SEEING THE LIGHT?

After all these many years, it is finally beginning to dawn on some of the people, particularly in those areas most directly affected by the federal government's "in-the-money" minority, why not?

Although they never actually had seen money grow on trees, there was the feeling that the government could give away money without hurting anyone. They didn't stop to realize that the only way the government could give away was that which it had taken away from the people in the first place through taxation. That was one popular misconception.

But there was also the more realistic thinking on the part of the "have-nots." If they, representing the majority, could receive the benefits of government handouts financed by taxes exacted from the "in-the-money" minority, why not?

That was a slick little bit of selfishness and a political expedient the politicians could play to a frazzle.

"Cheap government power" was one of the big "presentations" before the eyes of eager recipients. The fact that government power didn't have to pay taxes into the public coffers made no difference. The power bill the average householder received at the end of the month was all that mattered.

The recent public power reverses in Oregon, however, indicate that the voters are beginning to realize they cannot get something for nothing simply because Uncle Sam undertakes a project and bears the initial cost.

The proposed issue of bonds financing a PUD in Oregon. The voters apparently concluded that it makes no difference whether they pay possibly higher rates for electricity or higher taxes to the local districts.

Public ownership questions were on the ballot in three Oregon areas. In contrast with the close senatorial race, public ownership lost heavily on all three propositions: (1) North Lincoln county communities voted nearly four to one against a public ownership proposal for extending a private utility's service territory by the neighboring Central Lincoln Peoples Utility district. (This was the fifth defeat for public utility district proposals in the area since 1933). (2) In Tillamook county a proposed \$4,700,000 PUD revenue bond issue was defeated three to two. The Tillamook county PUD has been operating for eight years in competition with a private utility in parts of the district. The asserted purpose of the proposed bonds was to expand facilities. But authorization would have permitted use of the proceeds to obtain company property, and this was made a clear issue in the campaign. (3) The third Oregon contest came in Union county where it was proposed to dissolve a PUD formed in 1940. It was approved by a vote of two to one. This is the first PUD dissolution proposal to be voted upon in the state.

The same fundamental question of higher rates or higher taxes was involved on a larger scale in Dixon, Yates, TWA, IGO controversy. TWA construction of an additional plant would have involved a federal expenditure of more than \$100,000,000, increasing the public debt and further unbalancing the budget.

People living thousands of miles from the source of money did have to pay for the benefit of a limited section, just as people in the country would have to pay additional taxes if the government built a high dam in Hells canyon.

It doesn't soothe the people so much any more to be told these improvements will produce the "cheap power" for the national welfare and security.

Steadily increasing taxes, weighing more heavily on everyone's shoulders, the "common man" included, are finally bringing more people to their senses. To keep the government gravy train rolling, they pay out more tax money from one pocket than they put back into the other with these "benefits" they receive from Uncle Sam.

As Secretary Benson told an audience in Salt Lake City recently, the difference is the amount of money it takes to maintain our sprawling bureaucracy in Washington.

Perhaps some day the American people will realize the more they do for themselves and the more that government is kept within the states, instead of looking to Washington for handouts, the more they actually will receive for their money.

Special Envoy For Indochina Ends Impasse

BAIGON, Viet Nam, Nov. 17 (UP)—The influence of the United States on events in Indochina will be felt in the next few days, Viet Nam is expected to learn today after the arrival here of Gen. J. Lawton Collins as President Eisenhower's special envoy.

Observers in a position to know said today the first consequence of Collins' presence in Saigon will be the departure of Gen. Nguyen-Van Thinh for France.

The rebellious chief of staff of Viet Nam's army, who has been going for consultations with Chief of State Bao Dai on the French Riviera, informed sources say the ambassador will give him an important new job. This will leave the army in the hands of someone more likely to take orders from Premier Ngo Dinh Diem.

The two-month-old "coup" between Diem and Thinh would be ended and the premier freed to take the bold steps required to bring stability to the free South.

How much Collins himself did to end the deadlock was not learned. Some say that, as a former U. S. army chief of staff, he brought Thinh to Diem's attention as a man who would obey his superior.

Whatever the case, there seems no room for doubt that the government has taken an important step toward direct interest in Vietnamese affairs.

Simmons went elk hunting early Sunday morning and told his family he would be back the same afternoon. He was lightly dressed and carried only a couple of sandwiches, his rifle, a hunting knife and a few matches. Heavy rains have hit the area the past several days and snow has fallen at higher elevations.

Award Made

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (UP)—The atomic energy commission yesterday announced its first special award in the nuclear field—\$25,000—will go to Enrico Fermi. He is the Italian-born Nobel prize winner who built America's first nuclear reactor.

While making the A-bomb a reality, AEC Chairman Lewis L. Strauss said Fermi also will receive a special citation noting his contributions to basic neutron physics and the achievement of the controlled nuclear chain reaction.

Wilson Avers Powers Must Live in Peace

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (UP)—Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson said yesterday the United States has no intention of interfering in the Russian "or look forward to a war."

"I don't know what you can do about it," he told a news conference when asked if he favored co-existence. "We're all on the same planet. It must be done."

Wilson made his comments in response to questions about yesterday's Senate speech by Republican leader William F. Knowland that co-existence would lead to "atomic stalemate" and ultimate red victory.

Wilson also said the United States "certainly" could fight to defend freedom if it had to.

A reporter told him that Secretary of State Acheson's statement says the United States would fight if red China attacked Yugoslavia and asked if the country was ready.

Wilson said that "we have great military strength and certainly we could fight that war if the chips fell that hard to be done." But he emphasized that he personally would like "to get the best out of the international situation."

Welker Hits At Tipsiness By Senators

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (UP)—Sen. Herman Welker, R-Tex., told the senate yesterday that some senators in the past have been from the chamber because they were drunk. He said he was naming "no offenders."

Welker made this statement in a brief opposing the censure charges pending against Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R-Wis.

He said some senators have been guilty of "unbecoming" conduct without being disciplined.

"Would you not say . . . that it is unbecoming a member of the senate to appear on the floor of these halls dressed in a state of intoxication?" he asked. "To be led off the floor of this great deliberative body in full view of a crowded gallery, to be saved from being made a further object of scorn and to prevent obstruction of the legislative process of this body?"

"Yet we have seen incidents of this nature and crowded galleries have seen such incidents. I do not want to convey the impression that such incidents are common; they are not, but they have happened at frequent intervals. I am naming no offenders."

Barrimore Rites Slated Thursday

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 17 (UP)—El Barrimore, patriarch of the American theater's most famous family, will be buried Thursday morning in the Roman Catholic faith of his actress mother.

Barrimore, 76, died Monday night with an exit line from "Macbeth's Soliloquy" on death his last words. He was given the last rites of the Catholic church shortly before he died of a congestion of the heart.

Military Program of Sending Kin to GI's Spreading Widely

By FRANK ELEAZER
WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Wives and kids, for the first time on a scale, now are living with American servicemen all over the world.

More will go just as fast as the military can send them. Lack of housing is the main limiting factor. At latest count—only now freed of its "secret" label—about 100,000 dependents of army, navy and air force men were abroad with their GI breadwinners.

They are scattered from Kilauea to French Morocco. With at least a sprinkling at most points in between. The biggest communities naturally are in Europe and Japan. Korea, still on a near-war basis, is the only major area where dependents still are barred.

Some critics have said the dependents should be sent home; that the program is costly and haphazard. They question whether the families could be evacuated if a shooting war started.

The military scoffs at these complaints. And it is not about to bring home the dependents. In fact, Assistant Defense Secretary Fred A. Seaton said the aim now is to spread up the shipment overseas of servicemen's families.

Many men entitled to take their families overseas don't actually get to take them now. Or they may have to wait a year or so for their turn to come. Seaton said the hope is to ship eligible families either along with the men or at about the same time.

Why do we do this? To keep the men happy and more important, to keep them in uniform.

"It is no secret that all the services are up against a tough problem getting men to reenlist," Seaton said. "At the same time it is costing more and more to train the kind of men we must have. It is wonderful to spend two years training a man and then have him leave the service. If dependents were to be

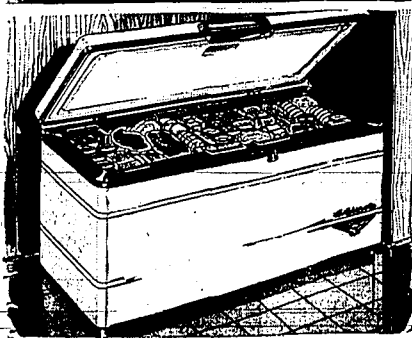

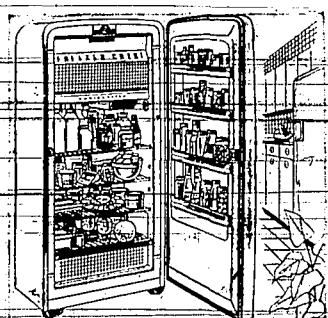

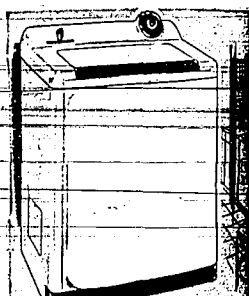
