Heavy Turnout Is Reported in Early Time of Balloting

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)—An unexpectedly heavy vote was rolled up in the election today, Americans, being between Republicans and Democrats to control the congress, showed none of the apathy that both sides had feared. And in much of the East and parts of the west the voters had to face bad weather—rain or snow west of the polls.

But how the weather might affect the outcome was a question the politicians were pondering. Bad weather ordinarily tends to cut turnout, and traditionally the GOP has been stronger in rural sections than in big cities.

First returns of any consequence came from normally Republican Kansas which has a system of counting through the day instead of waiting until the polls close as done in most states. These returns sent GOP candidates for governor and senator off to a good start. However, the first figures from 46 scattered Kansas precincts were too fragmentary to have any substantial bearing on the election. They were available for comparison with what the same precincts did in previous elections.

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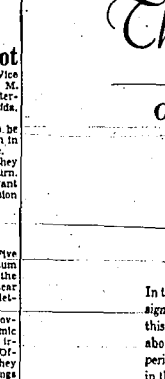
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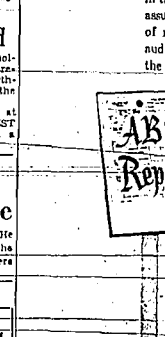

Survey Shows Water Level Is Down In '54 for Idaho Wells

BOISE, Nov. 2.—The U. S. Geological Survey reports that in general the water levels in most Idaho wells in the 1954 water year were somewhat below a year ago. The net decrease in ground water storage was estimated from a foot to two feet, with some having decreases several times as great in some basins showing no appreciable change. Snake river plain: Nine wells in the foot of a foot to several feet below 1953; five in Minidoka averaged a little more than a foot below 1953 and three were about the same; three in Blaine were less than a foot below 1953. In Gooding county, 13 wells ranged from a foot to several feet below 1953. A network of about 40 wells in Bingham, Blaine and Jefferson counties showed a small net lowering. Dry creek area, Twin Falls and Cassin counties: Water levels in wells in the arid area were 10 to 18 feet below 1953; those in unconfined aquifers did not change markedly. Bonneville county: Water level in a well was above average in the first part of the year, but slightly below at the end of the year. Aberdeen-Springfield area, Blaine: No important changes from 1953. Boise valley, Ada and Canyon counties: Water levels fluctuated throughout the year. In the Snake river valley, Cassin county: Water levels ranged from two to 3 1/2 feet below the 1953 year-end levels. Moscow basin, Latah county: Water level in a non-flowing artesian well was about half below 1953. Rattlesnake plain, northern Idaho: Water levels two to five feet below 1953.

States Apply In Watershed Improvement

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—More than 130 groups in 10 states have applied so far for watershed protection grants under a state-aided development program. Agriculture department officials expect the number to keep climbing as the states and more groups apply and seek cleared by local soil conservation district officials for projects in Washington. For example, about 68 projects are in the works in Texas, with 11 reportedly cleared and on their way to the agriculture department. The 128 already received here are from California, Delaware, Minnesota, South Carolina, Kentucky, South Dakota, Indiana, West Virginia, California, Nevada and Georgia. Most—113—have come from Kentucky, and some of these are still just tentatively approved by officials in the state. The second highest batch of applications have come from California—where nine—local groups are seeking to protect watershed projects. Of the rest, six have come from Georgia; three from Indiana; two from South Dakota, and one each from the other states. The fact that the applications have come to Washington means only they have cleared one of the hurdles in the process of getting projects for their areas. The applications have yet to be okayed by Secretary Ezra T. Benson, other federal agencies and congress. Under the new watershed law, public law 586, local organizations must initiate and help plan and pay for projects. None of the applications so far contain estimated costs of the projects. That will be worked out later.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—An historic struggle between major interest groups is now being fought in today's congressional and gubernatorial campaigns, regardless of the results.

The struggle is over the fate of President Eisenhower and the identities of the 1956 presidential nominees.

It has not been generally noted that the Republican Party has taken almost no part in the campaign, unless they were the losers in the primary elections.

Some eminent southerners as Senators Byrd, Virginia, George and Russell, Georgia, and McMillan, Arkansas, have not gone on the stump to demand restoration of Democratic rule, although such a shift would elevate them to many key chairmanships.

ATMITY—On the Republican side, there has been a minimum of effort by the so-called 'left' faction.

Albion B. Clark, Republican, has been named as the party's presidential pick. Clark is a former governor of Michigan and a member of the House of Representatives.

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ULTRACONSERVATIVES—Several other middle westerners preferred to sit out this election for reasons which are their own.

These men include the late Senator William Jenner, Indiana, and the late Senator Charles McNary, Oregon.

DEMOCRATS' INTRAPARTY FIGHT—The Democrats' struggle is over the fate of President Eisenhower and the identities of the 1956 presidential nominees.

The Democrats are divided into two main camps: the 'conservative' camp led by Dwight D. Eisenhower and the 'liberal' camp led by Hubert H. Humphrey.

STEVENS AND RENOMINATION—Adlai E. Stevenson's campaign exertions suggest that he would appreciate any nomination for 1956.

Stevenson is a former governor of Illinois and a member of the House of Representatives.

SOAR OF SUFFERY—Another prominent figure likely to suffer from today's result is Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Nixon is a former vice president and a member of the House of Representatives.

DOGS LEAD POLITICIANS' LIVES

It may be a familiar saying that politicians lead dogs, but the reverse is also true. In the case of Richard M. Nixon, it was his dog, Skipper, that led him to the White House.

Nixon's dog, Skipper, was a pointer and was with Nixon when he was elected vice president in 1952.

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Dispute Over Overtime Will Halt Schedule

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 19.—The refusal of AFL sailors to work overtime threatened today to disrupt the sailing schedule of 160 Pacific Maritime Association vessels.

The no-overtime went into effect last week-end at Pacific Coast ports in an outgrowth of a jurisdictional dispute between the sailors and the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union over the unloading of ships.

No Law

Harry Linderberg, secretary of the AFL Sailors Union of the Pacific, said his men "don't have to work overtime, and there is no law that can force a man to work overtime if he doesn't want to."

Shipowners pointed out, however, that Mrs. Breslin for the men to work overtime on Sundays and holidays when asked.

The AFL called a stop-work meeting yesterday to explain a dispute concerning about 1,000 Coastwise Lines freighters Pacific now tied up at San Pedro. Ships were tied in Seattle, Tacoma, Portland, San Francisco and San Pedro.

Under an agreement on Coastwise ships, sailors may unload cargo from one hold, but longshoremen work the other holds and move all cargo from dockside to warehouses.

Hold Empty

Last Wednesday the Pacific arrived in San Pedro with the hold usually assigned to the sailors empty. The sailors were told to unload another. The longshoremen objected, claiming the job of unloading it was theirs.

The longshoremen then refused to handle cargo unloaded by the sailors. AFL demands that the longshoremen shut down power so the longshoremen could not unload the other holds.

ALBION, Nov. 19.—Well past the age when most businessmen retire, Mrs. Jeanette Breslin, Albion, who celebrates her 70th birthday Sunday, is viewing the near completion of a quarter-million dollar expansion program for the telephone exchange.

"Thirty years ago when Mrs. Breslin arrived in Albion from North Dakota, the telephone system was of the old wood-and-hole variety. The crank style wall telephones gave way to more modern handsets and soon a dial system will eliminate even the need for a switchboard operator. But even though the new system is more efficient, many subscribers will find it an inadequate substitute for the woman who has been at the switchboard for more than two decades.

The expansion program consists of the construction of more than 300 miles of line and the installation of a dial system. When completed, the company will have 165 miles of line. Of this amount, 104.1 miles will be new lines to the Bridge, Ichonema and other areas.

Nearly 40 miles of the existing lines will be rebuilt. The company serves 250 subscribers.

After many years as owner-operator-manager of the telephone exchange, Mrs. Breslin recently turned over the management of the corporation to her son, Victor Redman, also a resident of Albion. Redman and his wife also are stockholders in the firm.

Although the management of the company is in younger hands, Mrs. Breslin is still the people of Albion are concerned. They continue to call on her for many favors. Vacation time finds her tending pets and watering flowers for friends who have taken two-week jaunts to other parts of the country. Children left alone

at home know that Mrs. Breslin is as close as her phone and call her as they need advice.

"Many times a day she plugs in to hear a voice saying, 'Call Mamma for me.' Some subscribers are a little amused on the rare occasions a relief operator doesn't immediately recognize the voice and locate Mamma."

Part of her 24-hour service is that of answer man. Anyone with a question from whom was the winning pitcher for the second game of the 1936 world series? To "Can you find me a baby-sitter?" immediately picks up the phone. This world of football, baseball and politics are as near to her as the radio at her side and the TV set across the room.

She teaches children to knit, chats with visitors and reads letters from home to Johanna Peterson, who has trouble with written English.

A frequent visitor from across the street is Mrs. Polly Blomquist, both a friend and patient. Mrs. Blomquist is one of the many visitors who turn to Mrs. Breslin for necessary treatment prescribed by their doctors.

Trained as a practical nurse, she works under the direction of doctors from Burley and Rupert. Her recognition, sometimes resembles a pharmacy.

A recent letter from an old friend and one-time patient called her "the

angel of Albion" and thanked her again for "saving my life."

If Mrs. Breslin has a hobby it's collecting modern appliances which she refers to as "gadgets." Although she constantly refuses human help with housework, she has her disposal units, clothes dryer and many other electric accoutrements at hand. Every new "gadget" that hits the market makes its Albion debut in her house.
