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ROUTINE, BUT IMPORTANT

Recently Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and U. N. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge paid a visit to Gen. Curtis LeMay at his strategic air command headquarters in Omaha. To ally any fears, they said the call had no special significance but was "routine."

We can have little doubt that they were speaking accurately, since there are at this time no signs of increasing war dangers, certainly no sign of a sort that would justify such a top-level huddle as this one.

Bill Dulles and Lodge may not have realized that it is not necessarily clear to most Americans why a visit from the nation's leading diplomats to the country's SAC commander should be routine.

We are inclined to forget the very intimate relation between foreign policy and military policy. In the view of the experts in these fields, military policy is properly regarded not as something distinct and apart, but as an extension, supplement and support for foreign policy.

At all times our diplomats must have any doubts as to the full range and character of our military capabilities. Those capabilities mark the limits of our diplomacy. We cannot safely go beyond them.

In other words, we dare not make either threats or promises which we cannot support with military action if that should become necessary.

Once a nation makes threats or promises which it cannot back up—and the little bit of military policy is properly regarded not as something distinct and apart, but as an extension, supplement and support for foreign policy.

This is a matter of especial importance to the United States, as the greatest power on earth today. As the principal military, economic and political prop of the whole free world, we are being besieged constantly to extend a protective arm to new lands. We are also under urging to shake a big stick in the hope that will dissuade a potential aggressor from rash action.

The temptation must always be a great one among our diplomats to spread the power and influence of this nation wider than is really safe. And if we are committed too extensively through promises and threats, then we shall find ourselves run into trouble, for at some point or other we shall be asked to go on what someone has said in the country's name.

That is why it is "routine" for men like Dulles and Lodge to talk with LeMay and other top military men. It is routine, but it is important.

REPUBLICANS CONFIDENT Republican National committee headquarters think the Democratic congressional investigators will have a hard time digging up any convincing evidence of GOP patronage abuses. This won't be because the evidence has been covered up, say the Republicans, but because the evidence isn't there.

Frankly, they admit they haven't done a very good job of replacing Democratic officials in the government with Republicans. Estimates have been made that out of the 2,500 government civilian employees, the Republicans in two years in office have been able to place only about 2,500 members of their party in key jobs.

Chauncy Robbins, who has been in charge of the personnel division at Republican National committee headquarters in Washington for the past year, says he has no idea where this 2,500 came from. He has no central file of job placement cards to show whether this number is right or wrong, high or low.

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### Slav Leaders Trial Shows Odd Aspects

**By United Press**

The trial in Belgrade of two high-ranking Yugoslav communist leaders is showing some odd aspects. Here are two men charged with high crimes against the regime of President Tito. They were arrested on the party line and defiantly refused to get back on it.

Milovan Djilas and Vladimir Dedjler were charged with getting off lightly. Milovan Djilas and Vladimir Dedjler walked out of court early this morning with no sentences. They will be under probation for from 18 months to two years but if they keep their mouths shut they probably will not be arrested again.

In Soviet Russia, or in any other communist-ruled country, Milovan Djilas and Vladimir Dedjler would have been dead long ago.

Secret police would have seized them, probably from their beds in the early hours of some morning. They would have been put in solitary confinement and subjected to mental or physical torture, or both, until they confessed their guilt. Then they would have been tried without prior announcement, convicted quickly and shot in the back of the head.

But Djilas and Dedjler were not even arrested. Their homes were put under guard, but only to keep them from carrying their rifles. Further by talking to foreign correspondents. When a correspondent visited Dedjler's home late in December, he found that Dedjler was out shopping for a new year tree, the equivalent of the American Christmas tree.

**Walk to Court**

The two communist deviants walked together to the district courthouse yesterday for the opening of their trial. Five minutes at first announced the trial would be public but suddenly changed their minds. Even the relatives of the two defendants—Djilas' wife and mother, Dedjler's brother and sister-in-law and a few others—were permitted to remain.

It was taken for granted that Djilas and Dedjler would be convicted. There was not much doubt that, under Yugoslav law, they were guilty. But they didn't plead guilty they defended their course with the aid of able lawyers.

Altogether, things have taken a strange turn in Yugoslavia. Tito, one of the world's outstanding communists, broke with the Kremlin rather than subordinate his own country's interests to Russia's. He has aligned himself alongside the west against Russian aggression. And though he remains a communist, he lets men accused of criminal subversive propaganda walk to their trials!

**Arrested New System**

What happened was that Djilas, a vice president and a possible successor to Tito, wanted Yugoslavia to turn into a relaxed democratic government. He advocated a two-party system. He was kicked from his government and communist party posts. But he continued to draw a pension as a wartime partisan hero and Dedjler against the Germans.

Dedjler, biographer and close friend of Tito, defended Djilas. He kept his post in the communist party leadership, nevertheless.

Around Christmas time both men, still defiant, gave interviews to foreign correspondents reaffirming their views. It was decided that they must be tried. But apparently neither need fear that whatever punishment the court may mete, he will have his brains blown out.

### Mortgage Credit Office Will Open

**SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 25 (AP)**—An office to administer the voluntary home mortgage credit program for Idaho, Montana, Utah and Wyoming will open in Salt Lake City today.

Albert M. Cole of the housing and home finance agency said the purpose of the program was to help home buyers or builders obtain home financing in areas where it is scarce. Mortgages are either insured by the federal housing administration or guaranteed by the veterans administration.

All areas in Idaho are eligible except Holzer.

### Pilots Okay Hops Of Over 8 Hours

**NEW YORK, Jan. 25 (AP)**—A dispute over non-stop cross-country flight time between the Airline Pilots association and American Airlines was settled yesterday, the company and union said in a joint announcement.

The pilots withdrew strike threats after agreement was reached. West-bound DC-7 flights in excess of eight hours will be allowed under the agreement, with no more than eight hour flight time rule holding for all other flights.
