Nixon Winds up Costa Rica Visit

MAN JOSSE, Costa Rica, Feb. 23 (AP)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon wound up his two-day visit today with a luncheon at the hotel where he stayed. Nixon is scheduled to leave by plane for Panama, the eighth stop of his 17,000-mile goodwill tour of Central America and the Caribbean. An indication that Nixon would be successful in his attempts to alleviate the situation was seen yesterday by observers who saw a notice tacked to the national assembly.

Preparedness Is Order for Forces

MOBOW, Feb. 23 (AP)—Marshall George R. Shulzer, new Soviet defense minister, called on his armed forces today to stand in "constant readiness for a devastating blow" in any aggression against the Soviet Union. Last night Zhukov told a Russian television audience that the USSR has no intention of starting a world war. "It has not raised any favorable echoes on the part of the capitalist countries," he said. "This was the only true friend of the United States" which is carrying out a policy of preparation for war and propaganda.

House Rejects 'Eisenhower Bill' 31-26; Senators Vote to Keep Road Panel Intact

BOISE, Feb. 23 (AP)—The house killed 31-26 today a bill to reopen Southern Idaho College of Education at Albion with an appropriation of \$250,000. The vote came after Rep. Ray Robb, R., Minidoka, called upon the house to pass the senate-approved measure, saying Albion was located in what is potentially "one of the most thickly populated farm areas of our state."

Eisenhower Lashes Demo Tax Cut Plan

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP)—President Eisenhower denounced the Democratic proposal for a \$20-a-head tax cut today as fiscal irresponsibility. He said he does not favor a tax cut which would head the country into greater deficit spending. He said the Democrats attached their proposed reduction to a bill to extend corporation and excise taxes at present rates because they lack the courage to offer their bill on its own merits. Mr. Eisenhower refused to say in advance whether he would veto legislation with the Democrats' tax cut rider.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP)—Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D., Wash., urged today that the government immediately building superhighways "to scrape out of cities" in event of a nuclear attack. Sen. Estes Kefauver, D., Tenn., endorsed the idea at a high-level government commission to plan ways of dealing with a grim, but not hopeless, future in the event of an atomic attack.

Deadline Set for Earning Reports

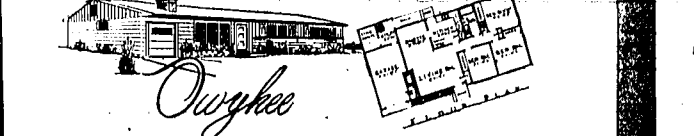

Democrat Might Seen in Chicago
 CHICAGO, Feb. 23 (AP)—Chicago's newly defeated Democratic organization showed its might today with a crushing victory over a two-term mayor who refused to be "dumped," Richard J. Daley, a veteran politician who heads the party's Cook county machinery, polled 100,000 votes more than the businessman mayor, final unofficial returns yesterday a bitterly fought primary election showed today. Daley and his well-oiled Democratic organization will face a young ex-Democrat, Robert E. Merzian, in the April 4 showdown battle for the mayor's chair of the nation's second largest city. Merzian, a 38-year-old alderman who bolted the Democratic party, won the Republican nomination in a breeze against token opposition from two candidates. He took 105,226 votes out of the 132,473 GOP ballots, one of the lowest Republican victories in years.

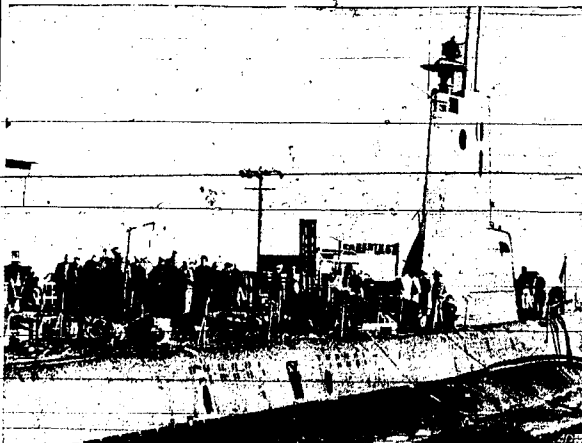

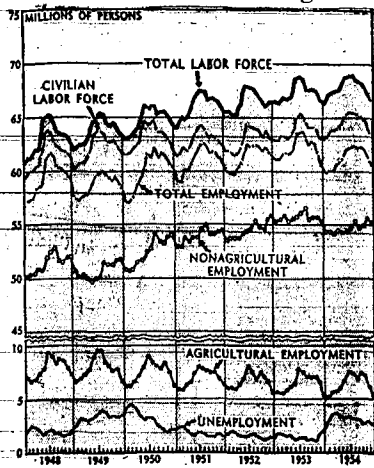

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Japan; Not Formosa, Is Seen As Real Red Target in Orient

By United Press

The red threat in Formosa and southeast Asia is grabbing the headlines. But Japan remains the No. 1 communist target in the far east.

The Formosa situation certainly is serious enough, involving as it does the danger that the United States might be dragged into a war with Communist China.

The serious communist threat to Indochina, Thailand and Burma will be the chief topic for discussion at the southeast Asia treaty organization conference which opened today in Bangkok.

But from the long range viewpoint, Japan is the great prize in the struggle between west and east in the far east.

The danger that the communists might take over in Japan has become too remote to warrant any anxiety.

There was a time when that threat was not remote, and there is no doubt that Russia's action in fomenting the Korean war was due to its desire to make Korea a stepping stone to Japan.

It is Japanese friendship and cooperation which is the prize now, however—the friendship and cooperation of nearly 90 million industrious and ambitious people.

Japan took a frightful beating in World War II. But it has made a remarkable comeback.

At present Japan is aligned closely with the United States and the western allies. It is an Asian country, however, its future lies in Asia.

Soviet, Russia and Red China, the two great communist powers, are its immediate neighbors.

Japanese Premier Ichiro Hatoyama made it plain as soon as he took office Dec. 8 that he desired closer trade and diplomatic relations with both Russia and Red China.

Hatoyama promised to maintain close ties with the United States. But any cooperation with the two communist countries could be conducted only at the expense of relations with the United States.

Russia has taken advantage of Hatoyama's attitude to start an attempt to wean Japan away from United States influence.

Russia refused to join in the peace treaty which the United States and 47 other countries signed with Japan in 1951. Now, however, Russia has offered to end the state of war between it and Japan. Negotiations are to start within a few weeks. If they succeed, Russia may agree to let Japan join the United Nations, and it may offer as bait the little Shikotan and Habomai islands, off the northwest coast of Japan, which it has held since the end of the war.

BURLEY, Feb. 23.—A franchise to install a television coaxial cable in Burley was requested at the city council meeting Monday by Wayne Allen, representative of an eastern firm operating similar systems in other cities.

Allen said his company's system would provide the city with four new-for-TV channels and would also receive color TV. The company would not sell or service TV sets and Burley dealers would handle the sales.

Installation of the cable would be handled through the telephone company. Mayor J. L. Salmon advised Allen the council would consider the matter further when Allen submitted an agreement with the telephone company, and complete details on the construction, operation and financing of the system.

The council was requested by television dealers to revoke the city's TV antenna installation ordinance. The dealers argued that the ordinance showed there are nearly 600 TV antennas in Burley, compared to 100 when the ordinance was adopted.

Kalca E. Lowe, Burley attorney who appeared at the meeting as the representative of Hal Matthews, Burley druggist, said the council client is opposed to removal of the Sunday closing ordinance which might force Matthews' store to curtail operations.

Lowe was informed the city merchants bureau is to be organized via the council to that effect. The council has also agreed to contact Burley druggists on the issue and to settle the issue, if possible, by council action.

Police Chief W. W. White informed the council schoolyard afternoon check of Overland avenue near the Overland school revealed that 98 per cent of the drivers obeyed the posted speed limit.

Most flagrant violator of the speed limit exceeded the posted limit of seven miles per hour, the chief said. A request by Pamela Burke for a license to operate a taxi at 1200 Oakley avenue was tabled pending substantiation of character references.

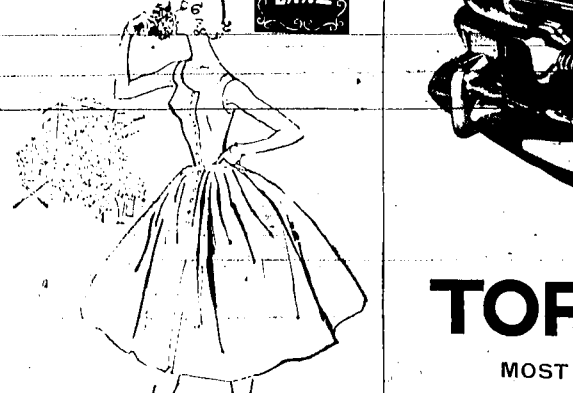

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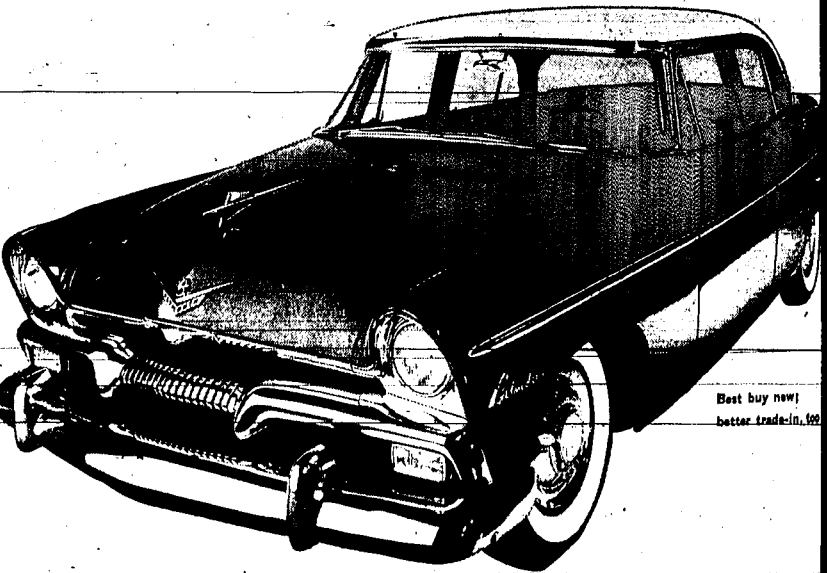
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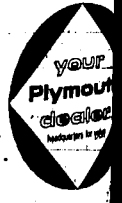

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

No child cries because he is happy. Some people think that they cry because they are hungry, or hurt, or lonely, or miserable. I think they should be attended to at once. If they are hungry, feed them; if they are lonely, comfort them; if they are hurt, attend to the hurt. Children, the babies, the runabouts, do not cry as a pleasant pastime. I know that there are people wise in the ways of childhood who say that children should be fed on schedule. I can go along with that provided a margin is left for the occasional need of an occasional child. Say that a baby has a rather small stomach and cannot eat as much of his formula as he needs for growth? He stops eating before his bottle is empty. His mother takes him away. His next feeding time is hours away. Soon he is hungry. Is he to be left to cry? Of course not. Feed him. Growing children are hungry between meals. Especially the school children. A school session is hard work and uses a lot of a child's energy. When he gets home from school he needs a filler-up. Give it to him. He will be ready for his dinner all right. Suppose the crying child has been fed. He is as comfortable physically as his mother can make him. But he is crying. Stop work and try to learn why. He is not likely to be able to tell you—for sometimes the feeling that prompts the crying is too deeply hidden in him for any expression he can give it. The trouble is in his mind. Something or somebody has done or left undone something that means much to him. Try to connect him. His state of mind is more important than the housework. Give time to trying to see why he is so unhappy. Are there children in the family older and younger than he? He may feel left out. Give him extra affection. Does anyone tease or misuse him? Stop that sort of thing as fast as possible. Does he sleep enough? Ask the family doctor to see what he can find out about his condition and maybe he can offer advice that will be helpful. DREAMY? Really? Love? Possession? Check every possible cause knowing that no child cries for the fun of it. One sort of crying needs no sympathy. When a child puts on a tantrum to get what he wants be sure to see he does not get it. Just wash his face and hands with cool water and put him to bed to sleep of his temper and his tyrannical mood. But do help the child who cries because he can't help it. Babies do not cry to be naughty—there is a reason, but as they grow older they should grow away from stop-crying babies. 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Silencing for Tires Sought by Scientists

AKRON, O., Feb. 23 (AP)—Someday you may have auto tires that won't squeal when you make a turn. Or, perhaps even completely noiseless tires.

They could come from research here by scientists of the B. F. Goodrich Company. Using 1000 different makes of tires, they are trying to find out what makes a tire squeal. It's an annoying noise, particularly at night on residential streets, and the squealing seems worse with low-pressure tires.

An analysis shows that squeal doesn't come from just one single part of the tire or tread, says Dr. F. K. Schoenfeld, director of the Goodrich research laboratory.

Called "Noise"

"The squeal is noise, not a single musical note. It is a single note, it would be coming from just one kind of vibration or friction.

The research project seeks to pin down all the component parts involved in production of squeal—checking on tread design, the type of rubber used in tires, how much noise comes from the rubbing together of tread bands.

Another research project is looking for causes of tire thumps. This thumping creates vibrations something like going over a string of little railroad ties.

Defectives Have It

It happens only with defective tires. "Thumpers" sometimes come off the production line, and can't be detected from appearance.

Here a team of scientists is running tests on thumpers. From X-rays, they find that one cause can be fabric threads out of line in the tire carcass.

Unequal pressure at one point in the tire is another cause, two researchers find. They are studying tires running at pressure over the surface of a revolving wheel. Any change in the pressure of contact between tire and the "roadway" is detected by a curve or sudden jump made by a pen writing on graph paper. The points in the tire producing the thump can be located for detailed analysis of what was wrong, and how it can be prevented on the production line.

29 Crash Victims Hacked From Ice

RIVET, Italy, Feb. 23 (AP)—Search crews used pick axes yesterday to pry from icy tombs the frozen bodies of 29 victims of a Belgian airliner crash on Mt. Terminiello, high in the Apennines of central Italy.

An advance group of 40 national police and Italian airmen went about their grim task after the arrival of a Belgian military and Belgian commission.

The plane, a Sabena-Belgian Airlines DC6, crashed at an altitude of 4,500 feet Feb. 13. All aboard perished. Four of the victims were Americans.

Luigi Rossi, skiing instructor at a Mt. Terminiello winter resort, reported the plane appeared to have missed clearing the mountain by only 14 feet.

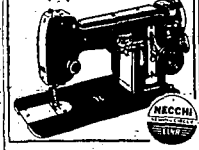

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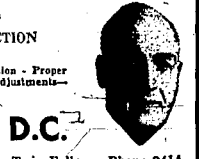


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
