

Rivalry Seen Cause of Low Yule Feeling

NEW YORK, Dec. 18 (AP)—A strange Christmas spirit grips some people each Christmas, a psychiatrist finds. He's not talking of people who hate Christmas as the Barmy Army or of those who loved one lost through illness or accident. Nor of ferocious types who prefer to padlock their doors to the world.

Instead, the Christmas neurosis stems from childhood jealousy of a brother or sister, or emotional hunger that never was satisfied. Dr. L. D. Joyce Boyer, Berkeley, Calif., told the American Psychological Association.

From a study of patients with Christmas depression, he finds that they had better real reasons for their unhappiness than they think. "They had loved someone best to a brother or sister," he said.

Some feel that a younger brother or sister had replaced them as the center of the family. Others feel that an older brother or sister had been favored by the parents. Dr. Boyer said.

These people, he said, had tended to put "Santa Claus" in their minds as a figure who had favored one child over another. "We feel the state has some obligation to provide uniform schools for all children; that the purpose for which the state exists is to educate; and a number of districts have, at considerable effort, taken steps to provide for participation in the program."

Half of Huge Tax Bill Paid

Largest Taxpayer in County Pays Half Of '54 Tax With Check for \$124,196.86

The Idaho Power company, largest taxpayer in Twin Falls county, turned over a check for \$124,196.86 to the county Saturday as its first half payment on its 1954 property taxes in the county. The company will pay \$248,393.71 in county property taxes for 1954, about one-tenth of the county's total tax income. Funds will go toward financing county, cities, state and school operations. Last week, 27 Idaho counties received the first half of property taxes from the Idaho Power company amounting to a total for the year of \$1,986,624.85, reports D. S. Bailey, division manager. Sixty-three per cent of the company's Idaho property taxes go to support schools. The company also is the largest taxpayer in nine other counties including Boise, Elmore, Gem, Gooding, Jerome, Lemhi, Owyhee, Power and Valley. It is either the second or third largest taxpayer in Ada, Adams, Blaine, Blingham, Blaine, Canyon, Lincoln, Minidoka, Payette and Washington counties. The kilowatt-hour tax, paid to the state tax collector, will amount to an additional \$525,000 for the year.

Deadline

Monday is the last day for paying taxes without penalty, reminds Mrs. Rose J. Wilson, county treasurer. She says all checks mailed in must be postmarked before midnight Monday. The treasurer's office was open until 5 p.m. Saturday to accommodate taxpayers. The office closes at 5 p.m. Monday. Mrs. Wilson pointed out the Monday deadline is for the first half of 1954 taxes on real property. The personal property tax deadline is later.

Phone Company Executives Inspect Expansion Plans; Conduit Extended

Part of \$150,000 Expansion of Telephone Facilities Under Way Here

Changes and exchange cables that will provide the service requirements of the company, explains Reynolds. Contractor for the six-dial conduit system is the George F. Cook Construction company, Minneapolis. He expects the project will be completed by mid-January. Rapid growth and development of the northwest and northwest portions of the city has necessitated installation of new telephone facilities. Telephone cables are too large to be suspended from poles and are being placed underground. The project must meet city and state specifications. Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company expects the new installation will provide the type of service its customers are requesting, Reynolds says. At present, the company is limited to the type of service it can provide. Normally the company offers one, two and four-party service, but shortages of facilities restrict installations to four-party service in most areas, according to Reynolds. The company presently has about 250 requests for a better grade service, he notes. Most of the requests are for one and two-party service with about 60 orders for service from persons awaiting telephones. The demand is growing each day, Reynolds states. Until the new project is completed, the company is compelled to hold new orders for service. Installation of 11 new switchboard positions in the central office here is planned in 1955, the district manager reveals. With outside plant equipment, new poles, cables and wires and new central office equipment to be installed in the exchange building, the company feels it can provide facilities to meet service needs until the system is converted to dial operation—tentatively scheduled for 1957. Eventually the Twin Falls office will serve as the central office for Magic Valley communities when the dial conversion program is completed, according to Reynolds. On the ultimate plan, it is contemplated to reduce all rural lines to a minimum of six and a maximum of eight subscribers per line.

smelled alcohol on the breaths of some of the persons treated but couldn't say which persons.
Mrs. Fenstermaker also testified she saw the car in which Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Parrott, Mr. and Mrs. Myron C. Hill and Mr. and Mrs. Frank T. Hill, the victims, were sitting. She said it was parked behind the truck driven by Walter Oxleyville, Portland, who testified Friday morning.
Snyder testified that he arrived at the accident scene at 11:30 p.m. and that he radioed immediately for the Butley fire department, a wrecker, hearse and ambulance. He described the position of the wrecked vehicle and said he could see the bodies of the six persons in the wreckage of their Plymouth. He also testified that Gummerston admitted to him he was the driver of the Cadillac. He also said Gummerston told him he was driving between 25 and 40 miles an hour when he entered the dust storm.
Snyder also testified that marks on the highway indicated a vehicle had skidded between 34 and 49 feet. He testified about his arrest at the accident scene and how he had helped take the injured to Malia and Albano explained how the skid marks and said he believed them to be from the Plymouth.
Bray, who assisted in moving the wrecked vehicle, testified as to how they were jammed into the car.

She said she had no key and water but that she did not know how many drinks others in the party had had.
After Fenstermaker testified they decided to go to the dance at Nat but stayed only 20 minutes and then they way back to Butley when the accident occurred. She said she and Bonnie Gummer were riding in the front seat of the car. She estimated the speed of the car at 50 miles an hour when the automobile hit the dust storm and that her next recollection was being helped from the car by Gummerston.
Miss Gummer's testimony was similar to Miss Fenstermaker's. She said she did not regain consciousness, however, until several days later. Eddie Lutzien was the first witness Saturday. He contradicted the two previous witnesses in claiming that he, too, was riding in the front seat.
He testified he saw approaching headlights and cautioned Gummerston to slow down because he thought someone was wrong. He said he didn't think Gummerston set the brakes on the Cadillac but applied them only lightly. He also testified that he saw the Plymouth burning before it was hit by the Cadillac. Miss Fenstermaker, in her testimony, said the first time she saw the Plymouth it was not burning.
Lutzien testified he was thrown through the windshield in the crash and that when he came to he was in the ditch. He said he flung one car for help but was refused. He said Keith D. Cunningham picked him up and took him to Malia.
Joe Kellogg, another passenger in Gummerston's car, had had several drinks of whiskey at Miss Fenstermaker's home. He said the bottle belonged to him and that he took it to the car. He claimed Gummerston had had only one drink at the dance, he testified, he passed the bottle to some friends and doesn't know what happened to it. He said he slept most of the way home and did not remember the crash. He said he had no clear recollection of anything until he came to in the operating room.
Martha Daniels, also a passenger in Gummerston's car, told a story similar to the others including that she fell asleep in the rear seat of the car.
Cunningham, who was taken to Malia following the crash, said he, too, had been at the dance at Nat. He said he first saw the glow of the burning vehicle ahead of him and then saw Lutzien in the road.

Britain Finds It Now Has Color Problem and It's Growing, Too

LONDON (NPA)—Britain, long proud of the fact that it has no "color problem" at home, has suddenly found one sitting on its front doorstep, and it's a honey.
The color problem, which has been without a cent in their jeans, West Indians are pouring into Britain by the thousands in a migration with the Puerto Rican "invasion" of New York.
London now has its "Little Harlem," as Birmingham, Liverpool, Bristol and Newcastle, and the racial tension is steadily mounting in these urban areas.

Recently it erupted with dramatic violence in a series of riots in Camden Town, London.
The race riot of Camden Town is a tattered and gray from coal smoke, but from behind them white residents have been pouring with increasing hostility at the West Indian newcomers into the neighborhood.

It took just one drunken Jamaican involved in a public brawl with a white man to touch off the racial powder keg. A mob set fire to the Jamaican's house, smashed the windows of other colored neighbors, overturned cars in the street.
At the height of the rioting, as many as 400 whites and West Indians, some armed with razors and knives, were involved. Police cordoned off one street and patrolling it in squad cars for several days after the disorders.
Among the cars wrecked, was one belonging to an American Negro soldier, who had been visiting in Camden Town.

Londoners' read about the riots with dismay. Long accustomed to pointing the accusing finger at racial intolerance in America, the racial attitude has been, "It can't happen here." But it is happening.
In Paddington, north London, "Keep Britain White" leaflets are slipped under doors.
In Birmingham, to prove that a definite "color bar" exists, a journalist blacked his face, inserted rubber tubes up his nose to give it a negroid appearance and, in turn, was refused a drink, cigarette, admission to a dance hall.
The sudden influx of West Indians has both police and members of parliament worried. Not long ago Jamaica supported a population of a million largely through sugar, tobacco and bananas exports to Britain.

Today its population is nearly half again as large, and Britain is buying its sugar elsewhere.
Testify: Mass unemployment and what Jamaicans call "the \$25 question"—\$254 representing the price of a one-way boat ticket to Britain where the streets are supposed to be paved with gold.
What started as a trickle following the war has now swollen to a flood, with West Indian arrivals expected to top 100,000 in 1956, as compared with 3,000 in 1953. Another 100,000 are said to be waiting on the docks of Kingston, Jamaica, held up by the "254 question."

Quotas to Hit Beet Growers On New Land

POCAHELLO, Dec. 10 (U-P)—sugar beet growers were told Friday that new growers and those who have not raised beets for the last five years will be hardest hit by government restrictions in 1955.
C. R. Holmstead, department of agriculture official, said that the restriction, in the form of acreage allotment, was the result of over-production in 1953. He said that while in 1953 production and consumption were equal, more than 1,500,000 tons of beets will be carried into 1955 from this year's crop.
This is the reason, he added, that Idaho's acreage allotment for next year has been dropped from 30,000 to 20,000 acres.

Plane Crash Is Fatal to 4

MILWAUKEE, Dec. 18 (AP) — A father-and-son holiday hunting trip to Canada Friday turned into a flaming air crash death for four persons, including Frederick C. Miller, prominent Milwaukee brewer, civic leader and sports figure.

Miller's son, Frederick, Jr., 20, died in the furiously burning plane along with the pilots, Joseph Laird, 39, and his brother Paul, 34, both of Milwaukee.

Miller, 48, a University of Notre Dame football star under the late Knute Rockne, died of injuries several hours after the crash.

The trip, planned as a hunting jaunt into the Canadian woods, was only a few seconds old when the Miller-owned twin-engine plane spluttered and plunged to the ground near a residential area north of General Mitchell field.

Japanese Will Not Swing to Soviet Sphere

TOKYO, Dec. 18 (Sunday) — Two facts stand out today after a week of confusing statements about proposed Japanese recognition of Red China and Russia in the interests of trade:

1. Japan's new management headed by conservative Prime Minister Ichiro Hatoyama, is solidly in the free world camp and is not going to do anything it thinks might endanger that position.

2. Japanese businessmen, as individuals, will have to call the ball for any expansion of trade with the Reds. About all the Hatoyama government will do presently is postpone travel restrictions for "non-political" visits to the communist nations.

An American embassy spokesman confirmed today that members of the new government have called on Ambassador John Allison and told him it "desires to maintain close and cordial relations with the United States."

Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov's statement that Russia is willing to meet with Japan on "normalizing" relations got a cool reception from most political leaders except the "leftist" half of the split Japanese Socialist party.

Hatoyama said the "time is not ripe." Foreign Minister Mamoru Shigemitsu said it was "a step forward" if the offer is sincere but that the Japanese government does not plan to sound out Russia any further now.

and technicians. It is then added that this approval "did not involve the delegation of responsibility of government to make decisions on putting plans into action in the event of hostilities."
Hands of Civilians
This was a landmarked way of saying that civilians, not the military, would have the final decision as to the use of atomic weapons. It is left up in the air two big questions: What civilians? And what happens if the military chiefs on the spot can't get in touch with their governments?
The answers to both questions apparently remained military secrets.
But there was no indication that the United States would have to change any standing instructions that may already have been given to U. S. Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther, supreme allied commander in Europe.
Plan to Hold Reds
The council, by its approval of plans for an atomic "new look" in Europe's defense, gave effect to what, in the American view, is the first real plan capable of holding back the human sea that Russia could roll against the West.
The plan will not be in full force until 1957.
Until then the West relies on the threat of atomic attack to discourage Russian aggression in Europe.

Iowa Has Brand New Public Cave

DES MOINES, Pa., Dec. 18.—Iowa's answer to the Carlsbad caves in New Mexico, Spook cave, is being built in Iowa.
A new cave was discovered near this place in October, 1935, by Gerald Miller, 27, a Monona, Ia., farmer and M. James Hoffman, 45, former McGregor, Ia., resident.
The two men investigated a hole in the bluff on the Mississippi river near which natives had called "spook" for centuries.
The sounds coming from the cave, Mickle and Hoffman dynamited a hole into the bluff and discovered a mile-long underground river, one subterranean room 100 feet long and 45 feet across. They also found two underground waterfalls and six other rooms through which the river flows.
"There are thousands of caves in Iowa but this will be the only one you can get into with a car," Mickle said. The men plan to open the cave next spring and charge admission.

(1) Appropriations for a "pilot" program to demonstrate with small watersheds throughout the country the effectiveness of good land management and up-stream water control.
(2) The Hop-Alton watershed protection and flood prevention act which provides federal money and technical assistance to states and local agencies in small watershed management programs.
(3) Amendment of a 1937 law authorizing federal loans to farmers for soil and water conservation facilities.
(4) An income tax change permitting farmers to deduct the cost of terraces, contour farming, ponds and other conservation improvements, up to 25 per cent of their gross income.

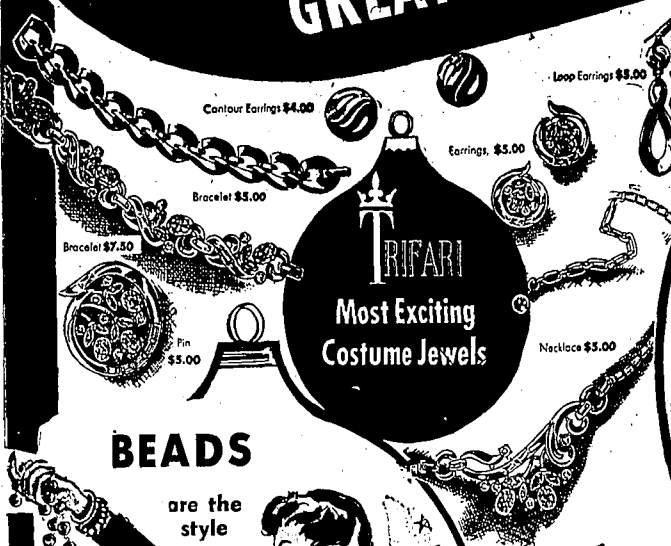

In the dust on top of a cupboard in an abandoned cabin on an early Idaho homestead, a Jan. 20, 1897, edition of the New York Tribune was preserved for 57 years and now is receiving more gentle care so the record can be preserved even longer.

F. N. Stowell, SHOSHONE, found the paper while visiting the homestead at Nounan, Id., this summer. Nounan is located in southeast Idaho in Bear Lake county and was one of the early Idaho settlements of the Utah Mormons. The town today isn't any larger than it was 50 years ago.

Political preference of the paper's management is rather obvious. Major McKinley, president-elect in

the fall of 1896, was quoted every few lines, and his biography was given in a full page feature story. Sen. John Sherman, new secretary of state, was described as a "typical Republican" with a record to be proud of.

Neglected on-going President Grover Cleveland is mentioned by name but once in the 20-page edition and that was his own signature at the close of a message he sent to congress.

The New York Tribune—one of a million copies printed on Jan. 20, 1897—outlived its life expectancy to emerge again in modern times to bring its readers the intimacies of a new era long past to a new generation.

Sincere seekers after truth are found among all ages. Recently, the fourth grade girls wrote me regarding the movements in the solar system. The difficulty in explaining to pupils of this age that the earth is not the center of the universe, and that the sun is the center, is a real problem. The old-time idea was that the earth was flat and motionless and was the center of the universe. All heavenly bodies were thought to revolve daily around this fixed and all-important earth. But there were a few deep thinkers of nature long before the Christian era who held practically present-day views. One such was the Greek, Aristarchus of Samos, who was most active around 250 B. C.

CHICAGO, Dec. 18.—The world is in for earthquakes, tidal waves and volcanic eruptions next Tuesday, ousted college physician Charles Laughhead said. But it won't exactly come to an end.

Laughhead, who was fired from his post with Michigan State college on grounds that he was predicting the end of the world, made this resounding forecast here yesterday as he consulted with a fellow believer in imminent doom.

"Next Tuesday, he said, will be merely a 'turning point toward catastrophe in this part of the world.' The end of the world as we know it will be the result of a tidal wave, the ground from Hudson's bay to the Gulf of Mexico may rise and the legendary continents of Atlantis and Lemuria may emerge from the sea, Laughhead said.

He warned that the eastern and western seaboard should also be on the lookout for 'catastrophic upheavals.'

But things won't get really bad until 1955, he said, the tall, scrawny physician said.

By that time, he said, it's quite likely that all the land masses that they now exist will sink beneath the ocean and be replaced by new continents. Men from other planets may traverse a few of the earthlings in space ships, he said.
