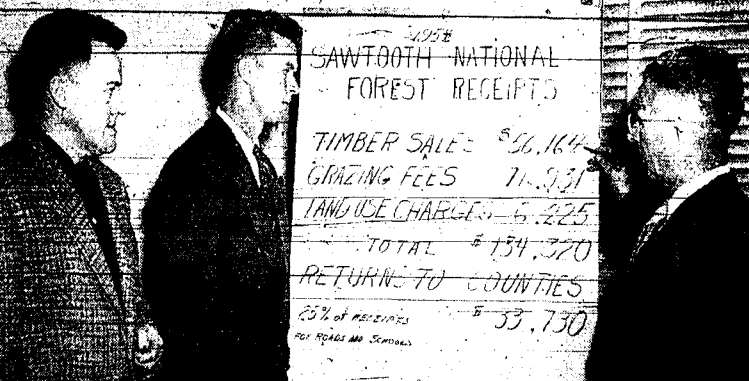

Solon to Lose One of Three Senate Posts

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6 (Special)—Sen. Henry C. Dworshak will soon leave his post on the senate committee on government operations and revert to his former status as a two-committee senator.

"I have little if any desire to stay on government operations," Dworshak said when asked about his plans for the coming session. "I think the committee post would give a freshman senator a chance to do interesting and valuable work."

Dworshak held three committee assignments during the last two years when Republicans controlled congress: interior and insular affairs committee; appropriations committee and government operations. With Democrats in control of the senate, Dworshak will be forced to give up one of the three committee jobs, and he has elected to drop government operations.

"I wanted to get off that committee two years ago and give a freshman senator a chance at it," he said, but senatorial tradition made the change impossible.

Sen. Joseph McCarthy's now-famous investigating subcommittee belongs to the government operations committee and Dworshak served on the McCarthy panel during last spring's bitter anti-McCarthy fight.

The change to a full-time reporter for Burley and Rupert is in line with the Times-News policy of constantly seeking improvement in news coverage for Magic Valley readers.

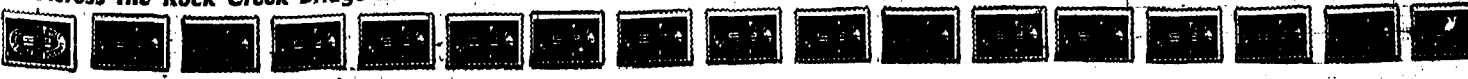

West Not Wild But Ranchers Become Riled

PORT WORTH, Tex., Jan. 6 — Hold on there, partner, the west isn't so wild any more. The rustlers are fewer and less deadly. The diamond back rattlers are scarce. The blood-thirsty man. And the coyotes are just pests. But doggone it, partner, these fellows prowling round with their Geiger counters are enough to run a poor cattleman plumb loco.

Ream the Range

The ranchers say prospectors for uranium cross the fences, dig in the pastures and roam over the rangelands without a word to anybody. And because of a law passed in 1919, the ranchers can't bother them about trespassing or intruding. The Texas legislature in 1919 gave landowners who had bought acreage from the state the right to lease it for oil and gas. The state wanted a 1/16th royalty. The landowner could get that much or more, as long as the state received 1/16th or half of any amount more than that.

Uranium Not Mentioned

So the 1919 legislature hadn't heard about uranium and didn't worry about such minerals. Neither did the ranchers. So the rights for minerals other than oil or gas belong to the state. A citizen can go hunting them. And prospectors with Geiger counters and such paraphernalia fan out over the rangelands everywhere hunting the metal necessary for making atomic bombs. Directors of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association were expected to use strong words here today in passing a resolution asking the same rights on uranium and other minerals they now have on gas and oil.

Needs New Law

Port Worth attorney Oliver Panun says a new law is necessary. "And that's what we need," said a cowboy, before every one of the 100-odd members of the association. "It's not just weekenders that are doing it," the ranchers complain. Every day some fellow in the southwest is writing Sears-Roebuck and Montgomery Ward for Geiger counters. They plan to spend their two-week vacations hunting A-bombs on our rangelands.

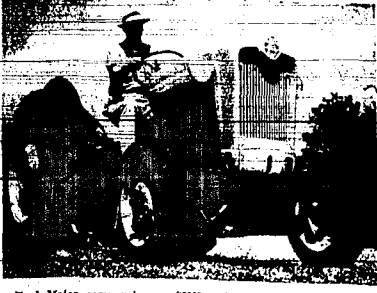

Henry Ford II, president, said the new line of tractors is "a major step in the company's farm machinery expansion program aimed at capturing a greater share of the two billion dollar a year machinery business."

Since the late Henry Ford pioneered the mass production of tractors in 1917, Ford has concentrated on one size tractor, and in the process has produced well over two million tractors. In August, 1953, the company entered the full-line farm machinery field, with a complete line of farm equipment, ranging from plows and cultivators to combine, corn pickers, hay balers and other major implements.

Both models of the new 800 series—the 850 and 850—have five-speed transmissions, and are powered by Ford's field-proven "Red Tiger" 112 cubic-inch engine. Standard equipment includes sealed beam headlights and taillights, safety starter and a new "Rest-O-Ride" seat, which permits the operator to "float" on a cushion of rubber.

Standard on the 850 model is Ford's new live-power take-off for the operation of PTO-driven machines such as a corn picker. With the operator controls the tractor, as well as the PTO-operated machine.

Calendar Planner Says World Might Get Four Black Fridays

HONOLULU, Jan. 6.—A man who is stumping for a calendar plan of his own said yesterday the world is in danger of getting a new type of calendar which would eliminate New Year's day and have four Fridays the thirteenth.

Willard E. Edwards, a Hawaii engineer who has been working for adoption of his perpetual calendar for the past 14 years, said United Nations action on a reformed and improved calendar might be launched early in 1955.

"And," Edwards said, "there's a million dollar outfit known as the World Calendar association which is doing its best to keep its so-called world calendar constantly in the public and official eye to exclusion of all other plans. All it wants is equal consideration and comparison for my perpetual calendar, and I have written to Dr. Dag Hammarskjold, secretary-general of the U. N., asking for assurance that I will get fair treatment."

Both Edwards' calendar and that of his rival want to replace the present Gregorian system of keeping track of the days, months and years, a system which some say has become unwieldy and impractical for modern living. Both new proposals are for an international fixed civil calendar of 12 months and equal quarters of 91 days each.

The difference, according to Edwards, is in the way each proposal goes toward eliminating the alleged faults of the present system.

Edwards said his calendar will do everything that the world calendar would do and still keep New Year's day as well as eliminate all "Black Fridays."

Under his perpetual calendar, Edwards said Sunday always would be a day of rest. For instance, the first and 15th of the month would always fall on a week day, making it easy to meet those traditional payroll and payment dates without calendar juggling.

On the world calendar the first and 15th would fall on Sunday four times a year, and New Year's would be eliminated in favor of a year-end day which would come between a Saturday and a Sunday. Edwards' New Year day would also be a day apart from the dates on the calendar, but it would come between a Sunday and Monday and actually would be the first day of the year.

U.S. Naval Air Power Takes on Strong New Look With Series of Jet Aircraft

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Naval air power will take on a mighty new look this year as a whole new series of warplanes, jets, fighters and transport planes, into a new type of air striking force that could play a vital role in future war. The navy was caught short of modern planes when the Korean war broke. Now the admirals are confident they have a batch of planes in all categories that can handle any enemy. Two new bombers and two fighters are stars of the upcoming carrier-based forces. The Douglas A3D Skywarrior, a 70,000-pound jet, is described as "designed to fly at faster speeds over longer distances and with greater striking loads than any other known aircraft of its weight or size." It can fly more than 2,500 miles and has a speed of 600 to 700 miles per hour. It will go into service next summer as the navy's "basic atom bomber." The air force also has ordered the plane, calling it the B-66. Also going into key roles next summer is the Douglas A4D Skyhawk, a "bomber" size bomber so small it can be stowed aboard ship without folding wings. Able to span the ocean without refueling, the little atom bomber flies more than 600 miles an hour. It can be refueled in flight. In the fighter department, the navy will spend to shipboard squadrons in about six months the Douglas F4D Skyray, a jet which topped a world speed record of 752.9 miles per hour at sea level in 1953 when it was still experimental. It will be an all-purpose carrier fighter, replacing the famed F4U Corsair of World War II.

HOOD stores will find a choice selection of meats available at marked-down prices in their local food markets this week-end. Pork chops and pork steaks will be prominently featured and some stores will trim prices on pork chops by as much as a cent a pound. Selected markets will offer legs of lamb and lamb chops at special prices. Fryer chickens will be a favorite week-end special as meat men help producers cope with the huge supplies of the birds. In most places, steaks and prime ribs will be higher than a week ago. Choice of beef steaks are still strong. However, chuck meat will be featured in a good many stores, some reductions running to a cent a pound.

Eggs Featured
Laying flocks are expected to be 2 to 4 per cent larger this month than a year ago, so you should find eggs plentiful and quite reasonable. The poultry industry is calling this "egg month," and the U. S. department of agriculture is supporting the program to boost egg production by consumers.

The USDA, looking over the food situation this month, reports that there are heavy supplies of pork at reduced prices and that beef supplies will continue large. Heavy turkeys from cold storage also are abundant.

Supplies of lard and lardons are large, says the USDA, and supplies continue to mount with consumer prices down. There's also a lot of ground lard.

Milk production during recent months has been at record levels. Dairy products are abundant. Favorites in the vegetable line this week-end will include nearly 200 lbs. of potatoes, onions and carrots. Root crops—turnips, beets, parsnips, sweet carrots, iceberg lettuce, sweet corn, and cauliflower. Available also are considered reasonably priced.

Il Dice's Loot Went to Reds, Witness Says

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6 (AP)—A house committee published this week a cloak and dagger story revealing that the slayers of Benito Mussolini found on him a fortune in cash, gold and jewels which they turned over to the Italian communist party.

The story was told in testimony given last month to the select committee on communist aggression by Joseph Switlow, a former high official in the Polish security ministry, who fled to the west. The transcript was headed "Mussolini's Loot."

Switlow's account centers on Enzo Castellone, whom he described as an Italian communist agent, and three men detailed to kill Mussolini when the dictator was on the run after the allies took Italy.

Switlow said the killers sent the valuables to the Italian communist party, but that the Italian government got wind of it and demanded the treasure, so the communists undertook to hustle the two key witnesses, Castellone and his companion, out of the country.

Castellone, who Switlow's account says fled to Poland, but the other man was arrested by the Italian police.

Concludes Story

Switlow concluded his story: "At the time of my escape from Poland, Castellone was about to get a position as an engineer in Poland."

Records show that Mussolini, 46 of his fascist henchmen and his mistress, Clara Petacci, were captured by Italian partisans near Lake Como and were executed April 28, 1945, after a trial in the Swiss canton of Ticino.

The bodies of the Italian dictator and his mistress were strung up by the heels in a Milan square.

Official Given Far East Post, Benson Silent

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6 (AP)—Wolf Ladejinsky, fired by the agriculture department as a security risk, got a new job yesterday with the operations administration. He will work on land reform in Viet Nam, helping to fight off communist pressure.

The appointment was announced by FOA Chief Harold E. Blasen. It came after the White House, which broke out when Ladejinsky was resigned Dec. 18 from his post as agricultural attaché in the U. S. embassy at Tokyo.

Ladejinsky, Russian-born but now a naturalized American, had security clearance from the agriculture department, but when his post was shifted to the agriculture department by set of congress last year Secretary of Agriculture Benson ruled that he could not be retained. Benson acted on the advice of his security officer, John Glenn Cassidy.

"The security conflict between agriculture and state brought demands for a congressional hearing and in the end the White House stepped in."

The new responsibilities given Ladejinsky were to effect a revision of the security assessment made by the agriculture department. But Benson stuck by his gun at a news conference late in the day.

He was asked by a reporter whether he didn't consider Ladejinsky's re-employment, with White House approval, "a rebuke to you."

"You'll have to draw your own conclusions," Benson retorted.

The secretary told the newsmen he felt he had made a "correct" decision in refusing to accept Ladejinsky's transfer from the state to the agriculture department.

Sound Sense Gives Riches To 'Gold Ear'

NEW YORK, Jan. 6 (AP)—A man with a sound approach to business has made a fortune in the gold mining industry in the country.

In high fidelity circles, an expert who can distinguish the delicate nuances of sound by ear is much the same way a wine connoisseur identifies vintage years by taste is given the accolade of "golden ear."

Reeves is the creator of stereo-phonograph sound systems, for both cinema and gramophone, the two big, ultra-sensitive techniques which revolutionized the audio industry and gave it a needed shot in the box office. He is president of Cinegrams Inc.

He is called "Buzz" by intimates, a somewhat improbable nickname for a dedicated sound engineer whose ear is so sensitive he is driven almost frantic by the fuzzy tones in what many people consider good recorded music. Turn on a juke box and Reeves shudders, gasps quickly and walks out.

Reeves is a 56-foot South Carolina native who has a finger in more economic pins than anyone since Louis Jack Horner. He didn't get that way by sitting in a corner. For 21 years, Reeves has buzzed around starting-up or acquiring more than 20 corporations which have produced such varied products as precision sound equipment, TV tubes, plastic toys and marine wire cables.

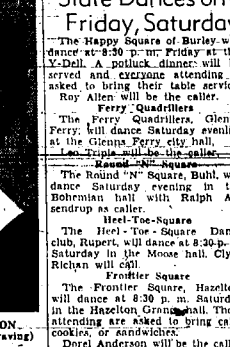
