Tachen Islands Were Used in Past as Highway for Invasions

The Tachen Islands, a series of barren, wind-swept rocks jutting out of the East China sea, were used by the Chinese three centuries ago as bases for two invasions of Formosa.

The Chinese Nationalists recalled that and took upon the islands 200 miles north of Formosa as stepping stones to a final assault on the island. They would like to hold them with their 10,000-man garrison, but modern communist airpower may prove too much for them.

Usually reliable sources in Taipei said Defense Minister Yu Tsensan told U. S. ambassador Karl L. Rankin in a secret conference that the islands must be abandoned if the U. S. seventh fleet does not use its carrier-based jets to defend them. This brought immediate reaction from Washington and President Eisenhower was reported to be considering allowing the fleet to remove nationalist troops from the heavily defended islands where they have been formidable defenses in the bare rock.

The main island in the group is Tachen, a 20 square mile mountain top guarding the entrance to the communist port of Haimen barely 10 miles away.

It is laced with defenses—machine guns and heavy mortar emplacements; artillery and mortar batteries running throughout an underground defense system.

United Press correspondent William Miller, a former army officer who fought in Korea, said the beaches of the island are either unapproachable because of steeply rising cliffs or heavily covered by fire.

"I have seldom seen better, more extensive fortifications," Miller said. "They are better than what we had in Korea."

U. S. military advisers on the island—three officers and 10 enlisted men—said it would be a "hard, tough invasion job for the U. S. marines." But communist airpower is making the island untenable—such massive raids as Tuesday's 300-bomber attack could weaken the defenses and cut off supplies by sea from Formosa.

The loss of Yiklangshan island was a body blow, for the tiny island is 13,000 meters—not quite eight miles—in the north and that is only range for modern big artillery.

Tachen is really two islands, the upper and lower, both together providing a home for 4,000 civilian residents, mostly fishermen. It is so forsaken that only stray grass, a few rocks, National soldiers and the fishermen can be found there.

But its position off the coast makes it a valuable intelligence post and a block to Hong Kong-Beiping shipping. It has been a definite thorn in the side to communist Formosa.

The Tachen group contains hundreds of tiny bits of land—jutting out from the sea, as tips of mountain peaks. Other important islands to the south, all worthless rocky hills much less than Tachen.

The next important nationalist-held island is Pishan, 30 miles to the south, approximately halfway to Haimen. The main red-held islands to the north are Taiman, Tienan and Tunchi.

The Tachens were first used as a path of invasion in 1949 when the Manchus drove the Ming dynasty south from Peking (now Peking). A man known as Cheng Chi-lung
