Postal Salary Boost Okayed By Committee

WASHINGTON, March 4 (AP)—The House postoffice committee today approved legislation to give an average 7.5 per cent increase to some 125,000 postoffice employees in various parts of the country.

Committee chairman Tom Murray, D. Tenn., estimated that the bill, if enacted into law, would cost the government about \$15 million annually.

Blood-Colored Lava Misses Hawaii Town

HILO, Hawaii, March 4 (AP)—First traces of daylight disclosed today that Kapeho village "miraculously" stood intact even though blood-red lava was flowing fiercely on both sides—and within 200 yards—of the tiny sugar plantation town.

Volcanologist Dr. Gordon MacDonald, who spent the night flitting with death to track the flow, reported to the Olaia police station—some 15 miles from Kapeho—that the village "might survive." The 335 residents of Kapeho were evacuated two days ago.

U. S. Moves to Annul Korea Truce Group

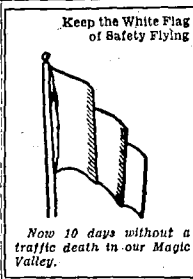

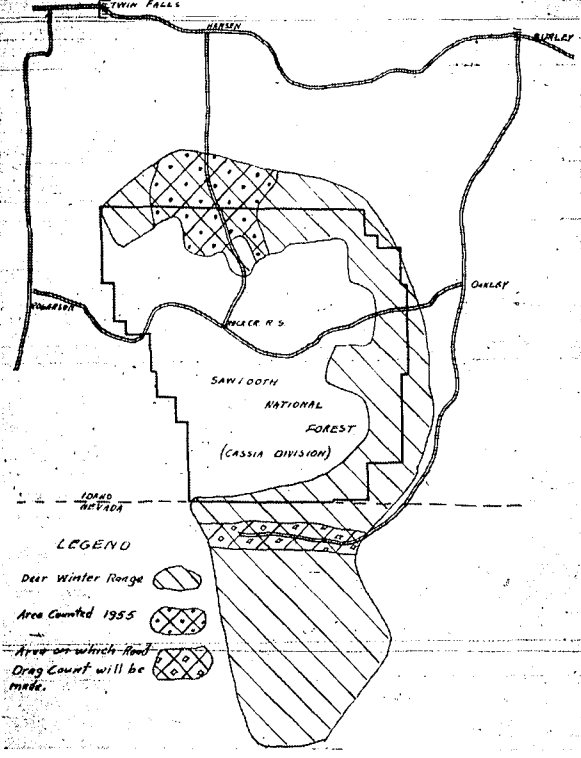

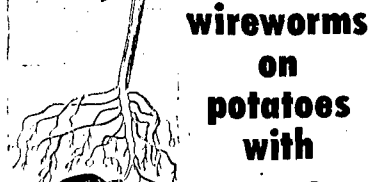

U.S. Order Stops New Freight Rate

PORTLAND, March 4 (AP)—A federal court order yesterday told six railroads they cannot put into effect in the Pacific northwest new, low freight rates on petroleum products.

The decision upset an interstate commerce commission order approving the rates. The rail lines had proposed the lower tariffs in an effort to regain business lost to barges, trucks and a pipeline.

The lower rates, covering petroleum products shipped between Oregon, Washington, Idaho and parts of Montana and Wyoming, were to have gone into effect Dec. 9, 1952. The day before that, truck and barge lines, joined by the AT&T Telephone union and the Pacific Inland Traffic bureau, petitioned for an injunction.

Committee Begins Communism Tour

WASHINGTON, March 4 (AP)—The House un-American activities committee will hold hearings during the next month in Seattle, Newark and Milwaukee on alleged communist activities.

First hearings will open in Seattle on March 17, and will be followed by sessions in Newark starting March 28, and in Milwaukee beginning April 4.

Thomas W. Davis, committee clerk, said no specific field of endeavor will be investigated but that the committee will be checking into "communism" in general.

Probes Readied On Plane Crash

TOKYO, March 4 (AP)—The United States air force announced today it has grounded its C-119 flying boxcars as safety air base in southern Japan pending further investigation of a crash of one of the planes Tuesday.

A spokesman denied reports that sabotage was suspected. One airman was killed and two others are missing and presumed dead in the crash of a cargo plane which developed engine trouble on a flight from Japan to Okinawa. Four crewmen survived.
