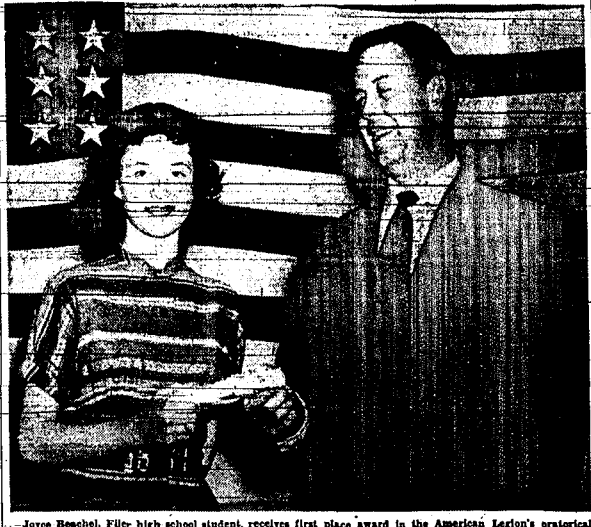

**Potential Shortages for Water Lead to Irrigating Suggestions**

Because the water supply for many irrigated farms in this area is expected to be far below normal, the soil conservation service is making a number of suggestions to get the best results from "the supply available."

M. W. Nelson, Boise, snow survey leader for the SCS, said snow surveys as of the middle of this month indicate the snow pack is the lowest on record for this time of the year. Dry soil beneath the snow further increases the possibility of a critical water shortage, he said.

Judging from past records, three-fourths of the total snow pack usually had fallen by the middle of February and unless there is an unusual amount of snow and rain between now and the first of April, the water shortage will not be overcome, he added.

Walter Hankins, SCS snow surveyor for this area, will make another survey south of Twin Falls next Tuesday. His report is expected to be available on Wednesday.

To offset some of the potential seriousness of the situation, the SCS is suggesting farmers adopt practices to get the most benefit from the water available.

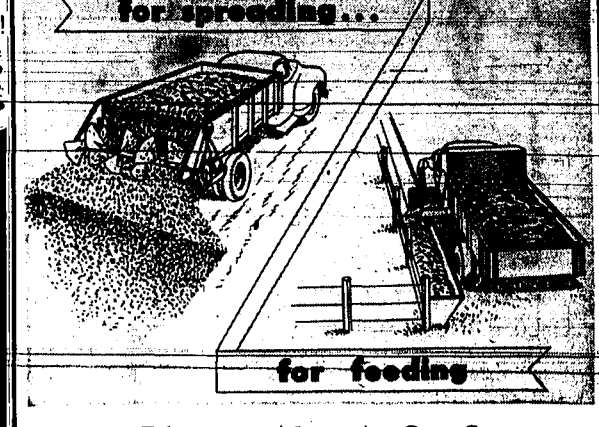

### British Group Hits Churchill Defense Plans

LONDON, Feb. 25 (AP)—British Laborites tonight challenged the Churchill government's new atomic age military program as a carping money for conventional weapons.

Laborites said to draft a censure motion—immediately after—postponing a vote on a blueprint of the Royal Air Force, it said, would guarantee overwhelming superiority against any aggressor combined with America's air might.

Air Minister Lord De Vile D'Essex announced a new air-bill, announced a white paper presented to parliament on appropriations for the new fiscal year.

Repeating Britain is building her bomber air force to a state of high efficiency and preparedness, the minister added:

Thus, the Royal Air Force, together with the United States Air Force, will provide the main deterrent to aggression, and is by the threat of overwhelming nuclear striking power that an aggressor will be deterred.

Laborites came right back by saying the Churchill government had budgeted too much money for conventional weapons.

The air force estimates rounded out the Churchill government's defense program, the minister declared, featuring manufacture of the hydrogen bomb, an army geared to nuclear warfare and a navy of superhull missile ships.

But the opposition charged that was not enough emphasis on the secret of the H-bomb and was going full speed ahead with its production.

### Batista Takes Reins of Cuba

HAVANA, Cuba, Feb. 25 (AP)—General Fulgencio Batista, Cuba's 45-year-old strongman, came back to the island's White House yesterday as president to assume the reins of the government.

There was no show of disorders that his enemies had threatened. The new regime probably had been a connected incident. Two Cuban gangsters were slain by police after an arms cache was uncovered in the city.

Officials said the stock of 30 machine-guns and other weapons probably had been intended for use by the Batista.

Leader of two revolutions since 1933, the old army sergeant was sworn in for a four-year term in a brief ceremony at the presidential palace.

### Rescuers Seek to Save 24,000 Sheep

RAVENHILL, Wyo., Feb. 25 (AP)—Six relief crews battled their way through huge drifts of snow yesterday in an effort to get feed to an estimated 24,000 starving sheep isolated following a blizzard of the past.

The rescue operations were being carried on in the snowbound northwestern portion of Carbon county where numerous flocks were reported trapped on ground covered so thickly by snow that grazing is impossible.
