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Budge Urges Upstream Use Of All Water

(From Page One) Budge urged a considerable amount in the occasional drought years. And other, such as the Salmon Falls tract in Twin Falls county and the Owyhee project in southwestern Idaho and southeastern Oregon are in dire and critical need.

"All such demands should, in my opinion, be fully satisfied before any water supply is committed for new lands," Budge declared.

He went on to point out favorable agricultural conditions in south Idaho and predicted greater irrigation development through full water use.

Budge noted the spread of the drought area in the southwest and pointed out it has reduced materially U. S. production of food and fiber. Progression of the drought area, for two more years or longer, will result in a serious loss of surplus, he said.

East of King Hill, Idaho, has 100,000 acre irrigated developments of 200,000 acres in need of supplemental water, he said. West of King Hill there is a potential of 783,000 acre in shortage and 557,000 acre by pumping, he added.

"It would seem that the minimum future irrigation development to be made in Idaho is not less than two million acres of new land," Budge declared.

"Now is the time to start making the necessary plans to see that all of our water is put to use, and not to prevent flood damage, and then used, as far upstream as possible, not only on the main Snake river, but on every major tributary," Budge said.

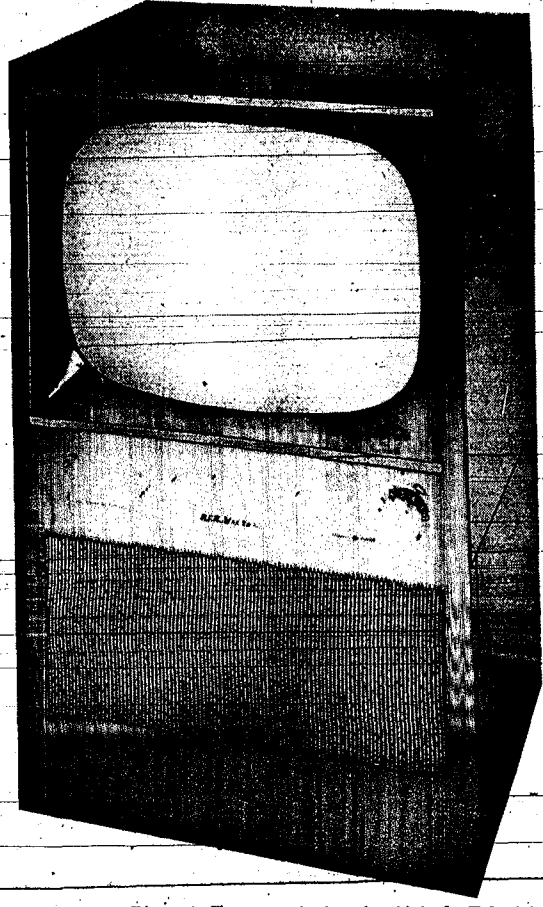

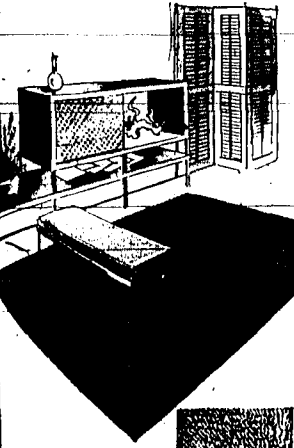

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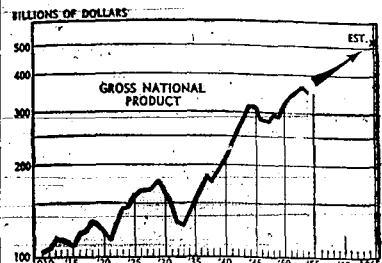

Highly Secret Meetings Held Over Sugar Quotas

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (Special)—The nation's top beet and cane sugar producers met here Friday with agriculture department officials in a highly secret attempt to work out sugar quota plans which might affect expansion of the entire domestic industry.

The meeting, asked by 50 representatives themselves, results from President Eisenhower's promise two weeks ago to senators and congressmen from sugar-producing states that he would consider changes in the domestic sugar quota. The domestic industry has long had its eye on the large share of increasing U. S. sugar consumption which up until now has been filled by offshore producers, principally Cuba.

Under the sugar act of 1948 any increase in U. S. consumption has been met 95 per cent by non-domestic sources.

The meetings, over which Under Secretary T. D. More and Assistant Secretary James A. McConnell are presiding, will be continued between the agriculture department and a committee of Washington representatives for the whole industry.

Assistant Secretary McConnell described the meeting as a "conference to iron out the disagreement which may exist" over quotas.

"So far," said McConnell, "it has been purely a hearing for the industry to present its views and to back them up with a brief."

"There is surprisingly close agreement between all industry representatives," said McConnell.

Hawaii Solons Plan Big, Gay Opening Meet

HONOLULU, T. H., Feb. 15 (AP)—The opening of the Hawaiian legislative session is traditionally a gala affair—with strumming ukuleles, hula dancing, ancient Hawaiian chants and outbursts of spontaneous entertainment intermingled with the opening day formalities. But this year, says house speaker-designate Charles E. Kaunane, the festivities will be blzier, better and more colorful than ever.

"We're going to bring back to the people the semblance of Hawaiian regime," said Kaunane, who will be the first full-blooded Hawaiian speaker since Hawaii became a territory in 1900. He said that the Democrats controlling both houses of the legislature for the first time in this traditionally Republican territory there will be a number of extras in the way of opening-day entertainments.

If it's no different from past years, there's probably nothing like it anywhere in the world. It's like a Polynesian Mardi Gras, with hundreds of people joining in the fun and trying to push their way into the tiny chambers where the Hawaiian royalty once held court.

Hawaii legislators are meeting in regular session every two years in the historic Iolani palace, a gray stone building erected in the 1850s by King Kalanikouale'ou. The house chamber was the royal throne room. The senate chamber was the state dining room. The governor's office was the royal bedroom.

Intermingled with the opening day business of organizing the houses, naming committees and other formalities, there is singing and hula dancing among the flower-decked desks of the lawmakers. It's not surprising to see a usually staid senator—his face barely visible through a stack of flower leis—break into a spontaneous hula.

Unique features seen

There are other unique features of Hawaii's legislature:

The opening and closing prayers each day are given in the Hawaiian language.

It's probably the most cosmopolitan law-making body in the world. Its members are of Caucasian, Chinese, Japanese and Hawaiian ancestry, of mixtures of these. This year, for the first time, there is a full-blooded Hawaiian legislator.

And it probably ranks high in the amount of business it handles. More than 1,000 bills were introduced in the 1932 session. One senator dropped 70 into the hopper on opening day, and he says he got 100 ready for Wednesday's opening.

Business Chief Advises Men To Take Unglamorous Labor

NEW YORK, Feb. 15 (AP)—One of the nation's highest-paid delivery boys, thinks too many young men today are trying to win success the wrong way.

"They want a glamor job—a position with a title," said Alfred L. Hammell, Hammell is the delivery boy who heads the giant Railway Express agency. Largely self-educated, although one college has conferred a doctorate in business on him, he began at the bottom 45 years ago as a freight handler.

Today the firm he directs as president has about 45,000 employees, rings up some 400 million dollars a year in making 90 million air and rail shipments to 25,000 American communities.

"It's a big mistake for young men to look only for glamor jobs," he said. "Anybody who is afraid to get his hands dirty isn't likely to go very far."

"The jobs that have the least glamor on the surface often afford you the opportunity to get the most know-how of the business you're in," Hammell got the glamor dreams out of his system young.

"At 19 I set out prospecting for gold on an old mining claim of my father's in California," he recalled. "I spent 18 months chasing a rat-hole that had no end. In that time I found \$1,000 worth of gold—but it all went for beans, bacon and dynamite."
