### Lincoln Panel Sets up Fund Budget for '35

BOHONONE, Jan. 20.—Tentative budget for Lincoln county was set by county commissioners this month. The budget for 1935 is \$279,285.30, a slight increase over last year's budget. The rate was increased to \$1.25 per acre for the county road fund, for additional newly elected officers, for additional to the county weed control program and for the purchase of a new car for the sheriff's office.

No wage increases were granted county employees.

Last year's budget amounted to \$276,285.30. The 1935 budget for last year's proposed budget was \$279,285.30. Total expenditures for last year amounted to \$276,285.30.

A \$500 addition was set in the tentative budget for the sheriff with \$11,078 for this year compared to \$11,078 last year. The increase was proposed, Bowman explained, because the state has fixed the rate in a short wave radio at the sheriff's office.

Also increased in the proposed budget for this year is the county clerk's budget. Last year the approved budget for the county clerk was \$7,248 while the tentative budget this year is set at \$8,311.70, making a difference of \$1,063.70. Extra help will be needed in the clerk's office as a result of change in personnel, Bowman said.

The county assessor will take a \$125.00 cut in his budget under last year if the tentative budget is approved. His budget is set at \$9,400.00 compared to \$9,525.00 last year. The cut was made in travel expense.

A raise of \$161.75 is proposed for the county treasurer's budget for supplies and surety bonds. Last year's approved budget was for \$7,329.50 compared to \$7,591.25 this year.

An additional appropriation of \$1,625 is needed in the tentative budget for phone bills and surety bonds. Last year the approved budget was \$1,625.00 while the tentative budget this year is set at \$4,611.50 compared to \$4,657.85 this year.

Similar reasons were given for an \$182 increase in the tentative budget for the prosecuting attorney. Last year his budget was approved at \$4,409 compared to \$4,591.50 this year.

Nine dollars and twenty-five cents were added to the tentative budget for a county coroner for a surety bond, making this year's tentative budget \$132.25 while the budget for both district and justice was \$132.25.

Last year's \$4,735 and \$300, respectively.

Last year's budget for county commissioners was set at \$2,550 while this year it is \$2,550.

Both the courthouse grounds and county physician budgets are the same as last year, \$4,800 and \$115, respectively.

The tentative budget of \$730 was set for the county nurse and public health work over last year's approved budget of \$730. The tentative budget for a medical director and expenses involved in work of the southeastern health district is \$1,000.00.

The county agent's budget is the same as last year, \$4,438.00, while the commissioners' special account is \$200, \$250, from \$175 to \$200. The drop was permitted because of no election expenses this year.

The current expense fund is \$82,385.90 while last year it was \$82,385.90. The fund is \$100,000.00 this year, \$95,000.00 last year, \$90,000.00 and last year, \$85,000.00. Both years, \$80,000.00. ## 'Miracles' of Healing, Federal Finance Discussed for Forum

### Devil Blamed By Censor as Job's Reason

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 20—Lloyd T. Binford, 88-year-old watchdog of the morals of Memphis moviegoers, said yesterday one reason he has to ban so many films is "there's a certain amount of the devil in all of us."

"It's just human nature," he said in an interview. "In a sense all of us belong to the devil because we go to get us and please our own thoughts in our minds. Many movies stimulate those wrong thoughts."

Binford, who was born shortly after the Civil war in the tiny village of Duck Hill, Miss., divides between the devil and 400,000 Memphis souls as chairman of the censor board, which reviews and must approve every movie shown in local theaters.

His role has made him the bane of many Hollywood producers, a frequent target of newspaper criticism, and either a hero or a nuisance in the eyes of local citizens. He has headed the censor board more than 26 years, and this month was reappointed to another one-year term.

Barred Some Performers

Binford signed a decision barring Ingrid Bergman and Charlie Chaplin from Memphis screens because of their private lives. His board demanded that a Billie Holiday dance be cut from one movie, a Gene Home number from another. It banned Jane Russell in "The French Line."

"The film 'Curley' was banned because it showed Negroes in school with white children. Producers carried the case to the state supreme court, which ruled a film could not be banned just because Negroes appeared in it."
