Screwball Excuses - Civil aeronautics Administrator F. B. Leo says absent-mindedness caused many of the 3,000 small-plane accidents investigated by CAA last year. To prove his point he released some of the excuses pilots have given for their accidents.

Then there was the case of the pilot trying to sell an amphibious aircraft. During the demonstration flight, over water, the pilot-alesman was hit by a wave, and the pilot of the plane as he came in for a sea landing. "The descent was normal," the pilot reported later. "Then the plane turned over. We climbed out on the wings and discovered the wheels in the down position."

JEROME, Feb. 3.—Mrs. Dick Overfield, public health nurse, reports that no report is available on the number of chest X-rays taken in Jerome county in the recent tuberculosis case finding survey.

Mrs. Overfield did report, however, that 1411 skin tests were taken in the west end of the county and that 820 chest X-rays were taken of junior and senior high school children.

The tests made in the schools brought some reactions and X-rays were taken of these children and their family doctors were informed.

Mrs. Overfield explained that 14 children at Washington school, 25 at Lincoln school and one preschool child in the Lincoln school area showed reactions.

Five children showed reactions at Appleton school as well as one preschool child and one Idaho One preschool child at Canyonside and one school child at Pleasant Plains showed positive. During the tests in the east end of the county four children in both Hazelton and Eden showed reactions.

Mrs. Overfield said any child who was absent from school when the tests were made and any preschool children, who did not have the test should be brought to her office in the courthouse, and the skin tests will be given.

She further explained that the X-ray mobile unit will return to Jerome, Feb. 15 for the convenience of those who were ill or out of town when it was here before. Mrs. Overfield urges all those who did not have chest X-rays taken during January to be sure and visit the mobile unit when it returns on Feb. 15.

According to a break-down of President Eisenhower's proposed 1935 budget of 62.4 billion dollars, Mr. I. A. Taxpayer must pay an estimated \$330.00 for himself and every member of his family next year.

Senator Sees No Letup in Tension

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Feb. 3.—Sen. Henry Dworshak, R. Ind., yesterday told a Lincoln-McKinley dinner audience he foresees no letup in far east tension.

Dworshak said he believes the congressional vote on the defense of Formosa showed "complete faith and confidence of congress" in President Eisenhower.

"It is inevitable we shall have trouble in the weeks ahead... probably years," he said.

Dworshak said he believes that foreign aid can be cut without impairing foreign relations and that the number of federal employes can be reduced.

Long the second-largest item on the budget, interest on the 274-billion-dollar debt will cost the government \$5,378,000,000 in 1935. This state's per capita federal tax burden of \$43.37 for 1934 is by far the lowest of the four northwestern states. Washington's per capita tax liability for 1934 is \$43.33; Oregon's is \$42.74; Montana's is \$41.61.

Of the "big five" items on the budget, four are lower for 1935 than for 1934. Veterans affairs, however, are up in 1935, increasing from \$4,431,000,000 in 1934 to \$4,840,000,000 in 1935. The 1934 bill is \$450-million department. For Mr. I. A. Taxpayer is \$25.94.

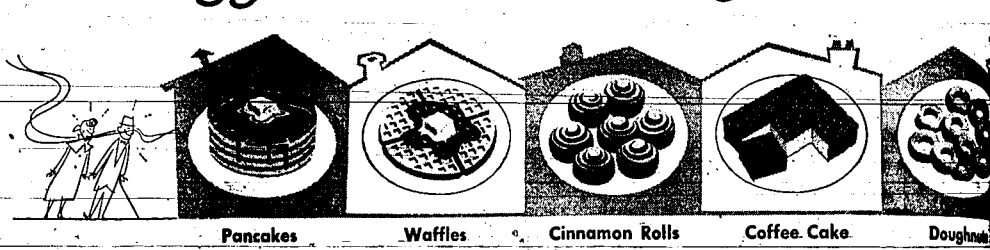

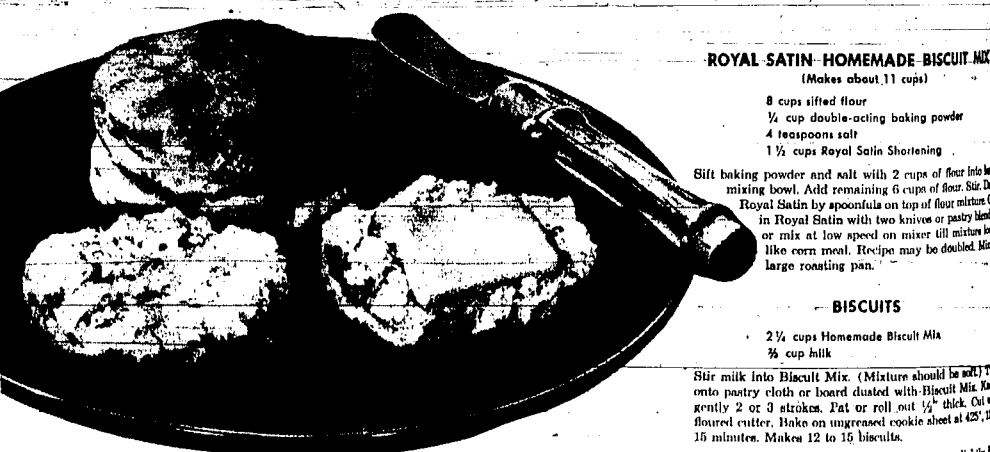

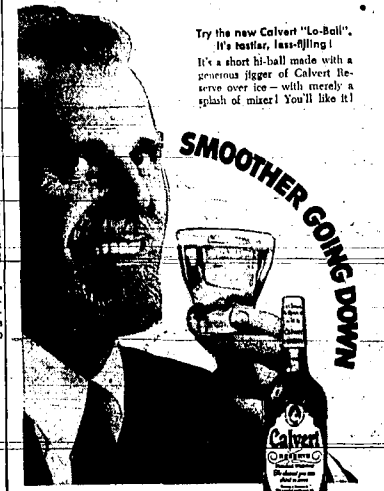

Organization Has 1 Purpose: To Have Woman President

NEW YORK, Feb. 3—An organization called "Woman for President" has been quietly boring from within for 19 years, unknown to most men and, for that matter, to most women.
Its headquarters is here in New York. Its aim is to put a woman in the White House. Not right away, but eventually.
"Woman for President" has been pretty inactive recently but is serious about smouldering. It is a nervous organization.
Activities declined during World War II after a brisk pre-war start and set of the comfortable rule of woful thinking during the post-war era. But a few determined women saw that the Manhattan phone book kept a listing of "Woman for President and Other Public Offices."
The organization plans to hold a national convention here this spring. "Small minorities well organized have captured governments," Miss Lillian Rock, national chairman of the organization, said. "Here is a different thing. More than half the nation would be represented."
"We interrupted, 'Maybe,' we said hesitantly, 'some women would rather have a man President.'"
"Maybe some men would rather have a woman President—too?" Miss Rock answered promptly.
"Women are born executives. They have to be so mothers and as managers of a household. How many times have you heard a man say, 'Mak the minkus'?"
The organization has no special woman in mind, though Miss Rock said it must be a woman trained as an executive and a leader, ideally from business, professional or educational fields.
"I think we'll start with a woman for vice president," Miss Rock said thoughtfully. "If you work, think they could. The idea of our organization isn't to get a woman in the White House immediately."

Is Reinstated
LOS ANGELES, Feb. 3—The air force has announced its F-100 Super Sabre fighter, grounded since Nov. 11, will return to active flying status plane by plane as modifications are made in its tail and control system.

The young soldier was stricken with bulbar ppolio just before Thanksgiving while on duty as a mail clerk in Manila. He was flown to San Francisco for treatment. The Andersons arrived here late yesterday after a two-day drive from Pocatello.

Mother Comments
"He looks pretty good," his mother said. "Thin, but pretty good. They say he's coming along fine."
Mrs. Anderson, weary from the long trip, said she and her husband had not had a chance to talk with the doctors.
"But the nurses say he's very cheerful," she said. "He knows it will take time and he's willing to do what's asked."

Waiting
Mrs. Anderson said she had not seen her son for over a year and a half. "We couldn't go over and we've just been waiting until he came home."
"It hurt us deeply," she said, "this polio, especially because he's the father of two babies."
Mrs. Anderson was very nervous for the shock of seeing her son in an iron lung, but it still hurt. We wrote him we were coming. We didn't want him to be surprised when we arrived."

Notified of Disease
Mrs. Anderson and her husband had been notified about their son's disease the day following his leaving.

Young Anderson's 21-year-old wife, Jacqueline, followed her husband's emergency flight from Manila and has been with him daily since he arrived at Letterman Jan. 25. They have a boy and a girl, Brett Allen, 2 1/2, and Richa Dean, 1-year-old.
The polio victim's wife is the former Jacqueline Montgomery of Pocatello.

Testimony at Trial Wrong, Ex-Red Says

NEW YORK, Feb. 3 (AP)—Former Communist Harry Matuzow claims today he gave the testimony in Owen Lattimore case for false charges against fast expert Owen Lattimore was false.

He said he was not in the testimony before the senate internal security committee of writing books that carried the official communist line.
"Actually I had no knowledge of that," Matuzow said in an interview. He said he had also given false information to the senate committee at the time McCarthy's senate permanent investigations subcommittee was checking into alleged communist writings in U. S. overseas libraries.

Matuzow said he told McCarthy many books were communist-inspired when they were not communist books at all.
Shortly after he made the statement Matuzow was subpoenaed to appear before a federal grand jury today to explain recent statements he has made regarding false testimony.

Lattimore has been indicted twice on charges of perjury before the internal security committee. McCarthy charges in the first indictment were dismissed by Federal Judge Luther Youngdahl. Two counts of a second indictment were eliminated by Youngdahl on Jan. 18.

Lattimore, a professor at Johns Hopkins university, is an expert on far eastern affairs and a former member of the state department. He has consistently denied any communist connections.
Matuzow said he "sacrificed the reputation of others to satisfy my own ends."
"I didn't care what happened to Owen Lattimore or the others," he said. "I only cared what happened to me."
Matuzow said on Monday that his testimony in the trial of 13 convicted second string communists was false. He charged that Roy Cohn, former assistant U. S. attorney and legal aid to McCarthy, had told him what to say.
The convicted communists filed a motion for a new trial on the basis of Matuzow's Monday statement.

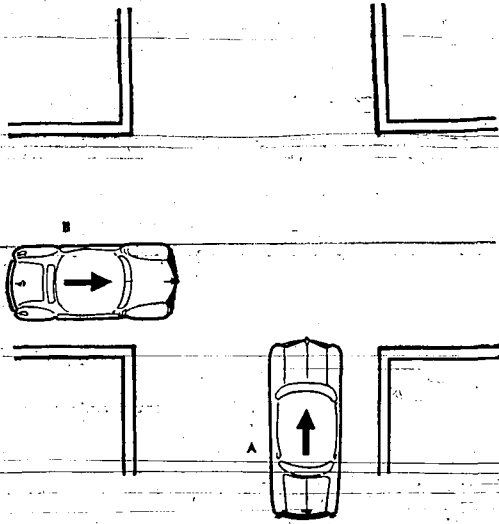

Intersections Are Called Most Hazardous Areas for Mishaps

The intersection, whether on the highway or within the city limits, is beyond a doubt the most dangerous spot as far as traffic accidents are concerned.
According to police figures, more accidents occur at intersections than anywhere else. Inside the city, 60 per cent of all accidents occur at street crossings.
Police Chief Howard Gillette says many of these accidents are the result of ignorance on the part of drivers. "They just don't know who has the right-of-way when they get to a corner," he says.
"This is especially so in the case of the traffic code. It is written in simple terms who has the right-of-way and it's purely a matter of not knowing the letter of law that causes confusion."
The chief continues by citing as

an example the many Twin Falls drivers who are under the impression that the avenues have the right-of-way and that vehicles being driven along the streets have to stop for them. "This, of course, is untrue," he says. "The law does not distinguish between streets and avenues as such, one is as important as the other as far as the question of right-of-way is concerned."
The accompanying illustration clarifies one of the many questions related to the right-of-way problem. It should be self-explanatory that vehicle "A" must allow vehicle "B" to cross first.

Pork Is Rated Buy of Week In Meat Markets

Pork looks like one of your best bets for week-end shopping in the nation's food stores.
Lots of pork will be widely featured, with reductions of as much as eight cents a pound from week-end prices. As usual, pork chops will come down with the hams. Smoked picnic, smoked ham and spareribs also will be featured in some stores.
In some stores, beef prices will be down slightly from week-end levels. Various cuts will be featured. Items mentioned by a number of stores are: beef and special "meat" cuts of beef, chuck roast and round steak.

Lamb About Same
Leg of lamb prices are holding about the same and meat men consider them a pretty good buy.
In the fish line, haddock filets are a favorite with many markets. Egg prices still show an upward tendency. Butter is little changed over-all.

Vegetable Buys Named
There's not much change in the best buys in vegetables: Potatoes, onions, old-crop cabbage (Danish type) and turnips continue to be recommended to thrifty shoppers. New cabbage is rated as a good buy and that includes the domestic type as well as red and savoy cabbage. Also on the good buy are chopped carrots, cucumbers and red and green bell peppers.
Spinach and tomatoes are considered moderately priced. Among vegetables going higher during the week in the wholesale markets were squash, celery, cucumbers, and root parsley.
Avocados and limes are good buys in fruit and produce men also give the nod to tangerines, grapefruit, oranges and apples.

Pears Cited
There are good supplies of d'anjou pears in the markets at moderate prices. Marketing is about at a peak now and produce experts say prices are about as high as they'll get.

Good News for Persons With Hay Fever: Anti-Dust Device

CHICAGO, Feb. 3 (AP)—Richard R. Cook's office hasn't been dusted in weeks. And he's proud of it.
Cook, president of an electronics firm, has developed a gadget which he believes will be a boon to housewives and hay fever sufferers.
It takes dust and pollen out of the air.
Cook, a grey-haired executive who works in his shirt sleeves, has one of the machines in his own office in a sooty factory neighborhood near the railroad tracks.
"There isn't a speck of dust around. And the cleaning woman hasn't been in here in weeks," he said. "She might come in once a month."
Cook has a more elaborate gadget installed in his home in suburban Evanston. It's hooked up to the warm air heating system, and it keeps the whole house dust free, he said.
His wife hasn't had the curtains cleaned in the three years since he installed the unit, he said.
"And we haven't had to do any decorating either."
Cook, an engineer by trade, began experimenting with the anti-dust device because his wife and three of his four children are afflicted with hay fever.
"We used to spend a lot of money on trips, to get away from the pollen," Cook said. "Now we find it unnecessary."
Cook's device filters dust from the air electrostatically. A fan blows the air through silica and a series of eight aluminum plates. The plates are alternately charged, one positive and the next negative.
"The magnetic field thus set up catches the dust to adhere to the plates," Cook began tinkering with the

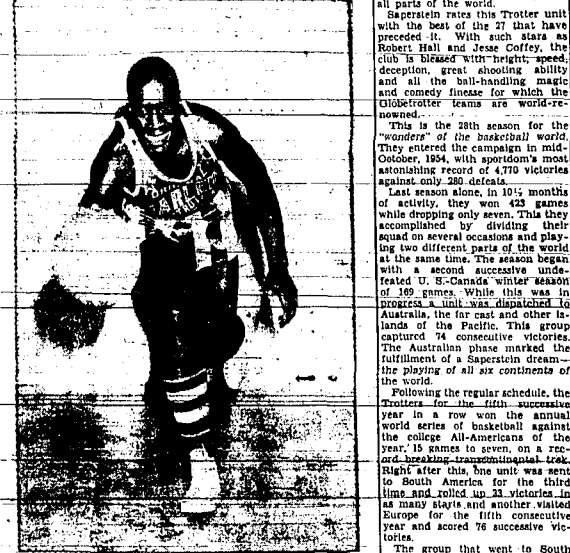

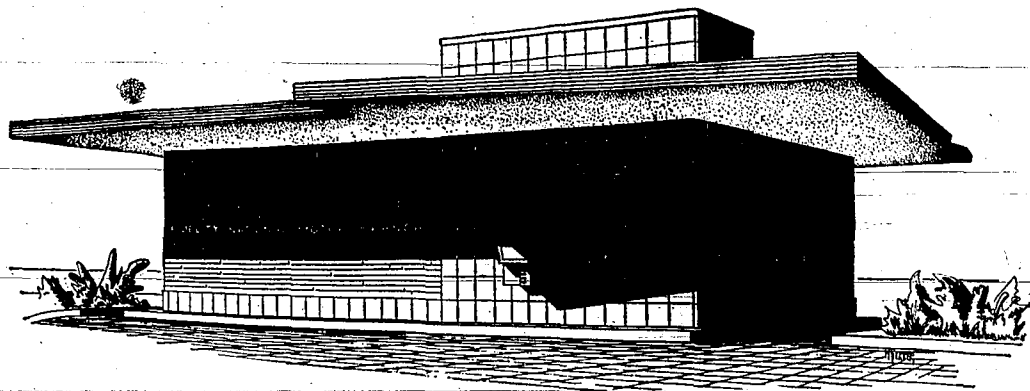

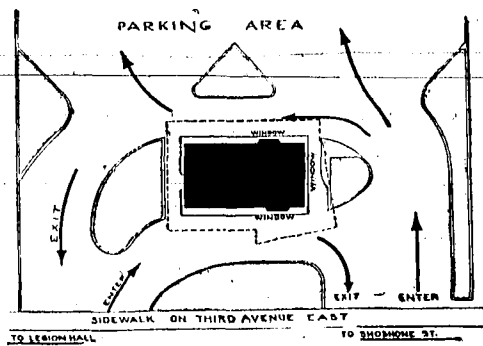

Traffic Safety Drive Joined By Postoffice

Twin Falls postoffice has joined the national safety council's safe driver award program, announced Mr. W. Frantz, local postmaster.

Every postal employee who drives regularly as part of his daily assignment as a contractor, or privately owned motor vehicle on of ficial business for at least six weeks during a 12-month period is eligible to participate in the safe driver award program, explains Frantz.

The program excludes drivers employed as contractors, individuals who work for the postoffice during the holiday season, vacations and other short periods also are excluded from the program.

Safe driver award winners will receive a gold lapel pin emblem and a wallet size card both inscribed with the number of years the recipient has driven without an accident. The cards and pins will be issued to drivers who complete 12 months of accident-free driving.

The program marks another major step in the postal department's safety and health program, declares Frantz.

The national fleet safety contest provides a means for entering in competition with other motor vehicle drivers throughout the country. Postoffice department participation will be on a regional basis, says Frantz.

Drivers with past two accident records will be given every consideration in this new program, he reports.

New Red, White, Blue Truck Is Added for Postoffice Here

Something new has been added to the postoffice.

A 1954 Dodge panel truck being used for special deliveries and emergency postal work.

What sets the one-half ton truck apart from the postoffice's other two delivery trucks is that the vehicle is equipped with a right hand drive.

Features of the truck include convenience of making curb pickup and deliveries and safety to the driver. The driver is now able to leave the truck on the curb side rather than climbing out on the traffic side.

The new unit is painted red, white and blue which will be the eventual color combination on all postoffice vehicles, reports W. W. Frantz, postmaster.

Truck equipment includes all modern safety devices including direction signals. "It has everything built-in," says Frantz.

The right hand drive truck has been tested in other areas and has been found satisfactory and it is expected all postoffice trucks will ultimately be of the right hand drive type, says Frantz.

He also reported the new truck will be used for making special deliveries which will eliminate the use of a privately owned vehicle as has been the practice since 1945.

Democrat Farm Chiefs Begin Repeal Fight on Flexible Plan

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3 (AP)—Democratic farm leaders in the House yesterday launched their organized attempt to repeal the Eisenhower administration's flexible farm program and restore rigid high price supports for five basic crops.

It looked like an uphill fight. There was little prospect the bill could be pushed through congress before next year. If then, more supporters conceded in advance of combat's muster enough votes to over-ride—a possible presidential veto.

Nevertheless, Chairman Harold D. Cooley moved to "start the ball on the road to early house action by calling the house agriculture committee to a closed meeting to consider it."

The North Carolina Democrat told a reporter he would "suggest" that the committee agree to vote on the measure soon without public hearings. He said he wouldn't need that plan, if many members objected. Objection seemed certain. Republican members—a private Republican member—agreed to insist on at least brief hearings.

The issue is whether to restore mandatory price supports of 90 per cent of parity for wheat, cotton, corn, peanuts and rice which prevailed until this year. Parity is a legal standard for measuring farm prices in relation to prices farmers must pay for things they buy.

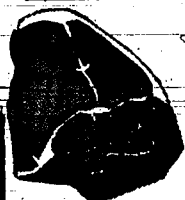

The U. S. seventh fleet is operating in the vicinity of Okinawa, so if the communists want to land on the Ryukyu Islands, they will have to get past the boys in blue first.

If Chinese bombers come out from their main base at Chungking, Okinawa, they will be met by Saboteurs who constantly patrol these islands.

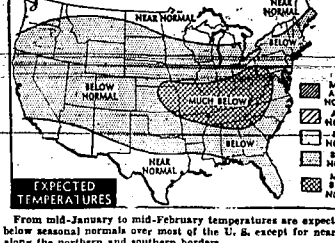
