Postmaster Gives Business Firms Tip On How to Help Speed Mail Deliveries

Businessmen dissatisfied with the delivery of their mail should not place all the responsibility for delay on the postoffice department, suggests W. W. Frantz, Twin Falls postmaster.

Many business firms periodically contribute to the delay of mail delivery, he points out. He refers to the habit of many firms who let their outgoing mail pile up until 5 p.m. before it is dropped into a collection box.

This produces a super-time avalanche of mail in postoffices and a log-jam of letters to be processed, sorted and prepared to be sent out, Frantz explains.

By the time this pileup is cleared, it often is too late for the mail to be placed on the proper long-distance train.

In an effort to expedite deliveries, Frantz urged business firms to deposit their outgoing mail two or three times a day. He suggests business firms deposit their outgoing mail at noon and again in mid-afternoon.

It makes little sense to allow a letter written at 10 a.m. to sit around in a business office until it is posted, Frantz points out. The habit of posting letters at 5 p.m. makes little sense in view of the frequent collection of incoming mail made by most firms. It is impossible to send your mail frequently as to collect it several times a day, Frantz insists.

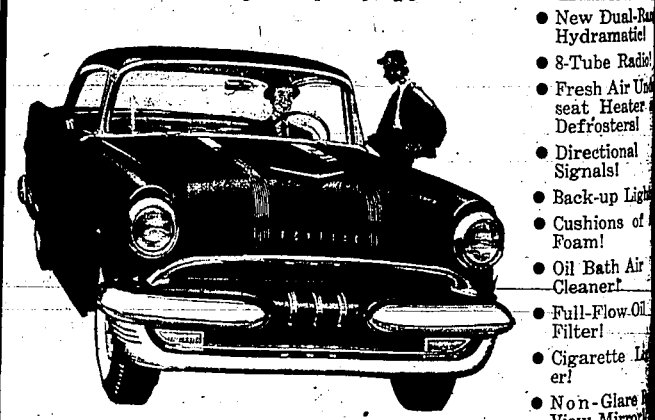

The board of examiners would be established for these functions: Treasurer, education, conservation, law enforcement, highway, labor, employment security, public assistance, business and professional regulation and judicial general. Their administration would serve at the pleasure of the governor.

Transfer Functions
All boards and commissions except a board of regents, board of education, industrial accident board, public utilities commission and merger and acquisition commission and their functions would be abolished and transferred to the appropriate departments or abolished.

The board would be placed in the department of conservation, and an advisory conservation board, similar to the present cooperative board of forestry, "performing its additional duties" would be created.

All departments with 25 or more employees would come under the merit system council.

All professional and occupational boards would be removed from state statutes, and functions now performed that protect health, safety and morals of the state would be administered by single administrators.
