

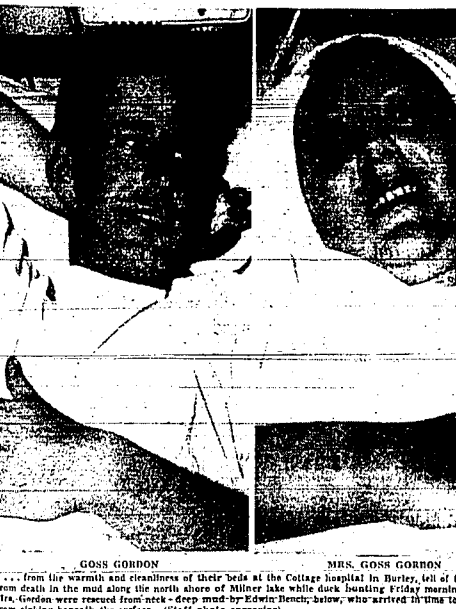
# Administration Planers Split on Foreign Spending

Reports said Harold Stassen, foreign operations administrator, favored large-scale grants in the new program, while Secretary of the Treasury, John A. Ladd, is strongly opposed to more Marshall plan type of any considerable size.

Stassen was represented by a spokesman who said he was favoring foreign economic assistance, but believed it should be forthcoming chiefly through the regular channels of the government-owned Export-Import bank, the 51-nation World Bank and the proposed 100-million dollar International Finance Corporation. The latter would get its funds from World Bank members, with the United States putting up 25 million dollars.

No decision has yet been made by President Eisenhower, but Stassen said the administration is split on the issue.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 4 (AP)—Adlai Stevenson pledged today that he will not usurp the powers of President Eisenhower's executive powers, but he said Republicans can expect "honorable criticism" if they inject politics into the foreign policy.

Speaking to about 1,000 of the party faithful at a \$100-a-plate dinner, the 1952 presidential nominee said the Democrats in the role of "loyal opposition" to the Eisenhower administration.

"I am sure that the great majority of Democrats and of independent voters are in favor of this (GOP) administration to succeed as it never has before in its history of defending the security and property of our own people and of expanding the hopeful freedom and justice for all people," Stevenson said.

In response to a question, Hagerty said the President still was following a hands-off policy with regard to the McCarthy controversy itself.

## Area Canning Kitchen Picks Its Directors

JEROME, Dec. 4—Mrs. Herman Hall, representing the northwest district, was elected a director for a term of two years at the annual meeting of the Jerome Canning Kitchen Thursday night at the county courthouse.  
Also elected was Mrs. William Snyder, representing the southwest district, for a term of two years. Holdover directors are Mrs. Ed Jensen, Leighton Jure and O. W. Oeller.  
Members discussed the cost of canning and took under consideration the possibility of increasing the cost per can for the next year. However, it was decided that with a large fruit crop and a heavy run of canning for the next season, the cost of cans could remain at eight cents and eight and one-half cents.  
Further improvements for parking were discussed and the grounds will be graded and gravelled to facilitate a larger parking area.  
Frank Humberch, secretary-manager, reported that the canning kitchen broke about even this year although it was the smallest run during the past four years. He pointed out that 121,000 cans had been processed. Of these, 40,000 were fruit, 65,000 vegetables and 7,000 fish and meats. The kitchen operates about 70 days and 150 paid members participated as well as nine school, churches and the hospital. Humberch reported major improvements made this year were installation of a large can sealer and some grading and graveling for a parking area. He stated that the Jerome kitchen had the largest production capacity in this area.  
Immediately following the meeting directors elected Leighton Jure chairman, personnel including Mrs. Pearl Hogue, supervisor; Mrs. Julia Jacobs, assistant; Ed Jensen, boiler supervisor, and Humberch, secretary-manager.

### Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Most people have hobbies but not many have one that is as profitable and enjoyable as that of Mrs. John R. Toomey, GOODING.

She makes shell jewelry in her spare time, fashioning it from the delicate little shells, the smallest cup shell in the world, to the large "lucina" shell. Some of the shells Mrs. Toomey uses are colored by nature with brown, green, blue and white. Some are plain white with a smooth, glossy finish. She uses them to make earrings, necklaces, pins and combination sets.

Clear fish scales are used for the leaves in many designs and seed pearls are used to accent other designs. Many shells used in the cup shape can be cut lengthwise to form one design and cut crosswise to form another.

She calls the jewelry "Jewelry by Jan." The designs are mostly for all but she also makes some novelty sets. She makes earrings, necklaces, pins and combination sets.

Mrs. Toomey has been interested in this hobby only since March. Seeing a pin a friend was wearing, she liked the idea immediately.

"It isn't hard but it takes a steady hand and lots of patience," she liked the idea immediately.

The equipment she uses is found in most homes. She uses a dinner plate on which to form her designs. She uses a small, flat, round object to make a pattern and cement to glue them together.

To make a pin or earring set, first a drop of cement is placed on the plate, allowed to set just a little and then a design is made. After the cement is dry a razor blade is used to cut the design from the plate. It is then cemented on a plastic disk for the pin or earring back.

Mrs. Toomey buys the chain for her necklaces in 25-foot lengths and cuts it herself to the desired length. Daintily though the shell jewelry appears, it is very durable. It looks so fragile, but actually it is durable.

Mrs. and Mr. Toomey have two small children, a daughter 2 years old and a son of 8 months. Mrs. Toomey says she works on her hobby in 15 minutes and after the children are in bed in the evening.

Mrs. Toomey says most of the ideas used in the "Jewelry by Jan" are her own. In the few months she has been working at this hobby, she has made over 100 earrings, necklaces and pins.

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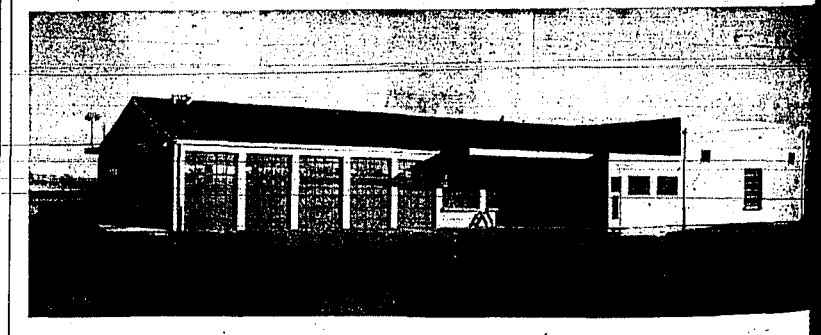

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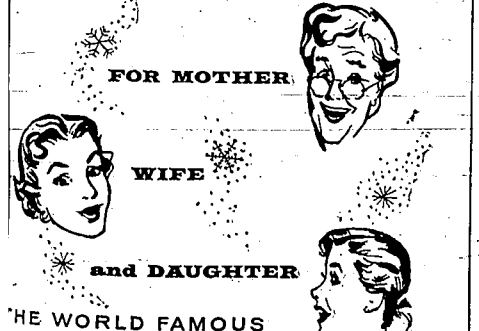

"Peep Hole" on Soviet Power Lost by Alphabetical Listings

Western exposure on Soviet Russia have lost a "peep hole" into the way things are going inside the Kremlin. For years, they had watched closely the order of precedence in which top-ranking Russian leaders were listed when they attended official functions—celebrations, congresses, banquets, funerals and even open meetings.

The frequent shifting in the ranking of the top men was the "peep hole" through which the West could see the power struggle in the Kremlin. It was a peep hole, however, that is now closed.

This had happened once before. Shortly after the death of Joseph Stalin, then the almighty ruler of the Soviet Union, the order of precedence was changed. This time, however, the change was permanent.

There are two suggestions as to the reason for the change. One is that the Kremlin is trying to build up the idea of collective leadership, in which the power is shared by a group of men. The other is that the change is a sign of a new power struggle.

In the alphabetical listing, Premier Georgi M. Malenkov ranks first, followed by Nikita S. Khrushchev, then Lavrenti Beria, and finally Molotov, who is normally the man in the government, comes last. Nikita S. Khrushchev, first secretary of the Russian Communist party, is now the most powerful man in the Kremlin.

Malenkov, of course is the No. 1 man. It has long been apparent that Khrushchev is a ruthless, ambitious man. He has a great talent for the job. He is a ruthless, ambitious man. He has a great talent for the job.

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Report Shows Status of Pilot District Program for Lincoln

SHOSHONE, Dec. 4.—Lincoln county farmers were given first-hand information this week on the pilot district program for Lincoln county conservation service.

The information was given at a series of meetings by officials of the soil conservation service, the bureau of land management and the state fish and game department.

Highlighting the report was given by Mrs. Clark, Pocatello, range conservationist for the soil conservation service, who stated that the program was already well advanced and what is hoped to be accomplished by the program will increase production of the soil.

The district, Clark said, comprises 121 square miles, including all of Lincoln county and 30 square miles in Gooding county. Approximately 100,000 acres, or 13 per cent, are classified as suitable for farming with only 34,000 acres actually under cultivation.

Range land comprises 74,000 acres or 60 per cent of the district. Of this total only 20,000 acres, or four per cent, are in good condition. 215,000 acres are in fair condition, 452,000 acres in poor condition, the report said. Livestock, however, is the leading agricultural interest in the district, contributing approximately 53 per cent of the total agricultural income.

Each year approximately 45,000 sheep use the district's rangeland while moving into summer range in the Big Wood river basin.

Also each year approximately 30,000 acre feet of water are delivered through the Big Wood river canal system to the farms in the district.
