HINGTON, Nov. 9 (AP)—President Eisenhower yesterday named John Marshall Harlan of New York City, a Republican, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Democrat H. Jackson. On the court, Harlan would join two Republicans—Chief Justice Earl Warren and Associate Justice Harold Burton—and six Democrats.

Harlan, 55 years old, is a native of Chicago who was graduated from Princeton University, received a degree in jurisprudence from Oxford University in England and a law degree from the New York law school.

Harlan has been serving on the circuit court of appeals covering the third circuit since March 4 of this year, by appointment of Eisenhower. He was a judge on the circuit court of appeals from 1934 to 1937, when he was appointed to the circuit court of appeals by President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Harlan was a member of the Supreme Court from 1955 to 1961, when he was appointed to the circuit court of appeals by President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

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Speakership Fight in GOP Rank Looms

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9 (AP)—A bone-shaking Republican battle in the house of representatives over minority leadership in the 80th congress was fought today on the basis of reports that Speaker Joseph W. Martin Jr. does not want the job.

Some of Martin's friends were organizing a campaign to keep him in as party leader. And to prevent that responsibility from going to Rep. Charles A. Halleck, R-Ia., who they fear may suspect might be President Eisenhower's choice. They were confident Martin would continue, even if reluctantly.

Martin's retirement from the leadership to become a less harried elder statesman in the house, could not fail to boost Halleck toward the 80th congress minority leadership. Halleck is a majority leader under Martin's speakership in the expiring 79th congress.

Halleck succeeded Martin as floor leader when Republicans controlled the 78th congress in which Martin served as speaker. When the Democrats took over in the 81st congress, Martin, revered for the leadership, displacing Halleck.

One of the organizers of the Martin-for-leader movement told the United Press today that substantial opposition to Halleck has been developing.

"If Joe steps down now and Charles reaches for it, there will be a hell of a fight," a congressman told the United Press. "A group of old timers in the house will insist that Joe take on the leadership in the next congress. And when the chips are down, the 80th congress leader will be Joe Martin."

Martin told this correspondent and others long before this month's congressional election that he was of a mind to shuck the Republican speakership of the next house if he early failed to obtain a majority. He would have been pleased to continue as speaker, Martin was 70 years old Nov. 5. He isn't talking much, if any, for publication now.

His associates were confident Martin would accept a two-year hitch as minority leader rather, as one of them said, than turn down the job. He was described as reluctant, but under increasing pressure to resign his minority role.

County weed supervisors and county agents will supervise and "localize" the programs to individual county requirements.

The program is also coordinated with the work of the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce, Idaho Cattlemen's association, Idaho Dairyman's association, Idaho Wool Growers' association, Idaho State Reclamation association, the Amalgamated Sugar company, the Utah-Idaho Sugar company and the Idaho Power company.

Military May Revise Command Post Plans in H-Bomb Threats

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8 (AP)—The defense administration, already in a move to take away from Washington the military's emergency command post if the capital faces an attack.

Questions have been raised, it was learned today, over the wisdom of concentrating the military high command at a single location, such as the main-made cavern in western Maryland.

While that underground installation would be used as the original purpose of a central emergency communications center, it might not become the temporary headquarters for the entire staff of chiefs of staff and military commands of the three major services—an alternate penitentiary.

Instead, consideration has been turned toward a dispersal of the headquarters of the several armed forces to separate points outside the capital area. Initial thinking was toward use of established military centers, such as Ft. Belvoir, Va., about 15 miles south of the District of Columbia; Ft. Meade, Md., about 20 miles east; and Norfolk, Va., 120 air miles to the south.

But a re-evaluation of the potentialities of the hydrogen bomb, made after the first test explosion at the Marshall Islands proving ground last spring, apparently has brought new ideas about the blast effect. Estimates of the zone of major damage from H-bomb blast effect alone run as much as 100 miles from the point of detonation.

While the underground installation at Ft. Belvoir, about 70 miles northwest of Washington in Frederick County, Md., presumably would escape the blast of a bomb exploded over the capital, it could be vulnerable to one dropped with the purpose of "cratering" the subterranean installation.

A civilian defense task made last summer, reportedly indicated the need for greater dispersal than previously planned not only of military command posts but of civilian government agencies.

"The atomic energy commission began planning months ago to move its headquarters out of Washington. Officials say no definite site has been selected yet. The federal civil defense administration, already in a move to take away from Washington the military's emergency command post, is taking another look at plans for alternative emergency command posts if the capital faces an attack.

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Air Shock Waves Called Dangerous

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8 (AP)—The air force was cautioned today that shock waves from planes flying faster than the speed of sound could cause damage to people on the ground and damage some types of buildings.

A report prepared by Fred L. Dugan, a civilian scientist at the Wright air development center, Dayton, O., said a plane flying 1.5 times the speed of sound, or 1,125 miles per hour, at 100 feet above ground would generate shock waves with a pressure of 100 pounds per square foot. (So far as is known, no plane has achieved a speed of 1,125 miles per hour.)

Such pressure could cause "serious physiological effects" to persons and damage wooden buildings, the report said. It noted that 425 pounds of pressure per square foot, equivalent to 180 decibels, can cause mechanical damage to the ear while 140 decibels cause pain and 120 cause discomfort.
