Legal Opinion Says Federal High Dam Would Overshadow Snake Water Rights

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (Special)—Upstream water users on the Snake river can kiss their rights goodbye if a federal dam is built at Hells canyon, a top-legal authority here says.

Frank B. Horne, head of the American division of the library of congress, which does research for members of congress, has so informed former budget committee chairman Budde. "The fact that the Snake river has a top-legal authority here says," Horne takes up 32 pages quoting precedents but finally concludes: "This brings us to the main question underlying this whole problem, which, as we see it, can be stated bluntly as follows: 'In the event, after the authorization and construction of the Hells canyon dam, there is insufficient downstream flow for its operation...'

"Horne adds that any protection for water users in the upper Snake valley into a Hells canyon bill would not be absolute, and cannot be absolute, because of the constitutional powers of congress that are involved."

"In view of past decisions of the supreme court, a constitutional amendment would be required to give users in the exercise of complete control of these water resources of navigable rivers in the states (which congress is not about to do)."

"Budde says Horne's opinion in this matter is very pertinent because it underlines some of the arguments already introduced in a federal Hells canyon bill. 'This dam, or, for that matter, one at the Mountain Sheep state, would be constructed below the break where water can be used for irrigation. 'All other dams built by the bureau of reclamation in its 52-year history have been above the irrigated acreage; but that would not be true in this case. 'If a federal dam were to be built at Hells canyon our upstream water users would just be out of luck in dry years when water would be needed to turn the generators of the federal government decided to take the waters?'

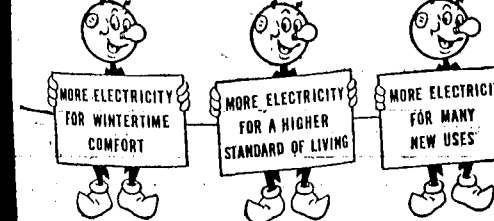

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Sen. Estes Kefauver's annual attempt to win headlines and 1938 presidential election by sensational crime forays has met determined opposition from Attorney General Herbert Brownell, Jr. and J. Edgar Hoover, FBI director. They have ambitious FBI director from Tennessee. Senator Kefauver has prepared a measure to ban indictments on information on sports contests, aiming to break telegraph communications between race tracks and bookies. He has been introducing the bill ever since his sensational television investigations of 1931, but it had been pigeonholed by Sen. John W. Bricker, Ohio—the "lackadaisical" chairman of the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee on Republican side.

CHARGE—DETENTION—Kefauver—felt accused of improper treatment and action from the Democratic chairman, Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, Washington. Both a liberal and not averse to public flapping and promoting news headlines-making hearings into operations of the politico-criminal underworld.

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ANTI-RACKETEER—In the nationwide revolution and reaction to Kefauver's earlier televised revelations, the person broached up, regarded as what Hoover describes as "a vicious, personal crimes—murder, burglary, rape, assaults and street holdups."

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"OCCUPATION" LEVY—Kefauver also intends to try to strengthen the financial burdens which his earlier proposals, now law, imposed on the criminals' community. The 1935 federal nomination in 1935 he obtained a \$50 federal license, thus identifying themselves and their activities, and to pay a specified regular income taxes. It amounts to an occupation levy.

KEFAUVER'S CLEANUP PLAN—Under Kefauver's plan, a reputed criminal or gambler's "known worth"—real estate, securities, bank cash and other forms of material wealth—would constitute proof of guilt unless he could show that he had earned it from honest and legitimate sources. Another measure of guilt or innocence would be ordinary living expenditures on purchase of "hot" cars, clothes, food, Florida and California vacations. Kefauver believes that these measures will clean up the crime scene. Unlike Hoover, he still thinks crime is nationwide.

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VIEW OF OTHERS

CURE FOR STREAM POLLUTION? We don't anticipate that Idaho's legislature will do anything about it at the present session, but one of them is already public in filing to the solution to the problem. We're referring to the pollution of Snake river waters by cities and villages who use sewage disposal.

Research has repeatedly pointed out that municipal and industrial water here is ruined by sewage. The fly also is under suspicion. It makes sense that a polluted stream of water and germ carrier's are a bad combination—whether it be pollen or gonorrhea. There's nothing to be done about it, except to clean up the source. In this case, there would mean bond issues and, in these days of high taxes, there would be plenty of eyes to follow it.

We've talked about stream pollution in this column before. We're bringing the matter up again for two reasons: (1) the legislature is in session and individuals and organizations might be interested in bringing the matter to their attention, and (2) the March of Dimes is now underway and, although the finger of suspicion hasn't been definitely pointed at stream pollution in Idaho as a cause of polio, it is believed that it could be.

Both rights and duties thus have been concentrated in Washington. And the sources of tax revenues available to the states have been exploited so greedily by the federal government that the states have been deprived of financing themselves and become beggars in Washington.

"Education," consisting largely of political "indoctrination," a term introduced during the war by the communists and fellow-travelers, is now practically guaranteed as a government subsidy to millions of men and women in partial compensation for service in the armed forces.

The whole system is now polluted. Students may learn that General Grant's regime was crooked and that Grant himself was personally honest. But they will not be taught that F. D. Roosevelt helped Elliott to trim one sucker out of \$300,000 and later intended a crooked scheme to get back Elliott's collateral.

They will be taught that Jackson was a victim of unjustified scandal, but nobody is going to teach them the truth of Eleanor Roosevelt's visit to her friend, Josephine, in the Pacific at the people's expense and of her interesting relationship with Earl Miller, her favorite sergeant of the New York state police, who got a commission as lieutenant commander and a soft, easy assignment to his satisfaction.

Only a few stubborn minds among the millions will ever learn that so readily as the Civil War the people of these states were not citizens of the federal union of states but citizens of their respective states, and that this relationship was changed not by congress but by the supreme court.

Believe me, the same kind of subjects may be proof against pollution by political pedagogue. History and literature are their best fields of imposition on the victims.

Plan Readied For New and Long Bridge

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—Engineers plan to build the longest suspension span in the world across the Narrows at the entrance of New York Harbor.

The bridge, 4,400-foot center span, will be 200 feet longer than that of the Golden Gate bridge at San Francisco, which has ranked as the world's longest since 1937.

And the Narrows bridge, which the Port of New York authority hopes to complete by 1960, may be the longest for only a short time.

Italy Plans Bridge With the next decade Italy hopes to build a suspension bridge with a 5,000-foot center span across the strait of Messina connecting Italy with the island of Sicily.

Thus the superlative in length of suspension bridges is held by the old world from the new, which has virtually had a monopoly on it since the late 19th century.

The 16 largest suspension bridges and all but one of the 27 largest cantilever bridges are in the United States has nine of the 14 largest steel arch bridges and 10 of the largest concrete bridges.

The world's highest suspension bridge, the Gorge of the Arkansas river in Colorado at a height of 1,033 feet.

Engineers now are embarked on two to three ambitious bridge construction projects since the 1920's, when most of today's leading suspension bridges were built.

In making comparisons of the length of suspension bridges engineers use the distance between the two towers rather than the distance from anchorage to anchorage.

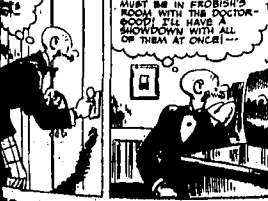

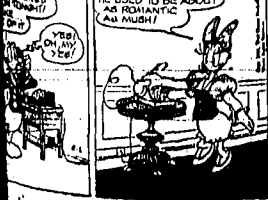

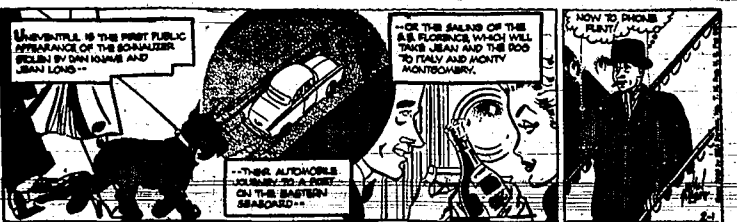

WOMEN MEET—Wendell Phillips, Ray Laney, J. Mason and Mrs. A. P. Brown met with Mrs. Orlando Jacobson, chairman of the Idaho League for Women's Suffrage, Friday afternoon to prepare the program for the new year.

The house passed 62-5 a bill requiring payment of the prevailing wage rates and a two-year limitation on a bill to raise the bonding limit of class A and B school districts from \$100,000 to \$200,000.

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New Shotgun Designed by Famous Firm

OGDEN, Utah, Feb. 1 (AP)—The Browning came out today with a new "double automatic" shotgun, the result of eight years of experiment and research and the latest triumph for a family famous for gun-making through four generations.

The name of Browning has been a household word ever since before the Civil war. It is a familiar name in Ogden, where the firm has been in business since 1881 and where many of the famous guns bearing their name were invented.

Started in Kentucky an ultra-modern workshop on a downtown Ogden street is the current headquarters of the Browning gunsmith and a far cry from the Kentucky mountain cabin where Jonathan Browning started the family trade in 1831 by designing and hand-forging his first rifle.

Jonathan, who later perfected a lever action rifle that was used for the Winchester rifle well known to every western movie fan, moved to Ogden in 1851. His son, Moses Browning was born in an adobe house here in 1855.

Makes Improvements John Moses Browning in his lifetime improved the gun which he invented the first practical machine gun and patented the modern repeating rifle.

Most of his 129 firearm patents were turned over to the Winchester-Remington for actual production. When he died in 1926 he had been decorated as "the great gun maker of the modern age" and his mantle fell on his son Val.

Val Browning now heads the Browning enterprises and already has two sons, John Val, 30, and Bruce, 29, are knee-deep in the gun business.

Took 8 Years In an interview at the Browning office, Val Browning said the "double automatic" shotgun has taken eight years to perfect. It employs an entirely different basic design than his father's famous Browning automatic, and features fewer parts that move shorter distances faster.

The new gun, which is being manufactured in Belgium, harnesses the recoil with a speed that permits rapid firing of any weight of 12 gauge shell. Because migratory bird hunting regulations limit the number of shells a hunter is permitted to carry, the new gun holds only two, but models with greater capacity are being designed.

Chairman Walter F. George, D. Ga., said his senate foreign relations committee might consider the resolution today. However, he added developments might make it advisable to take no action during the current U. N. cease-fire discussions.

Resolution introduced Hubert H. Humphrey, D. Minn., introduced the resolution today as a follow-up to the admission resolution giving President Eisenhower blank check power to fight the Communists, if necessary, to defend Formosa, and the Pescadores.

Hand Signals, Proper Use Are Termed Important Factor for Highway Safety

Hand signals and their proper use are important to traffic safety, police officers agree.

Police officers, state patrolmen and deputy sheriffs agree that a large percentage of accidents are caused by the wrong use of hand signals and pedestrianism. They feel proper traffic education would help prevent a big share of all types of accidents.

Police Chief Howard Gillette says, "Accidents don't happen, they are caused." He continues by pointing out that mechanical failure seldom is a contributing factor but that the human element involved nearly always is the sole reason for traffic mishaps.

He points out it is imperative that motorists, before driving their cars, know the meaning of the different signals and how to give them.

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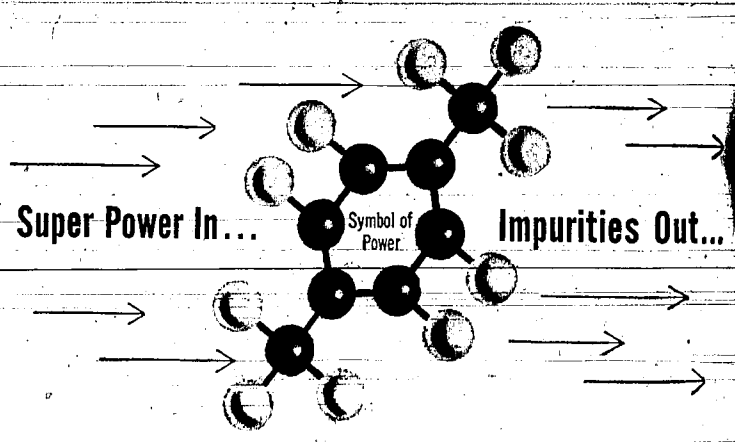

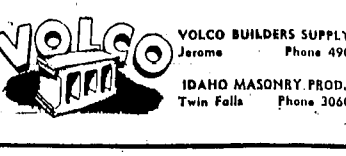
