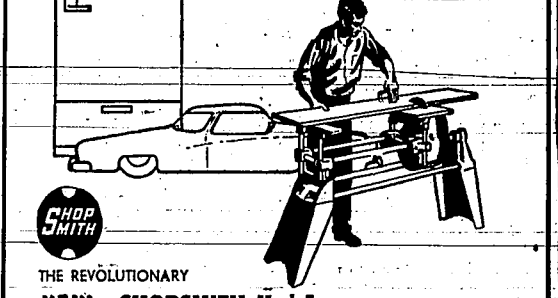

## Man's Success Story Proves Military Life Is Not so Bad

By HAL BOYLE  
MORGANTHAU, N. J., Oct. 30 (AP)—Parents, when a son is drafted for military service, sometimes complain. "I wouldn't want my boy to duck his duty to the country. But it does seem such a terrible waste of time, now that we are at peace. And he's so young. He'll be surrounded by all kinds of temptations. It's so easy for a kid his age to go wrong."

"Whenever I hear a father or mother carry out like this, I feel like telling them the story of Steve Lavele. His career is an example of how military service, far from hurting a kid, can help him get his feet on the ground and find a real goal in life."

Steve, still tough-looking at 33, is about as rugged an individualist as any.

As a friend said of the Winchester, Mass. boy who now operates a 12 million dollar a year electronics firm:

"He is a guy who's never really happy unless he's walking some kind of a tight rope."

This is Steve's story:

"I was a problem child in high school. Never in any big trouble, but always in some kind of mischief."

At 16, he managed to enlist in the navy by fibbing about his age. The navy sent him to radio school, mustered him out with disability pay after two years because of an injury. He had no money, less than two

years of high school credits. But he talked Northeastern college into admitting him as a special student, promising to catch up on his high school work in the summer months.

By stubborn-booting, he managed both to complete his high school work and graduate from college on schedule.

"But I still didn't feel I had an education," he said. Helped by his wife Miriam, who earned \$15 to \$18 a week in a hardware store, he took a graduate degree at Union college. Then he went to work at Harvard.

"That was 1939. I was flat. No real jobs were open. I made \$15 a week doing waterproofing. My wife made \$18 as an accountant, so we were at least living. Then I got fired, and then I got a \$40 job as a WPA electrician in Washington."

A year later he became an associate engineer at Wright field in Dayton, O., and pioneered in developing airplane instrument landing systems.

"I invented a new antenna that enabled them to save and use \$1,000,000 worth of transmitters they were ready to junk," Steve said. "For this they raised my pay \$100 a month."

Steve brooded about this, finally quit. He got a commercial firm to put him on his payroll, while he worked out his electronics experiments in his basement laboratory.

# Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Just around the corner, the tale of two Lincoln counties nearly 75 years ago and their trials and tribulations is being relived again. An election never is won until the voters have decided.

Mr. Johnson was nominated assessor and James Johnson, assessor, commiserated. In those days Lincoln county was a small county, comprising the area of the size of the area, the two candidates disagreed, each agreeing with the other in not only speak for each other.

Mr. Johnson, who started a story that Puller had been in the penitentiary for 10 years, and almost immediately became a legend in the Lincoln county area.

Woods claimed the winter of 1900-1901 was the coldest in the history of the county. The snow and the cold didn't look like mud but Feb. 28, 1901, took care of that. On that day the sun came up bright and red and a chinook swept across the new city. By nightfall the three feet of snow had melted and appeared and water was running in every direction.

The flood took out parts of cereals and crops and made it impossible to repair. Four horses were required to pull a vehicle along either Main or Shoshone streets.

A dog ran out to bark at one of the teams in front of the ID store and disappeared in the mud. Woods says the dog's tail there, now firmly covered with blacktop pavement.

Woods said the Twin Falls post-office was located in a store, and that since the town was pretty well filled with strangers, approximately 75 per cent of the mail was "general delivery."

The postmaster's daughter was charming, he recalled, and since she presided at the general delivery window, most of the persons seeking mail "belonged" to "her" masculine gender. At that time, he said, the ratio of men to women was six to one.

During the early days of Twin Falls, Woods was employed at the Palace "cave" and the "perme hotel" dining room. Among the men with whom he became acquainted were T. B. Ferrine, Mark Mearns, Feler H. Bush and others.

Woods says he has made three trips into Stanley basin but that the second is the only one really worth remembering. The first, he said, was made in a borrowed grocery delivery wagon. On the second, a new model Ford was used.

"We started up towards the summit after 7 a. m. and went, planned to get to the peak by 2 p. m. I believe this car was the first over the peak."

He doesn't say how he got down. The former Twin Falls resident recalls some of the ghost towns north of Kelowna and even remembers the wording on a wooden grave marker for a dance hall girl. He said he was "regret about a gang of counterfeiters who turned out better dollars at their silver and Carson City."

Woods' brother, George Woods, still lives in Twin Falls.

## Mercury May Soon Be Seen In South Sky

November's arrival will find Mercury and Saturn huddling close to the sun, so close that observations of these planets will be impossible by November 14, however, Mercury will have moved far enough westward that it can be seen as a bright object in the dawn sky in a direction almost southeast.

Brilliant Venus, which most of the year has been a splendid "evening star," is now setting in the south-west only with difficulty. This fine planet will pass nearly between us and the sun on November 15 and will then be coming up in the east-dawn before sunrise for the rest of the year.

Fixed stars, by its rapid eastward motion among the stars is still in the evening sky. An hour after sunset it can be spotted quite low in the south. Although very faintly bright, it is now greatly dimmed from its splendor of early summer when it was at the closest approach to the earth. Since there is no other bright stellar object in that part of the heavens, Mars can easily be located.

The only other naked-eye planet, Jupiter, now rises in the east-northeast between 10 and 11 p.m. Since both planets are very brilliant, there will be no mistaking its identity. The bright stars Pollux and Castor extend upward in the order named from Jupiter and form an almost straight line with it.

For identification of the conspicuous stars of early evening-planets are not stars—let us observe

around 8 p.m. A little west of the zenith, Deneb twinkles at the head of the Northern Cross. This is a fairly distinct arrangement of stars, extending down along the Milky Way toward the west-northwest. Somewhat lower in the western sky, the more brilliant Vega is very prominent.

Higher in the southwest we find Altair with a dimmer star both above and below it. Low in the sky the familiar Big Dipper, right side up—hangs above the northern horizon. Observation an hour or two later, will clearly show the Dipper is moving eastward. Twelve hours later, when nearly overhead, it is going westward. It encircles a point near the North Star each day.

Fairly well up in the northeast, yellow Capella rules that part of the sky alone. A little north of east orange Aldebaran has only recently cleared the horizon. When higher, this star can be seen to its left with the tip toward the right.

Some distance above Aldebaran, note the small cluster of little stars in the form of a tiny dipper, the Pleiades (Pley-ya-deez). A little northeast of the zenith the W of Cassiopeia's chair is easily seen. When in this position in the sky it looks more like a letter "A."

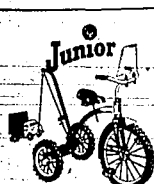
