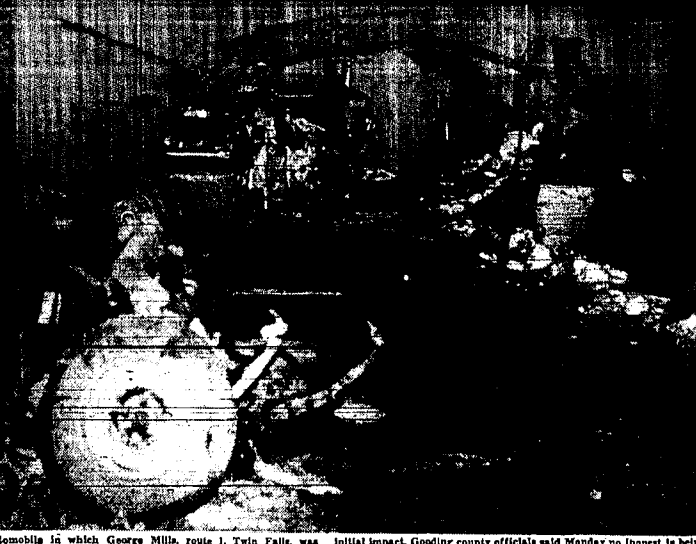

Former Slav Chiefs Face Secret Trial

Two former marshals in the Yugoslav communist party went on trial in Belgrade today on charges of publishing "subversive" articles. The court barred the foreign press from the proceedings because the president of the five-man panel "refused to accept the daily report on the course of the case."
Yugoslav reporters and spectators crowded up by the communist party were admitted and the court president insisted that it was a "public trial."
Courtroom Cleared
After the indictments were read, the courtroom was cleared and the trial became "secret."
Up before the court were Milovan Djilas, former vice president of Yugoslavia, and Vladimir Dedijer, historian of the partisans war against the Nazis and biographer of Marshal Tito.
Djilas was booted out of the communist party a year ago for voicing his unorthodox views in the Yugoslav newspaper Borba.
Accusation Given
Both Djilas and Dedijer were accused of "aiming to undermine the present social, economic and political order through insinuations published in two western newspapers around Christmas."
The government was embarrassed by the publication of the interviews because Tito at that time was getting good notices in the press on his tour of India, Burma and other eastern countries.
Djilas and Dedijer will be tried for violating an article of the criminal code through publication of their "subversive propaganda." Their defense will be based on the ground they did not publish the information maliciously—that they were only exercising freedom of speech guaranteed them under the constitution. Their crime was that they attacked Tito and other Yugoslav leaders as "Stalinists and bureaucrats."

Central America Passes Bad Three Weeks; No Peace Seen

The last three weeks in Central America were hot ones even for that politically turbulent area.
President Jose Antonio Remon, Panama, was assassinated on Jan. 2. A revolt broke out in Costa Rica on Jan. 11. There was an uprising in Guatemala last Thursday.
What lay behind the assassination of Remon remains something of a mystery. Jose Ramon Guindao, who was first vice president, automatically succeeded Remon, was charged with plotting the assassination. He was ousted and faces trial. But the Panama situation remains confused, and there may well be more trouble there before long.
The Costa Rican revolt was small but dangerous. It could have exploded into a war between Costa Rica and Nicaragua, which charged that the rebels came from Nicaragua, its neighbor to the north. President Jose Figueres, Costa Rica's liberal and President Anastasio Somoza, Nicaragua, a right wing "strong man" have long been on bad terms.
The revolt in Guatemala involved only the military bases of La Aurora, in the suburbs of Guatemala City, the capital. It was stamped out within a few hours. But it marked the re-emergence of the extreme leftists who were thrown out of office last June.

The largest Chinese settlement in America met on a busy street today celebration along Chinatown's main artery.

In homes, elders invoked the long-eared, big-billed god of happiness and Kuan Yin, the serene goddess of mercy and peace.

Housewives will not sweep their houses for a week. An old proverb tells them they would "sweep all good fortune away."

Good Chinese families have paid their debts. To carry a debt over into the new year is considered a disgrace and call misfortune and disaster down on oneself and family.

The public entertainment is sponsored by the Chinese Six Companies association, "the most powerful and richest association of Chinese in America."

The "Six Companies" which actually represents seven families, is celebrating its 30th anniversary.

More than 95 percent of all Chinese in the United States are members in one of the seven "families" and the decision of the family elders have a strong meaning.

To make sure the new year arrives in proper style, the Six Companies are sponsoring puppet shows, ceremonial dancing exhibitions, Art Shows, and oriental costume displays.

On Jan. 30 the festival will end with a parade under the pagoda-like lights along Grant avenue, culminating in the dance of the magnificent dragon.

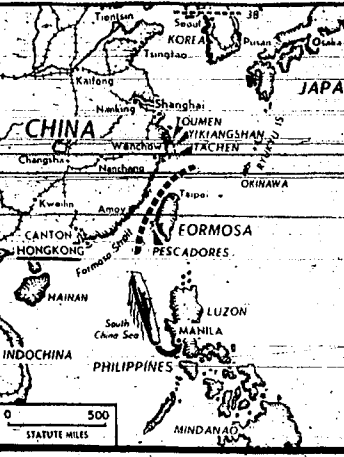
The dragon is a block-long and borne by 50 men; its head breathes smoke as its 100 legs wave a dance that was ancient when the Crusades were on their way to Jerusalem.
