Fire Fighters Remove Volts Out of Clouds

RAIN FRANCISCO, Dec. 19 (AP)—A method of fire prevention in western forests—taking the fire-starting high voltage out of clouds—has been demonstrated here yesterday at the annual Western Forestry conference.

Jack B. Barry of the Interagency Forest and Range Experiment station, Missoula, Mont., told delegates of a project which is being carried out by the U. S. forest service and the U. S. Army.

Barry said the project is being conducted by the U. S. forest service and the U. S. Army. The project includes a cloud survey from a constant rate of 10,000 feet throughout the west. Observers report cloud heights and speeds and characteristics of lightning storms. Also being studied is the "let air" effect of 20,000 to 40,000 feet at altitudes of 20,000 to 40,000 feet.

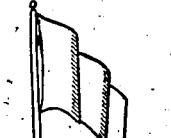

GOP Senators Submit Bid on Posts Desired

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Republican senators were notified today to submit their bids for committee assignments for next year by Dec. 13.

The notice carried an implied warning that there will be slim pickings for new senators and for incumbents who want to move to coveted committee areas in the next congress.

Sen. John W. Bricker, R., O., chairman of the GOP committee on committees, issued the notification. It asked each incumbent senator to list his first two preferences and each new senator to list three because there will be a "greater probability" in satisfying the wishes of the freshman.

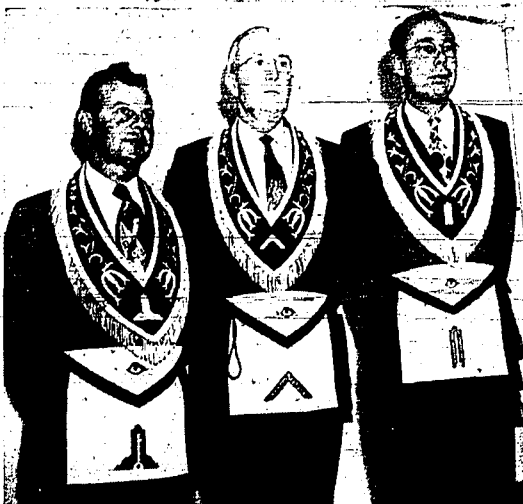
With few exceptions, committee seats will be no more than one member of a party from an individual state, committee members said.

Bricker's letter pointed out that the GOP is expected to revert to minority status where there are more seats and that it, therefore, will lose one seat on each committee when the Democrats take control.

Because of this shrinkage in Republican seats, there will be few openings to be filled on the more coveted committees. Most of the vacancies created by the retirement or defeat of incumbent Republicans will go to Democrats.

For example, the GOP will have only one seat on the subcommittee on armed services committees. They have only one on the subcommittee on which county seatmen regard as a favorable spot. They have none on the foreign relations committee, which also regarded as prime assignments.

Be Not Afraid Of Red Might, Warns Wilson

CHICAGO, Dec. 10.—Democratic Secretary Charles E. Wilson has called on Americans not to act frightened of the might of Communism.

"Too much has been said about the Russian and the Soviet and too little about our own strength," Wilson said last night.

"We should not act as if we are afraid," he said. He added that Americans would feel even more confident of their position if they could recall the new weapons recently developed by the United States.

Wilson, speaking at a meeting of the Illinois Manufacturers' association, said the association presented him with an editorial pleading him for sacrificing personal interest to bring "extraordinary ability, leadership and high energy" to the defense program.

Wilson told the manufacturers he is hopeful that defense expenditures will be \$12 billion, compared to \$10 billion in 1953.

This plan would bring the present estimated defense budget of \$11 billion down to less than \$10 billion, he said.

Ernest Hemingway Wins Nobel Literature Award for Writings

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Dec. 10.—The Swedish academy formally awarded the Nobel prize for literature to Ernest Hemingway today as "one of the great authors of our time."

Four other Americans and two Germans collected the three Nobel prizes awarded this year.

Dr. Linus Pauling, Pasadena, Calif., received the chemistry prize. The medical award went jointly to a three-man American polio research team—Dr. John P. Enders and Thomas H. Weller, Boston, Mass., and Frederick C. Robbins, Cleveland, O.

German professors Max Born and Walter Bothe shared the physics prize.

All the winners except Hemingway and Bothe attended in person.

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Former Probe Chief Counsel Assaults Press

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—Roy M. Cohn, former chief counsel for Sen. Joseph P. McCarthy's permanent subcommittee, accused the press of "disaffection" last night with the way the press has been reporting "news of subversion and betrayal."

Cohn criticized such newspapers as the New York Times, the Baltimore Sun and the New York World Telegram "and the Sun."

"I accused the Times of slanting stories by 'buying' an important part of a story 'and plugging it a trivial part.'"

Cohn "lashed out" at the Washington Post in general and the World Telegram in particular for its series on McCarthy by reporter Fred Scheraga.

Speaking to the *Brooklyn Institute of the Press* Cohn said "this fight against atheistic Communism belongs to all Americans—Catholics, Protestants and Jew."

"Cohn said that a recent tour through 'more than a dozen states' had shown him that "in some sections of the country, the exposure of Communists and fellow travelers propaganda is handled in such a manner that the readers who have seen the headlines on television wonder whether what they themselves saw is what they are reading about."

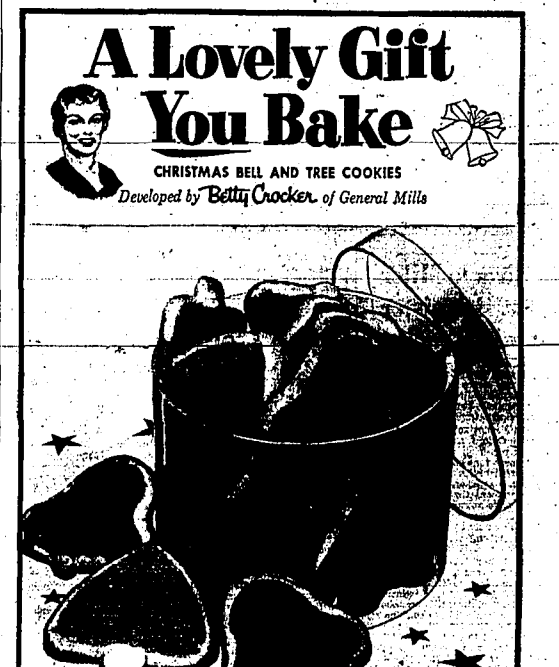

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Norris Calls Ring Fix Charge Absurd

NEW YORK, Dec. 10 (U.P.)—James D. Norris, jr., president of the International Boxing club, Thursday, described charges in a magazine article that he "fixed" two fights in 1937 and 1938 as "entirely, libelous and absurd."

Norris was referred to a copyrighted article in Sports Illustrated magazine in which former heavyweight boxer Harry Thomas claimed he was offered \$65,000 to throw his fight against Max Schmeling at Madison Square garden, Dec. 31, 1937, and \$5,000 to lose his bout against Tony Galento in Philadelphia, Nov. 14, 1938.

The IBCO president denounced the magazine article as "a cheap device on the part of a magazine seeking desperately to build circulation at the expense of boxing's best interests."

A hearing was held before the New York commission, Nov. 21, 1938, and Norris in a written statement, "At that hearing the boxer, Harry Thomas, who had the magazine story, refused to testify in connection on the hearsay the paper reported 'Thomas' story as completely untrue."

In the article Thomas related how he lost the bout against Schmeling on a technical knockout in his eighth round after being floored several times in that round. In the Galento bout Thomas was knocked out in the third round.

Thomas claimed, according to the magazine article, with relation to the Galento fight, "I was in on the two fixes and said that late promoter Mike Jacobs, no relation to the article, had been a fixer of prize fights."

Robert K. Christensen, chairman of the New York State Athletic commission, declined to comment until he has had a chance to study the article. Frank J. Brennan, chairman of the Pennsylvania Athletic commission, said in Philadelphia he "doubtless" contacted Thomas but in that city was fixed because "Thomas wasn't that good."

Writers said he planned no investigation. In Chicago, records showed that Norris himself had been a fixer of prize fights in 1933 and 1940 on Thomas' charges of fixings with Schmeling. Galento and issued a statement declaring that "the charges are not substantiated."

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Launching Set By U. S. Navy Of 'Forrestal'

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—A triumphantly U. S. navy tomorrow will launch the largest American ship ever built, the \$197,850,000 aircraft carrier, U. S. E. Forrestal.

The mighty man-of-war, 1,028 feet long, displacing 59,500 tons, will be eased gently into Hampton Roads, Va., with pomp and bedlam, new capital ship specially designed for the jet-atomic age.

Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson and others will visit the ship well in advance to an audience of congressmen, government officials, military leaders, shipyard executives and workers. The significant flag-ship will be sponsored by Mrs. James W. Forrestal, widow of the first defense secretary whose name it bears.

One of the most controversial ships in naval history, the Forrestal is being built for \$24,400,000 less than the 218 million dollars forecast when the keel was laid on July 13, the navy said today.

It is scheduled to be completed in the fall of 1955 and commissioned in the fall of 1956. The ship will carry 3,750 men and about 90 planes—jet atomic bombers and interceptors. Armed with its modern, high-speed planes able to reach targets 1,000 miles from its deck, the vessel will represent an investment of about \$72 million.

As the ship moves out of the graving dock, sided by 12 tugs, at the Newport News Shipbuilding and Drydock company, it will be sailing straight into a new argument over the future need and role of aircraft carriers.

Some experts suspect the Forrestal class is the end of the line in ship size. Two later ships, Saratoga and Ranger, are building, a fourth is authorized, and a fifth is to be sought next year.

Other experts expect the first atomic-powered carrier to be larger, maybe by 15,000 tons.

The Forrestal is the longest and broadest ship ever built, but its displacement tonnage is less than that of the British Queen Elizabeth and Queen Mary.

The Forrestal is distinguished by a conical or angled deck amidships which allows simultaneous takeoffs and landings by four steam catapults. Both are British developments, incorporated after construction was well started.

Cassia Ranchers Are Advised Of Problem of Winter Feeding

BURLEY, Dec. 10—The importance of a proper winter feeding program for livestock was told by Wade Wells, Boise, to ranchers in the Allion area at the Allion Grange hall Wednesday afternoon.

Wells, a livestock specialist from the University of Idaho extension service, also talked to ranchers at the Oakley high school Wednesday evening and in Burley Thursday morning. Friday he spoke at the Ethel LDS church at 11 a. m. in the Allion school, at 2 p. m. and will be at Melia's Half river Grange hall at 8 p. m.

Wells is touring The Cassia county communities—"The Request of Glenn Bodily, county extension agent here. Bodily feels Wade's advice will be pertinent in the event of a hard winter and the resultant grazing limitations.

"Wells stressed the far-reaching effects of a poor winter feeding program. Pregnant cattle may not be able to survive the "starvation" of delivery, and the weakened calves frequently will lack the vigor to get up and nurse. Wells said calves of undernourished cows will be stunted throughout their development. These same cows may miss a calf by not recovering sufficiently for another pregnancy and usually will bear two or three less calves in their lifetime than a cow that is main-

Probe Under Way

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—The justice department is still investigating former Army Maj. Irving Peres to determine if he can be prosecuted for making false statements as charged by Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R. Wis.

Last October, McCarthy wrote Attorney General Herbert Brownell, requesting an investigation to determine if Peres, a New York dentist, made false statements when he applied for an army commission in May, 1952. An informed source said the investigation is still under way.

Ruether Says Ike Refusing Aide Backing

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 10 (AP)—CIO President Walter Ruether accused President Eisenhower yesterday of practicing "political fraud" by failing to back up Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell.

Ruether told the CIO convention Mitchell lacked the standing in Eisenhower's cabinet enjoyed by Secretaries of Commerce and State.

Mitchell had told the convention in a speech here Tuesday that he condemned "statutory" laws now in effect in 17 states prohibiting unions and employers from negotiating contract clauses to require workers to become union members.

Eisenhower said in his Washington news conference the next day that Mitchell had not necessarily spoken for the administration although he later corrected that statement to express his own views.

Ruether said that if Weeks makes a business policy statement to a committee of the National Association of Manufacturers "you will not find that he is repudiated the next morning by the White House."

Mitchell had been commended by other convention speakers for his stand he took in opposing the state "right-to-work" laws.

Divorced

DENVER, Dec. 10 (AP)—Mrs. Alice Johnson's patience finally wore thin.

She was granted an interlocutory divorce decree yesterday from Edward P. Johnson, Mel-swan, N. J., on the ground of desertion. She told Superior Court Judge Mitchell Jones her husband left her 47 years ago.
