Members of the crew were known to have perished and 12 more were missing and feared dead in the worst disaster of the five-day series of winter storms that has spread havoc across the British Isles.

Storms Whip Pacific Areas, Several Dead

By The Associated Press

A typhoon and two great wind storms Monday spread havoc and death over vast areas of the Pacific from Japan to Honolulu.


High winds, rain and an avalanche killed at least six Japanese and left 19 missing in Japan.

Winds of 15-mph-an-hour blew down the 10- to 15-mph marine rain. The tent camp at the base of Fuji and forced the marines to move out to permanent barracks nearby.

Five Japanese were killed. Others were missing. 23 fishing boats were sunk and hundreds of homes were destroyed when the high wind ripped through seven small islands 100 miles south of Tokyo.

Another late season typhoon howled across the central Philippines, hitting the island of Leyte.

Indestructible Sir Winston, England's "Old Bulldog," Observes Anniversary

LONDON, (AP)—With a clear in his mouth, every baby looks like me," England's indestructible Sir Winston Churchill once commented on his own world-famous facial features. "I, of course, look like every baby," he added.

He is 60 years old today.

But Sir Winston's features are also extremely mobile. According to an artist, Graham Southern, commissioned by the combined houses of parliament to paint the famous leader Churchill's 60th birthday portrait, every thought that passes through Sir Winston's mind is reflected in his face.

Which will be—atomism, war, for, anti, with?

But for 60 million Britons there can be no doubt. There is only one Churchill, as far as they are concerned—the bulldog, growling, snapping, clapping, his tail fin- gers up in the air—always.

This is the Churchill whose "light them on the beaches" speech could stir a nation to resist invasion, and yet, curiously enough, bring comfort to those who had suffered losses—so the "a thousand years from now, men will say 'This was their finest hour'."

It was his finest hour, too, and remembering, thousands of humble folk are expecting these things by contributing to an 80th Birthday Presentation fund, which will be used for the benefit of the nation's aged.

A 71-year-old preceptor sends his best wishes to Sir Winston— thanks for all Sir Winston has done.

But the war years have receded, and now politicians are saying that having survived his hour of danger, Sir Winston should retire, make way for younger men of ability. In- stead, he is likened to an actor who has outlived his popularity, and is now a laughing stock.

"For a man of this sort Sir Win- ston," says a most interesting ac- count. Recently, picking up a copy of the tabloid Daily Mirror in the headline "Churchill Must Go," he faced a checkmate—photo of a bathing beauty, Sir Winston cried: "Just look at it, on one side lechery, on the other treachery."

Churchill is indestructible. Like Cleopatra, age seems neither to wither him, nor custom to stale his infinite variety. True, he depends upon a hearing aid, and his age is as firm as a lion's paw, but his spirit is still youthful and his wit rapier-like.

Even the Tories have been after the razor edge of his tongue. After listening to a Tory minister's speech on foreign affairs, Sir Win- ston commented dryly:

"I thought it was a very good speech. It must have been good, for it contained every platitude known to men with the possible exception of 'Fiddle de meo, thy God' and 'Please adjust your dress before leaving this public conference.'"

Another Tory—a tall, gloomy col- league—he refers to as "that With- ington's Reliance."

Churchill's work-habits are awe- inspiring. seldom retiring before midnight, he is capable of going at a morning cabinet meeting, con- ferring with several ministers in the afternoon and receiving an even- ing audience with the queen at Buckingham palace.

For some he follow his doctor's advice to cut down on spirits and tobacco. Of the former, he says, "I have taken more out of alcohol than alcohol has taken out of me."

As for his cigar-smoking, "If I had not smoked so much I might have been bad-tempered at the wrong time."

Verily, is perhaps his outstanding weakness. Few who saw him at the coronation of Elizabeth II will for- get the sight of Churchill decked out in the velvet robes and plumes of a knight of the garter.

All but overlooked, however, was the by-play between Sir Winston and a boy scout, who insisted on holding an umbrella over the prime minister as he walked from West- minster abbey to his carriage in downpouring rain.

"Don't hold that thing over me, none," he snapped irritably. "I want to be seen."

As he flung himself into the car- riage, his garter robes trailing be- hind him, Lady Churchill could be heard admonishing: "Now then, dear, tuck in your pants."

Is Churchill really indestructible? Has time played him a mad prank, making him grow younger instead of older with each succeeding year? Political hopes whose progress he has retarded sometimes get his in- pression.

This nightmare of clocks in re- verse, of time gone berserk, was captured by a British newspaper cartoonist. He showed Churchill in 1904, a tubercular, young man telling an infatuated carpet-slipped An- thony Eden that he, Eden, must go, that he is "too old."

"Winston," the cartoonist adds, "gives a half-promise that he will resign on reaching the age of 15."

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Research May Bring Drop in Two Products

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—Review of 1954 research highlights reveals that government farm experiments and the use of wheat to bring down the price of bread and milk.

Research teams proved that high quality milk can be produced with less than half the labor and investment used by most farmers. The scientists say housewives may pay less for milk if dairy farmers use goat sanitation and milk-cooling methods and cheaper, more convenient housing for cows.

The cost of bread may be lowered by bringing down the cost of producing wheat, the nations wheat bread grain, the scientists said. They showed that the cost of producing a bushel of wheat can be brought down from an average of \$1.65 at harvest to \$1.20 by using new cultivation methods and more fertilization. The saving of \$1.20 a bushel would be nearly double the 10-cent reduction ordered in federal wheat support prices for next year.

Hereafter, the cost of wheat for farm experiments so far in 1954—\$1.20 a bushel—has been reduced to \$1.00.

1. Agriculture department researchers found one of the causes of animal ailments which has plagued cattle and dairy producers since historic times. Scientists found that a substance found in alfalfa, is one of the causes of the disease which pulls up cattle like balloons.

2. Scientists introduced disease-resistant and higher-yielding varieties of wheat, peaches, soybeans, alfalfa, watermelon, tomato and onion.

3. Research workers found new poisons such as malathion or diazinon mixed with sugar and spread in dairy barns and poultry houses can be used to exterminate insects which have developed the ability to shake off effects of DDT.

4. Scientists have achieved a four-way-cross chicken by mating two hybrid chickens of separate blood strains which will lay more eggs than many of their purebred sisters.

5. Studies held out the promise that anti-biotic drugs may be useful in fighting plant diseases.

6. Research workers invented a portable, cheap device for testing soil salinity for farmers in western areas where the soil often is salty.

British Foo Gets South Africa Job

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, Nov. 30 (AP)—Dr. G. B. Murray, an extreme advocate of racial segregation, today was elected prime minister of the Union of South Africa.

The parliamentary caucus of the ruling Nationalist party chose Murray over N. C. Havens, a moderate, to succeed the retiring 80-year-old prime minister, Daniel Malan.

Strict secrecy was observed when party delegates met last night at Pretoria, 80 miles west of Johannesburg, to start their deliberations on the issue of replacing Malan.

Dr. Murray, a Hindu, under Malan's regime, is considered an even more extreme supporter of the "apartheid" racial segregation system than the retiring prime minister.

At 61 he is an old man, but determined to establish South Africa as a republic and is fanatically anti-British.

End for Segregation in U. S. Schools May Take Years Yet

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—An end to segregation in American public schools.

The supreme court, ruling last week that public school segregation is unconstitutional, and must end, is not likely to see the end of the two key questions: How and when?

The court now can't attempt to give the answer before far into next year. Even then, judging from the court's careful allowance in handing down the decision, it is unlikely to call for overnight action.

The court doesn't have to follow the views of President Eisenhower and Atty. Gen. Brownell but no doubt will consider them. And both last week came out for a careful and gradual solution as against a sudden one.

Those Southern states which have given the court their opinions have called for a gradual approach as a minimum. Although Negroes have told the court they want segregation ended no later than September, 1955.

A few Southern states in extreme opposition to the court's ruling, particularly Georgia, may try this kind of device for thwarting any final effort of the federal government to end segregation at all.

End their present public school system and substitute another kind—for instance, private associations—to keep white and Negro children separate. Georgia voters approved such a plan in the Nov. 2 election. And Georgia's Gov. Talmadge has said:

"Segregation in Georgia will not be ended at any time."

The supreme court ruled against segregation in public schools. An arrangement like Georgia's, supported by public tax money, would be in effect a public school system under another name. Or would it?

Some lawyers here foresee, before there could be an answer to that question, a light all the way up through the federal courts again to the supreme court—a fight which would take more years.

Although the court was first announced in December 1953, segregation, it didn't give its opinion until May 17, 1954. This delay was clear evidence it understood the magnitude of the problem and the need for care.

The problem is not one but many. The intense and ancient racial prejudices that must be settled or

compromised; the planning required in combining schools and school districts; financing; redistributing white and Negro teachers.
