SUEZ CANAL VITAL TO U.S.

Most Americans, when they think about the Suez canal, probably conceive of it as pretty much a British problem, since it has been pictured for so long as the "lifeline" of Britain's empire. But the fact is, the United States and all free peoples have a great stake in the canal.

In the decade since World War II ended, U. S. use of the canal has mounted more than tenfold. A very high percentage of this traffic is represented by the oil import trade which moves north through Suez from the islands of the Persian Gulf and other Middle Eastern points.

What could happen to this and other traffic if the canal were ever blocked-off? A vessel running this 104-mile course struck a steel structure and temporarily stopped the flow of ships.

Without the canal, all craft plying between India, the Middle East and the Atlantic ports of the western hemisphere, as well as all European destinations would have to head around the southern tip of Africa.

The cost in time, miles and money would be tremendous, and in an acute moment of free world peril the delay could prove disastrous.

For example, a ship bound on a U. S. New England port to Karachi, India, would have to travel 5,500 miles farther, take two weeks longer, and put out \$25,000 more in making the passage.

Not too many people around the globe realize that the prized waterway which makes these important savings possible is actually run as a private enterprise, the Suez Canal Company. Both technically and financially, it has a performance record as one of the most efficient operations in modern business history.

Last year, for the 27th time, the company slashed its toll charges. As traffic has climbed from 486 ships in 1870 to around 15,000 in 1954, operating economies have been passed on to the canal's users in the best free enterprise tradition.

Over the years, the company also has made many improvements, especially toward straightening, widening and deepening the channel which cuts a gash through the desert to link the Mediterranean and the Red sea.

Fittingly for a roadway of international importance, the Suez is internationally owned and managed. It is managed by the Egyptian government runs out. R-Day Events Are Planned For Germany

RONNIG, Germany, Jan. 20 (AP)—R-day is coming for Western Germany within the next few months, probably this spring. The "R" is for rearmament.

The prospect is that R-day will come when the western European Union treaties have been finally ratified.

But it is coming anyway. The United States and Great Britain have decided the rearmament or ratification of the Bonn republic must be carried as part of the common defense against red aggression.

New Army Mark

R-day will mark the birth of a completely new army—the Streitkräfte or "fighting forces" of the Federal Republic of West Germany. It will become the most modern and most effective striking force in western Europe.

The West German defense ministry, under tough Theodor Blank, is all set to go.

Blank has a card index containing the names of 150,000 men who already have volunteered for military service.

Blueprints for the new army have been completed. This will be the set-up:

1. A land army of 12 highly mobile divisions totaling 400,000 men.
2. An air force of 80,000 men.
3. A small coastal navy of 20,000 men.

Store's Chiefs Get Top Help From Experts

CHICAGO, Jan. 20 (AP)—Einer 77 Stevens, president of a big downtown women's store, visits a psychologist once a week. So do the rest of the store's executives.

It's part of a program to improve management and personnel relationships, Stevens said.

Stevens retained a firm of consulting psychologists for his store about seven years ago. Asked how the program has paid off, he smiled and said:

"People like to work here."

The reason isn't hard to find. At the age of 70, Stevens is vitally interested in improving himself and learning more about people.

Stevens, who still thinks of himself as a "hard-headed businessman," got interested in applied psychology after listening to a talk by Dr. Francis Hillier.

"My wife dragged me to the affair," Stevens said. "I didn't want to go, but I went."

Stevens said he retained Hillier's organization because "it operates among management, from the top down."

"And a store like ours is only as good as its management," he said.

Hillier's group uses few of the psychological tests, gimmicks and gadgets with which some psychologists surround themselves.

"Instead," Stevens said, "they help us with our problems by talking them over by helping us see the right solution."

The program is strictly voluntary, Stevens said. Nobody has to participate.

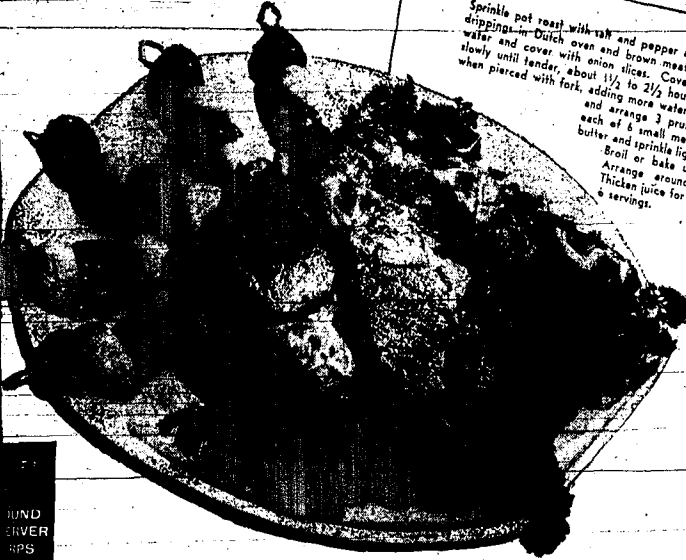

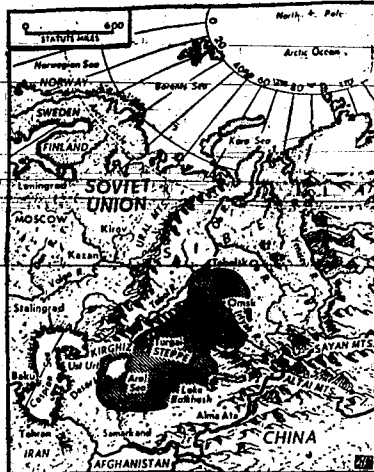

Correspondent Tastes Fear in Jungle Fight With Rebel Band

By JOHN ABNEY
MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Jan. 20.—You can't make fear when you are waiting for incoming destruction. It is dry and it makes your throat swell no matter how often you swallow.

We felt that fear Saturday afternoon while waiting with a poorly trained government patrol for a rebel tank to come in sight along the Inter-American highway that bisects the Costa Rican jungles.

The tank was a 2 1/2-ton government patrol of 10 men armed with rifles and submachine guns set out from San Ros with me and three other correspondents.

As the truck moved over with us, three men of our badly trained and badly placed patrol began firing into the rebels who poured over the sides of the half track and scrambled to positions along the road.

From the direction of the rebel firing we knew they had dispersed with efficiency and were working on us from both sides.

Heavy explosions from grenades shook their way into the chatter of machine guns and rifles a few yards away defused us.

The rebels first began sulling the top of the grass and knocking twigs from my bush and I asked another 35 feet to the rear.

It's better than from a rifle a few feet to the side made me think our patrol would be as dangerous to run into suddenly as the rebels and I stayed put.

It kept up for a solid hour—the night-pitched chatter of the sub-machine guns, the squalor of mortars, the deep coughing of rifles and the slower hammering of 30 caliber machine guns.

Roadwork

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Jan. 20.—Judge Frank E. Gregorsk revoked Howard A. Pecard's driver's license yesterday for drunk driving and ordered him to "run back and forth to work everyday" to get "in real good shape."

Pecard made the mistake of telling the judge he was an amateur boxer.

He marched me hands up to the road, where they searched and stripped me of all my papers and cameras and put me with the rest of the correspondents lying face up in a ditch, our hands over our heads.

While other rebels combed the area for more prisoners our guards kept machine guns on us. Across the road they collected their own casualties. They had two dead and four wounded.

We pleaded for our cameras to get pictures but to no avail. A 21-year-old lieutenant named Pacheco was leading the rebels.

His men were grim and mad at the ambush and thought we were members of the Caribbean Legion in the service of Costa Rican President Jose Figueres.

They wanted to shoot us on the spot. But their young lieutenant told them they were to let us go.

They marched us down the road to their lines.

We waited until almost dark when I heard a voice say "Hello, John. I wondered if it was you. They told me some newsmen were captured."

The voice was that of a friend of mine from Mexico, an exile from Costa Rica named Manuel Caballero. He talked to the officers and a few minutes later our hands were ordered untied.

We were marched 15 miles to a battalion headquarters where we lay on our backs by the roadside almost exhausted and looked at the stars almost touching us in the clear night.

Manuel brought us water and the rebels began joking with us.

"You're lucky as hell to be alive," Manuel told us.

The morning we met Capt. Teodoro Pizarro, the 27-year-old Wood Ranger commanding the rebels, at his headquarters and Lieut. Claudio Fonseca, the second in command.

"You boys are lucky," Pizarro said. "You were born again yesterday afternoon in Costa Rica."

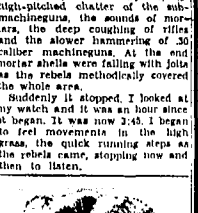

Grand Opera Has Deficit of Only \$14,000

CHICAGO, Jan. 20 (AP)—An attractive brunette who has scored tremendous financial success by operating only \$15,000 in the red for the New York and Europe in the grand manner today.

Carol Fox, president of the Lyric Opera, has created a small sensation in the music world by bringing opera to the grand opera house and only losing a few thousands in the process.

Grand opera in the past frequently has incurred annual deficits in excess of one million dollars here.

Mrs. Fox, in her late 20s, decided in 1931 that Chicago deserved better than a few touring opera companies each season. She thought the nation's second largest city should have big time opera.

Studied Singing

A Illinois Chicago, Mrs. Fox studied singing in New York and Europe, but never sang professionally.

She approached Larence Kelly, a youthful real estate man and long time friend of hers, about the idea. Kelly talked it over with Nicolò Rescigno. Thirty of Mrs. Fox's friends were lined up to solicit funds and the Lyric Opera was born. Kelly became secretary-treasurer and Rescigno conductor.

The Lyric Opera's first season, 12 performances of eight operas, saw the dazzling success of soprano Maria Menichilli Calza debut in Italy in America, plus the appearance of numerous other world famous opera stars.

Plan Longer Season

While the successful infant season was still in progress, Mrs. Fox and Kelly decided to plan for a longer season next year—24 performances of 11 operas.

She and Kelly leave for New York tomorrow for a four-month tour of Europe to sign singers for next season.

So far they've announced only the signing of tenor Jussi Björling of Metropolitan opera fame. But they indicate that most of this season's stars will be back. That would include Mme. Menichilli Calza, Giuseppe di Stefano and Leopold Simoneau, and baritone Tito Gobbi and Nicola Rossi-Lemeni.

Turbine Controls Contract Okayed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (AP)—Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel, R-Calif., today announced the signing of a \$1,000,000 contract for the manufacture of 15 hydraulic turbine governors at the hydro-electric plant at the Dallas, Ore.

The contract went to the Pelton Water Wheel company, San Francisco.

Kuchel said the equipment is the same that was involved in bids which army engineers rejected last May.

Kuchel predicted that the award might be given to a Japanese concern which was the apparent low bidder.

U. S. Men Get Fatter, Warns Obese Expert

AMPS, Ia., Jan. 20 (AP)—American men are getting fatter and the ladies are getting slimmer an expert on obesity said.

Perhaps that's because the nation's males don't have to cram themselves into Dior creations or light-fitting skirts, Dr. James M. Hundley said yesterday.

Hundley, who is chief chemist of the "Public Health Service" at Bethesda, Md., spoke before the first conference on weight control ever held in the United States.

He said:

About 100 experts on over-eating and obesity are gathered here for a three-day conference at Iowa State University.

Hundley told the experts that men now are about five pounds heavier for their height and women about five pounds lighter than similar groups in 1912.

"If a motivating force, social or otherwise, could be found which would induce men to strive for slimmness, as apparently women have, man's progress against obesity might be made," he said.

Slim for Health

Hundley emphasized however, that both men and women should stay on the slim side for health reasons, not because they look prettier that way.

Obesity is "a major health problem of our day," he said, and cited statistics showing an increase of 10 per cent or more in such ailments as heart, blood and gall bladder diseases among fat persons.

Other scientists backed up Hundley's warning and added that a lot of the current methods of combating over-weight are misleading.
