Per Cent Boost in Pay for Military Is Asked by Solon to Maintain Power

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28 (UP)—Senator Mansfield, D., Mont., proposed today 25 per cent military pay rates as a means to maintain a 3 million-man military force on a basis with a minimum use of the draft.

Mr. Mansfield said that he is opposed to any universal military service program which is financed by a new excess profits tax on war production. He included the modified system the Eisenhower administration has asked it will ask Congress to approve next year.

Shivers Under Rigid Arctic Blanket

Idaho shivers under its coldest temperature in more than a week today, but some parts of the valley, while colder than Twin Falls, showed small indications of warmer weather.

In Twin Falls Monday night and Tuesday morning, the coldest readings since Nov. 28, 1952, were recorded. The mercury fell to 12 degrees, Shoshone to 10 and two but that was one degree warmer than the night before.

At Sunday night, with a minus 10 degrees warmer than Sunday night, the mercury had fallen to a minus 10 degrees.

The assembly stunned Mendes-France and alarmed Washington and London last night by turning down this accord, 280-250, on its first reading. The premier early today submitted a revised bill calling for its ratification as a confidence question.

Second Vote Set

The second confidence vote tomorrow will give final ratification to the admission of West Germany into NATO. It is the least controversial of the accords and the one on which the government is most confident.

After more than a week of debate and parliamentary maneuvering, the assembly today has given tentative approval to three of the four treaties. The deputies last Friday approved a French-English accord on the future of the displaced Saar and the pact giving West Germany almost complete sovereignty.

Yule Traffic Count Totals 392 Persons

America's motoring press has a ghastly new record during the Christmas holiday week-end when 392 died in traffic accidents.

Five hundred thousand persons died in all types of accidents. The overall toll for the week-end was the highest for two-day week-end holidays.

Automobiles accounted for the great majority of accident victims but 63 persons died in fires during the 48-hour, two-day period. Falls, bullet wounds and miscellaneous accidents accounted for 60 others. That figure included one small boy who died with a lollipop wedged in his throat.

Fire Kills 12

One fire which lashed out when Kerosene was splashed in a wood shed took 12 lives at Parkin, Ark. There was no such single mass disaster on the highways, but Texas bullet wounds and miscellaneous accidents were heavy in some sections. Texas counted 35 traffic deaths, California 29.

In contrast, Nebraska, New Hampshire, North Dakota, Rhode Island, Vermont and Wyoming got through the holiday season without any accidental deaths.

The National Safety Council said that 370 persons would be killed in traffic.

Bad Gases Up

The overall hourly rate of accidental deaths from 6 p. m. Friday to midnight, Sunday throughout the week-end was 1.14.

727 deaths an hour during the catastrophic four-day observance of Independence Day in 1925 when 725 persons were killed by traffic.

Traffic deaths at this week-end came at an hourly rate of 1.16 compared with 1.14 at an hourly rate during the first 10 months of this year, and 543 during the four-day observance of Independence Day in 1925 when 555 were killed in traffic.

In Terms of Deaths per Day

The week-end traffic toll of 392 was the highest in the history of the Bureau of Highway Traffic during the 48-hour period.

It was nearly twice the daily average of 1925 when 192 persons were killed in traffic.

Flood Threatens

HANOVER, Germany, Dec. 23.—Melting snows combined with heavy rains to cause a serious threat of floods in several West German states.

Two women drowned near U. S.-occupied Bielefeld, in southwestern Germany, when their car plunged into the swollen Ems river. Ship traffic on the Weser river in the British-occupied north halted when rising waters made bridges impassable.

EXPANSION PLANNED

DENVER, Dec. 23.—The Denver and Rio Grande Western railroad announced today it will spend \$7,600,000 in 1954 for improvements and new equipment. That is 36 per cent more than the expenditures for the same purpose during 1953.

The biggest Republican surprise was that the American people were healthier than ever before in their history—and money-wise had enjoyed their second best year.

A few more "muddle through" years such as this and we may suddenly awaken to the fact we have achieved more than we ever dared to dream.

THE most heartening event in the story of 1954 was the death of Sir Roger Bannister of British. This victory, coupled with the fact the empire managed to send two sons up to Mt. Everest the year before, led to wild hopes the British might produce a good heavy-weight boxer during the second half of the century.

Everyone had his own reason for liking or disliking 1954, but it certainly marked a new height in human achievement.





Department stores are launching their bargain sales early this year. Merchants are taking note of the increasing custom of using gift certificates or putting cash in family stockings.

That means there are a lot of folk with money burning holes in their pockets. Many a retailer is eager to cash this new cash before it goes to a competitor.

And Christmas sales volume showed that people had money to spend and were in a mood to spend it this year.





Officials Feel Optimism for French Ballot

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—The state department, the president and senators were cautiously optimistic today over French presidential elections. France's latest victories in the French debate over West European defense.

Officially, the state department had no comment. But officials privately expressed optimism over the vote to admit Germany to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and approval of French membership in the United Nations.

Part Not Approved. The key provision of the defense program — German rearmament — still has not been approved, spokesmen cautioned, and there can be little optimism here until it is.

At his August 24, holiday reception, President Eisenhower was reported by his press secretary, James Hagerly, to be "gratified" over the vote to admit Germany to NATO. But Hagerly said the President will make no formal statement on the President's "until action has been completed on all the measures."

Leaves "Bad Taste." State department sources said French indecision over rearming Germany has left a "bad taste" in other West European states.

It indicates France is "playing politics with a matter of life or death to the western alliance."

But department sources said they have received no evidence that the indecision will affect the willingness of other members, particularly Germany, to ratify the defense agreement.

Fishing Industry Markets Needed

RENEKLEY, Calif., Dec. 28.—The west coast fishing industry's yearly catch could be increased by several billion pounds if more markets were developed and prices were raised, it was reported here today.

Richard Van Giver, director of the University of Washington school of fisheries, declared that the 25 billion pounds of fish that are taken from the sea each year must be doubled to feed the rapid increase in world population.

Addressing the American Society for the Advancement of Science, Van Giver said the best use of the west coast fishing region requires some new means of using many species not now marketed.

Colonel Gets Black Eyes in Speed Ordeal

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—Two black eyes and a few blood blisters were the only ill effects suffered by an air force colonel jerked to a dead stop from a record ground speed of 502 miles per hour.

Lieut.-Col. John P. Stapp underwent the speed and stop ordeal as a human guinea pig in a test at the Holloman air development center, Alamogordo, N. M., the air force announced. The purpose was to determine the effect on airmen who bail out of planes at supersonic speeds.

Eye Balls Slam Stapp's eyes were blackened because his eye balls slammed against his lids and the blood blisters were caused by dust particles which struck him. Otherwise he came through without harm, the air force said.

Stapp was strapped to a 2,000-pound tubular steel rocket sled mounted on steel rails, then propelled forward to a top speed of 502 miles per hour and brought to a dead stop in one and a half seconds.

Withstands Pressure Stapp withstood a pressure equal to 25 times his own weight during the test, enough to make him "weigh" more than three tons.

The sled was stripped of its windshield to obtain increased speed. Stapp wore no special protective clothing but did have a plastic helmet and clear plastic visor to protect his head and face.

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Reds to Free 3 Americans; Report States

VIENNA, Austria, Dec. 28 (AP)—Three Americans held in a Soviet prison camp southeast of Moscow are in excellent health and may be released within a few days, according to a group of returning Austrian prisoners reported today.

The three Americans are William A. Verdine, Starke, La., and John Helmut Noble, Detroit, Mich. The state department has demanded several times that Russia free them.

Marchuk was reported without leave from the U. S. Army on Feb. 1, 1949, in Berlin. Vienna was reported AWOL in Europe on Feb. 3, 1949. Noble has been in Soviet custody for nearly eight years.

Johann Schick, one of the 55 Austrians returned today, said the three Americans told him Soviet prison officials promised them they would be sent home very soon.

He described them as being "in good physical condition" when he saw them last night, Sunday, on Christmas Eve shortly before the Austrians boarded a Vienna-bound train for freedom.

Russian officials handed over 55 prisoners of war and civilian internees including one woman at the camp southeast of Moscow this morning. Most of them had been held in Russia since World War II.
