### Liberal Arts Advantage Is Aired at T. F.

Advantages of the small liberal arts college as opposed to the large university is the message which President Tom E. Shearer, College of Idaho, Caldwell, is bringing to high school students in the Twin Falls area.

Many students do not realize that it is no more expensive to attend a privately endowed college than a state university. Dr. Shearer said: "Although tuition is higher, the overall costs are about the same."

Dr. Shearer explained the College of Idaho's educational and social activities are college sponsored, while in the state university the student often is required to pay for these separately.

Dr. Shearer pointed out that one of the major advantages of the small liberal arts college is its ability to give the student a more intimate relationship between the faculty and the students. At the College of Idaho, he said, the proportion of faculty to students was 1 to 7.

ORANOE, Calif., Feb. 21 (AP)—A former college professor is on his way to the other side of the world to find a snowman. He wants to bring it back alive.
