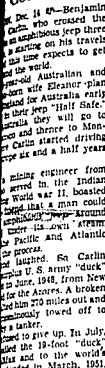

PTA's Leader Finds Key for Safety Marks

BOISE, Dec. 14.—Mrs. C. S. Boquet, president of the Idaho Congress of Parents and Teachers, says, "Something can be done about the mounting toll of traffic accidents."
