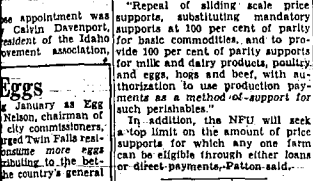

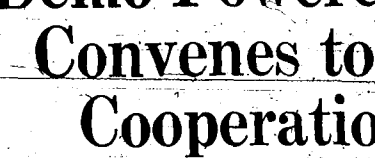

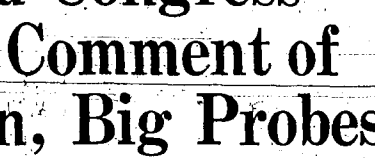

NOW'S THE TIME TO ACT!

Despite the nation-wide presidential appeal for public support in the recent 'Safety' day, we set a new record for a two-day New Year's holiday, which safety experts have described as a "major national disaster".

During the holiday week-end, 292 persons died in traffic accidents and many hundreds more were seriously injured. Ned H. Dearborn, president of the National Safety Council, who has been advocating more strict laws for more rigid enforcement and even heavier penalties for traffic law violators, had this to say following all the holiday week-end carnage:

"As a killer, Hurricane Hazel (which took 118 lives) was a piker compared to the tidal wave of carelessness, selfishness and cold indifference that is piling up a toll of death and mangled wreckage that should shame any civilized nation."

That's the deplorable picture from a nation-wide viewpoint. At home, in Idaho, it's even worse, because we have made one of the most disgraceful showings in the country. Because of our attitude all too prevalent in this state, 241 persons lost their lives in Idaho highways during 1934 as compared with 198 the previous year. In Magic Valley alone 58 were killed in 1934, which is 23 more than the number of lives similarly snuffed out in 1933.

When states all around the country have demonstrated serious concern and taken drastic action to curb all this needless slaughter and destruction, it's something of a mystery why Idaho continues to blunder along. Relatedly this last year, we did add five patrolmen to our state police force, which even yet is pitifully inadequate to cope with this ever-increasing problem. But the answer lies only in a gesture compared to steps which have been taken by such states as Washington, Oregon and Utah. Otherwise, all up and down the line, the people of Idaho and those directly associated with law enforcement, seemed to be only half-heartedly concerned about the blood bath on the state's highways.

At long last, it should be time for the question to present itself: Just when do we expect to bring this rat race under control? There was never a better time than right now, while the state legislature is in session. First of all, we must have effective laws to cope with those who persist in driving like maniacs with long teeth and maniacal provisions that will strike fear in the hearts of these potential killers.

Not until punishment is more certain and severe for those responsible for accidents, injury and death, because of their own reckless disregard for the lives of others, will there ever be any stop to all this highway slaughter.

And it's going to be up to our legislature, our new governor and everyone identified with law enforcement, as well as the public generally, to make a determined drive effective.

As Frank E. Moss, Butte county attorney, has expressed it in appealing to the legislature for drastic action in that state: "A man convicted of reckless driving is one who, but for a bit of luck, would have been a highway killer. The reckless disregard for human life is there regardless of the outcome. He ought to be dealt with in a manner commensurate with the hazard he causes."

That's the kind of the action we will take to get the job done in Idaho. Lenient judges, law enforcement officials lax in their responsibilities, indifferent judges and an uncooperative public make success impossible. It is interesting to note that Idaho's Gov. Noel E. Smylie and Utah's Gov. J. Bracken Lee have challenged the respective states, one after the other, in an all-out effort to reduce the number of highway fatalities in 1935.

Turmoil May Be Coming in Six Republics

By United Press

The sign that a new period of political turbulence in the six little "banana republics" of Central America is being heralded by the fact that Panama is to elect a new president in a few weeks which bids to last for a long time, and may, in more ways than one, be a harbinger of the making of chaos in Honduras, Costa Rica and Guatemala.

An attempt was made last April to assassinate President Anastasio Somoza, the "strong man" of Nicaragua. His death would have been a surprise.

In Salvador—United of the six republics is already building up there in anticipation of a presidential election next year.

On the basis of the population of each of the six Central American countries, the United States is regarded as the world record for political turbulence.

Panama, for instance, has had 20 presidents since it became a republic in 1903.

In Honduras, Julio Lozano is a candidate in the presidential election which will be held in February. The liberal candidate got the most votes—48 per cent. But an absolute majority was needed to elect him.

The absence of President Juan Manuel Galvez, who had gone to Panama to attend to the election, has caused a political crisis. President Lozano was declared president. Galvez then resigned Dec. 31, but Lozano is still president, waiting for a sign of a challenge to his rule.

President Feeding

President Feeding of Nicaragua is feeding with President Jose Figueres of neighboring Costa Rica. Figueres is a liberal, who has made this country a haven for Latin American refugees from other Latin American countries. Somoza is decidedly of the right wing and Costa Rica has charged that Costa Rican troops and planes have violated the Nicaraguan frontier.

This situation is highly explosive, and is being closely watched by the state department.

Threatened With Trouble

Costa Rica, where a communist-dominated government was thrown out last year, is now threatened with trouble from both right and left wing elements in politics.

Part of the turmoil in Central America is being caused by the fact that some of the republics are coming from economic instability. There was hope that the recent Latin-American economic conference in Brazil might result in some big-scale United States economic aid. There is more hope of this kind of aid to come from American dollars. The United States did not respond. There was great disappointment, and now the situation is getting worse.

Talks Are Set By 2 Leaders On Saar Pact

BONN, Germany, Jan. 5 (AP)—The foreign office said today French Premier Pierre Mendès-France plans to meet West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer within the next two weeks. They probably will discuss again their accord on the Saar which has proved unpopular among the Germans.

German sources said it is most likely Mendès-France will stop off in Brussels before the meeting. Adenauer where Adenauer will be staying on his way back home from a three-day state visit to Italy ending Jan. 13.

While in Italy, Mendès-France is expected to discuss closer French-German economic ties and the technical aspects of carrying out the projected rearmament of West Germany within the Western European union.

France insists on acceptance of the controversial French-German agreement to Europeanize the German-speaking Saar territory as part of a general settlement linking West Germany to the WEU and the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Before Christmas, Adenauer led parliament here would seek a meeting with the French premier to clarify parts of the Saar agreement.

Adenauer insists that the Saar compromise—placing the area under a neutral commissioner chosen by the WEU—cannot be renegotiated. But several articles need to be filled in, especially those concerning West German economic openings in the Saar and the powers of the commissioner.

Man Is Sentenced On Embellishment

Louis Caborn, 42, Waverly apartments, pleaded guilty to a charge of embellishment of property valued at less than \$50 when he appeared for a preliminary hearing in Twin Falls just over a week ago.

Bad Eyesight Cited in Study

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Jan. 5 (AP)—Four out of 10 workers in the United States have eyesight unaided for their jobs.

The ailments may not be serious but they cost industry millions of dollars a year. And thousands of workers are getting smaller paychecks because they can't see well.

A report on America's squinting and blinking citizens has been issued by the research department of the Bausch and Lomb Optical company, which studied the visual efficiency of 12 million industrial workers and found a direct relationship between eyesight and job performance.

Fuzzy sight, according to Jane Davis, director of Bausch and Lomb's occupational research center, is behind many of industry's accidents. Workers with poor eyesight turn out less work than their clear-sighted colleagues and their product is likely to be of inferior quality.

Poor sight leads to on-the-job accidents. It results in waste of materials. It is the cause behind many cases of absenteeism, and is partly responsible for high labor turnover and the resulting expense of training new workers.

Mrs. Davis said many persons go about their work without suspecting there is anything wrong with their eyes. Unless they develop headaches or have trouble reading, they would never occur to them to have their eyes examined.

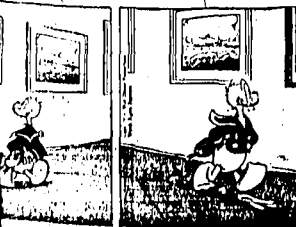

Japan Is Paid Sum by U. S. Over H-Bomb

TOKYO, Jan. 5 (AP)—The United States has agreed to pay Japan two million dollars for loss to life and property as result of its hydrogen-bomb tests in the Pacific last year, the foreign office announced today.

The agreement was signed by Foreign Minister Mamoru Shigemitsu and U. S. ambassador John Allison at a ceremony at the foreign ministry building.

Allison assured the Japanese in an interview that the United States will take every possible precaution against a recurrence of the Fortunate Dragon incident in future tests.

Given Warning
"This is not a safe world," he warned "it is sometimes necessary to make dangerous experiments, but they should be surrounded by the utmost precautions."

Japanese officials hoped the agreement would heal the anti-American feelings which were aroused by the fishermen near Bikini March 1 last year and end the agitation against further H-bomb tests.

Specification Made
The United States specified that it did not recognize any legal responsibility to compensate the fishermen of the Japanese fishing industry for subsequent losses as a result of the atomic tests.

The United States indicated that fishing vessels had been warned to stay out of the danger area and that the fishing boat Fortunate Dragon was destroyed by a radioactive fallout.

Japan agreed that it would ask no more compensation from the United States for damages rising out of the Bikini tests.

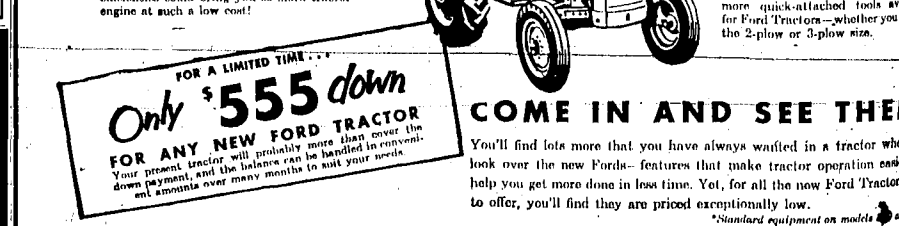
