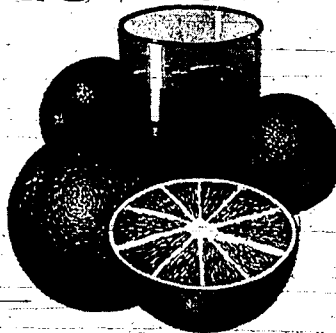

'Winnie' Calls For Easing of U. S. Criticism

LONDON, Feb. 24 (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill in an address tonight warned his own government's position on the United States' policy in the Far East.

He said there is no question of a withdrawal of British military aid from the defense of the offshore islands and that "we should be careful of what advice we should offer to our friends and allies."

Rape Laborites

In a move apparently directed at smothering British-American differences on the issue, Churchill spoke sharply to Laborite clamoring for surrender of the islands to Red China.

Churchill gave a written statement to the house after he verbally described the "comfort" Red China's refusal to attend a security council meeting on Formosa. He turned down a Laborite suggestion he inquire personally with Red China's Premier Chou En-lai.

Keep Issue Hot

At the same time Labor's national executive committee kept the controversy in the foreground by stating that Red China be given membership in the United Nations as a way of settling the explosive Far Eastern situation.

In his written report on the Formosa situation, Churchill said: "The British are engaged in a bitter struggle between the coastal islands of China and the island of Formosa."

Jump to Formosa

This is especially true at a time when the Chinese communists keep assiduously asserting that the islands are to be regarded as a stepping stone to the seizure of Formosa itself, with all that must mean for the Chinese Nationalists under Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek, who have been given shelter and protection there by the United States, and to whom the United States are bound by 47 years of comradeship in war both against the Chinese, communists and the Japanese invaders of China.

Churchill's remarks tended to back off somewhat from an earlier stand taken by his government. Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden has said publicly Britain regards the offshore islands as belonging to Red China and has privately urged U. S. Secretary of State Dulles to engage in an argument of the islands to Chinese Nationalist troops to help bring about a quick unwritten cease-fire.

HORSHEDALE, N. Y., Feb. 24 (AP)—The mysterious cobweb that blanketed parts of this village was only a harmless spider web.

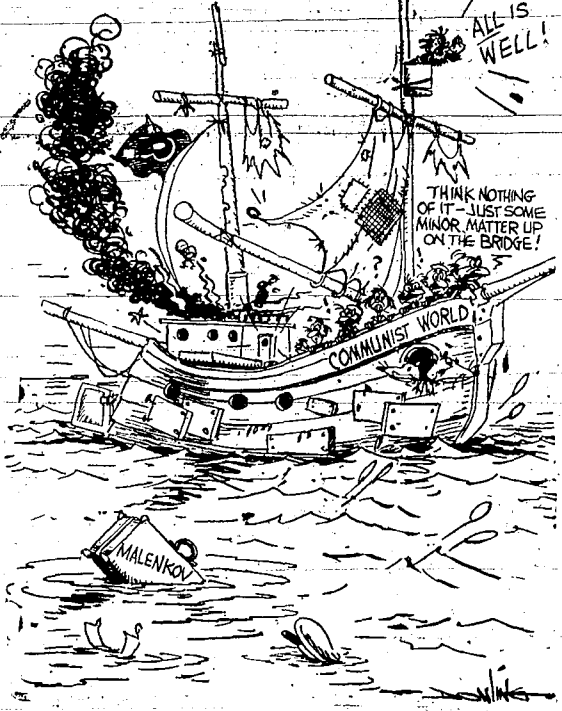
It was no more radioactive than the air you breathe.

Boyle Asks American Youths To Fight for Right to Vote

By HAL BOYLE

NEW YORK, Feb. 24 (AP)—Curbsome reflections of a pavement Platonic Congress proposed a constitutional amendment making it illegal for anyone under 21 to drive an automobile. What would happen?

Millions of teenagers would let out an outraged cry that would echo from here to Mars.

They'd write chain letters of protest, make a major match on the nation's capital, picket the White House by day and by night.

While millions teenagers now have the opportunity to fight for the greatest single privilege of American democracy, and, by and large, their attitude seems to be one of indifference. I refer to their lukewarm reaction to proposals to lower the voting age from 21 to 18.

Youth has got President Eisenhower in its corner in this matter. He backs the idea of extending the ballot to 18-year-olds. But they themselves don't seem steamed up about it. Somehow, that's a kind of sad, too.

Many older people, of course, feel that 18-year-olds are too lacking in judgment and responsibility to be given the right to vote.

"That same fear in the early days of the republic resulted in restrictions that limited the right of voting to property owners. The same fear kept women from having the vote for more than a century.

"Universal suffrage," contemptuously remarked Otto von Bismarck, "is the government of a house by its nursery."

But in 1836 a forward-thinking young lawyer of 28—long named Abraham Lincoln—had just opposite thought.

"I go for all sharing the privileges of the government, who assist in bearing the burdens," he wrote, adding he favored the right of suffrage for those "who pay taxes or bear arms by no means excluding females."

Today, proponents of earlier voting point out, there are roughly five million citizens between 18 and 21 who are now taxed without representation. Youth is not exempt from taxes, on thousands of items. Any more than the elderly are.

About 14 million are married and have set up households. And most of the men in that age group are, of course, subject to military duty.

Personally, I wouldn't mind a house if every guy and his girl got to vote at 18. If we trust them out on a public highway in a 150-horsepower auto.

why not trust them to show at least ordinary common sense in a voting booth?

Georgia has let its 18-year-olds vote for quite a spell now. It's the only state that does, and has survived the experiment in fine shape. And why not? Isn't anyone at 18, honest are at their peak, as likely to cast a selfless vote as he would be at 45?

It would be more heartening if our youth got all stirred up over the issue, marched on Washington, and really fought to win. This right to vote, teenagers with the spirit to do that would be democracy's true "hope of tomorrow."

But things granted for the mere taking usually wind up being more likely for granted. A stranger to our civilization might well ask:

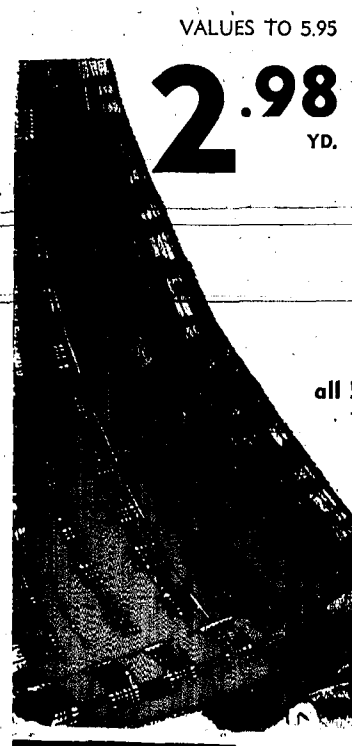

Machine Has Top Defense

NEW YORK, Feb. 24 (AP)—Electronic science has come up with a device that makes synthetic music, but a research associate who helped bring it into the world is telling music-lovers there is no cause for alarm.

New Musical

Dr. Elmer W. Engstrom, executive vice president for research and engineering at Radio Corporation of America, does not share the gloomy view of musicologists who fear RCA's "music synthesizer" will undermine the warm, personal art of music.

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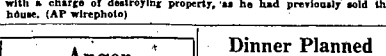
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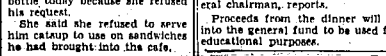
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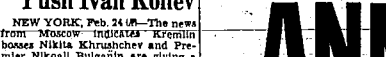
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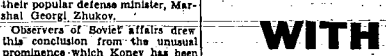
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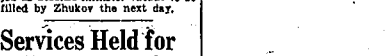
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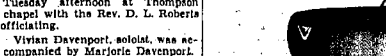
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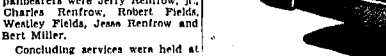
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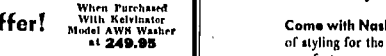
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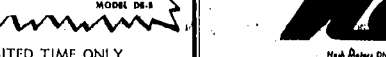
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"We're setting the stage for a new music," Engstrom said in an interview. "This is a new instrument. History shows that many composers lived in periods when someone produced a new musical instrument."

"Each wrote for the clavichord, he believe. Then the piano was invented and composers wrote music for it. As instruments change, music is written for each new one."

RCA's musical synthesizer can produce remarkably lifelike instrumental or vocal music. It can also make brand new sounds going far beyond the limits of musical instruments in use today.

To create the sounds, holes are punched in a piece of paper that is fed into a machine of many dials and switches and more than 300 electronic channels. The experimental model demonstrated, recently by RCA cost \$25,000 to build.

"We look on the synthesizer as a new method of producing music," Engstrom said. "It can put in tones that which cannot be achieved otherwise. There's no limit to its build-up of the musical note. It can change the frequency during a note. It can do anything that we can imagine in music."

He believes the potentialities of the machine are yet to be realized. Its contribution to the art of music, he said, will be known when engineers combine their talent with that of composers and musicians.

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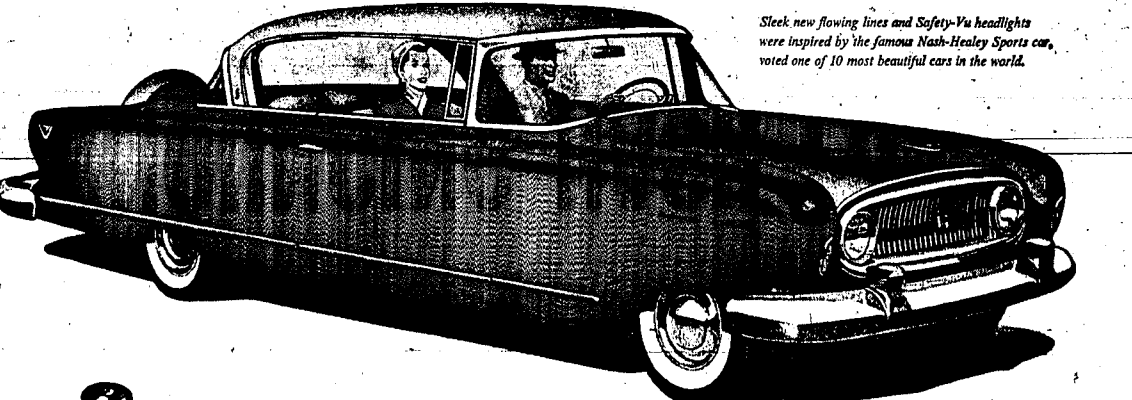

Divorce Seen Between Two Rival Parties

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)—The honeymoon of the Republican Eisenhower administration with the Democratic 84th congress has gone phony and the unhappy parties are talking for a divorce. The divorce is being sought by the Eisenhower administration, it is said by a source familiar with the situation.

Seven weeks ago today President Eisenhower was delivering to a general congress his annual message on the state of the nation and asking to utter his own greeting and shake the hand of the venerable speaker Sam Rayburn, Mr. Democrat, house of representatives.

And, back there in that year's general election campaign, it was Mr. Eisenhower who put limits on the extent to which Vice President Richard M. Nixon could develop his reputation as the Democrat over a period of 20 years, had been soft and glib on communism.

The facts of political life are unfolding before Mr. Eisenhower right now. The principal facts are these: Rayburn and his Democrats expect Mr. Eisenhower to seek a second term. They count him as the most dangerous candidate in the Republican camp and they expect to cut him down to size by mauling his domestic program on taxes and other basic issues.

Much of this may come as a surprise to the President who entered office with what appeared to be a vague idea that he would be a tame and friendly leader at heart, incapable of playing politics. That is a long way from the heated acrimony of the campaign and the sharp answers and the Democratic attacks which he heard Mr. Eisenhower's comment.

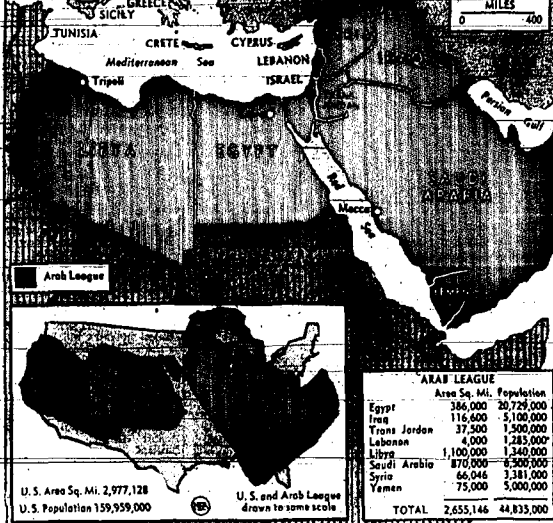
A divorce between the President and the speaker on procedure, Rayburn complained that the President was giving messages to congress without giving Democratic leaders advance warning. However, it turned out to be the fault of a Democratic clerk on the Hill.

The blow-up on taxes likely is only the beginning. As new domestic policies come before congress, will the Democrats seek to checkmate the White House, it being the custom of both parties to do so. The limit for the presidential term which is coming up in 1956.

Keen attention of British and American diplomats will be focused on the middle east, particularly the Arab league, during 1955. Goal of U. S. 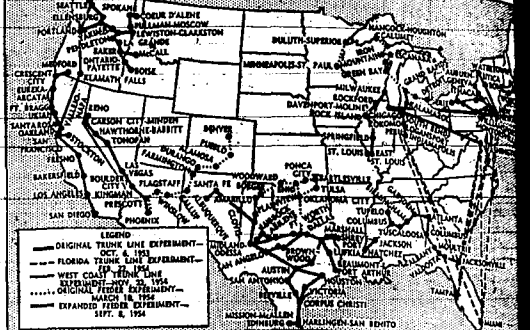

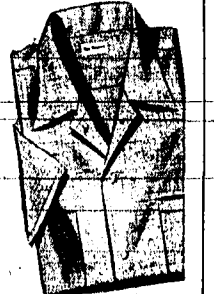

"These earrings were given to my grandmother by the emperor... this is my brooch... this is my husband's castle in Freiburg," she said.

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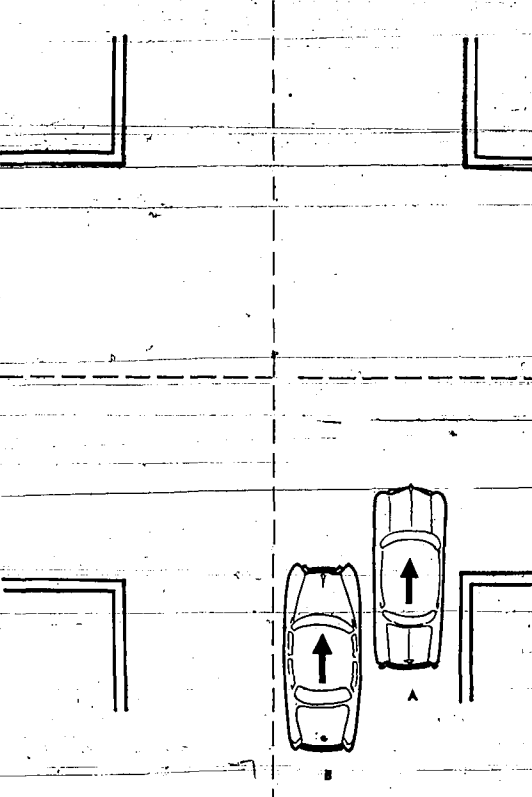
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Proper Lane Important for Left Turn



Vehicle "B" is in the proper lane to begin a left turn, while vehicle "A" is in the wrong lane for a left turn. When turning left, "B" must yield the right of way to all cars approaching in the opposite direction.

Proper Procedure Outlined For Making Legal Left Turn

"Most drivers seem to have an idea that left turns should be executed from the right hand lane as near to the right side of the roadway as possible," says Police Chief Howard Gillette.

"When we come to the question of left turns, some drivers seem to think that they may turn to the left from either lane of the right side of the road, disregarding approaching traffic altogether. Accidents often are the result," the chief says.

"The city vehicle code states that a driver intending to make a left turn at an intersection shall make his approach in the portion of the right half of the roadway nearest the center line. After entering the intersection the left turn shall be made so as to leave the intersection to the right of the center-line of the roadway being entered, unless otherwise directed by markers, butions or signs."

Prior to beginning the left turn, the turning driver shall yield the right of way to all vehicles ap-

proaching the intersection as long as they constitute a danger to the car's turning movement.

The chief also stresses that turning movements, whether they be to the right or left, should be signaled by proper hand signals or directional lights for at least 100 feet before making the turn.

The proper arm signal for a left turn is arm and hand extended horizontally. After a traffic light changes from red to green, traffic waiting to make a left turn shall wait until all cars proceeding straight ahead in the opposite direction have been driven across.

Emphasizing the fact that the chief says a number of accidents occur as the result of attempting to turn left quickly in front of oncoming traffic.

Former Utah Solon Begins Talks Career

DETROIT, Feb. 24 (AP)—Douglas R. Stringfellow, former Utah congressman who dropped out of politics when his stories of wartime heroism were proved a fake last fall, turned up in a new role today—paid lecturer on morals.

Stringfellow, who went off the congressional payroll Jan. 1 when the new congress took office, took the first steps to rebuild his life by starting a lecture tour.

He spoke in Kalamazoo, Mich., and Detroit this week. He has other talks scheduled in Jackson, Mich., March 2 and Yuma, Ariz., March 7. His subject is "What I Have Learned."

The 32-year-old Republican dropped out of public life last October with the tearful admission that his "cloak and dagger" story, which had helped him to win an American Legion citation for "outstanding leadership traits" and a portrayal of his life on a national TV show, was all a fake.

Before his admission, his story of his work behind anti-Nazi lines in Germany during World War II had captivated many audiences. In it he told how a group, in which he was the sole survivor, had been successful in hamstringing Hitler's efforts to produce an A-bomb.

"I'm solely responsible for that tale," Stringfellow said. "I've made a clean breast of it. Perhaps I could be called the champion of hypocrisy, and rightly so. But I feel I've admitted my guilt. And I'm paying for it."

Announcements of his lectures haven't gone unnoticed.

One Detroit woman wrote a local newspaper asking: "What has happened? What dislocated thought process is responsible for this insult to those who value honesty?"

Another wrote: "How does he get the guts to stand up and give his opinions after he admitted his war hero stories were phony only when confronted with proof?"

The new lectures are less captivating than those he made as a "war hero." He opens them with a brief mention of the phony story. Then he launches into a lecture on morals.
