Nov. 29 (UP)—Soviet Russia called upon her satellites in Europe to build up and consolidate the West German West-Germans.

Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov told delegates to the European Communist conference and Communist bloc to firmly establish the "peace-loving" character of the "democratic forces" of Europe. They should "consolidate the forces" and then consider in event that the Paris agreements (for West German rearmament and creation of a united Germany) are ratified and implemented.

Molotov said the European communist bloc measures to strengthen their defense according to the necessities of the present moment.

"This demands on the parts of the governments 'participating' in this conference that they carry out, in common, measures in the field of the organization of military forces and command and take other steps to ensure the integrity of their frontiers against possible aggression," Molotov said.

**Postmaster Urges Three-Cent Stamp for Yule Holiday Cards**

Christmas cards will win more friends and influence more people if mailed with a three-cent stamp, rather than a two-cent stamp, says W. W. Frantz, Twin Falls postmaster.  
First class postage is the best Yuletide insurance you can get, he explains. "With it, greetings will be processed and delivered quicker and they will be forwarded or returned, if it becomes necessary, he points out. "This eliminates any worry about whether or not your season's greetings were received. Your own return address on the envelope will help your address books up to date. Then, too, Christmas cards mailed with three-cent stamps are customarily enjoyed," the postmaster states.  
None of these postal privileges is authorized at the third-class rate. Moreover, Christmas card envelopes, smaller than two and three-fourths inches by four inches or larger than 9 by 12 inches require cancellation by hand and must carry first-class postage.  
"Because of all these reasons," the postmaster states, "it is important not to be 'prung' into second-class and almost stamps being sold has increased."  
Equally important is the necessity for early mailing. Christmas cards addressed outside the state should be mailed by Dec. 15. Local delivery requires mailing at least a week before Christmas.  
Postmaster Frantz is urging everyone to tie Christmas cards in two separate bundles with each address labeled the same way. These postal labels marked "all for local delivery" and "all for out-of-town delivery" should be attached.  
These helpful lists are available without cost at the postoffice and will shorten delivery time greatly, points out Frantz. Parcel post is also available.

# Medical Scientist Says Use Of "Miracle" Drugs Harmful

NEW YORK, Nov. 29 (AP)—A noted medical scientist lamented today that every home medicine cabinet in the land "probably contains a potential keystone of dynamite."

Dr. William Dement, professor of clinical medicine at Tufts college medical school, Boston, International known as an authority on blood chemistry, was giving a Dutch lecture both to physicians and their patients.

"It seems that every slight ailment every tiny rise in temperature, every ache and other vague symptoms occasions the immediate use of a potent pharmaceutical," he said.

"The patient themselves, surrounded by popular articles, radio talks and television broadcasts extolling the miracles of modern medicine, demand numerous potent medications and, when these are not prescribed, dose themselves liberally from stocks obtained at the corner drug store."

But "miracle" drugs are potentially destructive of the body's chemical machinery for the manufacture of new blood cells. Speaking to the profession and through it to patients in the technical journal "Postgraduate Medicine," he said that "the various systems of the body affected by drugs and chemicals, none more vulnerable than the blood and bone marrow."

He praised the drug industry for "high ideals and careful research. He thought it would be "folly" to return to herbs, bark, and other more or less simple "medicines" when the "miracles" drugs have saved innumerable persons who without them "would have been doomed by various illnesses. But they should be used only when

Group Battles To Stop Plans For New Dam

NEW YORK, Nov. 20 (AP)—The council of conservationists announced Sunday it has formed an executive committee to coordinate the fight against the proposed building of Echo Park dam on the Colorado river.

This dam is the most urgent example of threatening encroachment by commercial interests on the national park system, a statement from the council said. Elwood Clark, president of the National Parks Association, told the committee's first meeting some 17 other plans would also infringe on national park territory.

The council said approval of Echo Park dam would be a sign for sponsors of these other plans to push ahead with their proposals.

The council said the proposed Echo Park dam, designed to provide irrigation water and power, would ruin the "Monumental Monument" of the park.

Conservationists are working to prevent approval of the dam. The committee issued a statement saying it was aware of the need for sound water development of the Upper Colorado but added:

"We point out that the necessity for Echo Park dam has never been demonstrated. We also point out that the alternative to Echo Park dam has never been adequately studied by the bureau of reclamation, and have never been proved."
