

Snow Survey Shows Water Supply Short

at Mt. Paic Mountain, said an additional 14 inches fell in the area on Tuesday. The forest service estimates that snow on the ground as of Monday.
The forest service and bureau of reclamation also report that snow in the upper Snake river valley is only 43 per cent of normal. The four snow measuring stations on the Snake river valley show 11, 24 and 25 inches of snow, respectively. This snow has 28, 49, 8.6 and 3.2 inches of water content, respectively. The 11 and 24 inch stations have 7.9 and 10.5 inches of snow and 2.9, 7.8, 7.8 and 10.9 inches, respectively. This moisture is 72 per cent of normal.
Mid-lake has 20 inches of snow with a water content of 3.8 inches compared to 6.3 inches last year and 6.4 inches normally. This is 61 per cent of normal.
The four measuring stations on Henrys fork have 32, 39, and 34 inches of snow with a water content of 4.2, 8.1 and 7.7 inches, respectively. Last year the three stations had 92, 141 and 124 inches of snow, respectively. The water content is 9.9, 13.0 and 10.2 inches. The amount this year is 50 per cent, 70 per cent and 78 per cent of normal.

Nixon Briefed By Chief Over Coming Jaunt

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20—President Dwight D. Nixon received thorough instructions from President Eisenhower today for his good will tour of the Central American and Caribbean republics.
The two met in a private breakfast table at the White House this morning. Nixon was expected to brief reporters accompanying him on the trip later in the day.
The vice president and Mrs. Nixon will leave here by air Sunday on a four-week tour of Central America and the Caribbean. They will be accompanied by Henry F. Holland, assistant secretary of state for inter-American affairs.
The president feels Nixon's visit will help to dispel the impression that United States relations with Latin America are an important factor in the high school and college students' strike.
Latin American diplomats have complained the United States is growing into Europe and Asia. However, the president's visit is intended to correct this impression.
Aware of this criticism, the administration is using every opportunity to repair its relations with some of the sister countries of the western hemisphere.

Rumors State Over Chinese

LONDON, Feb. 20—There are very strong indications that Moscow has a bear by the tail in her relations with Red China.
Diplomatic sources here say that the Soviet Union is finding it difficult to keep her Communist Chinese allies from getting out of line. This is particularly true, the sources said today, in the Far East.
Russia, these sources believe, has no stomach for a head-on collision with the United States in the far east. But the Kremlin still has an advantage and wants to press it to the limit.
The trouble stems from the fact that Peiping apparently has over-estimated the implications of its recent success in forming and seizing Yikiangsan Island, in the Formosan Strait.
Ever since that relatively modest military success, diplomats here report, Red China has been kicking at the traces.

More than 175 head, consisting of more than 175 head, is fed 15 pounds of best pulp, 5 pounds of grain, 10 pounds of alfalfa and ground-ops, and 1/2 pounds of molasses.

Care of Your Children
By ANGELO PATRI

"I just a customer," said Pete, the owner of the general store. "She always brought her little boy along, he's about 5 now, and while she did her shopping he wandered about the shop and picked up whatever he wanted, a chocolate bar, chewing gum, maybe a ball, anything he felt like having."

"His mother never said a word although she saw him doing it. One morning, later, they came in and he filled his pockets. Janet watched him. He had two chocolate bars, five sticks of gum, a handful of mixed candies and a tennis ball. I charged them on the bill and she was furious. She said she would never come into this shop again and I couldn't be sorry."

"Who could? This habit of picking up odds and ends in the sweet shops, fruit stores, the Five and Tens, is really a very bad habit indeed and a costly one to the shopkeepers. It is morally wrong. It is taking what does not belong to the taker and there is a hard word for this—THEFT."

"There is every reason for taking a walkabout child to the shops: He sees a variety of things he would not otherwise know about. He sees people going about their business and he learns about that. He comes in contact with many kinds of people and gathers many kinds of experience, all of which are valuable to his education and training provided he is watched and guided as he goes along.

Children have to learn that they cannot have everything they see, everything they would like to have. A shopping trip is a fine lesson in this idea. A child will want the

candy he sees, and the toys, and special foods. His mother says, "No. You do not need that," to his request for something he does not need and cannot use in any case. "No, that costs too much," to what is beyond the family's means.

He learns too, not to touch things that do not belong to him. An experienced mother gives him something to hold while she does the shopping—and that prevents his handling things.

There are other places where children must not pick up what they see nor touch it. A mother takes a child to call on friends. There are cookies on a plate on the table. Some children who have not been trained in this particular will help themselves to cookies without an invitation. If there are attractive things within their reach they will handle them; much to the distress of their owners. This has spoiled many a friendship.

MOTHERS ARE ONLY PEOPLE on every hand their duties, among them the training of the children. This matter of handling things, taking what is handy, is an important matter that must be attended to early in the child's life, the earlier the better.

Little children do not know it is wrong to take things, but they must be taught the meaning of personal possession. How to deal with a child who is in this stage is discussed by Dr. F. P. 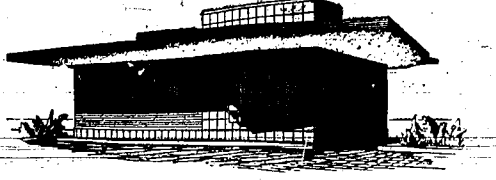
