Ge Licor Sales T Indians Illegal, Rules Idaho Court

BOISE, Dec. 8 (AP)—The Idaho Supreme Court, in a 3 to 2 decision, today upheld the constitutionality of the state law prohibiting sale of intoxicating liquor to Indians.

A complaint was ordered reinstated against George Rorvick, Fort Hall cafe operator, charging him with sale of intoxicating liquor to an Indian, and Bingham county district judge Preston Thatcher.

Action Taken By Board on School Items

BOISE, Dec. 22.—The state board of education met with University of Idaho President Dr. R. H. Theophilos here yesterday and made several appointments to the university and arranged final details for the three-year program under which it will send technical farm advisers to Ecuador.

The board also adopted textbooks recommended by the state curriculum committee last week for mathematics, health and science classes in the public schools.

It also approved the publication and distribution of curriculum study guides for the use of teachers in secondary physical education and business education classes.

Earlier, the board approved a plan for Idaho State college's summer session to be held June 6 to July 29 and authorized the school to establish agency membership in the National League of Education.

Dr. Carl McIntosh, ICG president, said the board also approved scholarship gifts of \$750 from the Idaho Bank and Trust Co. to the Idaho State College, \$150 from the Twin Falls Kiwanis club, \$50 from the Pocatello Art and Travel Club, \$100 from the Boise chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma, and \$200 from the Pocatello 25-30 club.

West German Border Patrol to Form Nucleus of Future Army

MUNICH, Germany, Dec. 8 — The border police force highly mobile, speedy diesel trucks that seat a 30-man platoon are used as a nucleus for the future army.

The 12-division West German army will exist on paper until the NATO nations ratify the Paris agreement authorizing its existence.

It is organized along military lines and forms a nucleus for the future army.

The average border policeman is around 20 years old. He has never been in battle, and the crushing defeat of Hitler's army is a childhood memory to him.

"We who have been to Russia know the kind of war we would have to fight if the Reds attacked," said Capt. Peter Mueller, an intelligence officer.

"We cannot possibly match the eastern forces in manpower as we must organize a force of anti-aircraft and equip them well enough so that they can stand off an army superior in numbers," he said.

The border policeman's uniform includes the "coal scuttler" helmet which was a German trademark in two world wars.

The new German soldier marches less than his predecessor did. To keep the border police force highly mobile, speedy diesel trucks that seat a 30-man platoon are used as a nucleus for the future army.

A stopped down engine, sedan also is employed as a patrol car, and officials are testing a "diesel" which is a four-passenger car similar to the American jeep.

The heaviest weapon the border police can use is the German nine-millimeter pistol, about the size of a U. S. 32 caliber pistol, and a machine pistol of the same caliber.

The force also has a standard carbine as big as an American 30 caliber rifle. All these weapons date back to World War II.

After German sovereignty is returned, the border police are expected to be authorized to carry heavier arms — principally larger caliber machine guns.

Points will be planned to match anything the German-Communists have on the opposite side of border fence.

Sawdust Licking Cattle Drop Dead

SUNBURST, Mont., Dec. 8 — Cattle with a taste for sawdust started dropping dead on Peter Sula's ranch near the Montana-Canadian border.

The herd last week broke into an old shed where the sawdust was stored.

Sula said his father when running the ranch 20 years ago had mixed arsenic in the sawdust to make poisoned bait to kill grasshoppers.

1954 Will Be Big Yuletide for People and Car Traffic Jams

NEW YORK, Dec. 8 (AP)—It's a big Christmas in traffic jams, too. More traffic in stores means more jams on the streets—and there are more cars than ever this year to get stuck at intersections.
 Electronic engineers are busy tackling the traffic officers' problems. First they thought up use of radar to clock speedsters on the open stretches.
 Next, in spots where traffic sometimes only crawls, it was, electronic thought up a scheme of using radar to report changes in volume of approaching traffic and to time the red lights accordingly.
 Now the engineers are coming up with still another idea—using radio and seeing on television to clock and map changing traffic conditions and then more or less automatically change traffic signals over whole sections of the city.

eastern industries at Norwalk, Conn. is offering what it calls an electronic master cycle and off-set selector system. This is an electronic computing gadget only 10 inches long, 7 inches high and 12 inches deep.
 The gadget receives a steady stream of traffic information, mechanically reported from many intersections, which it fits in its electric brain. The company engineers say the device then automatically determines the most efficient operating pattern for the traffic signals to which it is connected.
 When the volume of traffic from the east suddenly swells, traffic signals are turned to let it through the intersection. As northbound traffic volume builds up, the signals

are changed to clear it and speed it on its way.
 Engineers say the computer is set to disregard sharp swells, however, but rather to determine constantly the average volume and compute the most efficient signal changes.

Business and Industry Leaders Count Progressive, Prosperous 1955 Growth

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—The United States and Canada are in for an extremely good business year in 1955. That is the opinion of business leaders in every section of the country and in widely diversified industries.

There is a virtually unanimous agreement that 1955 will be better than 1954 and that the business surge which began in the autumn will mount with steady but not spectacular momentum.

The forecast came from leaders in farming and livestock, home construction, steel, retail merchandising, banking, textile manufacturing, the stock market, factory production, shipping, mining, airlines and railroads.

Reasons for this economic forecast included population growth, removal of trade barriers, improved conditions in Europe and South America, more liberal credit terms, national defense demands and the impetus furnished by such booming industries as housing.

Electronics was singled out by the president of the National Association of Manufacturers as the industry with the biggest future. The west coast, the southwest and the Rocky mountains are the areas of greatest optimism.

There are weak spots. The textile industry is cautious. Some farm products may find rough sledding. But the overall picture from the viewpoint of the businessmen is very good.

This is a summary of opinions from 11 sections of the country and Montreal, Canada: Chicago—Sylvester J. Meyers, president of the Chicago board of trade: "The general outlook for mid-west farmers in 1955 appears to be quite favorable. With a few notable exceptions such as eggs and poultry, farm product prices reversed their downward trend during the past year and in some cases are now higher than a year ago."

Boston—Martin Cerril, one of New England's biggest home builders: "I predict a bright outlook in the building industry, extending through 1957. Cerril built 1,600 homes in the Boston area this year and expects to build more."

St. Louis—H. H. Kell, president of Mississippi Shipping Company: "I have always been high on the economic possibilities of the Gulf-Mississippi delta area."

His company's recent survey showed the general business outlook in the 12 western states and the province of Alberta, Canada, is optimistic and encouraging.

There is no indication of any slowdown in trend toward further industrialization and development of natural resources in the area. San Francisco—D. J. Russell, president of the Southern Pacific railroad: Population in the eight states served by the Southern Pacific has grown 50 per cent since 1940 and he predicts another 25 per cent growth from 1960 to 1960.

Spray Called Exterminator Of Grub Pest

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—Two federal entomologists have devised an experimental fumigant spray they claim is "lethal" to the cattle grub.

Although scores of new sprays have been tried in recent years for the fight against the grub, a. H. Roth and George W. Eddy say the new one is the first to prove more effective than standard rotenone sprays.

Roth and Eddy, stationed at the Corvallis, Ore., laboratory of the agricultural department's entomological research service, prepared a report on the new spray today for the Entomological Research Service, which is meeting in Washington.

The spray, named for simplicity, is 21/100 Technicel, 10 to 30 percent methoxychlor and 60 to 70 percent thiophosphate.

The scientists said that 21/100 applied in the hocks of nine grubs-infected cattle killed all the grubs in less than a week. Rotenone sprays result in an 84 per cent kill the first week and 91 per cent by the end of the second.

Roth and Eddy point out the preliminary nature of their tests and caution that until much more is learned about the toxic effect of the spray on cattle, livestock men should continue to depend on rotenone for cattle grub control.

Idaho Merchants Expect Busy, Merry Christmas This Season

IDAHO MERCHANTS say they are already finding this Christmas a busy one. The season is expected to be the best in years.

Store managers' estimates of their pre-Christmas business range from about the same as last year to 18 per cent better.

There will be a lot of television and radio Christmas programs in Idaho, as merchants are reporting TV receivers one of their "hot" items.

But the television rush has slowed down in northern Idaho, where programs have been available now for two years.

Why is business better? The reason most often expressed is the increase in store footcure store manager H. M. Burningham, Boise, said, "people are more interested about the economy."
