U. S. Accused of Planning to Seek 'Extinction' of Indians

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (Special)—The Association on American Indian Affairs today accused the government of "planned extinction of American Indians as Indians."

In a strongly worded statement released by Oliver LaFollette, Santa Fe, N. M., its president, the association demanded that steps be taken to insure the continued existence of Indian tribes after termination of federal aid.

"In recent years," the association states "particularly in the two years of the first congress, the President has approved so-called termination bills for Indians which in some cases dictate their extermination as Indians."

In cases where federal aid is terminated, the association urges that state and local governments, church organizations, and other regional groups assume responsibility for Indians.

The statement concludes with three principles: That termination of federal responsibility does not require extinction of the tribe; that the federal government should not withdraw aid before local groups are ready to assume responsibility.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (AP)—Sen. Herman Welker, R., Fayette, Idaho, is a frustrated man.

Here he is in a city where most folks would as lief sit on a cactus as in a witness chair before a congressional investigating committee. And yet, he keeps telling the senate he was busting to get in there and talk—and no one so much as invited him to appear.

This theme—why wasn't Welker asked to testify—has bobbed up each day since the senate began debating whether it should censure Sen. Joe McCarthy, R., Wis.

"Once again I will ask my question . . . Why was I not permitted to appear when I should appear, and that I might give the senate the answers I could for the benefit of the select committee?"

The answer to that, like so many things that come up in the senate, is a bit involved.

Contempt charged

The select committee recommended that McCarthy be censured because it felt that he was, among other things, "contemptuous" of a senate subcommittee that had wanted to ask him some questions.

Now Welker cites had been a member of that subcommittee, but had resigned.

There, he says, he should have been called to testify before the senators on the select committee made up their minds about McCarthy.

Didn't know?

Well, and why wasn't he?

The committee's viewpoint: No one knew Welker wanted to testify, and if he did, why didn't he say so?

Democratic Leadership Nets Strength, Unity in Guatemala

By JOHN ZISCHANG

GUATEMALA CITY, Guatemala, Nov. 18 (AP)—Guatemala's new democratic government has brought greater progress, economic strength and unity to this Central American republic in five months than were registered in 10 years of the "communist experiment."

The nation's economy today is reviving. Tourists are returning to its almost forgotten treasures of natural beauty. The people are losing the lethargy and hopelessness that their "republican" government had brought.

The strong individualistic nature and customs of three million Guatemalans played equally important roles in the historic transition.

The red-tinged government of Jacobo Arbenz had 10 years to try to make the Central American republic the only communist showcase in the western hemisphere. The pro-American government of President Carlos Castillo Armas appears to have made good headway toward turning his country into a democratic window display in one-twentieth of that time.

Castillo is finishing the dead-end roads, driving to get the tourist trade back, planning to develop vast virgin areas for the benefit of both Guatemalans and European homefolks, encouraging the nation's doctors to improve health programs and generally showing sympathy with the people at large.

His predecessor, whose rule was patterned after the so-called "populist" republics didn't have much time for the people. In their 10 years in control, the Kremlin-backed government leaders couldn't make good

communities of such private enterprises as the barfoot harbor of Chichicastenango. He charges five cents if the customers will face the wall and stand still, and 1 cent more if the customer prefers to place into the street to see the swirling stenosis.

Arbenz said it takes 100 man-hours to produce 100 pounds of exportable coffee. Under the previous red-tainted regime, the coffee workers listened to promises of higher pay for fewer hours.

Ayestran said the promises paid off only in higher coffee prices and taxes. Now, he said, "our hope is that the next two or three crops will permit the coffee grower to undertake a larger share of the enormous responsibility of improving their workers' conditions."

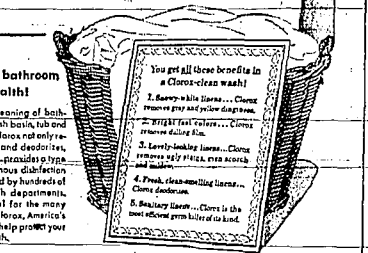

Thanksgiving Turkey Given U. S. Spotlight

By The Associated Press

The Thanksgiving turkey takes over in the nation's food stores this week-end, along with all the things that go with it.

And that turkey will cost you more than last year's did. The consensus of food store men is that prices will be from 8 to 10 cents a pound below year-ago levels.

You'll find ample supplies of the birds in any weight you desire. The U. S. department of agriculture estimates this year's crop of turkeys at 61 million, a good gain over 1953.

The department has worked through the last of items that go with the holiday bird, here are the findings:

Poultry is plentiful, green onions are in moderate supply and a good buy, lopped carrots are fairly scarce. A good buy, cabbage and cucumbers are low priced, tomatoes and avocados are reasonable.

There's a light supply of pumpkins, but other types of winter squash are plentiful. Turnips and rutabagas are inexpensive. Round white potatoes are reasonable, with baking potatoes running higher than the round whites.

There are moderate price tags on sweet potatoes, cauliflower and onions. Cauliflowers are fairly plentiful. Cranberries are selling at about the same price as a year ago. Chestnuts from Italy are rather low in price. Parsley is reasonable but peas are high.

All types of apples—for baking, cooking or just plain eating—are available. Florida oranges and grapefruit are good buys. Red emperors are the best purchase in grapes. Peas are moderate priced, and most of them are from the Pacific northwest.

For this Sunday's dinner, or for Thanksgiving if you don't want turkey, you'll find good value in chickens of all types. Veal roast is another favorite. Some stores will feature ham, pot roast, rib end pork roast, leg of lamb, and shrimp and oysters.

Food men consider most cuts of beef to be on the high side right now. In many markets, pork chop prices will be up from a week ago. Lamb prices are pretty much unchanged from last week.

Butter will cost a couple of cents a pound more in many areas this week-end. Eggs will be off a cent or two in some cities but up as much as 6 cents in others.

Industrial machines, automobiles, grains and cotton provide about 40 per cent of the total value of exports to U. S. goods.

Former Fort Hall Agency Head Now Tribal Affairs Supervisor

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (Special).—The former superintendent of the Indian agency at Fort Hall, Ida., is settling down in his important new job with the Indian Bureau here today.

He is Peru Farver, a 57-year-old Choctaw Indian, who has just been appointed to a newly-established \$2,000 job as supervisor of tribal affairs.

"I hope to work toward greater cooperation between various bureau activities and those of the independent tribal governments all over the country," Farver says.

The genial white-haired official is past the voluntary retirement age of 65 but he intends to continue with the bureau until compulsory retirement at 70.

He has been with the bureau for 23 years.

The position he holds has just been created, and it will be Farver's job to study tribal problems in health, education, income and population, and bring those problems to the bureau's attention. He will act as a liaison officer between the tribes and the bureau.

Farver is well qualified through long experience in reservation or agency affairs to fulfill this important task.

Born Feb. 3, 1887, at Eagletown in the Indian territory, (which became the state of Oklahoma in 1907), Farver's first job was teaching the Choctaw tribal school at Armstrong, Okla., in 1908. Eventually he rose to be supervisor at Armstrong and was assigned to other agencies in Oklahoma: Tuskahoma and Haskell.


A brief period of service with the army in 1918 and a few years in the insurance business interrupted Farver's Indian bureau work, to which he returned in 1922. In that year he went to the Great Lakes agency at Ashland, Wis. Subsequent assignments took him to agencies at Cherokee River, S. D.; Red Lake, Minn.; Belcourt, N. D.; and finally Fort Hall. From there he came to the Washington job last week.

Asked about the next few days in the Indian territory, Farver recounts that the Choctaws were one of the "five civilized tribes" resettled there from their homes in the southeastern states by order of President Andrew Jackson in 1837.

There, until the end of the century, says Farver, the five tribes—Choctaws, Chickasaws, Creeks and Seminoles—lived a Spanish existence, imposing their own rules regarding tribal life. The greatest sin a man could commit was cowardice, and punishments were strict though humane.

Today, of course, says Farver, Indian tribes exercise self-government under their own written constitutions. It is the aim of the bureau and Farver merely to extend

War on Grasshopper, Cricket Outbreaks Termed Successful

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—(Special.)—A successful campaign against grasshopper and cricket outbreaks in the West.

The department of agriculture announced that control activities against grasshoppers covered 788,000 acres of rangeland and the war on Mormon crickets covered 122,000 acres.

Thousands of individual farmers and ranchers benefited from this year's federal-state cooperative program. Estimated savings in livestock forage are 200,000 tons or more.

Altogether the control program reached an area of over 900,000 acres, 300,000 acres of federal land and 500,000 acres of state and private land.

Control activities, reports the agriculture department, resulted in \$9 saving for every \$1 spent on grasshoppers and \$41 saving for every \$1 spent on Mormon crickets.

Individual state reports have not yet been received for this year, but last year's program was so successful that control in 1934 was necessary in a decidedly smaller area than in 1933.

Since 1933, the department of agriculture estimates, control activities against the two perennial pests have saved the American farmer and rancher over a billion dollars.

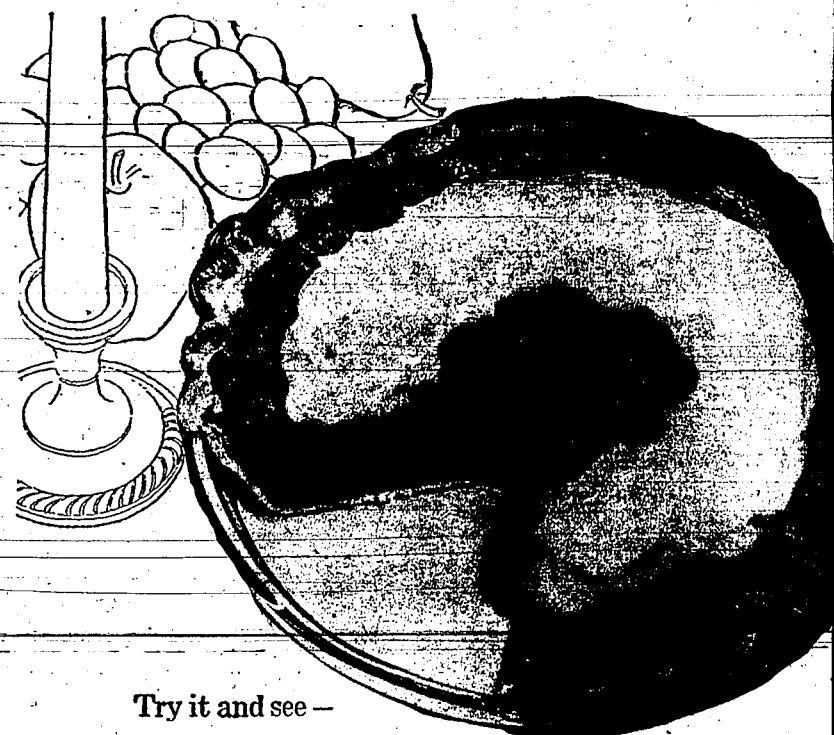

Atty.-Gen. Duke W. Dunbar and Gilbert T. Carroll, chief of the highway patrol, advocated the speed law in line with a program of the national committee on uniform codes and ordinances. Carroll said it would give the highway patrol a powerful weapon of enforcement.

The consensus at the meeting was that speed is the primary factor in the sharp increase of traffic deaths in Colorado—345 so far this year, six more than in all of 1952.

1. To Remove Leg
thigh or second joint and drumstick. Hold the drumstick firmly with fingers, pulling gently away from turkey body. At the same time cut through skin between leg and body. Continue as follows:

Then cut through joint joining leg to backbone and skin on the back. Hold leg on service plate with drumstick at a convenient angle to plate. Separate drumstick and thigh by cutting down through the joint to the plate.

Hold drumstick upright, at a convenient angle to plate and cut down, turning drumstick to get uniform slices.

4. Slice Thigh Meat
Hold thigh firmly on plate with a fork. Cut slices of meat parallel to the bone.

5. Cut Into White Meat Parallel to Wing
Make a cut deep into the breast to the body frame parallel to and as close to the wing as possible.

6. Slice White Meat
Beginning at front, starting halfway up the breast, cut thin slices of white meat down to the cut made parallel to the wing. The slices will fall away from the turkey as they are cut to this line. Carve enough meat at one time to serve all guests.

Remove individual servings of stuffing from an opening cut into side of the turkey where leg has been removed.

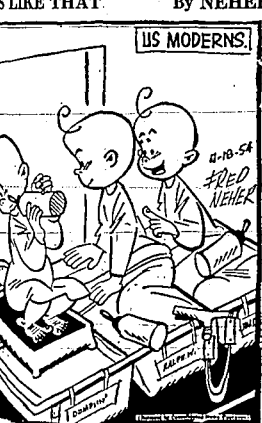

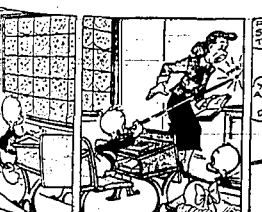

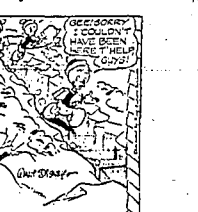

"You Can't Take It With You," Albin, the Washington, Mrs. Frank full production of the Twin Falls Little Theater guild, opens a three-day run at Washington school, Tuesday evening, Thursday evening, and Saturday evening, 8 o'clock each night. A special show was presented to an invitational audience Wednesday night.

The comedy by Moss Hart and George Kaufman tells the story of a family whose members are more or less "imbued with the spirit of insanity."

The author writes plays because "an old typewriter was left in the house eight years ago," grandpa collects snakes and attends commencement exercises, father and his friends make fireworks in the basement, a daughter takes dancing lessons and her husband plays the saxophone and distributes candy with gnomes and gnomes.

The play, however, is more than a vehicle of amusement. It takes a solid whack at the "silver-ridden" members of big business and advocates a more relaxed attitude for all. "You can't take it with you," grandpa says, questioning the validity of the constant search for the all-mighty dollar. He does not believe in money—means happiness—and throughout the play the members of the family, despite their "crazy" ideas, are portrayed as a rather happy bunch. The writer set would do well to copy. And, of course, they do before the curtain falls.

If the purpose of a good comedy is to make people laugh, the Theater guild should derive much satisfaction from the production. The play is ideally suited for an amateur group. It features a cast of 19 and is a ready-made of the typical farcical roles which so often are the downfall for the inexperienced of the stage.

In the role as grandpa, Tom Alworth delivers a remarkable performance. He gives every indication of being at home in the part and handles his lines with professional polish. Lucille Kelly as the play-writing mother also does justice to her part.

Jocelyn Lloyd plays the role of the young girl who falls in love and eventually gets her man despite differences in social and economic background.

Howard Harms in the role as Mr. Kirby and James Goodhue as the Russian dancing teacher handle their parts with aplomb. Mrs. Eugene Breinholt, as the actress of past plays now inclined to overindulgence in gin, is excellent and the audience has reason to regret that her part is not a much larger one.
