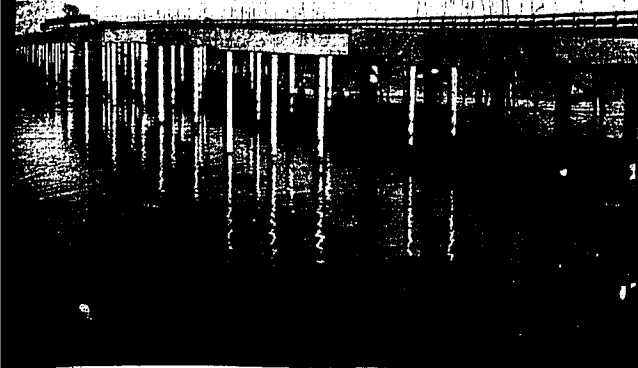

# New Span Takes Shape Across River



commonly known as the Montgomery bridge, is one of the new spans across the Snake river in the vicinity of Burley and is one of the other two bridges currently in under construction.

**Progresses on Two of Three Snake River Bridges**

Dec. 7 — Three new traffic deck. Estimated cost will be \$485,000.

The Montgomery bridge, which was started last June, is a relatively new concrete design. Estimated cost, new approaches included, is \$204,800.

The other bridge under construction is the Heyburn bridge, which will replace the present Heyburn-Burley crossing, a part of highway 30N. Contractors are Hansen and Parr, Spokane, who are constructing the bridge and approaches at an estimated cost of \$225,732.

While the Montgomery and Heyburn bridges will be set in close parallel to existing bridges, the Heyburn bridge will angle sharply across the Snake, with the north end set close to the present bridge and the south end more than 1,000 feet upstream from the present bridge, which was begun in 1924.

For two of the bridges, the Calson company, Boise, is handling present traffic while construction is in progress. The Heyburn bridge will be built on a 26-foot wide

structure. Both this bridge and the Heyburn bridge are scheduled for completion next year, each replacing old bridges that were beyond repair. (Staff photo-engraving)

The bridge's south end. The reason for this is the Burley airport.

Both concrete bridges are being built in a large measure with federal aid funds and in order to qualify, the new Heyburn bridge has to comply with CAA regulations regarding highway distances from runway approaches. The present bridge and south approach are hard by the airport, but the new bridge and approach will be nearly a quarter of a mile away.

The diagonal crossing of the Heyburn bridge makes it 1,100 feet long, considerably longer than the bridge it will replace. The Heyburn bridge will have 108 piling, as compared with 150 for the Montgomery bridge. The last 18 piling shells for the Heyburn bridge, which was begun in August, are expected to be in place this week.

The piling shells are steel casings, 14 inches in diameter. They are driven into the river bed in walled sections by a pile driver. On the Heyburn bridge, the pile driver was mounted on a barge. On the Montgomery bridge, the pile driver was moved on a platform extended from one newly driven set of piling shells to another.

Piling shells of the Heyburn bridge are being driven 15 to 40 feet below the river bed. Driving is stopped when 10 blows, each the equivalent of a 35-ton anvil, fail to budge the piling shell more than one inch. Montgomery bridge piling have been sunk 10 to 22 feet and rest on bedrock.

The pilings are placed in bents, or sets of six, with the bents placed 40 feet apart. The outer pilings of the Heyburn bridge are tilted toward the center one inch per vertical foot. This angle will help reduce the lateral strain on the bridge.

The Montgomery bridge piling shells already have been filled with concrete, with a concrete cross-pile built on top of each bent. The first 30 of 144 stringers, laid in sets of six from one bent to the next, have been set in place. The Heyburn bridge will have 192 stringers.

The concrete stringers, which are cast in forms on shore and laid in place by derrick, are 40 feet long, three and one-half feet high and a foot thick. Each weighs 10 tons. On top of the stringers of each bridge will be built a 34-inch thick concrete deck or roadway 28 feet wide.

Project chief on the Montgomery bridge is F. L. Norman, while C. J. Jarvis is chief on the Heyburn bridge.

# FDR Blamed For '41 Japan Sneak Attack

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—(AP)—Husband E. Kimmel, self-styled "scapegoat" of the Pearl Harbor disaster, charged today that the Roosevelt administration deliberately provoked the Japanese attack that plunged the United States into World War II just 13 years ago.

The retired naval officer, who was commander-in-chief of the Pacific fleet on the "day that will live in infamy," also said that top officials of the war and navy departments withheld from Hawaiian commanders intelligence reports, including intercepted Japanese messages, that clearly indicated the attack was coming.

Had this information been passed along to him, even on the eve of the attack, Kimmel said, "I would have had my ships in a position to intercept the Japanese raiding force before it struck."

Kimmel and the late Maj. Gen. Walter C. Short, then army commander in Hawaii, were removed from their commands in January, 1942, after special commission headed by former Supreme Court Justice Owen Roberts held them primarily responsible for the success of the sneak Japanese attack. However, retired navy Capt. T. T. Kimmel, a naval historian, said no important information "was ever withheld" from Kimmel and Short. He also said that it was a "characteristic misrepresentation" to suggest that the late President Roosevelt deliberately invited the attack to provide this country with an excuse to enter the war.

# Navy Plans Will Not Be Changed Despite 'Advice'

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—(AP)—The navy plans to continue building and operating aircraft carriers despite unadvised advice to the contrary from Britain's Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery.

The navy's stand was laid down Monday by James H. Smith, assistant secretary for air, at a conference called for the purpose of giving the navy's position to Lord Montgomery's staff. Smith said the size and scope of western navies should be reduced to meet the needs of the world, but he said that the navy's plans should be built because, he said, the ship of such ships was being brought to an end by air power.

Smith explained that the United States navy's conclusions differed from those of the British because the problem was an Englishman, with European responsibilities, whereas the official defense officials of this country have a lot of its surface covered by vast stretches of the sea. Smith said that the navy had examined Montgomery's speech and had made several on the importance of air power in recent weeks — "with a great deal of care" but had concluded that the navy should "not be greatly disturbed."

# Egypt Hangs Six For Kill Attempt

CAIRO, Dec. 7.—(AP)—Egypt's revolutionary government hanged six leaders of the outlawed Muslim Brotherhood today for attempting to assassinate Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser.

The executions began at dawn in the Cairo prison and were spaced at 30-minute intervals to each execution, the condemned was left hanging from the gibbet for almost half an hour.

First to die was Mahmoud Abdel Latif, 36, in the plot to kill the youthful premier at Alexandria last Oct. 26.

Following him to the gallows were Yousef Talmat, 42, chief of the secret brotherhood; Ibrahim El Tayeb, 32, lawyer and brotherhood leader in Cairo; Hishay Dawoud, leader in the Bahari district; Mahdi Mohamed, 41, brotherhood member in the Beni Nasser zone; and Abdel Kader Oda, a member of the brotherhood council.

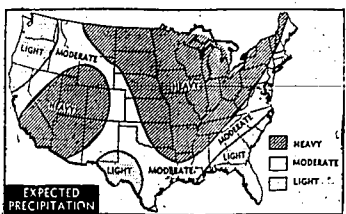

# Strange Music, From Deeps of Outer Space, Studied, Traced

PALO ALTO, Calif., Dec. 7.—(AP)—A research project on messages from outer space, called "whistlers," has been launched at Stanford University, it was disclosed here yesterday.

The research is centered upon "whistlers," phenomena described by musical sounds from outer space. Scientists are testing a theory they are related to lightning.

In an exclusive interview with the Palo Alto Times, Dr. Robert Helliwell, associate professor of electrical engineering, revealed that Stanford, with cooperation of U. S. government engineers, has set up a listening station aboard the navy low-breaker Atka, now en route to Atlantic sea.

In addition, new equipment is being set up at Stanford's radio propagation laboratory to catch and study the signals which have intrigued scientists ever since a German field communications officer recorded the first one during World War I.

Helliwell told the Times that the research, under auspices of the Air Force Cambridge Research Center and the Stanford radio propagation laboratory, may make outer space regions, far beyond the limits of the known ionosphere, accessible to study by radio for the first time in the history of science.

It is expected to test the theory developed by L. J. O. Storey at Cambridge University in England, that the whistlers, dispatched into the ionosphere from one of the earth's hemispheres, are deflected back to the other one by forces in outer space.

Helliwell said there is some astronomical evidence to support existence of the outer space masses. The national bureau of standards, through its central radio propagation laboratory at Boulder, Colo., is cooperating in the Atka project.

British scientists are lending interested support, and Helliwell said there is prospect of establishing receiving stations also in Bermuda and the Falkland Islands.

Dr. Helliwell discounted the possibility of the whistlers' origin on another planet.

The scientist defined a whistler like this: "A message from outer space — actually a signal with a musical quality, picked up on receiving sets, and from all known characteristics, produced by lightning discharges."

It awakes like the lashing of a whip, he said, beginning on a high, fast note and decaying at a diminishing rate for a second or two, it bounces between hemispheres, via outer space, more than once.

# Communism Makes Return In South American Nations

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, Dec. 7.—(AP)—Communism is creeping stealthily back into the political and economic life of the South American republics.

It reached its high tide in the "brothers-in-arms" days of World War II, when the Russians were allies of the democracies against Hitler.

After the war it diminished steadily, but now it is coming back with the aid of an economic slump due partly to world surpluses of raw materials and foodstuffs.

Communists are filtering into labor unions and trying to warm their way into political parties.

They are fomenting strikes and inciting terrorism.

In numbers they are still small but they are a growing danger.

So far, there is no sign of a situation like that which exists in Europe.

in Guatemala, in Central America, in the recent United Nations educational, scientific and cultural organization conference in Montevideo, Uruguay, and the recent Pan-American financial conference in Petropolis, Brazil.

One of the communist slogans for the Petropolis meeting was: "United States monopolists have no intention of solving Latin America's economic difficulties. The only solution lies in trade with communist countries."

An indication of the alchemy way in which the reds work was given when President Getulio Vargas of Brazil committed suicide last August after political opponents demanded his resignation.

The Brazilian communists had opposed Vargas bitterly, but in his suicide note, Vargas blamed foreign interests for Brazil's economic crisis.

The communists, in a 100 per cent policy switch, threw their support to Vargas' labor party in the election which followed.

There have been police attacks against communists in some countries, including Argentina, Chile and Colombia. The Communist party is outlawed in some of the republics.

Nevertheless, by using every sort of trickery, working either openly or underground, the reds are coming back.

South Americans say that if the United States does something about it now, in the form of economic aid, it may save money in the long run.

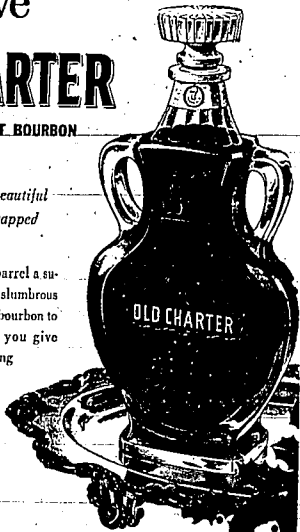

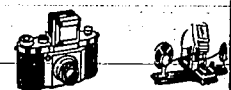

# Salle Is Voted 1 Quintet in e-Season Poll

By The Associated Press  
Salle Explorers, who won the NCAA basketball title last spring, and Kentucky's Wildcats, who won the 1953-54 season undefeated but didn't play for the national title, are tabbed to finish 1-2 in the current campaign. At least they're picked in that order by the sportswriters and broadcasters participating in The Associated Press preseason poll with Duquesne a good third.

The experts, asked to rate the top 20 teams on the basis of how they expect them to do in the full season, put Salle on top by a big margin. Out of 81 participants in this annual voting game, 34 cast first place votes for Salle and 13 named Kentucky first. No other team drew more than three first place votes although 10 other teams were at the head of various ballots.

La Salle, with 34 first and 12 second place votes, had an imposing total of 342 points on the basis of a system of counting 10 for each first place vote, nine for second, and on down. Kentucky, whose votes were somewhat more scattered, drew 313 points for second place, Duquesne had 288 points for third place and Iowa 265 for fourth.

Then came Holy Cross and Indiana close together, Dayton, Nebraska, Notre Dame in another tight group and North Carolina State, barely edging out the Oklahoma A&M and St. Louis for 10th.

Indicating the wide variety of opinion among the voters after the first round, the top four, a total of 66 colleges was listed on the ballots and the 10th place team, Iowa, whose votes didn't get enough points to place among the first 20.

In last season's final Associated Press ranking poll, taken after the 10th Bradley, Western Kentucky, St. Louis and Holy Cross, national independent tournament winner, third place in the 1954 first round 10 were Indiana, Duquesne, Notre Dame, all rated in this year's pre-season first 10.
