School Board Votes New Teachers' Pay Schedules

A new salary schedule for teachers in the Twin Falls school district was adopted Tuesday night by the board of education meeting in special session.

The salary schedule is contained on pages of a special five-mill levy to be submitted to voters in the district as soon as possible. The five-mill levy will bring the school district's levy for the general fund to the maximum amount. It is estimated the new salary schedule alone will cost an additional \$30,502 for teachers' pay next year.

The new schedule sets starting pay for all teachers \$500 per year higher than the schedule now in effect. Annual raises are cut \$16 for teachers with two and three years of training and for all others.

Low pay on the schedule, for teachers with only two years of training, is \$2,900. For teachers in that category the schedule provides annual increases of \$50 through the eighth year to a maximum of \$3,250. Teachers with three years of training would start at \$3,100 and get annual raises of \$50 to a maximum of \$3,450 in the eighth year.

Teachers with bachelor's degrees start at \$3,200 with annual increases of \$50 to a maximum of \$4,200 in the 11th year. Starting pay for five years of training is \$3,400 with annual increase of \$50 to a maximum of \$4,500 in the 11th year. Teachers with master's degrees start at \$3,500 with annual increases of \$50 to a maximum of \$4,400 in the 11th year.

All teachers get raises for next year under the schedule. Figures on the basis of the present faculty, 20 teachers, would get raises of \$88, four raises less, Salmon.

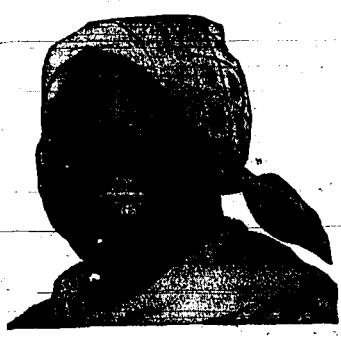

U. S. Sets Fast Clearance for Plant Worker

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 (AP)—The defense department announced plans today to give defense plant workers faster security clearances and to see that there are fewer unnecessary security checks.

Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson set up a special Pentagon office to handle clearance of industrial workers with jobs requiring knowledge of secret information. He also made public new regulations, effective April 4, to correct "deficiencies" in the present industrial security system which covers more than two million defense workers.

This development came on the heels of reports that the Justice department has decided that government employees accused of being security risks should be allowed to face their accusers. The defense department announcement did not state specifically whether the new policy would apply to defense plant employees.

Cites Number

Wilber M. Brucker, defense department general counsel, told reporters that "more than a desirable number" of defense plant workers have been suspended pending investigations under current procedures.

He said there have been about 4,000 suspensions in the past 18 months. About one-third resulted in hearings on security checks, Brucker said. He did not reveal how many were factors to their jobs or what disposition was made of the other two-thirds.

Besides unnecessary suspensions, resulting from inequality of procedure, Brucker said, there have been some cases "where the time is more than a year" before settlement.

Plan Outlined

"The revised program is designed to accelerate clearances of personnel in industry whose jobs require access to classified information," the formal announcement said. "It anticipated that centralized screening will decrease the number of employees actually suspended and thus reduce the number required to go to hearing."

Regional hearing boards, where employees suspended or denied clearance can defend themselves, will continue to function at New York, Chicago and San Francisco.

Suggested routes include Los Angeles to San Francisco, to Boise, to Laramie, to Pikes Peak; Los Angeles to San Francisco, to Twin Falls, to Salt Lake City, to Denver, to Pikes Peak; Los Angeles to Las Vegas, to Salt Lake City to Denver, to Pikes Peak, and Los Angeles to Phoenix, Ariz., to Santa Fe, N. M., to Pikes Peak.

High cow for the unit for the year was a registered Holstein owned by Archie Malone, Jerome. She produced 20,500 pounds of milk and 843.3 pounds of butterfat. Construction Report Given For City Area

Residential building in Twin Falls during January was valued at \$28,000 compared to \$27,800 in December and \$15,500 in January, 1954, according to statistics compiled by the First Security Bank of Idaho and the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company.

Although residential building increased by 88 per cent from a year ago, there was no residential building in Twin Falls during January, 1955. In January, 1954, non-residential building was valued at \$44,000. In December, it was valued at \$22,850.

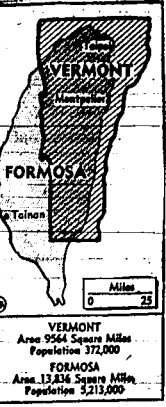
Total authorized construction in Twin Falls during January, 1955, represented by 11 building permits, was valued at \$36,840, which was 78 per cent below January, 1954. In December, 1954, the total was \$75,740. Alterations and repairs in January, 1955, were valued at \$60,000. In January, 1954, \$23,250, and in December, 1954, \$23,220.

In Idaho's six major cities, Twin Falls, Boise, Idaho Falls, Lewiston, Moscow and Pocatello, building construction in January, 1955, was valued at \$10,628, a 100 per cent increase over January of last year.

A total of 228 permits was issued in the six cities during the month. Non-residential buildings were valued at \$145,700; commercial construction was valued at \$9,275, and alterations and repairs were valued at \$205,254.

According to statistics compiled by the Building Services and Loan association, Portland, total construction for 1954 in Twin Falls was estimated at \$2,100,000, an 80 per cent increase over the 1953 total of \$1,225,378. The 1954 total for Idaho was \$18,830,180, a 19 per cent increase over the 1953 total of \$15,816,885.

Federal Agency Aids Farmers In War Against Horde of Birds

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—Truck farmers in the Atlantic coastal and midwestern states are getting tired of growing sweet corn strictly for the birds. The interior department's fish and wildlife service is trying to help them find a way to beat the blackbird problem.

If you didn't realize there was a blackbird problem, that's a pretty good sign that you've never tried to grow sweet corn or other kinds of fresh vegetables for market.

Blackbirds, it seems, are connoisseurs of sweet corn. They've ravaged fields, and truck farms throughout the Atlantic coastal states and in the middle west.

A wildlife service spokesman said blackbirds exist in "tremendous populations" and "come in by the horde." Some time back, the wildlife service banded some blackbirds in Arkansas. They found the birds were coming from 25 states and four Canadian provinces. They also found the noisy birds have an uncanny knack of invading

tom. At timed intervals a firecracker explodes, scaring away the blackbirds. These devices can be bought through county agents. But they aren't cheap.

The wildlife service is trying now to come up with something that works all the time and that the average farmer can afford—particularly since farmers have more things to do than sit in a field all day with gun in hand.

One thing the government experts have found is that blackbirds have a regular travel schedule and fly in various areas and fields at certain set times. Farmers may be able to defeat the blackbirds by planting their crops a short time earlier or later than usual.

The wildlife service also is experimenting with new strains of sweet corn that are "resistant" to blackbirds. The corn "has long, tough husks that the birds are not able to get into," a spokesman said.
