Lonely Ghosts Haunt Spanish Plaza Where One Circus Died

MANZANARES, Spain, Feb. 8 (AP)—There is a ghost haunting a vacant lot in Manzanares—the ghost of a circus.

The circus is buried there. Unlike most circuses that come to town, this one never moved on. It came to the end of the asphalt trail.

Eighteen months ago the circus paraded in. It had a brass band and acrobats and clowns. It had lions and bears and monkeys and a elephant.

The children all thought it was only a splendid circus. But the circus had fallen on hard times. Not enough people were coming to the big top. The owner did not have enough money to pay the performers, and a clown does not feel much like clowning on an empty stomach.

The 35 performers decided they could go on no longer. They left the circus, one by one, and went off to get jobs that paid well.

Everybody left except a dwarf named Francis. He could not bear to desert the animals. But there was not much he could do. The elephant got so hungry it ate the thatched roof off its stable and died of stomach trouble.

The polar bear escaped but came back hungry to his cage. Francis borrowed some meat to keep him going but he finally died.

Other animals escaped and were shot by hunters. Some of them died of disease.

Finally Francis told them goodbye and went off to the poor house. He had no other choice.

The children of Manzanares were sad. Even their mothers and fathers were sad. They had never seen a circus die before. They fed the bears and the monkey their leftovers and wondered what to do.

Then an organization in Madrid called "The International Society for the Acclimation of Wild Animals" heard about the circus, or what was left of it. The society sent a man to Manzanares to have a look. He said he would try to find someone to buy the animals.

But no one wanted them. They were thin, and sick-looking. A newspaper in Madrid spoke out.

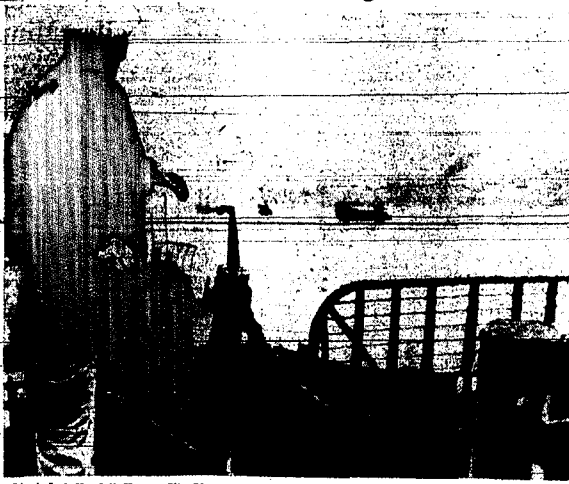

Report Given By Scouts on "Good Turns"

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—President Eisenhower received from the Boy Scouts of America yesterday a report on their "good turns" last year in arousing interest in national conservation.

Twelve youths called at the White House to present to President Eisenhower the report to the nation. They were given signed certificates by the President for their work.

The final presentation was in connection with Boy Scout week, which began Sunday. Forty-five years ago the scout organization was incorporated in the capital.

The scouts gave the President a health-bound report on efforts in 1953 to arouse public recognition of the need for adequate protection and wise management of your soil, water, air, forest, game and wildlife resources. Mr. Eisenhower had requested the national conservation theme as the Boy Scout's "good turn" last year.

The group was headed by John M. Schiff, Oyster, N. Y., National Boy Scout President, and Dr. Arthur A. Schuck, Short Hills, N. J., chief scout executive.

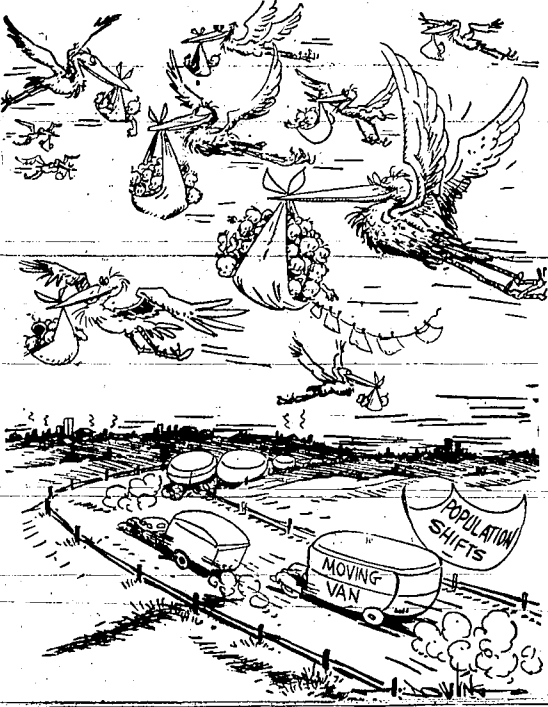
"In the past, good turns which started in 1912, few if any have attracted the interest and long-term participation in the national conservation good turn," the report said.

It cited a total of 41,721 projects in soil and water conservation, 3,173 forestry projects, 29,323 in fish and wildlife conservation and 39,450 activities in eliminating litter, highways, parks, rivers and streams.

"In an effort to arouse public recognition," the report stated, "we have sponsored public exhibits and demonstrations, gave 56,678 talks at public gatherings on conservation; and distributed more than three million posters."

The scouts expressed appreciation to the agriculture and interior departments who have done so much to help us in program planning, program promotion, and in actual program operation."

POPULATION SHIFTS MOVING VAN

48-Hour Pulpit Sermon Made By Preacher

WEST RICHLAND, Wash., Feb. 9.—Preacher Clinton Loy claimed a new record for the longest sermon ever delivered yesterday after 48 hours and 18 minutes of preaching.

"I would like to try again should anyone better his mark."

The 68-year-old dean of the Vnaul Bible Training center entered the pulpit at 12:01 a.m. (PST) Sunday and concluded his sermon at 12:19 p.m. (PST) today, observers said he was a "good albat" despite his marathon sermon.

During that time he completed the Old Testament, covered most of the New Testament, sang hymns and lectured on the holy land while sipping lemon juice at six-hour intervals.

Estimates Words

"I estimate I delivered from 160,000 to 170,000 words during the course of the sermon," Loy said. "If anyone had sat through the entire sermon they would have heard so much gospel as they'd get in a year at church."

Loy had originally intended to stop at the 48-hour mark. He delivered a portion of the sermon during a dust storm which stung his eyes and throat and at one time was forced to preach by candle light.

"Straight lemon juice kept me going," said Loy.

Audience Varied

His audience varied from 1 to 50 persons. One member of his congregation sat up all Sunday night listening to the preacher.

Loy said a former teacher of his, Dr. A. F. Putter, once gave a 24-hour sermon when he was dean of the Holy Land Bible Knowledge society at Los Angeles and that was the former record for a continuous sermon from the pulpit.

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Prevention of Suicides Told By Policeman

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 8.—A California highway patrolman who figures he has helped prevent more than 200 suicides on the Golden Gate bridge said today the way to do it is to "break their train of thought."

Once he even threatened to shoot a would-be jumper. The man came down.

"Each one is a different problem and has to be handled differently," said Patrolman James A. Morgan. "But the one thing that always works is distracting the person from his purpose."

Veteran of Work

Morgan, 43, is a veteran of 18 years with the California highway department. He has worked in a patrol car out of the Golden Gate bridge office for the past 10 years, and blocking suicide attempts is part of the routine.

Official records show that about 185 persons have taken a fatal 270-foot plunge from the world's longest suspension bridge into San Francisco bay since 1937, when the bridge was opened. Morgan believes the figure is too low.

"If there is any doubt about a case it isn't listed in the records," he said. "I've seen more than a hundred go over the side myself."

See Definite Failures

Morgan believes there is a definite pattern in Golden Gate suicides. Most of them occur between 11 p.m. and 3 a.m. The weather usually has been depressing. And, seriously, it is more than likely "3 days on either side of the wane of the moon."

From his bridge-rail observations Morgan has concluded more men than women try to dive off the bridge and domestic trouble is the most common motive behind the attempt. This is followed by financial woes and illness.

"If you can distract them somehow from what they're trying to do you can usually save them," he said.

Movies to Return To Valley Village

Hunting Dogs Are Proving Scourge of Bobcat Population Around South Hills

The bobcat and cougar hunting dogs of Warwick (Bud) Bennett, Jr. are ready to go hunting anytime. Since Christmas, Hawk, part bloodhound and part black and tan, and Sunday, part black and tan and part red tick, have been in on the kill of eight bobcats.

Hawk and Sunday are 3 years old and Bennett says they won't be in their prime until they are 5.

Bennett has been hunting bobcats and cougars in Magic Valley for the past six years. He is ready to discuss dogs and hunting but not hunting areas, naturally. The biggest bobcat he has taken this season weighed 41 pounds and was killed in Rock creek canyon on Jan. 2.

Two weeks ago Hawk was bitten severely in the neck by a bobcat. He jumped the cat as it was mauling Sunday and the enraged cat turned and sank its teeth in the dog's jugular vein. Bennett finished the cat with a shot from a 22 automatic pistol and then seized Hawk and applied pressure below the puncture in the dog's neck.

"After about 15 minutes the blood stopped. I brought Hawk to town and took him to the veterinarian. There was a large lump where the blood had coagulated but other than that the dog was okay," Bennett said.

The following week-end Hawk was back in the field trailing bobcats as eager as ever, Bennett added.

Bennett hunts along with Teal Beebold and Bob Smith, both Twin Falls.

"I had two fine dogs several years ago and was asked to sell them so I set a price so high I figured the fellow wouldn't buy. He surprised me by taking me up on the deal," Bennett says.

Bennett says it takes three or four years to train a dog so he will stick to a bobcat or cougar trail and not go off tracking deer or other animals.

"It isn't every dog that will make a good trail dog. Hawk has been in many fights and has had his ears chewed but he goes back for more every time," Bennett said.

Mrs. Bennett says she is partial to Sunday and Bennett admits Sunday is a fine hunting dog, too. However, he favors Hawk.

Bennett and his hunting companions follow their dogs on foot.

"There are too many places a bobcat or cougar can go where a horse can't," he explained.

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Tuberculosis May Be Beat By New Mold
 ATLANTA, Feb. 9 (AP)—Man's conqueror over tuberculosis, the once-dreaded "white plague," moved an important step toward victory with discovery of a new antibiotic drug that has produced impressive improvements in severe cases of pulmonary TB, it was announced today. The important medical disclosure was made at a conference of army, navy and veterans administration doctors and administrators. "The new drug is known as cyclosporin and will be sold under the trade name of Seromycin. It is the soil-mold product of the same type as streptomycin, another drug that has proved highly effective in treatment of tuberculosis. Medical science in recent years has been making deep inroads against the ravages of TB, a disease that took 104,414 lives per 100,000 population in the United States in 1950. Up to now, rest has been the No. 1 treatment. Streptomycin has been the drug used in the country since its discovery several years ago in Europe, Africa and India a drug known as BCO has gained prominence in the anti-TB fight."

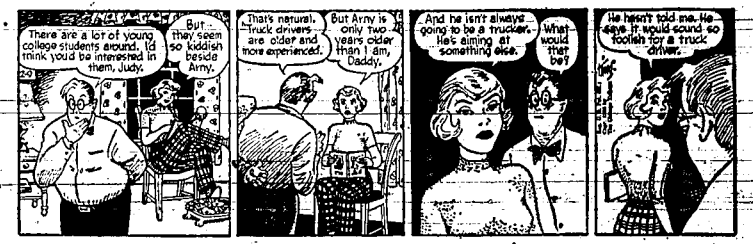

Odd Mansion, Built by Fear; Goes on Sale

HILLSBOROUGH, Calif., Feb. 9.—The house that fear built rose on the auction block today.

In his heyday, gambler Sam Termini's sprawling, bizarre mansion will go to the highest bidder at a sheriff's sale.

The six-year house in this exclusive residential community was built by Termini in his heyday as owner of the plush Cal-Neva club at Lake Tahoe. It was to be a "model" 335,000 home when the original plans were through testing in 1954.

Terrini's agents began investigating the gambler's finances when they learned he had paid \$220,000 in cash on the plush Cal-Neva club with his syndicate income.

Termini went to McNeill, Idaho federal attorney to serve a three-year term for income tax evasion and lost Cal-Neva. The government's claims against him amount to \$300,000 and he still owes contractor Frank S. Marshall of Redwood City \$117,000, which interest at \$100,000 to \$125,000 "but no more."

Since Termini lived in constant fear of being assassinated, he allowed only his most trusted associates to visit him, his wife and their one child when he was making Hillsborough his home.

Open to Public—But for the past few days the blockade type gates guarding the house have been opened to the public for the first time. Visitors have been gazing in amazement at the \$200,000 imported habitation of marble, the radiant heated terraces and the unique electronic system that permitted the frightened Termini to overhear conversation in any room in the house from any other room.

The fence surrounding the house was electronically sensitized so any shadow falling on it would energize a battery of flood lights. But this became too much—even for Termini—when cats crawling on the fence caused him to be awakened three times in one night by the glare of the protective lights. An electric eye system ringed the house on the inside of the fence.

The hordes of sightseers milling through the house and yard have laughed at all these precautions. But many have called it a crying shame that Mrs. Termini had such a fondness for green paint.

Grain Is Covered—The woodwork of the interior is of expensive Philippine mahogany but some of its grain could be seen. Mrs. Termini covered it with lifeless shades of her favorite green.

Termini's favorite room was reported to be the wine cellar—with its armor plate door. But it's said he never fell safe even there.

As one visitor was heard to say: "He probably was relieved to go to McNeill."

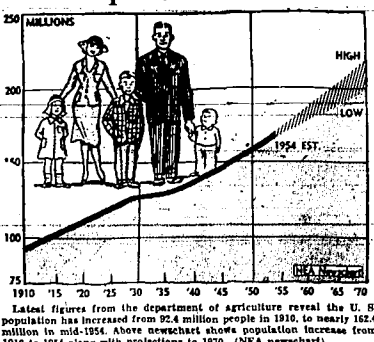
Church's Leader Extends His Visit

He outlined the structure of the prospective department at the annual meeting of the Petroleum Retailers of Greater Idaho.

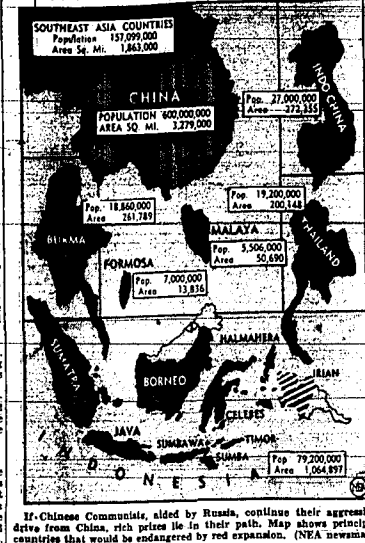
The department should have a seven-man council to advise on industrial development and a seven-man publicity council, both headed by one commissioner who would be responsible for over-all planning, Smylie said.

Plants Can Be Used to Detect Uranium Lode

TUCSON, Ariz., Feb. 9.—Plants can be more accurate than Geiger counters in pointing out the hiding places of America's uranium.

Dr. Edwin S. Kurie, University of Arizona botanist, says this does not mean prospectors can throw away their tools and find mines by plucking twigs and leaves—although it has been done.

Used to Outline—So far, trees and shrubs don't tell as much as drilling. But one uranium deposit has been spotted by a suspected "plant" can outline the deposit and eliminate costly drilling.

"The Geiger counter only tests the top few feet of soil," Dr. Kurie explains. "Plant roots go down to 40 feet, and in some cases more than 100 feet. The roots carry traces of uranium to the leaves of the plant. By testing the leaves, it is possible to determine the presence, extent and depth of deposits."

Not Foolproof—Plant prospecting isn't foolproof. But research is making it more accurate, cheaper, and may soon bring it within reach of mineral hunters working on showings.

The atomic energy commission has given the Arizona school a \$5,200 grant. This extends until September the project. Kurie has been working on a year and a half. Kurie says it has been known for a century that plants take up copper, gold, zinc, selenium and other inorganic minerals from the ground. Little was done with this knowledge.

School Curbs Told by Solon

BOISE, Feb. 9 (AP)—Rep. Clarence Kimpson, R. Cluster, said yesterday two bills introduced in the senate will curtail the taxing authority of county-commissioners.

Kimpson, superintendent of schools at Challis, referred in a prepared statement to bills requiring the levying of taxes in dollars instead of mills and restricting levy to an amount five per cent greater than that of the 1957-58 fiscal year.

"In addition," Kimpson said, "these bills grant to owners of real estate—and this class only—the right to approve any increase in property tax revenue over that amount."

He called the bill "a veiled attempt to subject school budgets, as well as budgets of other taxing units, to the abuse of political controls."

Gets New Post

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9 (AP)—Lieut. Gen. Anthony C. McAuliffe, an old artilleryman who won fame with one word at World War II fighting man, today was formally nominated to his new post as commander of the U. S. army in Europe.

President Eisenhower named McAuliffe's name to the senate for approval.
