

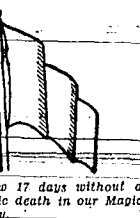
Hospitals Board Opposes Merger

Education, with its requested \$15,200,000 minimum school program and an overall budget of \$22 million dollars as approved by the governor, will make the largest demand on the general fund.

The committee said its group would budget the governor's 100-page budget book decreasing it to about \$19,000,000.

The general fund budget proposed by the committee amounts to more than 50 percent of the total state revenue in 1935-36.

The legislature, as it moved into its 1936 session, is reviewing dozens of bills that would put at risk its standing committees to work.

SEATTLE, Jan. 17—Building permits issued by the Twin Falls in Idaho during 1934—an increase of 14 per cent over 1933, according to a survey by the Pacific Architect and Builder, Seattle trade journal.

Idaho Traffic Toll Remains At Zero Point

Idaho's highway death toll for the year remained at zero today, but two persons lost their lives in week-end accidents involving vehicles.

Richard Cressy, Jr., 31, was crushed to death by a tractor yesterday when the machine slipped into gear as he and two others were working in a 100-acre home on the Fort Hall Indian reservation. His father was pinned to the wall of the house by the tractor and injured. The tractor ran over the son, crushing his chest.

Edward Papey, a 13-year-old Indian youth also of Fort Hall, was dead in a clump of sagebrush Saturday morning about 500 yards from the wreck of his car on E. highway 191 near Blackfoot, he died of exposure.

There were two other violent deaths during the week. Earl W. Eugene Meyer, 34, Bonners Ferry, was crushed to death when heavy logs fell from his truck and pinned him to the ground. He was killed by injuries received when he was kicked by a cow on his farm.

William Emerson, 58, Kimberly, was killed by a cow on his farm.

BURLEY, Jan. 17 — An eight-hour hunt last week came to a successful conclusion for Jack Mason, 34, Burley, when he brought down a tired female cougar with one shot of his 30-30 Winchester rifle.

Rocky Mountain Sites Furnish Many Solons In Key Positions

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—(AP)—but mountain congressmen may have 10 or 11 memberships in the Rocky Mountain region will be in stronger positions than ever before to shape legislation affecting reclamation, mining, public lands and Indian affairs.

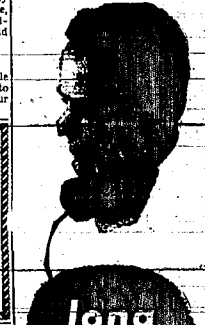
