442 Sixth Graders Bring Problems to Packed Twin Falls Junior High School

"If only the 442 sixth grade students currently housed in the junior high school could be returned to the elementary schools, they would rightly belong, we would have an adequate junior high school in Twin Falls, the new high school building, middle-class above the nation's average, would be a fine addition to the city system no longer had room for them. With the completion of the new high school building, rooms were vacated and the sixth graders took over that part of the junior high building previously occupied by the high school."

Mrs. O'Leary says that part of the building was opened in 1912 while the present junior high school section was completed in 1918. "The building is old, the access, but considering the rather desperate situation in the city system, we feel the sixth graders don't belong with many sixth graders to come."

The fact that the sixth graders are in the junior high school presents several advantages over the elementary schools. By being in the same building as the junior high students they are in a position to take advantage of some of the facilities now existing in the elementary schools.

As an example, Mrs. O'Leary cites the fact that the sixth graders have ten days a week in the school's gymnasium which was modeled for that purpose from an old high school shop. She also mentions that the sixth graders are allowed to use the school's library facilities, which include a periodical room.

Idaho Power Asks FCC to Okay Project

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (AP)—The Idaho Power company, seeking government approval to build three dams on the Snake river between Idaho and Oregon, yesterday asked the Federal Communications Commission to approve the project.

The company, which is controlled by the Public Service Company of Idaho, is asking the FCC to approve the project because it is necessary for the company to build a power line to carry the power from the dams to the city of Boise.

The project would involve the construction of three dams on the Snake river, each about 100 feet high. The dams would be built on the river between Idaho and Oregon.

Snow Depth in Jackson Lake Drainage Is Lowest for Years

In only three of the last 35 years has there been less snow on the Jackson lake watershed, the forest service, soil conservation service and the bureau of reclamation announced following a snow survey on Feb. 1. The three years in which there was less snow were 1931, 1940 and 1944. Whether or not Jackson lake fills this year depends on the amount of precipitation for the balance of the storming season, the report continued. A weather forecast by Irving P. Kirsh and staff, Denver, included in the report, give "colder than usual weather" for Idaho during February with "precipitation about normal although slight excesses will occur in the easternmost portions of the state." Water content in the snow on the watershed is a little less than 62 per cent of normal, the report shows. Contents range from 74 per cent of normal on Fall river to 55 per cent of normal on Aster creek on the Snake river drainage. Fall river now has 68 inches of snow with a water content of 18.4 inches. The snow last year had a water content of 22.4 inches and the average content is 21.2 inches. Aster creek has 40 inches of snow with a water content of 10.7 inches. The snow last year had 23.4 inches of water and the average is 19 inches. Water content in the snow on the Grey river drainage is 72 per cent of normal. The report shows 24 inches of snow with a water content of 5.5 inches. At this time last year the snow had 91 inches of water while the normal water content is 7.6 inches. Teton pass and Snake line measuring stations on the Teton river have 51 and 25 inches of snow, respectively. Water content in the former is 68 per cent of normal and the latter is 67 per cent. Snow at Teton pass has a water content of 15.8 inches compared to 20.7 inches last year and 22.8 inches normally. Snake line has 5.6 inches of water compared to 7.9 inches last year and an average of 9.3 inches. Turpin Meadows, Four-mile Meadows, Black Rock and Two-wolves pass, all measuring stations on the Snake river, have 21, 25, 35, and 47 inches of snow, respectively. The water content for these measurements are 57 per cent, 64 per cent, 62 per cent and 60 per cent of normal. Snow at Turpin Meadows has 39 inches of water compared to 7.9 inches last year and an average of 6.8 inches. Snow at Four-mile Meadows has 5.3 inches of water compared to 8.0 inches last year and an average of 8.3. Black Rock has 7.8

In some instances, the reductions will be around six cents a pound. Frying chicken prices are lower in many areas this week, too. Meat men rate pork as an especially good buy. The American Meat Institute reports that retail pork prices have reached their lowest levels in two years.

"The declines have run across the board on various pork items," the institute says. "Pork loin roast dropped an average of nearly six cents a pound in just the last week and now is selling in Chicago stores at 18 cents a pound less than a year ago. Tenderloin cut, too, is declining 6 1/2 cents in the last week, are averaging 12 cents below a year ago, while sliced bacon is 23 cents a pound lower."

Sausage Declines
The institute adds that pork sausage meat has declined 25 per cent since last February, smoked picnics have come down 18 per cent and whole ham 16 per cent.

Lamb prices don't show much change from a week ago, but legs of lamb will be widely featured for week-end dinners.

Some stores are going to have turkeys at lower prices. There also will be occasional specials on shoulders of roast.

Egg Prices Hit
Egg prices are moving up again. A major chain is hiking prices in all its stores by from two to four cents a dozen.

"Potatoes, onions and cabbage are considered the outstanding buys in vegetables this week. Cabbage also may be had in iceberg lettuce, bunched and topped carrot, endive, escarole, small to medium-size peppers and rhubarb."

Some Good
The quality of green beans is said to be only last year's generally speaking. Among vegetables going up in price at the wholesale level this week were corn, cucumbers, eggplants and cauliflower.

Florida strawberries are arriving in good volume in eastern markets and produce men say the price is reasonable. Other worthwhile buys are oranges, grapefruit, tangerines and apples. The Delicious type apple gets the favored rating.

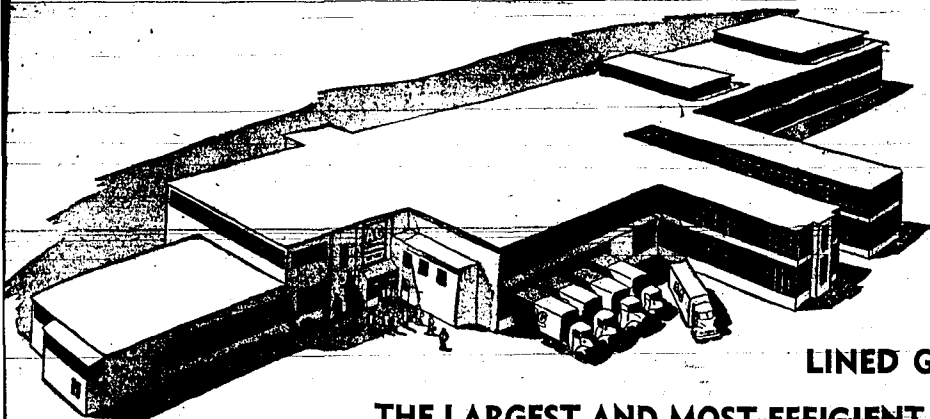

"Religious groups have an important part in the Radio Free Europe schedule," the Rev. Mr. Mully said. "Live broadcasts direct from churches with nationality congregations as well as studio broadcasts for Catholic, Protestant and Jewish faiths are included.

"A special program titled 'Pleading Church' is presented regularly to help parents in captive countries install religious values in their children and maintain their own faith and worship in an atheistic state. The program features prominent church leaders in exile who speak to their people, bringing them hope for the future, and constructive advice for the present."

The "Freedom week" from Lincoln's birthday to Washington's birthday marks a drive for funds to help keep Radio Free Europe in operation. Business houses and fraternal and service organizations are cooperating in the drive.

College Band 'Sorry' About Panty Affairs

DENVER, Feb. 10 (AP)—Members of the Kappa Sigma fraternity at Denver university said today they were "terribly sorry" they stood a sorry "gig" on "panty" night when a sister of their fraternity emblem on her panties.

"It was all in the nature of good fun," one Kappa Sigma member said, "and we described the incident as a 'spontaneous' and said there wasn't any real rough stuff."

The incident with Kappa Sigma's crest and star emblem on her panties wasn't identified. But Kappa Sigma members agreed to pay for her damaged clothing.

Tells Details

Allwyn (Skip) Pirie, second vice president of the fraternity and captain of the university's golf team, said the panty incident occurred because someone had stolen Kappa Sigma's symbol and a memorial plaque.

He said the missing symbol, which was becoming a campus joke and "it was important to us to get it back."

Fraternity members heard that Alpha Chi Omega sorority members knew something about the missing items. They lured 10 girls from the sorority house to the Sigma Kappa fraternity house with sandwiches and asked them to stand trial before a kangaroo court.

Girls "Convicted"

The girls, according to Pirie, were "convicted" and sentenced to have the stolen symbol painted on their foreheads.

"It was all in the nature of good fun," he said, "and the girls weren't complaining when the kangaroo court found them guilty."

But after several of the girls had the symbol painted on their foreheads, he said, the sentencing got out of hand when the unidentified head was stood on her head and the symbol painted on her panties.

Rescue Followed

The girls left the fraternity house unescorted. The inter-fraternity council ruled Kappa Sigma used "inexcusable bad taste" and put the fraternity under rigorous restrictions for the remainder of the school year. All campus and social functions for Kappa Sigma were ordered canceled. Kappa Sigma officers were told to resign by tonight. The fraternity was ordered to publish a written apology to each of the girls involved.

The Alpha Chi Omega sorority house members said "it started as fun, but the boys just went too far. The girls are pretty unhappy with the Kappa Sigmas."

Ambulance Driver Cleared in Deaths

LEWISTON, Feb. 10 (AP)—A coroner's jury yesterday cleared Ronald Colcord, 30, the driver of an ambulance, of negligence in a high speed collision Saturday which resulted in the death of a boy and girl.

The incident was the result of the death of Larry Cox, 6, killed when he ran through the windshield of a truck under the overturned ambulance. New Jersey Prosecuting Attorney Wynne Biles said the incident also covered the death of a 16-year-old baby after who was driving the car. The girl, Paddy Lou Rowland, died of injuries Monday night.

Benson Planning Caribbean Jaunt

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson said yesterday he plans to tour the Caribbean area covering much the same territory now being visited by Vice President Richard Nixon.

Plans call for him to leave Feb. 10. He will visit Puerto Rico; St. Croix; Trinidad; Caracas, Venezuela; Bogota, Colombia; Panama City; Costa Rica; Nicaragua, and Mexico City.

Parliament Votes On Death Rulings

LONDON, Feb. 10 (AP)—The cabinet last night authorized conservative members of parliament to vote as they wish on the issue of whether to attempt to abolish capital punishment in Britain.

A laborite motion proposes suspension of the death penalty for a five-year trial period. A similar attempt in 1948 was approved by the house of commons but was rejected by the house of lords.

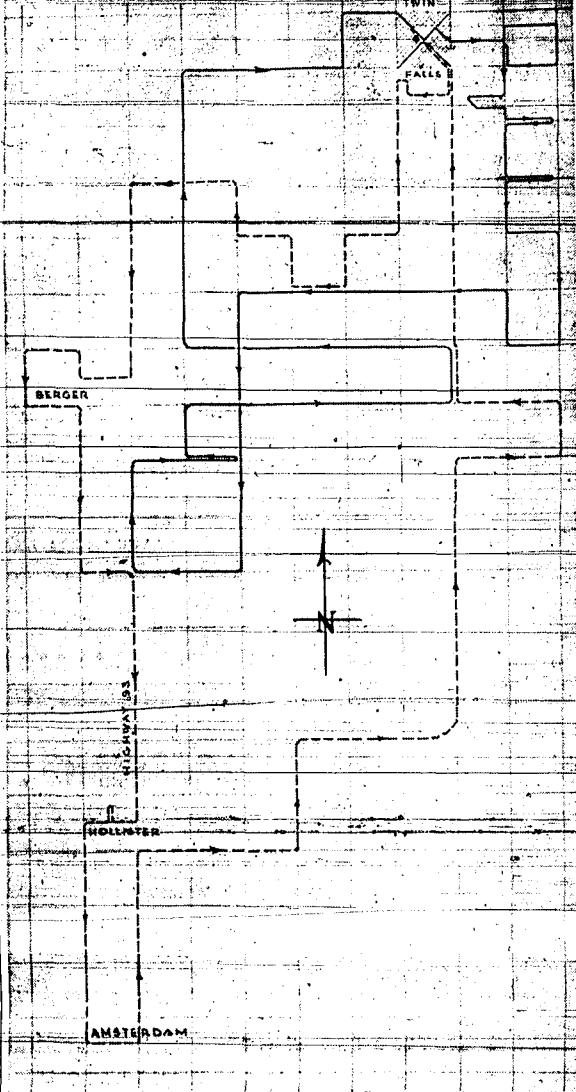

T.F. Routes to Expand When Hollister Postoffice Ends Service on March 1

When the Hollister postoffice is discontinued effective March 1, people presently receiving mail through Hollister will be served by the Twin Falls postoffice, says Postmaster W. W. Francis.

Some changes will be necessary in routes 1 and 2, Francis says. The routes as shown on accompanying map will be effective March 1. The Hollister and Amsterdam areas become part of Twin Falls route No. 1. Clyde Ross is carrier on route 1. Some changes will be made in Dwight Shaw's route No. 2 because of additions to route 1.

For some postal patrons, the change will mean switching mailboxes to the other side of the road. And some residents along route No. 1 will have to erect mailboxes. All mailboxes along the routes should be up by Feb. 29, Francis notes.

Francis says postal inspectors should erect mailboxes should be three and one-half feet off the ground for the small boxes and three feet, two inches from the bottom of the box to the ground for the large boxes. They must have the names of owners clearly visible on the side of the box. And mailboxes should be installed on the right side of the carrier's line of travel so he does not have to cross the road.

Any postal patron desiring additional information can obtain it from Francis, Mrs. N. Byrnes, president Hollister postmistress, or at Henstock's station in Hollister, Francis says.

Robot Worker Used to Speed Up Production

HARVARD, Ill., Feb. 10 (AP)—Robots are running production lines here with little pause for a coffee break.

They are ushering in the "age of automation" as plants of one-of-the-large television manufacturers.

The robots are at work here on TV sets and clock radios, and they do their jobs with speed and accuracy no human being could match. But now and then a robot gets its foot and a human being gets to straighten it out.

Do Work Fast

Twenty-three robots on the TV line in 44 compact plants into a TV chassis board in about 3 1/2 minutes. A completed board forms about half a television chassis.

The robots can turn out 250 boards an hour or 2,000 in an eight-hour day.

Powered by compressed air and controlled by electronics, the robots work in unison although each performs a different task. They miss as their compressed air is released, then they stamp their assigned parts into position.

Save All Day

It's that way all day long, his stamp, his stamp.

The robots don't look like their comic strip counterparts. They have no hands or feet. They are automatically controlled stamping machines.

"Master" Controls

At the head of the line is a "master brain," an electronic system that controls all of the "heads."

It works like this: The heads know how many people the robots have "replaced." Production has increased so much since the robots were installed here last July that the human working force has doubled.

And the human workers have to hustle to keep pace with the robots.

Churchill Asked To Meet Premier

LONDON, Feb. 10 (AP)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill goes to face the house of commons today to face a debate demanding that he attend an immediate conference with new Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin.

The socialists challenged the premier to invite Bulganin to a "joint discussion on the solution of outstanding international problems" at the very onset of the new Russian regime.

There was no assurance Churchill would answer the laborites questions when commons meets but he summoned his cabinet to an unexpected two-hour session last night.

The cabinet session came almost immediately after news dispatches were received from Moscow telling of Bulganin's tough first speech to the supreme soviet and appointment of Marshal Georgi Zhukov as defense minister.

Killed Financier Had Movie Plans

NEW YORK, Feb. 10 (AP)—A west coast associate said yesterday that Serge Rubenstein was setting up a two million dollar movie company when he was slain.

The company, according to Milton M. Golden, Los Angeles attorney, was to be known as Mid-City Picture corporation, and was to produce TV films in Germany and a full-length movie in Indonesia.

Golden was to have been president and Rubenstein chairman of Mid-City's board.

French Housing Nears Start Of Huge National Emergency

PARIS, Feb. 10 (AP)—So you think you have a housing problem. Well, take a look around France.

More than two million French families live in houses built before the battle of Waterloo (1815).

Another 176,000 families live in houses built under the reign of Francis I (1515-1547).

Only one-third of the 20 million rural population of France live in homes with running water.

An estimated 180,000 Parisians live in dwellings officially declared "unfit for habitation." They have no running water, no toilets, no gas, no electricity.

Another 2,000 Parisians have no homes at all. They sleep on subway gratings which throw up a continuous trail of dirt and water.

These facts are a startling reality behind the elegant boulevards, restaurants and fashion houses of Paris.

Thanks to the foresight of Napoleon III, Paris still ranks as the most beautiful city in the world. But Paris has reeled on its laurels too long. The average age of its buildings is 63 years. In the provinces of France the average age of buildings is 120 years.

As far as building is concerned, France is the best of the worst. For every seven housing units built in France since World War II, Germany has built 21 and the United States 24.

A report to the national assembly on the housing problem says France ranks 15th among modern nations in building activity. Why?

Frenchmen, according to economists, spend too much money for food. They lavish 60 per cent of their income on it. They just aren't willing to cut down food bills to pay more rent.

The government froze rents after 1945 in an effort to keep down the cost of living. But food prices were allowed to soar. Landlords with fixed-rent apartments say they can't afford repairs, much less new buildings.

Most Government buildings were built: "Twenty-five per cent of the population who are looking for shelter are without homes."

Newlyweds "dream home" and "government housing" are not available. They have to live in "shacks" while they wait for their homes.

It may take years to get their homes.

Negroes Hide To Avoid Big Moving Plans

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, Feb. 10 (AP)—Many Negro families scheduled to be moved from Johannesburg's white district into a settlement 12 miles from town have gone into hiding, it was disclosed today.

The unprecedented program under the government policy of apartheid—racial segregation—calls for the removal of 60,000 natives from their community of Sophiatown to a new government community at Meadowlands.

Stated for Saturday

The mass operation was scheduled for Saturday, but 2,000 heavily-armed police moved into the quarter yesterday and ordered 150 families to move immediately. Some 110 complied. The remainder hid with friends.

About 40 other families packed up their furniture and moved into the Sophiatown mission directed by Father Trevor Middleton and said they did not wish to move to Meadowlands. There was no immediate official reaction to this move but police warned the English-born minister to "keep moving" when he walked among the native families.

Police took other precautions and 2,000 of them armed with machine-guns stood outside the native area. A government spokesman told parliament last night he had received reports there might be armed opposition Saturday.

Trouble Anticipated

Minister of Justice C. R. Swart said senior police officials indicated that hidden explosives might be used to oppose the mass transfer of natives from their old areas which has not been limited to whites under the apartheid policy.

Swart disclosed the rumors of "brevets" or "bombs" in questions from opposition leader J. G. N. Strauss who demanded an explanation. Strauss was also present at public gatherings for a 20-day period.

The removal of the 110 families was carried out without incident. The families climbed into 75 government trucks with their cool stoves, kitchen utensils and other household belongings. Some of the natives treated the whole thing as a holiday excursion.

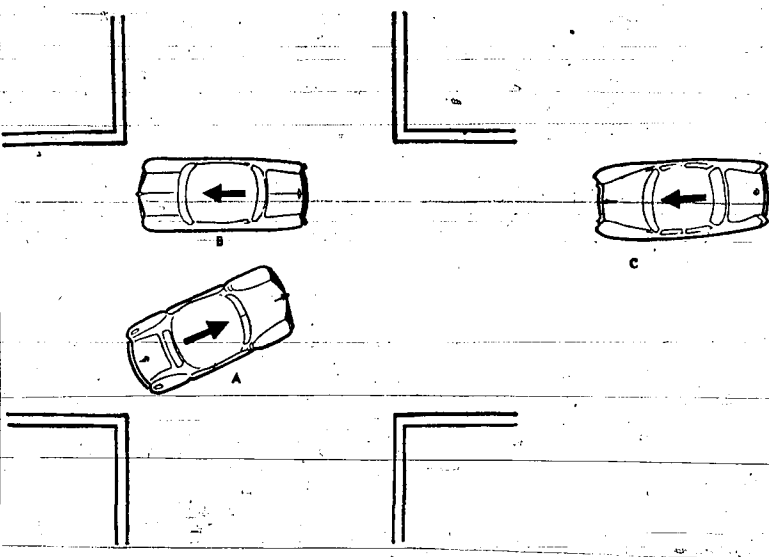
Home Area Smash

Government demolition crews sprayed the native homes with cyanide and then demolished them or burned the roofs to make them uninhabitable.

The initial move was restricted to shanty dwellers who either pay small rent or live as squatters. The movement of property and other matters will not go off as easily. The natives will be paid for confiscated homes but cannot buy property at Meadowlands.

Their existence in the European-populated Johannesburg area has been viewed as a challenge to apartheid.

Burden of Safety Rests on Driver of Car Waiting to Turn at Intersection

Prior to beginning a left turn, the drivers of turning cars must make certain they are in a position to complete their turns safely and that no oncoming vehicle constitutes a hazard, reads the Twin Falls vehicle code.

Police Chief Howard Gillette explains that no turning movement should be begun unless it can be completed without forcing oncoming traffic to stop.

If, however, a vehicle already has started its turn, the law states that oncoming autos must wait until the turn has been completed before proceeding across the intersection.

The chief warns that a large number of traffic accidents occur because both the driver of the turning and the oncoming vehicles refuse to slow down and continue to move in their respective directions, hoping the other car will stop.

"This hit and miss type of driving, taking chances and hoping the other driver won't have the intestinal fortitude to force the issue will lead to nothing but tragic results," the chief notes.

Gillette stresses the importance of "defensive driving," which means to anticipate and take precautionary measures to cope with even the unexpected and certainly illegal moves of the other drivers.

In the accompanying illustration, car "C" must yield the right of way to car "A" because it was not an immediate hazard at the time "A" began his turn. "B" however, had the right to proceed across the intersection before "A" began his turn because "B" was a hazard to his turning movement at the time he reached the intersection.

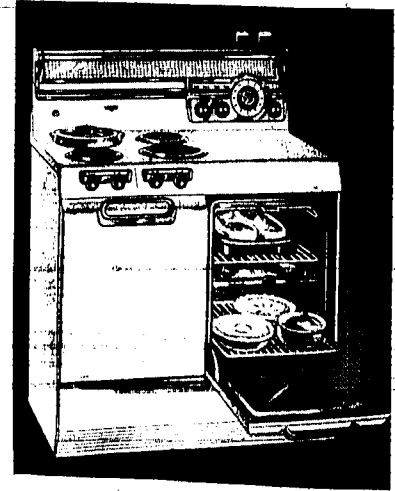

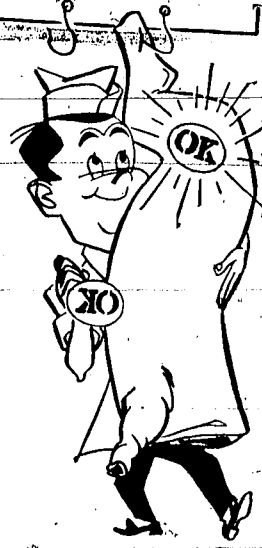

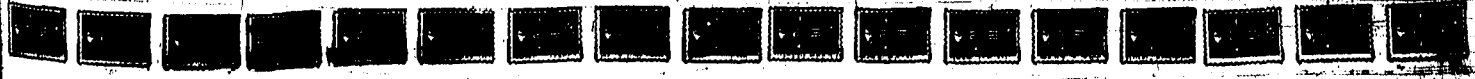

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—Monthly shots of GG—gamma globulin—help prevent attacks of asthma in asthmatic children, Dr. Ralph Bowen, Houston, Tex., said yesterday. The GG builds up more defenses against respiratory infections which make these children easy prey for asthmatic sieges, he said. GG is a blood component carrying antibodies against various types of germs and viruses. Asthmatic attacks were cut in half among 75 children getting GG compared with 75 others not given GG. Bowen said in a report to the American Academy of Allergy. Fewer of the GG children had to be hospitalized with severe asthma. The shots are given during the six months between fall and spring when colds and other infections are most common. GG is no cure-all, but seems definitely helpful when added to other protective treatment, Bowen said.

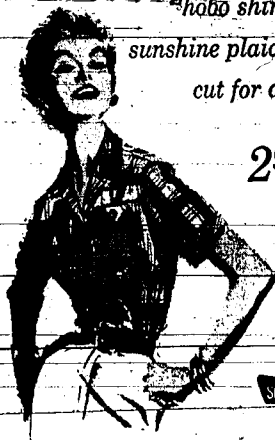
