# Soviet's New U.N. Official Facing Task

Jacob A. Malik, who has been named Soviet chief delegate to the United Nations, has drawn a tough assignment.

Malik will speak for the Kremlin in the general assembly, the political committee and the security council, in place of Andrei N. Vishinsky.

He is a veteran diplomat, like Vishinsky, and he has served as chief delegate before. The trouble is that he is no Vishinsky.

Vishinsky's death was a severe blow to the Soviet government. He had done a better job for his country in the U. N. than any other man the Kremlin ever had sent there. He was generally liked even by the delegates who opposed most bitterly the policy of his government.

Malik's appointment may be only temporary. The Kremlin is likely to do some hard thinking before it names him or any other man as chief U. N. delegate at this time.

But with the general assembly in the "big week" of its annual session, with President Roosevelt's "atoms for peace" plan under consideration, Malik is the man in charge right now.

He will get no red carpet welcome from his fellow delegates. Malik is no "friendly" delegate. He is a cold, calculating, ruthless, and unscrupulous man. But where Vishinsky made friends for the U. N., Malik has made enemies. Vishinsky was a diplomat; Malik is a politician.

Vishinsky not only made friends in the U. N., he had more success than any other Soviet delegate in influencing delegates of what might be called "friendly" countries, allied with the rest with the west. He was a good chairman for the Soviet's current "peace conference" propaganda.

Advised from London, says that Malik was named ambassador there after Joseph Stalin's death. He has been named ambassador to the U. N. because he is a young generation of communists than Vishinsky. He was born in 1906 and thus was in his heyday at the time of the Bolshevik revolution of 1917. Like Vishinsky, he is not a power in the communist party but is a career man in the government, below the policy-making level.

Malik entered the Soviet foreign ministry in 1927 after his graduation from the Institute of Diplomatic and Consular Officials. Within three years he was made minister of embassy in Tokyo, and in 1942 he was named ambassador to Japan. After representing Russia at the Moscow conference on the Japanese government in the closing days of World War II, Malik became a deputy foreign minister and later chief U. N. delegate. He was sent to London when Vishinsky, demoted to ambassador, minister in the big shake-up after Stalin died, was made head man in the Soviet U. N. delegation. Malik is back in Vishinsky's seat. But again, he is no Vishinsky.

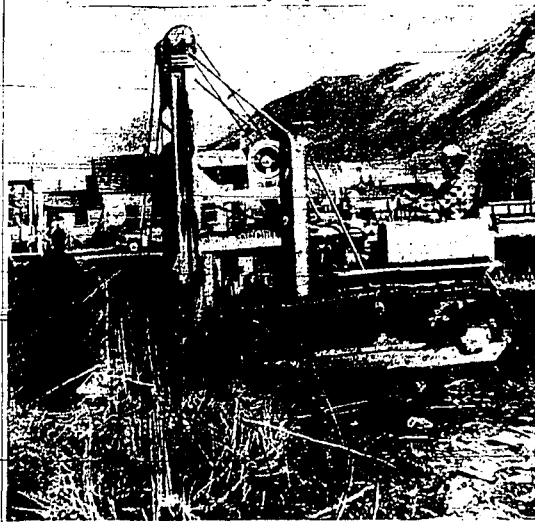

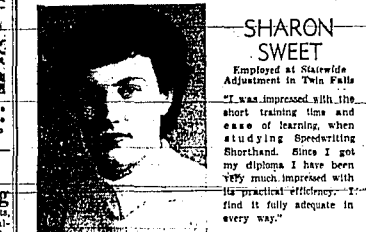

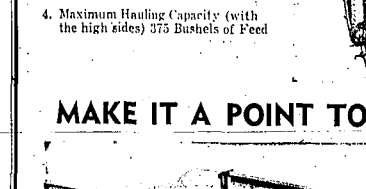

# Ike Promises Freedom Try For Prisoners

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—The families of 12 Americans imprisoned by the Chinese Communists had assurances from President Eisenhower today that the government is "using every feasible means" to obtain their freedom.

The President told them in a letter telegraphed to the families from Augusta, Ga., where he is spending the holiday.

"You may be very sure that your government is using every feasible means to bring your (husband or son) and all other Americans now in communist hands to freedom and to secure their proper treatment as long as their confinement continues," Mr. Eisenhower said.

"These efforts will be carried forward resolutely and tirelessly."

The government has prepared a schedule for releasing "wrongful detention" of the 11 Americans and two civilians on trumped-up charges. U. S. consul general Franklin C. Givens at Geneva, Switzerland, has demanded a meeting with the Chinese representative there to discuss the issue but so far has been snubbed.

While the state department here studied the first step to take, Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., U. S. ambassador at the United Nations, charged in a statement that Red China has added "still another item to the long list of tactics with the unappealing gang in Peking is unfit to sit in the United Nations."

# Nixon Says Repeat Hiss Case Unlikely With Security Setup

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—"If another 'Hiss case' possible," Vice President Richard M. Nixon, who played a major role in bringing Alger Hiss to book, thinks it highly unlikely under present government security programs.

Nixon also feels that Hiss, former state department official, never would have gone to prison except for the tireless investigations of the house un-American activities committee.

The vice president has refused to comment on the release tomorrow of Hiss from the Leavenworth, Pa., federal penitentiary. Nor will Nixon discuss publicly the details of his own role—as a member of the un-American activities committee—in the case which eventually put Hiss behind bars for perjury and espionage.

But Nixon's recent remarks in campaign speeches and elsewhere clearly underline his belief that the Eisenhower administration's security program will trap loyally suspects such as Hiss who might have been cleared under former regulations.

"The vice president's harping on that point provoked bitter controversy between him and the Democrats during the recent congressional campaigning. But he stuck to his attack."

He once said: "Under the security risk program of the previous administration, Alger Hiss, probably, would have been cleared due to the fact that his connections with subversive groups were secret, although there was evidence of associations which indicated some doubt about his security. His personal loyalty could not have been disproved because it was his word against that of someone else."

Under the Eisenhower program, Nixon said recently, "it is very unlikely that another Hiss case would occur," although there is always the possibility because—as he put it—real espionage agents "don't go around carrying cards."

LONDON, Nov. 18.—The body of Karl Marx, father of communism, has been dug up and reburied in a different plot in London's Highgate cemetery. A larger site was needed for a large memorial to be erected shortly.

The coffin was moved in the darkness early Tuesday by five grave-diggers working by the light of oil lamps. Officials said the home office, in approving the transfer, specified that the reburial must take place at night.

Also reburied in the new site were bodies of Marx' wife, Jenny; his grandson, Harry Longuet, and Helena Demuth, a family servant. Marx died here in exile from Germany in 1883 at the age of 63. His most famous book, "Das Kapital," is a bible of communism.
