## Cleric Aiding Racial Fights For Africans

LONDON, Nov. 15 (U-P)—In the sleepy South African village of Riebeeck West 50 years ago a deep-voiced young cleric boomed a gloomy sermon of doom against the ungodliness of drink.

It was his first parish and his first sermon—and his listeners were winegrowers.

Within weeks the young preacher was "forced to move to another parish."

The cleric was Daniel Francois Malan.

Malan, now 80, retired Nov. 30 after 4½ years as prime minister of the Union of South Africa after a lifetime of stubbornly fighting for what he sees as right.

As prime minister, the Dutch Reformed church minister set out like a modern Moses to lead his people into a promised land of peace and plenty.

He steps down with his work only partly done and with South Africa a wilderness of strife and fear.

The keynotes of Malan's policy has been apartheid—which is the Afrikaans language term for separation. He determined to separate permanently the whites, the Bantu Negroes, Asians and colored mixed blood folk to ensure that the whites were forever dominant.

The difference in "color," he wrote last March, "is merely the physical manifestation of the contrast between two irreconcilable ways of life, between barbarism and civilization, between heathenism and Christianity, and finally between overwhelming numerical odds on the one hand and insignificant numbers on the other."

Malan's pursuit of this policy turned South Africa into a country approaching an armed camp.

During his term of office tensions between the races periodically reached "boiling point." Brawls broke out in many of the big cities. Armed clashes between police and nonwhites multiplied.

His program began the process of uniting the country's 10 million whites against their white masters for the first time in history.

South Africa became a lonely nation—banned by nonwhite peoples, unpopular with Americans and Europeans.

The United Nations drew the weight of its prestige against Malan by formally indicting aspects of his race policies. Malan threatened to quit the world body if it did not stop what he called "meddling" in the Union's affairs.

The leader of the Nationalist government always insisted that for South Africa the choice was between apartheid and annihilation.

If the whites mixed with the blacks, said Malan, they would soon be "absorbed" into the "black" mass of Africa as effectively as if they had been completely annihilated.

While herding the nonwhites into racial ghettos and imposing on them the strictest of controls, Malan took some steps to improve their lot.

He doubled government spending on nonwhite education, bringing the annual level to about 40 million dollars for the 10 million Africans, Asians and coloreds. An increasing number of nonwhites today are being trained as clerks, policemen, artisans, nurses, builders. He stepped up spending to improve the rural reserves set aside for Negroes.

## Refugees Fleeing Berlin Reds Have Dipped to Mere 300 Day

BERLIN, Nov. 15 (U-P)—Every day some 300 East Germans pierce the iron curtain—simply by taking a one-way subway ride.

Divided Berlin's subway (U-bahn) and elevated (S-bahn) are the easiest ways for refugees to take their departure from communism.

These trains comprise the only "through" transportation linking red-ruled Berlin and the free part of the city.

The trains are "checked" by communist "people's police" only sporadically and for the most part Berliners travel on them without any trouble.

In the first nine months of this year, the flow of refugees into West Berlin averaged 10,000 a month. (Others, far fewer in number, cross into West Germany at zonal borders.)

At the present rate, the total for the year in West Berlin should run about 120,000.

Last year, 305,000 refugees funneled west through Berlin. The exodus slowed down after the communists relaxed pressure in the wake of the workers' uprising of June 17, 1953.

Although the subway ride is the easiest, there are more spectacular routes. Some refugees swim across the canals or the Spree or Havel rivers. Others have arrived on tugboats or river barges. Occasionally, refugees pedal across on bicycles.

One daring fellow made it this year on a bicycle belonging to an East Berlin policeman. Another came on a wheelchair.

A significant class of refugees is made up of deserting members of the "people's police"—vopos. In the first nine months of this year, 2,271 vopos fled to West Berlin. Of these, 170 were officers.

From 1949 to 1953, the amazing total of 10,912 vopos—nearly an infantry division—crossed west.

The refugee ranks have included editors, public prosecutors, judges and ordinary workers. One recent refugee was a first-footed, 14-year-old girl who escaped under a wall of communist police bullets.

Another was an 87-year-old great-grandmother. A large proportion are students and youths seeking to avoid conscription in the red "people's force."

One of the slickest "departures" from the communist east was engineered early this year by an East Berlin shopkeeper whose store specialized in beer steins.

The shopkeeper and his wife made a dash for freedom from East Berlin to West Berlin daily until they had moved the entire store, stein by stein.

West Berliners like to relate the story of the East Berliner who appeared at the sector border one day pushing a wheelbarrow full of sand.

Communist border guards ran their hands through the sand but found nothing and, although puzzled, they allowed the man to pass.

The same thing happened every day for the next week to the mounting bewilderment and irritation of the red guards.

Finally, on the seventh day, they could stand it no longer. "Look," they told the East Berliner, "the more you push, you build, please, you must tell us what you are smuggling into West Berlin."

"Wheelbarrows," replied the man, pushing the seventh one across the border.

## See Approval In Arms Pact

It looks as if March 1 may be made the target date for ratification of the London and Paris agreements to create Western Germany and make it a sovereign nation—despite Russian attempts at sabotage.

March 1 is about the earliest possible date for final approval of the agreements by the nine powers concerned.

There may be minor crises meantime between France and West Germany over their agreement on the Saar coal region, which is linked with the armament treaty.

Russia is making a desperate attempt to sabotage the agreement, and its note of Saturday proposing an "all-European security" agreement was its first big move.

The Kremlin has 15 weeks before March 1 to make new moves.

But advice from the capitals of the signatory countries indicate that ratification is certain, and that if there is any delay it will not be serious—nor will it be due to Russia.

The nine countries which agreed to the armament treaty are the United States, Canada, Great Britain, France, Western Germany, Italy, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg.

A survey of the nine capitals indicates that Great Britain will lead the ratification parade and that the "Benelux" countries—Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg—will be last.

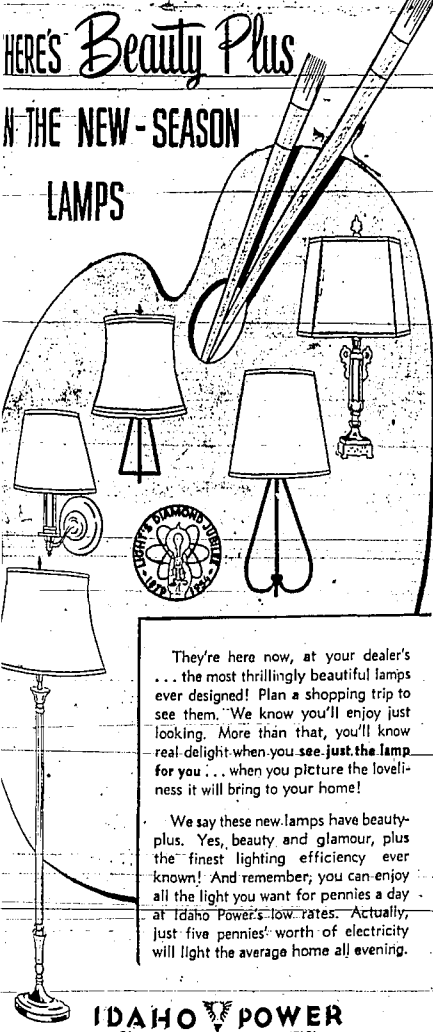

# '55 Looming As Fine Year For Business

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15 (U-P) — Government economists predicted today that 1955 will be another record year for business, a little better than this year but not quite as good as 1954.

They said they expect the gradual economic improvement which started last month to continue without any serious setbacks. But they expressed confidence that President Eisenhower will step in with requests for emergency measures, such as tax cuts and a greatly expanded public works program, should the optimistic forecast go wrong.

These economists based their predictions mainly upon belief that the construction boom will continue, personal incomes will stay high, and that manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers will begin to build up inventories which they have been using up for the last year.

The government economists forecast continued with one made recently by business and industrial leaders making up the government's business advisory council.

Advances predictions that this year would be a second-best one for business were borne out by a commerce department report made public last week.

The report showed the gross national product for the third quarter at an annual rate of \$355.5 billion, about the same as the two preceding quarters.

It indicated the gross national product for the entire year 1952 would be about \$355,000,000,000, some \$8,000,000,000 less than the record prosperity of 1953 but about \$10,000,000,000 more than in 1952.

Gross national product, the total of all goods and services produced, is considered the best business barometer.

# Solon Assails Eisenhower's Pact Conduct

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15 (U-P) — Wayne Morse, D-Ore., today said that one reason he broke from the Republican party was that President Eisenhower had mismanaged the north Atlantic treaty organization.

Morse, who spoke at the COP during the 1952 campaign, said a treaty, overseas showed "waste" and poor administration. "The senator said that the military officials said to him in the record conversations that they knew the administrative would be a waste of time. But the responsibility for it was Eisenhower's. They said he was not a good administrator and that his idea of a compromise was to give each group what it asked for."

Morse said he told Harold E. Blasen in 1952, now foreign operations administrator, that "I was shocked by the expediency and the immorality of the Eisenhower campaign and that they could count me out."

The independent senator added that he was shocked when Mr. Eisenhower "castigated the state department for taking the troops out of South Korea" when "there was no doubt that Eisenhower was a party to the recommendation" to remove the troops as chief of staff of the army and later as the chief civilian adviser to the President.

Morse also said, in a copyrighted interview published in the weekly news magazine of U. S. News and World Report, that he will vote with the Democrats to organize the next senate but he does not intend to join the Democratic party. Morse, whose vote helped the Republicans organize the closely-divided 83rd congress, said he decided two years ago he would vote with the Democrats in the 84th congress regardless of this year's election outcome.

# Strict Requirements for Hospitals Set By Joint Commission on Accreditation

By ROBERT GOLDENSTEIN CHICAGO, Nov. 15 (U-P) — Do you grope your fingers and hope you won't be snared for error when you go to a hospital for checkup on your aches and pains?

A powerful medical watchdog that stands guard against this happening to you.

The minute your name is entered on a hospital's receiving list your case is of direct concern to the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals.

The commission's goal: To insure the best possible medical care for today's hospital patients and to improve this care as rapidly as knowledge and experience will permit.

It is backed by five of North America's major, powerful medical groups who spend a half-million dollars of their own funds each year to conduct this program.

About 80 per cent of the 3,800 general hospitals in the United States and Canada of 25 beds or more have passed the rigid requirements of accreditation and been put on the approved list.

The program is entirely voluntary, however, and a few hospitals in the two countries never have applied for approval.

"Suppose you have stomach pains, hinting of appendicitis and a doctor sends you to an accredited hospital for a checkup. How would the program help you in your case?"

There would be many safeguards in a hospital meeting all conditions recommended by the Joint commission.

The building would be solidly constructed with adequate space for patient and for compliance with the legal fire code. There would be facilities for isolating patients with communicable diseases and sanitary precautions against cross-infection and vermin.

Attendants would be required to jot down on your record sheet any previous medical attention you had, and you would receive a complete physical examination before any operation.

If the physician or surgeon were uncertain of his diagnosis he would have to consult with another physician or surgeon.

In the operating room, emergency lighting would be available in the event of a power failure. Drawings and instruments would be sterile. A qualified anesthetist would administer the anesthetic and be on the alert for any complications until you were out of danger. Skilled nurses would be on hand to follow up your case.

If the surgeon removed your appendix, the tissue would be sent to the hospital pathologist for examination to determine whether it was healthy or diseased. The pathologist would record his findings.

The surgeon would make a written record of his diagnosis, his technique of performing the operation and what tissue he removed and why.

Your record also would list your general condition, your response to treatment and what drugs you were given.

In an emergency operation, of course, some of these preoperative steps would be waived for your protection.

Now suppose the operation wasn't necessary—that your stomach ache was brought on by too much eating at the dinner table.

The hospital's own tissue committee would find this out within 30 days.

In an effort to determine whether an operation is justified or unjustified, this group is required to report at least once a month on agreement or disagreement between the doctor, the original diagnosis and the report of the pathologist on the condition of the tissue removed.

of requirements for accreditation. In some cases they insist that a hospital have qualified doctors and nurses and maintain a laboratory.

In 1948 the first list of accredited hospitals was published. Only 60 of the 622 hospitals investigated received approval.

A survey showed vast room existed for improving patient care. Improved hospital care became the primary objective of the program.

On Dec. 31, 1952, the list of approved hospitals totaled 2,118—2,270 hospitals and 107 privates were approved. This compared with a list of 3,265 approved hospitals a year earlier.

Dr. Herman B. Babcock, who took over as director of the joint commission last summer, said there has been a sharp upsurge in the number of hospitals seeking accreditation.

He attributed this to a great part to the requirement of some unions and health plans that their benefits be restricted to treatment given in approved hospitals.

The college of surgeons agreed two years ago to expand the accreditation program into a joint effort of five interested medical groups. All share the cost of the program, financed from the dues paid by the members.

The joint commission's board of commissioners includes:

Three representatives of the American College of Physicians, seven from the American Hospital Association, six from the American Medical Association and one from the Canadian Medical Association.

The commission's requirements are identical to those laid down by the College of Surgeons, with some minor modifications.

Twelve commission investigators spend full time in the field examining the records of approval and occasionally approve hospitals and others seeking accreditation. They plan to visit each hospital at least once in three years.

Accreditation gives a hospital certain prestige in its community and usually qualifies the institution for resident physician and intern training programs. In some states, the Blue Cross plan requires that treatment of its subscribers be limited to accredited hospitals and some state boards of nursing limit their programs to such hospitals.

Few institutions could meet every recommendation of the commission. They are graded on a point system, and those reaching 75 per cent compliance are granted full approval. Provisional approval is granted

those achieving 60 to 74 per cent compliance.

However, there are three conditions listed any of which would be sufficient to disqualify a hospital—life hazard, fee splitting or other unethical practices among the medical practitioners or on the staff or use of hospital facilities.

Unjustified removal of normal tissue and unnecessary surgery could disqualify a hospital, depending on the degree.

When a hospital is approved, it displays a certificate of accreditation which pledges:

That its medical staff is restricted to physicians and surgeons who are graduates of approved medical schools, that they are legally licensed—competent and, within the character and in matters of procedure, ethics, that fee-splitting in any guise is prohibited.

That medical staff meetings are held at regular intervals to review the medical records of patients.

That accurate and complete medical records be written for all patients and filed in an accessible manner.

That diagnosis and therapeutic facilities under constant medical supervision are available.

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# Wind Season

## Ends as Toll Is Uncounted

MIAMI, Nov. 13 (AP)—The most destructive hurricane season of modern times ended officially today with subsiding still counting the damage and the dead.

A total of eight tropical storms roared northward from the Caribbean sea—only of Mexico—in a four-month period to leave at least 351 dead and damage estimated in excess of \$1 billion dollars.

The final official count of death and destruction from the six hurricanes and two storms of lesser fury won't be available until next month from the U. S. weather bureau.

Only last week, acting chief forecaster Walter Davis of the Miami weather bureau learned that six of 15 persons aboard a sailboat lost their lives when the craft capsized on a trip between Turk's Island and Great Inagua in the Bahamas during Hurricane Hazel.

The death and damage toll in the Negro island republic of Haiti probably never will be determined fully. Heavy devastated two portions of the island with 115 mile-an-hour winds Oct. 13.

The government listed 12 dead shortly after the storm passed, but territorial lists in the wake of the hurricane caused further damage to the island and some of the more fatalities and authorities said the toll would likely reach 1,000 lives from hurricane, floods and diseases. The island's sugar crop, its chief source of income, was wiped out.

There have been hurricanes of the past that took more lives. But never has the damage been as great. Beyond the Caribbean, the storm hit the east coast of the United States, through Canada to Hudson bay. The long course overland was unusual for a storm of this magnitude.

Haiti's total damage could only be estimated conservatively at one billion dollars.

## Damages Run To \$250,000 In Rains

KEY WEST, Fla., Nov. 13 (AP)—Damage mounted above the \$250,000 mark today from a week-end soaking of 19.88 inches of rain.

From a break cloud, 20 miles wide, singled out this five-mile-square island and cascaded rain for nearly 24 hours. Thursday and early yesterday, nearly eight and one-half inches fell in one three-hour period. Streets, homes and stores were flooded. Service stations estimated 50 to 60 per cent of the island's automobile population would need servicing because of water damage. Three telephone cables were knocked out.

Water ran six to eight inches deep over the ground floors of scores of downtown business places. However, the city's automatic drainage system, President Harry Truman's "little white house" escaped damage.

The rainfall, worst in the memory of island residents, surpassed the world record of 26.12 inches set in California on Jan. 22, 1943. The world record of 48 inches was recorded in July 1911 in the Philippines.

## Subcontracts Let For New Aircraft

SEATTLE, Nov. 13 (AP)—Boeing Airplane company today announced the letting of subcontracts for production of the air force KC-135 jet tanker-transport.

The firm said the subcontracts had been approved by the air force material command. The prototype of the tanker made its first test flight at the Boeing jet transport July 15 and was ordered into production by the air force on Sept. 1.

The KC-135, a version of America's first jet transport, is designed to return jet bombers at high speeds and altitudes. The 707 has reduced speeds of more than 550 miles per hour and services above 42,000 feet in test flight.

## Reds Will Have to Pay Dearly To Capture Chiang's Quemoy

By EDWARD H. KENNEDY

TAIPEH, (NEA)—Nationalist islands off Amoy are hardly more than a few miles from the mainland, but unlike French generals, Chiang's staff is not likely to waste valuable troops in a hopeless situation.

The Reds will have to pay a tremendous price for Quemoy, Little Quemooy and Taitau.

The islands are in a pocket surrounded on three sides by red mainland positions. Mainland guns can rake almost the entire area with medium artillery and everything within six gun range.

The seaborne Nationalist gun must be fed with shells brought in by air and sea. The Reds run trucks from military highways they are continually improving right up to the gun positions.

Nationalist officers feel they could prevent a buildup to attack the islands by air strikes in the glazing area. But they are not sure if American policy they are reeling to the fact that an assault can be launched with the enemy choosing his time.

This is the plan as gathered from well-informed sources here. Fishing boats, sampans and bamboo rafts are being collected in houses and buildings in the Amoy bay area.

The present so-called "apocryphal" story is in fact registration. Each point on the island objective of the communists is being targeted.

This is right out of the pages of Soviet military textbooks.

On D-Day, about the big guns which have fired for registration and were silent while others were in use. In all, four or five big guns are being fired in the area.

Red air activity will start over Formosa, keeping Chiang's fighters tied down to home defense.

After days of this intense artillery fire, Red infantry will push off from shore in what is described by Gen. Chou Chih-jou, secretary-general of the national defense command, as a "human sea."

Nationalist defenders will be battered by the massive artillery concentrations but they are not likely to be knocked out. The defenders are dug deep. They will take a tremendous toll of red infantry.

Nationalist counter battery fire will be hampered by single positions fixed by speed limitations. The communist artillery can move from main to secondary to alternate positions.

Perhaps as many as three waves may be driven off—but a deter-

mined attack should carry the day.

Where possible the Nationalist forces will withdraw, counter-punching to get the best price, preparing to give up the islands and an organized withdrawal plan could save all but the rear guard troops.

If needed, the U. S. navy could go under the red guns to pull people out, but not to fight.

The Nationalist Chinese are generally reluctant to give up these islands, because their master plan calls for a return to the mainland and these are stepping stones on the path home.

In accepting the supplies, training and support of their big Uncle they must also accept the ground rules imposed by him. His master plan has no provision for a return to the mainland which would start World War III now.

China's present people have played the waiting game before and they are going along with the U. S.

The board recently changed its standards for accepting cases for investigation and decision, with the result that many smaller firms were exempt from board jurisdiction.

Where the NLRB previously has handed down a decision in such a case, the board ruled, it will back up the decision and seek to ask a court to force compliance if necessary.

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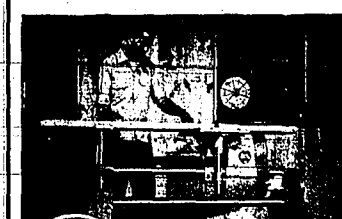

# U.S. Planning Campaign for World Trade

By SAM DAWSON  
NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—American business is heating up its war for world trade. Both industry and government are in on it, as competition gets sharper.

Many Americans complain bitterly that a resurgent Europe—built up with the aid of U. S. loans and grants—is pushing American businessmen out of some of their world markets.

Businessmen are seeking, and getting, U. S. government-backed underwriting of part of the risks of collecting payments for goods sold abroad. This is to meet European competition. Some other nations are taking their businessmen overseas trading.

Private banks here also are discussing a plan to join with federal agencies in providing credit to finance exports of capital goods.

Major U. S. exporters are interested in importing, exporting, shipping or financing world trade here today for a three-day meeting sponsored by the National Foreign Trade Council.

Other developments elsewhere: The U. S. government—at the Geneva conference on the general agreement on tariffs and trade—is urging other nations to lower the barriers against American goods which U. S. businessmen find so glaring. We want this done before we consider lowering our tariffs further.

Washington is also backing a plan for an international finance corporation to underwrite part of the risks of private investment in underdeveloped countries.

U. S. exporters are also going to Rio de Janeiro for a 21-nation economic conference to discuss the currency and trade barriers that businessmen battle in the western hemisphere.

In about seven weeks a new congress will meet. Early in the session will be a conference on the ratification of American foreign trade probably will be laid before it for a vote.

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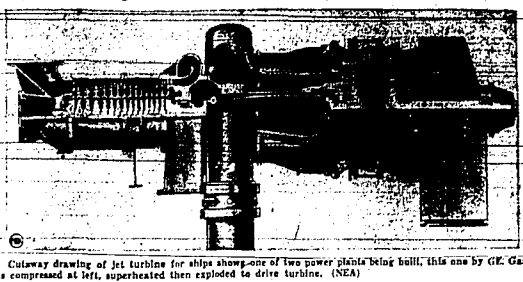
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# Jet Turbine Motor Shown

## Major Loop Expansion Plan Will Be Offered

CLEVELAND, Nov. 15 (AP)—A quick expansion into two more cities will be urged on the American league at its next meeting by Hank Greenberg, general manager of the Cleveland Indians.

Greenberg, who said Sunday he already had notified league president Will Harridge he will submit the plan at the Dec. 8 meeting, said he wanted a 10-team league at the "earliest opportunity." He added that he would ask formation of a committee "to investigate sites for the new franchise."

Although Greenberg refused to name specific cities into which he believed the league should move, San Francisco and Los Angeles have been mentioned.

Frank Lane, Chicago White Sox general manager, predicts that two west coast cities will be in major league baseball within three years. He pointed out that San Francisco has approved a \$10-million bond issue for a stadium and that the Los Angeles park district has authorized \$10 million for the same purpose.

"The time is rapidly approaching when the league must move into the Pacific coast," Lane concluded. "It's a question now whether the National or American league will be first to grab the territory, but whichever one it will be top dog," Lane added.

Greenberg forecasts a 10-team league by 1955 and says he must push for it right now. "We don't want the National league to get too far ahead of us," he said.

He booted a field goal for the winning margin against Montana 27-24 and his final point after touchdown was the difference in 14-13 victory over Utah and Brigham Young.

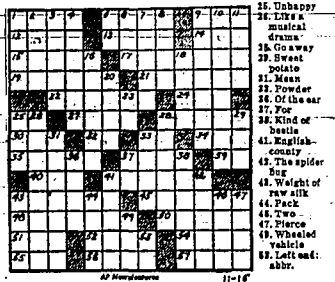

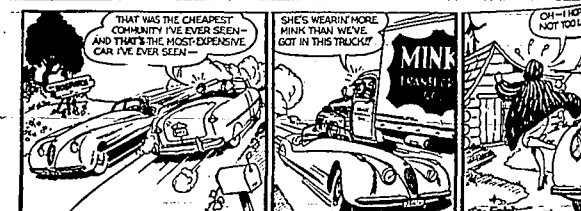
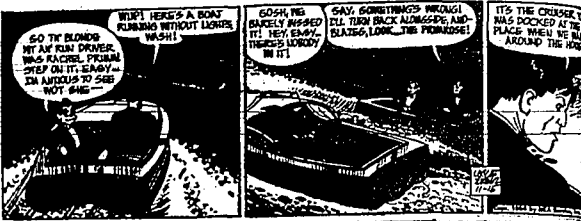
