Every Sunday this veteran Washington newspaper correspondent devotes his column to answering readers' letters of general interest on national and international topics.

WASHINGTON—"I notice," writes H. O. Haverrill, Mass., "that President Eisenhower will suspend the operation of the 'Buy America' law..."

Answer? In my opinion, and it is confirmed by labor and unemployment figures, the six per cent figure is extremely important and significant.

It marks the first time that any administration has raised formally the figure at which the number of people out of work becomes an economic threat.

Unemployment estimate—Since there are approximately 61 million people now employed, the six per cent provision means that Washington will begin to worry when 3,660,000 cannot find gainful employment.

Experts on the subject figure that almost one million of that three million are to be found in the coal, steel and other mining industries, which are expected to improve and expand within a few months.

Certain Democrats, as well as labor union officials like Walter P. Reuther and George L. Meany, dispute these figures. They maintain that more than five million are out of work.

"I can't understand this teacher shortage. They work five hours a day for five days. A 24-hour week. Who else has that? Every possible excuse for a holiday they have it. Then the long vacation. After that they get a pension. They get good salaries, a good right before the teachers who pay for the schools get. I don't understand this business of my teachers."

I do. I understand it well. I was one for many years. Five hours a day that never happened to me. The children's homework, their written lessons, compositions had to be corrected carefully and the results set down as carefully. And teaching was the easiest and the least of my day's work. This has not changed. It has become more involved, more complicated, more harassing than ever.

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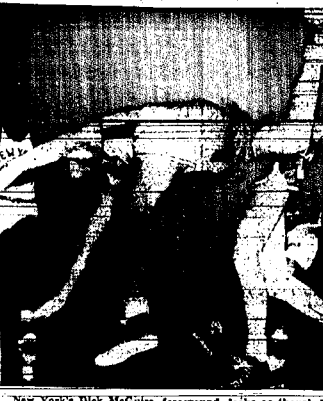
