Speaker Stresses Needs for Increasing Lamb Popularity

BURLEY, Dec. 17.—Increasing the popularity of lamb as the meat dish on America's dinner tables was discussed by E. F. Rinehart, Boise, animal husbandman of the University of Idaho extension service, at the annual meeting of the Cassia Livestock Marketing association Wednesday.

Rinehart said many restaurants do not have lamb on their menus and many butcher shops rarely, if ever, include lamb in their meat displays. He credited much of the prejudice against lamb to the substitution of mutton for the genuine article.

Rinehart suggested that butchers be encouraged to feature "lamb days" and that lamb producers, through their associations, see to it butchers get quality lambs. Statistics show that 71 per cent, or 7.5 pounds per person, of the lamb consumed in this country is in the states east

of the Mississippi and north of the Ohio rivers.

The three Pacific coast states account for 13 per cent of the lamb consumption, or 8.9 pounds per person. The entire great plains area, mountain states, and the southeastern quarter of the country consume only 10 per cent, or 1.8 pounds of lamb per person, he said.

M. C. Clear, Boise, secretary of the Idaho Woolgrowers association, urged sheepmen to make their views known to their representatives in the state legislature before the opening of the January session. He said they should support pending legislation aimed at reducing losses of sheep to attacking dogs and other predators. Clear also urged that legislators be instructed to remove livestock trucks from the classification of commercial trucks.

Cassia association members also saw a demonstration on wool grades by Lowell Wilson, wool technician at the U. S. sheep experiment station, Dubois, and a discussion on the best grasses for sheep production.

Cutting of Christmas Trees in Forest Is Not Being Permitted

Cutting of Christmas trees in the Cassia division of the Sawtooth national forest south of Twin Falls is strictly prohibited, Forest Ranger Lewis Clark reported Friday.

The only way trees can be cut in the national forest is under a permit and no permits are being granted, Clark said. He reported that on a trip to the south hills Thursday he noticed that several trees had been cut along the Rock creek road. No permits are being granted to

cut trees because there is no great supply of Christmas-type trees in the division, he continued. In addition, the only place accessible to persons wishing to cut Christmas trees is along the Rock creek canyon road, he said.

If the cutting of trees along the road was permitted it wouldn't be long before the area wouldn't be a very ideal place to visit, either summer or winter, he added.

U. S. Desires Land Swap in State of Utah

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—The federal government agreed today to swap 45,822 acres near Green River, Utah, for 46,417 acres of "wilderness" land owned by the state of Utah in the Navajo Indian reservation.

Secretary of the Interior McKay, in announcing government approval, said the state-owned land is in four sections. The law admitting Utah to the union, he explained, gave the state the interest in four sections of the townships which later became the reservation. The tracts were to be used for school fund purposes.

Utah, in a 1933 law, offered to exchange the school-section tracts for a more consolidated parcel class where the school lands lie in what are called the Purple Strip and the Anschutz Extension, near famed Monument Valley.

The state selected 45,822 acres of federal land having appraised value of \$2,606, based on character and grading value and offered in exchange the 46,417 acres which have an appraised value of \$3,824. The selected lands are more accessible than the offered lands, McKay said, and in an almost solid block east of Green River on both sides of U. S. Highway 6-86.

In recommending approval of the trade, Director Edward Woolsey of the bureau of land management, noted McKay to waive a regulation limiting such exchanges to not more than 6,400 acres. Woolsey said the limitation was not imposed by act of congress and he found the exchange to be in the public interest.

Indian Bureau's Head Denies Reports of Cheap Land Sales

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (Special)—Indian Commissioner Glenn L. Emmons this week denied reports that his bureau was being "liquidated" and that Indian lands, rich in uranium, were being "sold for a song."

Emmons' denial took the form of a letter to an Indian public relations man who had written Emmons asking what truth there was to the "liquidation" rumors.

Emmons wrote in reply that "there is widespread lack of informed public opinion about present Indian policy" and that he was glad to comment on such false reports.

Emmons continued saying "I would strongly oppose any proposal... for an abrupt termination of that guardianship over tribal lands with the object of liquidating this bureau."

But, said Emmons, it is true that many Indian tribes have become economically and politically advanced to the point where they deserve and should have complete self-determination in their affairs.

To their end, Emmons wrote, the first congress at the recommendation of the Indian commissioner and speech at the meeting of the Trustees, Arthur Watkins, R., Utah, head of the senate Indian subcommittee, passed six "termination" bills ending federal guardianship of an equal number of Indian tribes in Utah, Oregon, Wisconsin, and Texas.

Emmons elaborated on the termination procedure, pointing out that it was accompanied by "a development program under which (the Indians) would achieve self-support and independence."

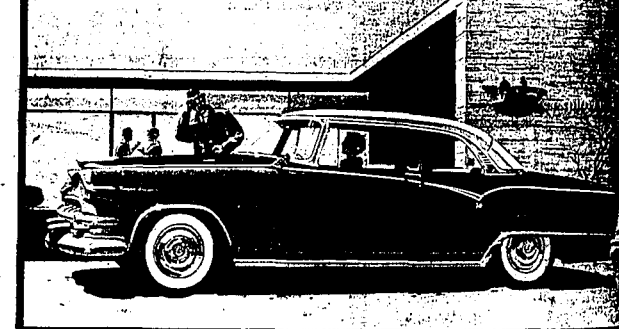

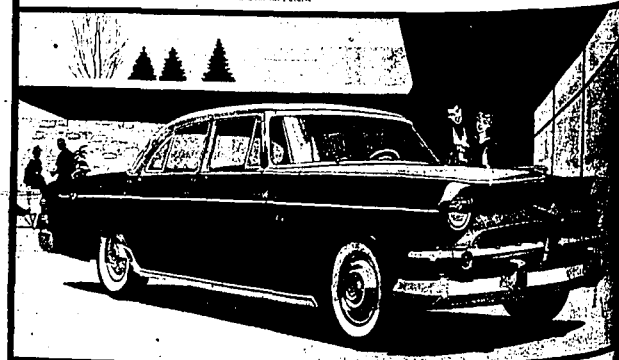
