# TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Eisenhower Republicans will suffer from more political and legislative defeat, in the eyes of most voters, than they will gain, unless the figuratively washes out of his hair his present group of so-called advisers and public relations spokesmen.

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## Polio Vaccine Shots Set for First Graders

DETROIT, Nov. 4 (AP)—If the Salk vaccine is proved effective, first graders in the nation will be the first to receive the shot. The state of Michigan has scheduled the shots for March 1955. More than 300,000 children under six are eligible for the shots.

The speaker, Dr. H. A. Press, is regional consultant of the National Foundation for Infantsile Polio, and said the results of the 1954 trial will be known by the end of the year. He said they now are being evaluated by the Polio Institute's Evaluation center at Michigan.

The foundation also will offer vaccine to pregnant women who took part in the trial but did not receive the shot, he said.

Press explained that three to four months are needed to manufacture and test each batch of the shot. It will be available to the public through the medical profession before the 1955 polio season, he said.

## Communist Hungary in Trouble as Plan To Convert to Heavy Industry Falters

Communist Hungary, seems to be in a serious trouble.

Things are not going well for the 2,000,000 ordinary people who live under the red dictatorship. But things are so bad that communist leaders are sharing the trouble.

## Payments Given For Forest Land

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (AP)—Forty states and two U. S. territories have been given \$16,303,643 from national forest receipts for the fiscal year ending last June 30, the agriculture department said today.

Under federal law, each state and territory collect 25 per cent of the income from national forest lands within its boundaries. The payments to states, earmarked for public schools and roads in counties in which the forest lands are located, are made to replace local real estate taxes.

National forest receipts come from the sale of timber, grazing fees and other forest uses. Payments to states this year ranged from \$749 for North Dakota to \$4,683,006 to Oregon. Other large payments included \$2,338,437 to Washington state and \$2,537,232 to California.

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## United States, Thai Government Are Worried Over Red Threat to Take Over

BANGKOK, Thailand, Nov. 4.—The United States and the Thai government are seriously concerned by the threat that the communists may attempt to take over this rich and strategic southeast Asian prize through infiltration and subversion.

Competent sources here, including high government officials, say the communists already have their agents placed in the army, navy and the air force. Even the Thai police forces have the communists by red agents, these sources say.

Officials here insist, however, that the communists agents are known, that their movements are closely watched by police and that measures are being taken to prevent a takeover move that might swing this land of 200,143 square miles and 10,192,000 people into the communist camp.

The United States is vitally concerned in what happens here. Thailand is a strategic link between Burma and Malaya. It is a hop-skip and jump from Red China.

If it should fall to the reds, Burma and Malaya where a communist takeover is being feared, would be open to the communists.

It has been reported in official Thai quarters—but never confirmed directly by the Americans—that the United States has given Thailand assurance that a communist takeover of Thailand would mean war with the United States, and American participation either in Thailand or in Red China.

It is believed here that America's concern is the best guarantee Thailand has against open aggression. But infiltration and subversion, the classic red pattern, are another matter.

Police General Phao Sriyannond, now visiting the United States, told the United Press recently that he has the latest knowledge of infiltrating agents.

The communists, he said, are attempting to recruit young men, mostly from northern Thailand and largely of Chinese ancestry, to be trained in communist techniques in China and then return to Thailand to await a go-ahead signal from the red high command.

Former Premier Pridi Banomyong is believed to be with the red chiefs in Peking, mapping a campaign to "liberate" Thailand from the red high command.

What the communists call "the offensive Philibean regime, directed by the American imperialists" this has strengthened the belief that if the communists strike here they will attempt a take-over designed to look like an inside rebellion.

The Thailand government, with American help, is taking many steps to counter the communist operations. All are aimed at winning greater popular support from the people. These measures include:

1. Orders to the land department to facilitate issuance of land titles to farmers now working on the land.

2. Promulgation of a land reform bill which limits holdings to 200 acres for agricultural purposes, four acres for industrial purposes and two per person for residential purposes.

3. The creation of a civil defense corps.

The latter represents the first time in modern Thai history that Thai leaders have taken the people into their confidence by arming them.

A 10,000-man corps of the projected 120,000-man civilian volunteer defense corps already is in process of being trained and armed by the Americans.

With American help, the Thai frontier defenses are being strengthened.

Americans also are helping train the Thai army and air force. Nearly all Thailand's arms are American supplied.

Thailand fears of a new communist move against this country have been heightened by the recent creation of an "autonomous Thai state" in the south China province of Yunnan. That is believed to have paved the way for a new campaign of propaganda and subversion directed against the existing Thai government. It is anticipated that this so-called Thai state, with some 15,000,000 persons of Thailand extraction, will be employed as a base for communist saboteurs.

# New Farming Leaders Face Tough Battle

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (AP)—Farm leaders of the new Democratic congress will have tough sledding trying to deliver on their promises to create rigid, high-price supports for basic farm crops.

Although Democrats won control, backers of President Eisenhower's flexible farm support program appeared to have held their own or perhaps picked up a vote or two in the senate.

**Approve Version**

Last July, the senate approved a modified version of the President's flexible program by a 49 to 44 vote. Much Mrs. Eisenhower's satisfaction, the election returns showed you don't have to favor rigid high farm price supports to get elected to congress from midwest farm states.

In two key farm states—Iowa and Ohio—voters unseated Democratic senators who voted for rigid supports and chose their place Congressmen who had voted in the house for a modified version of the administration program.

The key congressional votes earlier this year came on legislation to provide flexible supports ranging from 85 to 90 per cent of parity for 1935 crops of wheat, corn, peanuts, rice and cotton. The majority of the mandatory 90 per cent scale that had prevailed since World War II.

**Original Proposition**

The President originally proposed a 75-90 support range. This is provided by a permanent law enacted in 1940, but the law has been set aside from year to year. It will take force in 1955 unless congress passes, and the President signs, new legislation.

The narrow control won by the Democrats made it clear the new congress cannot muster this 2-1 vote necessary to enact farm legislation over Mr. Eisenhower's veto.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (AP)—The Democratic senate will take over the top position in the upper chamber when the 48th congress convenes Jan. 5, as the "quarterback" of the senate.

# France Shocked by Outbreak Of Mob Violence by Algerians

It must be admitted that the French Premier, Pierre-Mendès-France, is shocked that nationalist terrorism had broken out in Algeria.

The bombing and the murders in the adjoining protectorates of Tunisia and Morocco were bad enough.

But Algeria is not a protectorate or colony. Politically, it is a part of France, with direct representation in the French parliament as well as its own legislature. It is also France's oldest, largest and most important North African possession. About 1,000,000 of the 8,700,000 people are French.

While terrorism had flared sporadically in Morocco for 18 months, it in Tunisia since last spring, Algeria had been quiet.

The seriousness with which the French government regarded the Algerian outbreak was shown by the immediate dispatch from France of more than 3,500 paratroops and riot troops.

The terrorists struck suddenly. There were more than 30 simultaneous attacks. It was evident that the outbreak had been organized carefully.

French authorities suspect that Tunisian and Moroccan nationalists fomented the attacks. But the real significance seems to be that Algerian nationalists are stirring up a semi-independent status of their country. They, like the Tunisians and Moroccans, want complete freedom from French rule.

There had been outbreaks in Tunisia and Morocco over the weekend. Now all of French North Africa, extending 1,150 miles from the Libyan border to the Atlantic is involved in the terrorism.

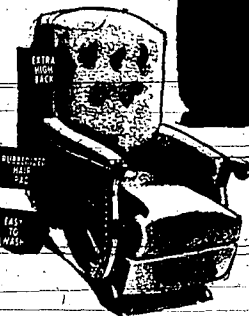

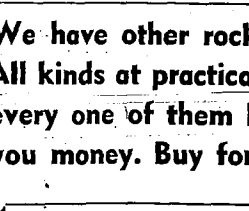

# Persons Must Give Data for Gas Holdings

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (AP)—Persons who filed applications for oil and gas leases on government acquired lands before Aug. 31 but failed to file their holdings information by the deadline, are being given until Dec. 1 to file such information and prevent loss of priority, the Interior department said yesterday.

Secretary McKelvey said the department has decided to require applicants to file a detailed statement of their interests, direct and indirect, in leases and applications for similar mineral deposits on acquired land in the same state.

Loss of land. He added that failure to file such information would result in loss of priority for a lease where more than one person applies for the same acre.

McKelvey added that because the bureau of land management stopped enforcing the requirement several years ago when a change was made in the somewhat parallel public land mineral leasing regulations, he had decided to give applicants until Dec. 1 to file the required information.

Does Not Apply. He emphasized, however, that the extension does not apply to applications filed on or after Aug. 31. To have priority, applicants must have filed the required information.

McKelvey noted an appeal is pending in the courts in a case which involves, among other things, the validity of a lease where the application lacked the information required under the regulations. He said that in view of the status of that lawsuit, he would not comment on whether present leases should attempt to cure the defective applications on which their leases were granted.

The 13 unsuccessful comeback candidates included former Sen. Glen Taylor, D., Ida., who left the Democratic caucus in 1952 to run for vice president on Henry A. Wallace's Progressive party ticket. Taylor was defeated by Sen. Henry C. Dworshak, incumbent Republican.

# Inner Tubes Soon to Become Obsolete, Country's Leading Manufacturers Say

NEW YORK, Nov. 4 (AP)—The inner tube may soon be just another thing for the kids to use when they learn to swim. If tire manufacturers are right, as they are enthusiastic.

"Within five years the inner tube will be as obsolete as the ladder," says D. P. Goodrich's Joseph A. Hoban, vice president of the tire and rubber equipment division.

"The tubular tire will become standard for everything from passenger car to airplane to farm tractor," says Goodyear's president, E. J. Thomas.

Most 1955 model cars will come equipped with tubular tires, the rubber industry says. The next step is to sell the tubular tire to owners of older models as replacements. Goodrich expects that.

rich expects that this year's "will be of the old-style casing, but as they disappear from the roads the inner-tube may go with them."

Pirelli, U. S. Rubber, General Tire and Rubber, and others are also in the scramble.

"Super-highways are expected to be a strong selling point for the tubular tire."

"The new highways mean higher speeds," Hoban points out. "And sustained high speeds puts more heat on a tire and increases the chance of a blowout. The tubular tire is cooler. And there's no tube to chain or wear out."

Thomas claims Goodyear's tubular tires with a flatter tread provides up to 12 per cent more mileage than their older tires.

"After several years of experimentation and 'blowing and considerable bickering among some of the companies over rights, the tubular has caught on fast in the market."

Its first big boost, however, will come with many 1955 cars using it as original equipment.

The tire industry puts out several types. One has a puncture-sealing element under the tread. You can pull a nail out and the tire won't go flat. This is a premium price tire.

The original equipment on many new cars, however, will be a lighter

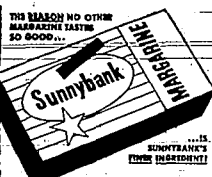

## Voters Choose Many Women For Congress

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (AP)—A record number of ladies will be sitting in the halls of congress next fall. Sixteen women won election to the 80th congress, an increase of three over the present lineup. One of the ladies in the 83rd congress—Sen. Eva H. Bowring, R. Neb., did not run in Tuesday's election, but all other incumbents were reelected.

Two women Democrats—Mrs. Coya Knutson, Minnesota, and Mrs. Martha W. Griffiths, Michigan—secured seats over incumbent Republican congressmen Tuesday. And a third, Mrs. Edith Green, Oregon, defeated Republican Tom Lawson McCall in a nip and tuck fight.

Another Democrat, Mrs. Iris Blitch, Georgia, defeated an incumbent Democratic congressman in a primary battle in September and was unopposed for election Tuesday. Mrs. Knutson, a former Ohio Minn. state legislator, became the first woman in Minnesota history to win a seat in congress. She defeated Rep. Harold G. Hargis, R., a veteran of 12 years in the house.

Mrs. Griffiths, a Detroit attorney and former recorder's court judge, ousted Rep. Charles G. Oakman, R. Georgia. Griffiths' contribution to the staff aide of congress—Mrs. Blitch—is a veteran campaigner in her own right. An attractive businesswoman, she is national Democratic committee woman from Georgia and a member of the state legislature. Mrs. Blitch won her seat from Rep. W. M. (Don) Wheeler, D.

## Overhaul of Red-Hunting Is Seen as Result of Demo Win

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (AP)—A possible overhaul of congressional red-hunting machinery loomed today in the wake of the Democratic election victory that ousted Republicans Joseph R. McCarthy, William E. Jenner and Harold H. Velde from key investigating committee chairmanships.

Sen. McCarthy, R. Wis., will be replaced as chairman of the senate investigating subcommittee on the 83rd congress by Sen. John L. McClellan, stern-visaged Arkansas Democrat who sat as one of McCarthy's judges in the 36-day televised army-McCarthy hearings last summer.

Sen. McClellan said today he favors creation of a joint senate-house committee to investigate communist activities. They said the force his own subcommittee should concentrate on its original mission of checking up on government waste and corruption.

Rep. Francis E. Walter, D.-Pa., to succeed Velde, R. Ill., as chairman of the house Un-American activities committee, announced yesterday that he favors abolishing that group entirely and transferring its communist-investigating functions to the house judiciary committee "where they should have been all along."

Walter said he thought that the change would curb "abuse of power" by the un-American activities group, which has been one of the most controversial committees in the house.
