Japanese Couple  
Taken From Hot  
Volcano's Crater

TOKYO, Jan. 7.—Two young  
lovers who tried to commit suicide

were rescued today after 35 hours

Experiment of Taking 3-Cent  
Mail by Air Proves Successful

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—The  
postoffice department's experiment  
in sending three-cent mail by air  
saving money and speeding delivery  
by 24 to 48 hours.  
It also is providing experience  
which Postmaster General Arthur  
E. Summerfield believes might prove  
invaluable in case an enemy attack  
should disrupt surface transpor-  
tation in this country.  
The experiment was inaugurated  
Oct. 6, 1933 between New York,  
Washington and Chicago. It has  
been extended gradually and na-  
tionally—first to three Florida cities,  
then to a "feeder" system in the  
middle west and recently  
along the Pacific coast from Seattle  
to San Diego.  
Summerfield said the net saving  
to the government has run about  
\$154,000 a year on the New York-  
Washington-Chicago-Florida phase  
of the experiment. There are no  
figures for the other experimental  
areas.  
Spot checks in all areas show  
speedier delivery. In many cases the  
elapsed time between postmarking  
at the sending point and delivery at  
the receiving end has been speeded  
24 hours. A test between Los Angeles  
and Portland, Ore., showed delivery  
to be 48 hours quicker than would  
have been possible by surface mail.  
One reason for swifter delivery is  
that mailing habits, railroad sched-  
ules and postmen delivery hours  
don't always mesh. There also are
