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# TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The national repair and rebuilding of the nation's domestic plant—highways, schools, hospitals, homes, health centers and insurance aid plans—is regarded by President Eisenhower as the single most important achievement of 1951 that will leave off World War III more or less permanently.

That is the essence of the program which is set to unfold in 1951 during the current session, it explains why he has presented no more radical reforms for the coming year in his recent messages. He believes that the country needs a period of order and basic reconstruction after the 20 years of neglect and neglect of the great depression, the struggle for economic reconstruction, World War II and the current conflict with Russia.

## SHOCK TO CONGRESS—Congress has been shocked at White House suggestions of a 100 billion dollar highway program. But nothing less will meet the peacetime and wartime needs of a nation on which the opinion of federal and private engineering advisers.

Estimates for new hospitals, new schools, new homes and new roads are not only a matter of public interest but also of the federal government, states, cities and private interests, will amount to at least 500 billion dollars and not finance these projects, it will underwrite them in cooperation with other governmental units and state and local agencies.

This startling program also has its political-economic aspect. As Roosevelt's new deal spending, "World War II," the Marshall plan and other foreign aid schemes produced a boom in the economy, it is estimated that so much money at home should maintain a high level of industrial activity, employment and general good times.

**PRESSING NEEDS**—President Eisenhower has discussed the program feelingly with engineers, educators and other specialists. He has found general agreement among them. He notes in these talks at his White House—state dinners that his program is a humanitarian aspect. In his opinion, however, these are practical and pressing demands.

He believes that the grave shortages imperil the American people's welfare and security. For instance, there are not enough hospital beds, nurses, nurses for proper care of the sick at reasonable costs. There are not enough classrooms for decent education from kindergarten through high school. There are not enough, Shuman and unlivable hovels still darken rural and urban landscapes.

**TRAFFIC CONDITIONS**—The breakdown of the highway system, perhaps, symbolizes the nation's state of disrepair most spectacularly. It has been deeply studied by the Federal Bureau of Investigation for safe driving. This year threatens to register a new record of automobile injuries and fatalities.

Traffic congestion may be a symptom of the nation's economic ills. Travel to and from work requires several hours each day, taking its human and economic toll. For many years, the nation's roads have been roads cannot carry even peacetime loads efficiently and rapidly. This condition would prove dangerous in time of war.

It is friends refer to these ailments' grandiose ideas as the "Eisenhower new deal." But they add the comment that it is a down-to-earth and constructive program without ideological taints of the Roosevelt-Truman kind.

**IS HE SUPERSTITIOUS?**—Sen. W. Kerr Scott, North Carolina, insists that he is not superstitious, but a hard-headed farmer, but the senate sergeant-at-arms has his doubts.

For many years, senators from North Carolina have occupied suite 315 in the senate office building. Permanent occupancy of the same office makes it customary for their offices to be in that room.

Senator Scott, however, noted that every North Carolina senator for almost 30 years died in office or was defeated in the primary while occupying that room. The one exception was that of Senator Lee 452, turning the former quarters over to Sen. Alan Bible, Nevada.

## RED PRESSURE TACTICS

Signs now indicate that the Russians may be abandoning "Peaceful Co-existence."

For the past several years this has been the theme song of the communist slumber-hour propaganda. Its commercials have been intended to lull the non-communist countries into a false sense of security by lessening their alarms.

But now there is an apparent shift in the Moscow line. Communist spokesmen seem to be lightening the tension.

There is a note of violence in current communist statements in Europe as well as in Asia. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles declared after his return from the North Atlantic Treaty organization council meeting in Paris.

It may well be a shift from the cooling dose of peace to a more threatening show of force, the secretary observed in his press conference, after reading a prepared statement on the results of the Paris NATO council session.

Secretary Dulles does not believe that this shift in communist tactics makes a difference or means any change in the ultimate Soviet objective of world conquest.

He was asked what the effect would be if Soviet Russia should carry out its new threats to break the 30-year alliance with France and a similar treaty with Great Britain for mutual aid against a new German aggression.

For answers the secretary recalled a long series of ineffective threats made by Russia over the past 10 years in its effort to prevent a build-up of western strength.

## GOOD OL' GEORGIA!

The Russian embassy in Washington has apparently been told that many Russian-born people now in America are trying to persuade them to go back to their native country. Recently they invited one prominent Washingtonian of Russian birth to come to one of their parties. Just for a look at the inside of the place and for a taste of vodka and caviar he went, taking along his American wife, a State Department official and a reporter.

They were both given rather frigid treatment by one of the Russian hosts when the ex-Russians made clear that he had come to America at an early age and had no desire to leave.

The red official then launched into a long-winded and stiff lecture about the beauties and wonders of the Soviet Union. He particularly stressed the attractions of that section of Russia known as Georgia, where he had been brought up. Finally, turning to the American wife, he inquired respectfully, "Now, Madam, I suppose you would still rather live here than in Russia?"

"Ah, really must you Ah, would," she drawled. "But Alvin, Alvin, you'll understand, I'm Alvin from Georgia, too."

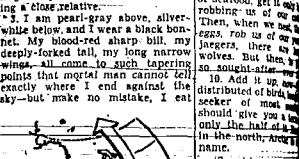

The committee officials hoped that the greater freedom in substitutions would give football the national attention of the old unaltered substitution or "two-platoon" system in its efficiency of play and less injuries.

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### Higher Share Of Road Fund Eyed for City

BOISE, Jan. 14 (AP)—The Idaho legislature received bills yesterday to give cities a larger share of highway funds to investigate employment especially "spillover" workers who fall outside the "workers' compensation" act.

The bills were introduced at brief morning sessions after which both bills were referred to the committee to hear Gov. Robert E. Smylie's budget message.

**Introduces Bill**  
The house committee and municipal committees introduced the bill backed by the Idaho Municipal League which would revise the apportionment of the 30 per cent of highway-user revenue now returned to cities and counties to more than 12 per cent.

The percentage of state funds would remain the same. However, the bill would apportion 35 per cent of the money to cities and counties of more than 125 population, instead of the present apportionment of four per cent to those of more than 2,500. The counties' share would be reduced from 86 to 65 per cent.
