Problem Solved for Growers Unit
 SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 5—The domestic sugar industry is being denied the annual increase in the growth of this country, according to a statement made today by Frank A. Kemp, president of the Great Western Sugar company, in an address before the California Sugar Beet Growers Association.

The California Association is holding its annual meeting at the St. Francis hotel. The Great Western Sugar company, with headquarters in Denver, is the largest beet-sugar manufacturing company in the United States.

With his plea for an amendment of the sugar act to give relief to the domestic sugar industry, Kemp said: "But make no mistake about it, we owe, and the country owes, sincere and determined allegiance to the broad principles of the existing sugar program. It has been, as President Eisenhower declared last year, in a straight jacket as it cannot increase its sales of sugar as the country increases its consumption."

Kemp pointed out that under the present act the domestic industry is in a straight jacket as it cannot increase its sales of sugar as the country increases its consumption. According to Kemp, all of this increase goes to Cuba and other foreign sugar producers.

"From 1949 when the present quotas were enacted, to 1954, the sugar market in this country increased about 1,050,000 tons. Except for 175,000 tons ceded to Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands in 1951, every ounce of increase has gone to Cuba and other foreign suppliers. Under the law as changed, every ounce of all future increase in demand will further swell the foreign share."

"At the same time, the domestic cane and beet areas, cut back in acreage, denied the right to improve a yield except by future acreage restrictions, plagued by above stocks in warehouse, look limply over the fence and wonder if growth is good for Cuba, should it not also be recognized to be good for California, and Idaho, and Colorado, and Louisiana."

Kemp accused certain Cuban interests of exerting every possible means to influence sentiment in

Speaker Says Domestic Sugar Industry Denied Right to Share in U. S. Growth

The United States in their favor. He called their methods an "unprovoked aggression."

"It is strikingly evident," said Kemp, "that there are many important influences at work behind the sugar scene and on the sugar stage. This is especially true in the case of the large Wall Street-Cubaiana syndicate which has propagated a new twist to the trade perspective and the desire to enhance profits on that investment would bring the conflict with domestic interests."

Kemp pointed out that terms of the present sugar act prevent the growth of the beet sugar industry in this country, which is in contrast with the development of this industry in other countries. He said sugar production in Cuba was 74 per cent greater in 1953 than in 1928. Great Britain increased her beet sugar production from 1928 to 1953, 44 per cent. Holland, 111 per cent. France, 90 per cent. Mexico, between the same years, increased her cane sugar production 149 per cent. Dominican Republic, 45 per cent. Brazil, 109 per cent; Australia, 52 per cent.

"The simple fact is, the rest of the world supported its domestic industry. Nothing is said by Cuba about these competitive increases by other countries, but cries arise to the high heavens at the slightest suggestion that some hope is to be held out to the American industry."

Kemp stated that the sugar yield between the same years, increased in the beet areas about 20 per cent since the pre-war period. Acreages from 1934 plantings have been cut back 10 per cent for the area as a whole, and some states have been forced to curtail their acreage by 13 per cent.

California growers were commended by Kemp on their production record set last year. He stated no acreage of equal size in the world ever attained so great a yield of beets or sugar per acre. This was credited by Kemp to improvement in farming methods, application of new skills and adoption of scientific research findings.

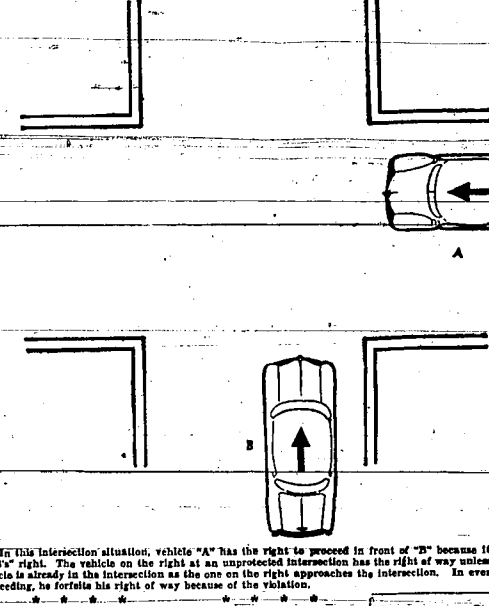

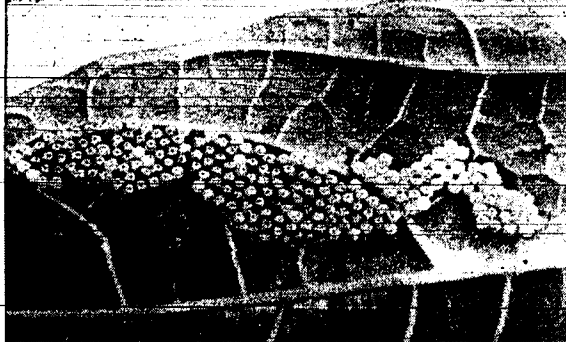

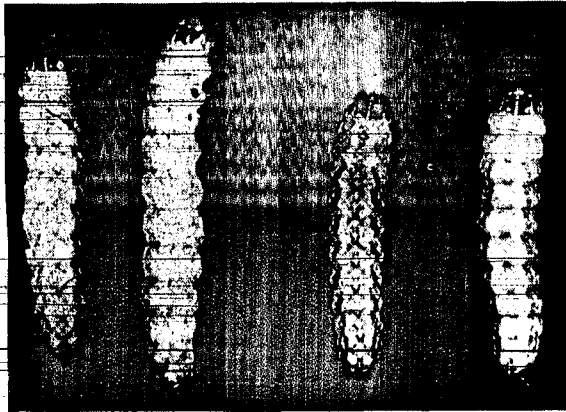
Western Bean Cutworm Threat Develops for Magic Valley Crops



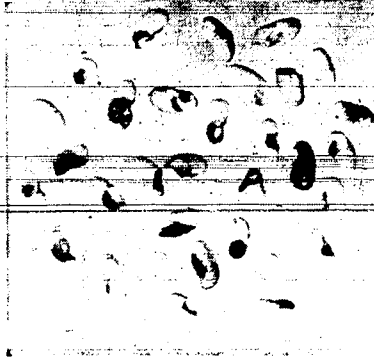
Western bean cutworms bored holes in these beans during feeding, thus cutting down the yield and ruining the quality of the beans.



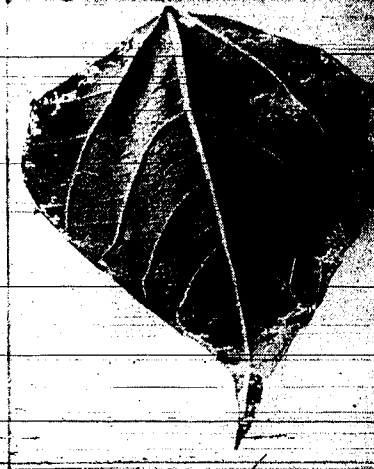
Clusters of eggs are laid on under side of bean leaves. After eating egg covering, larvae start feeding on leaves.

These eggs hatch in about a week and the young eat the egg shells before feeding on leaves, buds and flowers. When they have reached a one-half-inch length, they start feeding on the developing beans through feeding holes in the bean pods. Brown said the worms in the bean plants at time of combining are picked up with plants and may be trucked into warehouses where they are often found mixed with beans. Worm holes reduce the yield, lower the grade and restrict the sale of beans from infested areas.

Brown pointed out that beans for culinary purposes must be marketed before they can be marketed. Thus the cost of manual labor is so prohibitive that the market sales price of the bean removes Magic Valley production from competition with other areas where the pestiferous does not occur.

Jerome Area Feeder Tour Earns Praise

JEROME, Feb. 1.—"A highly profitable tour" was the comment of County Agent Virgil B. Cross following the Jerome county feeder tour Thursday. Cross said 219 persons attended the day's activities.

During the morning visit to the various sections of the county, E. Rinehart, extension animal husbandman, commended Cleo Ambrose on his feeding operation. Ambrose is not feeding pulp, slices of potatoes but is using hay, grain and molasses.

Discussion Held

Following lunch at the Jerome Grange hall, Cross was moderator of a panel discussion on various subjects. Charles F. Sierk, head of the animal husbandry department at the University of Idaho, talked on the use of alfalfa. Sierk explained that when fed the proper amounts to larger cattle, 700 pounds and over, the extra gave increased gains for a short period of time.

Also speaking on the panel was Henry Wood, who said that feed chaff talk on the cost of feeding cattle up to the grade of choice.

Hay Diseases

Rinehart stressed the value of alfalfa hay, stating that it is still the cheapest and best feed for cattle. His figures showed that 800 pounds could be fed each year for every acre of pasture.

Donald Nutsch spoke on selection by keeping cattle comfortable with dry warm beds, windbreaks and providing heated water for drinking.

The tour starts at 10 a.m. from the courthouse at Shoeshone, with the farm of Duane Aslett, four and one-half miles east, and one-half mile north of Dietrich to be visited at 10:30 a.m. At 11 a.m. the farm of Floyd Kaling, one and one-half miles west of Dietrich, will be visited, and a recess for lunch will be held from 12 to 1 p.m.

The tour will leave the courthouse at 1 p.m. and visit the Sanford Conner farm, five miles north and three miles east of Shoeshone, at 1:30 p.m. At 2 p.m. the group will visit the Oscar Steiner farm, five miles north, three miles east and one and one-quarter miles north of Shoeshone, with a 2:30 p.m. visit scheduled for the farm of Charles Bendleton, six miles north and one-half mile west of Shoeshone.

At 3 p.m. the tour will visit the William Koryak home, five miles north of Shoeshone, and at 3:30 p.m. the home of Howard Hill, four miles north, one mile west and one mile north of Shoeshone.

Various types of cattle, feed rations and equipment will be observed, Fred Koh, county agent, announces. Anyone interested is invited to join the tour.

Emphasis Slated on Childrens' Teeth As Dental Health Week Opens Monday

The 1935 National Children's Dental Health week, designed to bring public attention to the proper care of the teeth, will be observed here from Monday through Sunday.

Sponsored here by the Idaho southcentral district of the American Dental association, the annual observance is under direction of Dr. Donald E. Bonius, Twin Falls.

Dr. Bonius said that the dental health week is particularly planned to draw attention to four basic rules for sound dental health for children: early detection and treatment of dental ill; and routine consumption of fluoridated water or, in the absence of fluoridated water supply, the application of fluorides directly to the child's teeth.

Estimating that 90 to 95 per cent of the population is afflicted with dental decay, Dr. Bonius said dentists believe the most effective solution to the nation's dental disease problem is instilling proper health habits during a child's early life.

"Sugar is the arch enemy of your child's teeth," Dr. Bonius said, "it has been established beyond doubt that sugar-rich foods and beverages are the greatest enemy of dental care."

Dr. Bonius estimated that Americans eat about 100 pounds of sugar annually, or about three times more than is required for good nutrition.

To combat tooth decay, Dr. Bonius said, the association is urging parents to substitute nuts, popcorn, potato chips, cheese and fresh fruits for candy bars, soft drinks, pies, cookies and cakes.

According to Dr. Bonius, the dental and medical professions recommended that school premises not be sweetened beverages. Dentists and physicians are opposed to excessive sugar in the diet because it saps the appetite while adding little to nutrition, and because it is stored up in the body in the form of fat.

Dr. Bonius said proper use of the toothbrush is more important to dental health than the use of any one type of toothpaste or toothpowder. Their teeth should be brushed immediately after eating, especially after sticky sweets; the upper teeth should be brushed downward and the lower teeth should be brushed upward. The chewing surfaces should also be cleaned as well as the inside surfaces facing the tongue.

Regarding the controversial issue of fluoridation, Dr. Bonius noted virtually every health and scientific aid in the nation now recommends a large-scale fluoridation program for the prevention of dental decay.

In the absence of fluoridation, Dr. Bonius stated, the association recommends the application of fluoride solution directly to the child's teeth. To be effective, the applications are recommended to begin when the child is three. It is said they will reduce dental decay by an average of 40 per cent.

President of the southcentral district dental association is Dr. F. E. Carpenter, Twin Falls. Dr. B. J. Hawkins, Twin Falls, is secretary-treasurer.

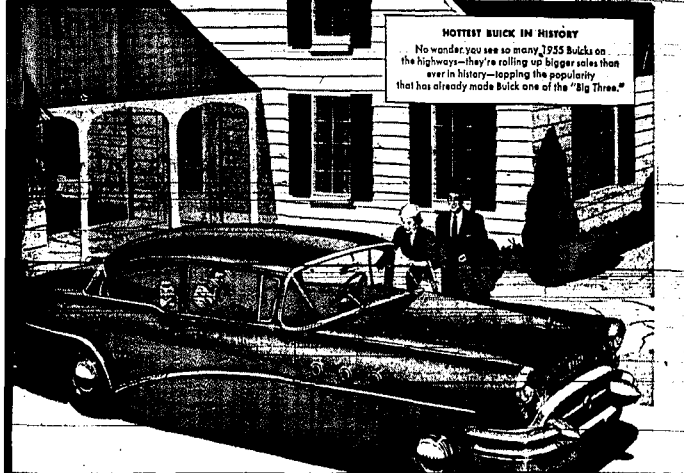

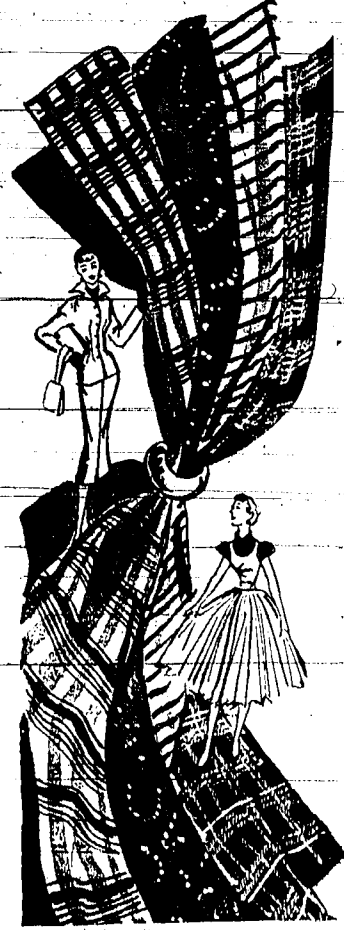

Eskimo Scout Outfit Patrols Alaskan Area

FT. RICHARDSON, Alaska, Feb. 5.—Within the icy ring of the Arctic circle, where a white man freezes to death in his own sweat, Eskimo scouts in muklat parkas are on guard 24 hours a day against any threatening sign from Soviet soldiers across the Bering Strait.

Most unique and colorful military outfit in the world, its crest is a Blue Thunderbird on a silver shield and the motto is "with you on guard."

Northland Natives Serve

These are the natives of the northland who slay the polar bear, hunt seals and walrus for food and trap mink, ermine and wolverine.

"They are as sturdy and impervious to cold as the manatees that pull their sleds and they can follow an invisible trail for 100 miles across trackless ice as easily as a white-tailed American can follow route 66 in his automobile."

Here at Ft. Richardson, a few miles from Anchorage, a handful of earnest young GI's, most of them sergeants, have the duty of schooling the young Eskimos to be the non-coms of the Eskimo scouts.

About 1,200 Men

The Eskimo scout outfit is composed of two battalions, about 1,200 men in all, one covering the northern territory bordering on the Arctic ocean and the other assigned to the west along the coast of the Bering Strait some 70 miles from Russia's Chukotka peninsula.

The scout units are scattered among the native villages. Some may have only one scout, others may be as large as a platoon or two in all. This series of village units forms a rough semicircle around the "critical" coasts of Alaska making a chain of trained civilian soldier groups to keep a watch on what the "other side" may be doing.

Officially, in army terminology, the mission of the Eskimo scouts is to "keep constant surveillance of waters and northwestern coastal areas, to report rapidly all information of a military nature, assist in emergency missions and to augment certain activities of the U. S. army relative to the development of Arctic clothing, survival and tactics."

Reenlistment Is Large

The scouts have a reenlistment average of better than 75 per cent. The sergeants in the villages can hardly wait until they are old enough to join up and once they do you couldn't blast them out with TNT.

The men who do the most active job in intelligence work in the Eskimo scouts are the boys of How company, first scout battalion, stationed on Little Diomedes Island in the middle of the Bering Strait between Alaska and Siberia.

These 18 men are closer to the Russians than any other American army unit in the northern hemisphere.

Just three miles away across the International line separating U. S. and Soviet territory is Big Diomedes Island, garrisoned by the 16th Air Division of the Soviet Union.

The Eskimo scouts on Little Diomedes and the Soviet unit on Big Diomedes watch each other like strange bulldogs separated by a glass fence.

The Little Diomedes scouts have a powerful telescope and a binocular can't see the nose on the other side of that three miles of ice without the U. S. army knowing about it.

Cuban Sugar Men Balk at Quota Boosts

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5 (Special)—Cuban sugar producers already have begun their campaign to forestall an increase in domestic sugar quotas at offshore expense, Sen. Henry C. Dworshak reports.

Apparently alarmed at efforts by senators and congressmen from both sides to raise sugar quotas in being urged by the Cuban interests have begun a write-in campaign to Congress.

Dworshak has received letters from Sherlock Davis and Thomas Blake, United States Cuban Sugar Council officials, protesting the Idahoan's stand for a large domestic share of increased U. S. sugar consumption.

The present sugar act, passed in 1948 and several times amended, provides that increases in U. S. sugar consumption be filled by offshore producers.

Dworshak more than once has attacked the provision as "unfair" to U. S. beet and cane sugar producers and joined in a delegation to the White House last week to urge new and more equitable legislation.

The Cuban Sugar Council wrote Dworshak that "Cuba is never less than the sixth largest gross importer of the product of American farms and factories."

This, the council argues, entitles Cuba to greater consideration than the proposed new legislation would permit.

"The question is much broader than it looks at first glance," says the council.

"From a defense angle," it argues, "the United States must depend in an emergency upon Cuba for increased supplies of sugar."

"Reducing the quota for Cuba," says the council, "would make it more difficult to obtain immediate increases in event of another emergency."

In defense of the domestic producer's position, Dworshak says simply, "No one contemplates cutting the Cuban sugar quota. All we want to see is that our domestic producers get a fair share of the steadily increasing U. S. sugar consumption."

"As it stands now," says Dworshak, "offshore producers get virtually all of that increased consumption, and it is simply not fair."

As to the other arguments advanced by Cuba, Dworshak says: "While the offshore interests naturally would do everything possible to maintain their share of this country, the lot of multinationals guards circulation."

"I have not seen the legislation sponsored by sugar producers but I am informed that it is intended to deprive Cuba of her share of the increased consumption."

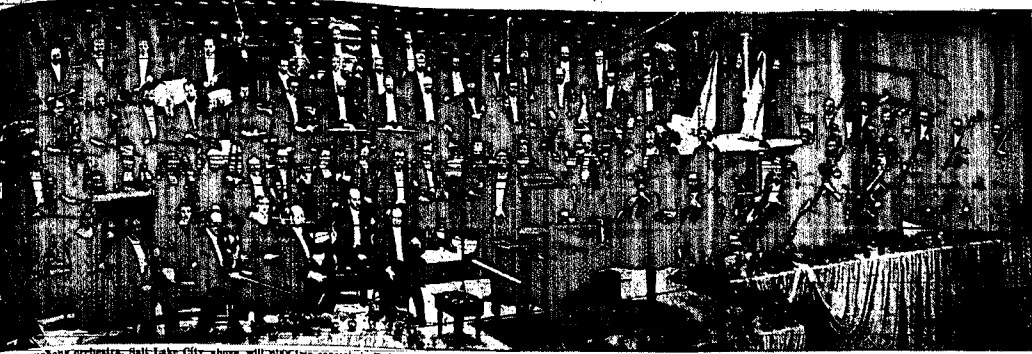
